

Turkey Shoot Is Set Sunday By Gun Club

Another of the Ruidoso Gun Club's popular fall turkey shoots is set for Sunday of this week-end, starting at 10 a. m. on the gun club's rifle range up Cedar Creek. The shoots are held to aid hunters in getting their shooting irons in shape, and their eyes sharpened for the night and targets for big game season, just around the corner. Frozen turkeys will be awarded shooters making the best hit on running deer targets. Any rifle and any sight is acceptable in the gun club's turkey shoot, secretary R. H. Hedgcock reports.

Illegal Ammunition, Guns Are Listed For Big Game Hunting

Charley Bird, game commissioner for this area, whose office is at the Ruidoso Hotel, has reported that there is considerable interest in just what constitutes illegal ammunition and legal guns for big game hunting, with the season in the offing. He said, according to a bulletin from the Game and Fish Department, there are three categories of illegal ammunition: "It shall be illegal to use steel or full-patched bullets in hunting, taking or attempting to take big game of any kind, except turkey and quail." The use of any fully automatic gun or rifle in the taking of game of birds is prohibited. "It shall be unlawful to use any gun or the following list in taking, hunting, pursuing or killing any game animal or game bird, provided that turkey, duck, grouse and quail may be hunted, pursued or killed in the manner specified by annual regulations: "ALL .22 cal rim fire (also .25, .32, 30 rim fire), 210 line, 22 Hornet, 25-30, 32-20 (32 Winchester) also known as 32 W. C. F., 32 Winchester, 30-40 (30 Winchester) also known as 30 W. C. F., 44-40 (44 Winchester) also known as 44 W. C. F., 30 M-1 Army Carbine (not 30-30), 30-06, 410 gauge shotgun with slug."

He also warned hunters to be sure to tag all game immediately upon killing same, and urged all hunters to study their game procedure maps to be certain of boundaries of areas in which they hunt.

Warriors End With Win, Loss Last Two Tilts

A well-trained, hard fighting Estancia Bear team Saturday afternoon here spoiled the Ruidoso High School's Homecoming with a 6-0 defeat for the Warriors that saw one of the best played defense vs games this year on the part of Ruidoso. Ruidoso gained more yardage than did Estancia with rugged drives that toted up 12 first downs for Ruidoso to 10 for the visitors.

The lone touchdown came in the third period when Estancia capitalized on a Ruidoso fumble on Ruidoso's 32 yard line to pivot towards the goal from there in a series of hard-driving runs to put the ball across. Ronnie Blackwell did most of the ball carrying, and went over with the score. An attempted kick for the point went wide to the left.

Ruidoso threatened early in the game, then two times in the final quarter—pushing toward the goal twice in that last game only to lose the ball even before a penetration could be gained. On one drive the Warriors drove from their six yard line to the Estancia 40 yard line. Estancia intercepted a Warrior aerial to stop that march; and then again later in the period, Ruidoso went from the Warrior 35 up to the Estancia 42 where four pass attempts in a row were incomplete, to give the ball to Estancia as the game faded into history.

The visitors fought down Ruidoso's passing attack with success—knocking down more than a dozen attempts at critical times. Twice the Bears intercepted Ruidoso passes.

Both teams played toe-to-toe in the first two quarters with Ruidoso earning six first downs to Estancia's five, and with not too much in the way of excitement, except for the threat by the Warriors early in the first period when the locals carried the ball down to the seven yard line only to lose it on a fumble.

Wilson Howard made one splendid gallop, going 35 yards off right guard for a great, big juicy first down in this march. Ruidoso was rough on Estancia's passing attack in the second period, knocking down several that might have been good. Punting by Ruidoso and Estancia was the highlight of the second frame, each laying the ball way back in enemy territory.

Lundy's running and pass interception proved heavy artillery for the visitors, while Sturman, Tuffy Wilson, Benny Jones and Maroney shone in good points in pass snatching and pass interception for the Warriors in the second period.

The third quarter was all Estancia's, the visitors marking up four first downs to none for Ruidoso—except as the victorious TD was scored by the Warriors with a 6-2 record for this year.

A pair of football queens, Ella Ruth Jackson and Lynda Redmann, who received tied votes, were introduced to the crowd during halftime as the 1958 gridiron royalty.

The game left the Warriors with a football king, Co-captains Royce Lackey and Jim Wilson escorted the football queens to the front of a formation of football players and the members of the school band during the cheering and escorted Estancia to the front amid the cheers of the fans.

The band, under direction of LeRoy Gooch, presented a medley of Christmas numbers in its final half-time performance this season.

Dedication Services Are Held For New Pews In Reformed Church

Services were held recently at the Mesalero Reformed Church located on the Reservation, dedicating the new pews for the sanctuary. The church was built nine years ago. From that time until sufficient funds were made available, folding chairs have been used by the congregation when attending services.

