Eunice Woman Heads State B. & P. W. Clubs

The 34th state convention of the Business and Professional Women named Mrs. Lenore Snell of Eunice as its new president in Ruidoso Saturday.

Other officers are: Mrs. Robert Lovell, Alamogordo, first vice-president; Mrs. Mary S. Payne, Lovington, second vice-president; Mrs. Faye Almes, Farmington, secretary; and Mrs. Hilda Loepfle Rowell, treasurer.

Resolutions passed included a request to the Legislature to require periodic eye tests for all drivers and making it mandatory to have every citizen typed for blood.

The executive committee took under consideration a resolution for the site of the 1939 convention city.

The Ruidoso Club, playing host to the convention, carried commitments of the state-wide organization for its hospitality. Here U. S. Post Office and National Bank of Ruidoso, along with souvenir literature, pictures, etc., about this area.

Attendance at this year's state meeting was declared to be the largest in many years, leaders said.

No bids were received for the 1939 state convention.

The convention also went on record in support of a plan whereby all persons would become members of the blood bank, and whereby it would have their blood typed, including RH negative or positive.

Convention members noted that such a program is made necessary by the increasing number of highway accidents in New Mexico, and accidents which are a drain on the state's blood bank reserves.

Primarily, however, such a program is intended to protect the individual, the convention noted.

The organization will present a resolution to the Legislature for this summer at Seattle, Washington, providing that the national convention be held annually.

Speaker at the Saturday night banquet, Miss Fannie Hardy of Little Rock, Ark., has been elected president of the National Federation, returned to the group the "pledge of knowing your neighbors and understanding their ways, even though it might be miles across land or sea. Through education the things can be accomplished. The world is becoming more closely knit and after a few years our future conventions may be held on the moon due to our stepped up space travel program."

Among the new committees appointed during the new board meeting was one to investigate the New Mexico community property laws. After the completion of their investigation, a woman attorney will be appointed to study the findings so that proper corrective measures may be made through legislation.

Sewer System Survey Starts

Preliminary surveying is already under way on Ruidoso's sewer system, bonds for which were approved overwhelmingly by voters in the April 1 municipal election.

A crew of men for Wilcox & Co., engineers, was here last week taking the first steps in laying out proposed lines by surveying in many parts of the community.

CHINO'S NAME WILL APPEAR ON BALLOT

Wendell Chino, Mesquero Apache tribal leader, has won his legal battle to get his name on the Democratic primary ballot as candidate for nomination for State Representative, position 1, in Otero County.

District Judge Allan D. Walker made permanent a temporary writ of mandamus commanding County Clerk Margaret Sanchez to certify Chino's candidacy to the Secretary of State. He had previously refused to do so on the basis of an attorney general's opinion holding Chino ineligible to run because he had registered as a Republican in 1948 then as a Democrat in 1950, without filing an affidavit changing his party affiliation.

Assistant District Attorney Lalo Garza argued at the hearing that filing such an affidavit is mandatory under New Mexico law. Chino's attorneys, George A. Shipley and Albert J. Rivera, contended that re-registering fulfilled the purpose of an affidavit and that the statute is discriminatory rather than mandatory.



CITY PARK IS PLANNED IN HEART OF CAPITAN

The Capitan Smokey Bear Committee met recently to start the ball rolling for the giant project the town plans to undertake to make the community a worthwhile tourist attraction.

Mr. Bill Holmes donated an acre of land adjoining the Hollis Cummings' land for the proposed Smokey Bear museum. The Capitan Woman's Club plans to build a city park on the Holmes gift, complete with picnic facilities for people visiting the birthplace of the fire preventing bear.

Mr. Don Murphy named a committee to spearhead the proposed projects. Fletch Hall and Ray Provine are in charge of the building of the museum. Newly elected Mayor Joe Borch offered to build a stone fireplace, the Forest Service is furnishing the logs and blueprints, and the Woman's Club will set up the exhibits. The Washington Office of the Forest Service has agreed to build 3-dimentional pictures of the story of Smokey's life. Volunteer labor will build the museum with the characteristic willingness of the men who constructed the Lincoln County Fair grounds in Capitan. Fletch Hall said, "You let us know the date you want it finished, and we'll have it for you."

School Superintendent Bill Hall was named by Mr. Murphy to have charge of the construction of new portals for the park in Palmer Holmes was asked to see to the construction of advertising signs to be placed at strategic points along our highway. Paul Sederback will head a fund-raising drive. The group enthusiastically endorsed the reactivation of the Chamber of Commerce and urged that all individuals sign up and help push the efforts to put the "Birthplace of Smokey" on the map and make it a place that tourists will want to visit and show their friends.

A reception will be held at City Hall Thursday afternoon, April 24, for the tour for Travel Writers which the Tourist Bureau and the New Mexico AAA Motor Club are sponsoring. At that time, this group of writers and editors from newspapers and magazines around the country will be shown the site of the museum and park and be given a briefing of Capitan's plans for development of the Smokey Bear attractions.





KITE FLYING IS DANGEROUS NEAR ELECTRIC WIRES

An appeal to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires was issued today by Community Public Service.

