Wednesday for the Saturday and Sunday races, respectively, for next week-end's program. Additional grandstand seating, an enlarged jockey club, new motion picture film patrol projection, improved rest rooms, more parking windows, additional parking space, more barns for stabling the quarterhorses and thoroughbreds and other improvements will greet the 1958 fans when they swim into the track next Friday.

## The County Agent Reports

(By RALPH DUNLAP)  
Market News  
Cattle prices are holding steady, several fat calf contracts at 29 to 32 for steers, and \$27.00-\$31.00 for heifers.  
Sheep and lamb sales were quiet, with a fall contract for black-face cross lambs, at \$23.00 for September delivery.

Around The County  
I visited several orchards last week with W. J. Wiltbank, extension horticulturist, and John J. Durkin, extension entomologist. Clover mites were noted in the Fred McTeague orchard, and a few McDaniel mites were noted on one tree in A. T. Pingleton's orchard. Mites are most easily noted on the water sprouts in the shaded center of the tree. If over 8 are noted on the leaves, it is time to start spraying. If any mites are noted include a miticide in your next spray application. Some good miticides are lethane, system, and DN-11. Some other promising insecticides that will kill mites are Guthion, trithion, and diazinon. A. T. Pingleton has some trial plots of these insecticides in his orchard. John Thomas put five pounds (poly boy) on his orchard, and got a little leaf burn. Growers should follow the recommendations put out by manufacturers. One pound per 100 gallons were recommended in this case. Apply the amount needed in several sprays.  
Powdery mildew was noted in most orchards, especially Jonathan trees in the Honko valley. Powdery mildew is more active during the damp weather we have been having lately. Control should be applied early, as the fruiting wood for next year can be seriously affected. Use sulfur at four pounds per 100 gallons for leaf-burns for mildew control in your cover sprays. At least 2 applications are required for control.  
Mr. McDaniel was having an excessive amount of blighting of the apple blossoms on the trees during the past week. This is due to poor pollination of the blossoms. Poor bee activity, and solid blocks of Red Delicious apples, was the explanation. W. J. Wiltbank gave the fruit blighting.  
Bart never had a small acreage of onions planted for commercial production. They look good so far, although considerable time will be required to weed them.  
The pecan grafts done on his tree three years ago may bear fruit this year, as there are some pecans on the grafted Tscham limb.