Fund raising projects by the women of the church and donations made it possible to purchase the fine new casket pews that are now in use.

The church plant is one of which any city could be proud. Besides adequate recreational facilities, the building includes a kitchen and rest rooms.

The sanctuary has an impressive stained glass window. This work of art was presented to the church by

the Harper family. The presentation was in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Richard Harper who were pioneer missionaries 50 years ago. Rev. Harper dearly loved the Indian people and was one of the first missionaries at Mesalero.

The story told by the window is very interesting. The left panel of the windows tells the Apache warrior has laid down his weapons of war to become a Good Soldier of Jesus Christ. He has taken the Word of God that he may be able to stand. This is a memorial to all Apache and Indian service men.

The right window tells that there were Indian men who became spokesmen for God—the interpreters of God's Word. Without them the older Indians could not know the message of Salvation through Christ. This is a memorial to all the interpreters.

The center window panel tells that Jesus is the Good Shepherd over all His people.

The Rev. Harvey Calsbeck is pastor of the church. Herman Van Galen is his assistant. Rev. Calsbeck has served the church 4 1/2 years. Membership of the church is 95 per cent native Indians. Four chapels make up the church's 140 membership.

A Weekly Sermonette Our Ministers Write—

"SOMETHING IMMORTAL"

That "Something Immortal" is generally simple, brief and satisfactory. The first cry of a new born babe, the receiving of a hard earned diploma, the assent to engagement and marriage on the part of some wonderful woman, the matters we always remember because we can't forget them. Sometimes they come as a result of much preparation and sometimes they come as surprises. This unexpected element possibly was one reason Jesus said, "Take no thought for the morrow for the morrow will take thought for the things of itself."

Some of the most unexpected and unforgettable experiences in life come in fishing and hunting. The fish and the deer are where you find them. As the hunting season is upon us we might think of one of the characters in the early story of Genesis, "Nimrod who was a mighty hunter before the Lord" as the record says. The Bible does not say why he was so called. Maybe the best explanation is that he was a very skillful hunter and also a truly Godly man. This is a remarkable combination and not often seen.





INTRODUCED BY:

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 7, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW ABSENTEE VOTING.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 7, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Every citizen of the United States,

who is over the age of twenty-one years, and has resided in New Mexico twelve months, in the county ninety days, and in the precinct in which he offers to vote thirty days next preceding the election, except idiots, insane persons, persons convicted of a felonious or infamous crime unless restored to political rights, shall be qualified to vote at all elections for public officers. The legislature may enact laws providing for absentee voting by qualified electors. All school elections shall be held at different times from other elections.

The legislature shall have the power to require the registration of the qualified electors as a requisite for voting, and shall regulate the manner, time and places of voting. The legislature shall enact such laws as will secure the secrecy of the ballot, the purity of elections and guard against the abuse of elective franchise. Not more than two members of the board of registration and not more than two judges of election shall belong to the same political party at the time of their appointment."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. There is hereby created a 'state department of public education' and a 'state board of education.' The state board of education shall determine public school policy and vocational education policy and shall have control, management and direction of all public schools, pursuant to authority and powers provided by law. The board shall appoint a qualified, experienced educational administrator to be known as the superintendent of public instruction, who shall, subject to the policies established by the board, direct the operation of the state department of public education.

The members of the state board of education shall be elected at the general election next following the adoption of this amendment. One member shall be elected from each of the present ten judicial districts. The initial board shall determine by lot from its members three members to serve terms of two years and three members to serve terms of four years. The remaining of the initial board shall serve terms of six years. Thereafter, as the terms of the initial board members expire, their replacements shall be elected from the same districts for terms of six years.

"If additional judicial districts are created the legislature may provide by law for the election by the people of a board of not less than seven members nor more than ten members from board of education districts, created by the legislature.

"The governor shall fill vacancies in the board by appointment of a resident from the district in which the vacancy occurs. Appointments shall be made within sixty days after the vacancy occurs. The appointed member shall serve until the next general election, at which time a member shall be elected to complete the original unexpired term.

"C. Board members shall be residents of the district they represent. Change of residence of a board member to a place outside the district from which he was elected shall automatically terminate the term of that member. The board members may be removed in the manner in which the legislature may provide by law."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 3, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for the term of two years beginning on the first day of January next after their election.

"Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms be ineligible to hold any state office for two years thereafter.

"The officers of the executive department except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 32 of the constitution to read:

"Section 32. No obligation or liability of any person, association or corporation held or owned by or

owing to the state, or any municipal corporation, shall ever be exchanged, transferred, remitted, released, postponed, or in any way diminished by the legislature, nor shall any such obligation or liability be extinguished except by the payment thereon into the proper treasury, or by proper proceeding in court. Provided that the obligations created by Special Session Laws 1935, Chapter 5 running to the state or any of its agencies, remaining unpaid on the effective date of this amendment are void."

"Section 2. All county officers shall be elected for a term of four years.






