

WARRIORS PLAY TONITE WITH TULAROSA HERE; GAME STARTS 7:30 P. M.

The Ruidoso Warriors are looking for their fourth win of the season when they meet the Tularosa Wildcats in Ruidoso Friday night at 7:30. The defending State Class C Champions are stepping out of their class again to play Class B Tularosa. The Warriors hold victories over Class B Hatch and Roswell B, and last week won their first district game over Captain 21 to 6.

Tulle comes into the game with a decisive victory over Carrizozo, a loss to Silver City and last week's victories to Santa Rosa. Co-Captain Tuffy Wilson of the Warriors, who mazed the Captain encounter last week because of an ankle injury in the Hatch game, is expected to be available for limited defensive action against Tularosa. This should strengthen the Warrior secondary which gave up 105 yards of passes last week.

The Warriors will be without the services of first string end Ronnie Dodson and tackle Dave Vance. Dodson, who has been out since the Hatch game, will be replaced this week by freshman Jerry Wilson. Pilling in for the 290-pound Vance will be Reynaldo Sanchez.

In just three plays Jerry Reynolds tossed a left-handed pass to Reed Sturman, who scampered to the left to go over standing up. The play covered about 21 yards. Wilson Howard bulldozed an extra point through right guard.

A couple of handsome punts by Joe Lee Smith of Captain were noteworthy in this first frame.

In the second quarter Carroll (Shorty) Jones raked up two beautiful runs for good yardage, each a first down, as the Tigers worried toward the goal in the hopes of getting a score. Penalties, however, erased some of the gains for the Tigers. Ruidoso covered, a Captain fumble on Captain's 30 to give Warrior boosters hopes for more scoring.

Captain failed to capitalize on a break late in the first half when Claude Montoya covered a Ruidoso fumble on the Ruidoso 16. Purcella Wilson, who had a 30-yard punt to put the ball down in the shadow of the goal posts, but three tries failed to earn a touchdown. Ruidoso was given the ball on downs on their own five in a goal post drive.

In the third quarter, Sturman gained ground in the third quarter, racking up four first downs with Maroney, Reed Sturman, Howard and Benny Jones taking turns galloping. It was in this frame, after the ball exchanging hands a couple of times, that Sturman tossed a 30-yard return of a punt. 

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



Foster sold parts of the ranch to Herb Lowry of Roswell and to the Armstrong family of Roswell."
