

RICHEST QUARTER HORSE RACE IN HISTORY OF TURF SET HERE FOR LABOR DAY AT RUIDOSO DOWNS

The richest quarter horse race in history will be run Labor Day in 1959, Sept. 7, at Ruidoso Downs, fastest growing race track in the U. S. Estimated gross value of the purse for the first running of the All American Futurity for Quarter Horses is more than \$50,000.00, with The Downs to add \$5,000.00, and with 5% of the pari-mutuel handle to be put on top of that.

On Nov. 1 this year there were 84 eligible colts, geldings and fillies, Gene Henley, primary stockholder and general manager of Ruidoso Downs, reported. Weights for fillies is to be 116 pounds, for colts and geldings, 119 pounds.

The race will be 400 yards—some feet-footed. Southwest pony will earn a tremendous pot for a few seconds of work. Winner will get 50% of the purse; 18% goes to the second horse; 12% to the third horse; 8% to the fourth; 7% to the fifth and 5% to the sixth.

The race is open to all foals of 1957 registered or listed in either the permanent stud book, the tentative stud book or the appendix of the American Quarter Horse Association. Of the 84 eligibles to date, 13 of the horses have not yet been named, but are entered by their owners by listing sire and dam.

Ten horses will be selected from a series of trials to be run about ten days before the Stake on Sept. 7, with an also-eligible list of four horses to be posted for the big race.

Ruidoso Downs, now ten years old, has been completely rebuilt in the last five years under management of Henley. The track began with a few week-ends of racing during one month in the summer to the point where now 50 racing days are held in a summer on week-ends and holidays, and the pari-mutuel handle cleared to above \$8,000,000.00 in 1958. Ruidoso Downs draws race supporters from a wide area of the Southwest, including Texas and Arizona.

In a letter sent early in November to owners of eligibles, Henley said this first running of the All American Futurity has already begun to gain nationwide prominence and should in time be considered in the same class as the Kentucky Derby, Belmont Stakes, etc. He said arrangements are underway now to have the sprint televised nationally.






A Weekly Sermonette
Our Ministers Write

WHAT IS RIGHT?

In our modern times there is considerable disagreement as to what is right and what is wrong. A group of high school girls were talking about receiving help on an examination. One girl said, "I will not copy, and I will not give help to another." The second girl said, "I won't receive help for myself, but I will help someone else who needs help." The third girl said that she would both receive and give help if the teacher was not looking. Here we have three standards as to what is right. Our question today is, "Is there an absolute standard of right and wrong, or is right relative to circumstances?" Can a thing be right today and wrong tomorrow? Can an act be right for one person and wrong for another? These are questions that each of us must answer for ourselves, for our moral standard of life depends on how we answer them.

For the purpose of this discussion we limit ourselves to one phase of the problem. Is right dependent on the individual? Some will say, "If I think a thing is right, then it is all

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

The McMurry Brothers entered the dairy business in 1925 when Mac and George McMurry purchased half interest in the farm on Aug. 1, 1943. They later purchased the remainder of the farm interest during that same year and since that time it has been owned and operated by the McMurry family. Ken and Willie McMurry entered the partnership in 1936 and are now active in the operation of the big firm.

The City Dairy does business at Margaret, Tulare, Hanford and Lemoore with home deliveries and their wholesale routes extend to Arto, Wasco and Tulare to Carrizo, Ruidoso and Mesquero. The distributor in the Ruidoso area is Jim Bates. City Dairy handles all products of the dairy line including cream, cottage cheese, eggs, butter, rocket-fries, chocolate, chocolate and deluxe ice cream. Their growth has been constant and today they operate a big fleet of trucks, both in purchase and distribution of their high quality products. The McMurry Brothers feel that their operation, being home-owned and home-operated, leaves them much closer to the producer and the consumer and they