"The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is lots of fun for children if it is done safely," Joe Coe, local CPS manager, pointed out. "Many youngsters don't realize the danger in this innocent pastime if certain safety rules are not observed. The most important thing

is to never fly kites where there is the possibility of their getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite if it becomes entangled in electric wires, according to Coe.

New Wing At Ft. Stanton Hospital To Be 'Completely Filled' When Ready For Use, Doctor Says

News was flashed from Ft. Stanton last week of the awarding of a contract to Pan-O-Rama Enterprises of Ruidoso and Howell for construction of a 20-bed wing to the tuberculosis sanatorium. An additional 50% matching appropriation is being sought from the federal Hill-Burton fund, also.

Just how badly needed is the new wing, forecast in an exclusive story more than five months ago by the Ruidoso News, is this release received last week-end from Martin Litvin, who now handles press relations for the sanatorium:

"The new wing to be an extension of Fort Stanton's building number four will be completely filled by patients directly after completion, Dr. H. C. Jernigan, Fort Stanton Medical Director, stated. He explained that the bed capacity is currently limited by the New Mexico Department of Health is 192 and said that although the new wing would increase the figure to 222 beds, a considerable need for further expansion and utilization and will continue to be pressing, because of the high incidence of tuberculosis in New Mexico; the Department of Public Health is on record recommending the availability of 400 beds.

"A waiting list of 30 prospective patients exists at present, Dr. Jernigan said, and because of this situation the hospital is deeply concerned with devising the most possible effective procedure of treatment which will focus on the individual needs of patients. Yet the cost of treating more patients will not advance appreciably, Dr. Jernigan said, because volume operation does tend to reduce new outgrowths of expense.

"The number of people with TB in the State who will not take advantage of Fort Stanton's facilities has grown noticeably smaller, Dr. Jernigan said, which indicates a growing awareness of the benefits of hospitalization now taking place in the minds of the citizenry.

"The number of cases of active TB reported as of March 29 to the New Mexico Department of Health was 196, Dr. Jernigan said, contrasting that figure with 205, the average number of cases reported on the same date five years ago, illustrating our undiminished need for adequate facilities, since the difference of 9 cases shows that the incidence in New Mexico is not decreasing appreciably. The principle of isolation for cases of active pulmonary tuberculosis is being successfully applied today, Dr. Jernigan said, but he went on to remark that patients at Fort Stanton who are isolated in the medical sense are nonetheless being offered Occupational Therapy and Vocational Rehabilitation in an effort to utilize all free time for constructive purposes."

Letter to the Editor

Ruidoso, N. M. April 23, 1958

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

No doubt you are aware that the high, dry winds we have been having the past few days spell the beginning of our spring fire season.

In view of the fact that we have had considerable winter and early spring moisture it might be easy for some of us to be lulled into false "sense of security." We have learned from painful experience in the past that it doesn't pay to take anything for granted in this fire prevention game. We know that the best way for us to prevent a disastrous fire from occurring is to prevent it from ever starting in the first place.

These high winds can dry out the grass fuels, such as pine needles and grass very rapidly. No matter how much moisture we have beneath the surface of the ground, fires will still spread rapidly in the grass fuels on the ground surface, especially with a strong wind pushing them.

I'm sure you will exercise extreme caution as you have in the past. I know that you will not attempt to burn rubbish when there is the slightest chance the fire will get out of hand. Most of you have been very good about obeying the local city ordinances covering fire prevention and suppression, and also the regulations laid down by the Forest Service to prevent fires on its lands. I trust that you will continue to use the same caution in the future.

We all have a big fire prevention job to do in this area this year and for several years to come. The Forest Service will continue to cooperate very closely with the local fire department and the local civic organizations to get out top and stay on top of this fire

WHAT CAN YOU MAIL IS QUESTION OFTEN ASKED OF LOCAL POSTOFFICES

The variety of items that people send—or try to send—through the mails is amazing. From form notices and trinkets of little consequence to social and business transactions of incalculable value, most everything makes grist for the biggest business on earth. But not all that is deposited is welcome.

Certain types of letters and packages are violations of law. Violations are being penalized of up to \$5,000 in fines and five years imprisonment, or both. One of the better known non-mailable items is chain letters. Others are lottery advertising and lottery tickets, sweepstakes tickets, obscene articles relating to birth prevention, liquor, firearms, explosives, matches, caustic acids, reasonable statements, poisons and poisonous reptiles.

In general, any articles, compositions, or materials which may hurt or injure another, or injure the mails or other property are non-mailable. Primary purpose of the law is to protect the mails against damage, to protect those who handle them against personal harm, and to protect the public against fraud. Some items ordinarily prohibited may be sent through the mails if they conform to special regulations as to preparation and packaging and if they are not outwardly dangerous, or of their own force dangerous or injurious to life, health, or property.

The burden rests with the mailer to insure that he has complied with the law. So if you are in doubt call Acting Postmaster L. F. Dryden. "The more helpful we can be to our patrons on these and other matters, the greater the profit eventually to both them and us," he says.


