

## F. H. A. Financing Is Desperate Need For More, Better Housing Here

(An Editorial)

Since the Federal Housing Administration came into being, efforts have been made by community leaders here year after year to secure approval of F. H. A. financing of homes in this area. All such efforts have met with failure—primarily because we were a resort town—a town labeled as having an unsteady economy. That also held back the granting of a charter for a bank in earlier years when applications were made for such a service here. The lack of a sewer system, an adequate water system and a fluctuating economy because of the difference in tourist trade in summer and winter were also factors in the delay.

Ruidoso will have under construction within a few weeks a \$650,000 sewer system; Ruidoso has completed one of the finest water systems in two states in the last three years—this one being the most advanced in its streets and highways—and has seen its economy improve by reaching a much more stable level in all seasons. The latter accomplishment was enjoyed rapidly—in five years in fact five years after a charter was granted by the State Bank here. For instance, as we write this, there is \$710,000.00 socked away in savings accounts in Ruidoso State Bank, and about \$75,000.00 in the Lincoln County Savings and Loan Association here. Executive Vice-President T. B. Hood says he has no doubt one million dollars in savings will be in the bank and savings and loan association by the end of next summer. This is an amazing figure—and a solid backbone that any community can have. We look for an even more improved winter economy with development of White Mountain Park into one of the Southwest's most fabulous snow sports resorts.

On every hand we see a large program being undertaken to correct, to many inadequate homes being used of necessity simply because as possible that Smokey was born here, the town will grow and grow as a tourist attraction. Hats off to those who recognize the value in Captain and have done so much already in building the Smokey museum and in other efforts to make the most of this opportunity.

## District Rotary Governor Compliments Local Club Projects

Rotary clubs in 110 countries and geographical regions throughout the world are united in an endeavor to promote international understanding, good will and peace. That was the message of L. V. Hendrix of Alamogordo, governor of district 592 of Rotary International, in addressing the Rotary Club of Ruidoso in its Tuesday noon luncheon here.

In addition to the activities of the more than 9,000 Rotary clubs within their own communities to promote this objective, Mr. Hendrix explained, Rotary International has awarded grants of more than \$2,000,000 in the past 11 years through its program of student fellowships, which enable outstanding college graduates to study for one year in countries other than their own, as Rotary ambassadors of good will. Since 1947, when this program was established, 1,078 Rotary Foundation Fellowships have been awarded to students in 85 countries for study in 43 countries.

"With fellowship and service to others as its keynote, Rotary provides a common ground for 462,000 business and professional executives throughout the world, regardless of differing nationalities or languages or political and religious beliefs," the Rotary district governor emphasized.

Hendrix urged the local Rotarians to attend the Rotary district conference to be held in East El Paso in March, and to make plans for the club to be well represented at the 50th annual convention of Rotary International, which will be held in New York City next June.

Hendrix complimented the Ruidoso club on its recent projects, including plans to furnish a room for the proposed annex to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley General Hospital; the financial drive for Girl Scouts here and participation in the international exchange of students program. He said he has spoken to 28 clubs in his current tour as district governor.

Hendrix referred to the Ruidoso club as the "baby" club of his district, it being the 40th in his district.

## RICHARDSON HEADS RE-VITALIZED U. S. 70 STATE ORGANIZATION

Fred L. Richardson, Ruidoso, was named state president of the U. S. Highway 70 Association in an annual fall state convention held here at Carrizo Lodge Saturday. Forty persons attended the meeting, representing five communities.

Immediately after his election, Richardson said special efforts would be made to organize support for U. S. Highway 70 on a local, or gross roots level, with each community through which the cross-continental highway passes setting up their own local organizations. Portions of membership dues in the national association are retained for local and state use—and Richardson, and other spokesmen at the meeting, saw plans for an "local angle" through use of these retained funds was needed to publicize the scenic wonders available all along U. S. Highway 70.

The meeting opened on 10 a. m. with a re-vitalized discussion led by retiring president R. Harold of Portales. By-laws and constitution were framed and passed in the morning session. A luncheon was held at noon, and immediately following this the election of state officers was held, with Richardson being chosen by a unanimous vote.

A. Ray Clarke of Ruidoso was elected vice-president and Mrs. Wayne Wautlet of Ruidoso was appointed by Richardson as state secretary and treasurer.

Also discussed in the meeting before adjournment was the annual national convention in Safford this week-end at least 20 people pledged they would make the trip.

"We now have a re-vitalized and strong organization that is going to grow, particularly on the local level," Richardson said at the meeting closed. "We would like to see every community in our state through which U. S. 70 passes organize their own community association—that will make a stronger state association—and in turn a stronger national organization."

Two men represented in the meeting were Clewis Ruidoso, Portales, Hollywood and Ruidoso Downs. It was announced at the meeting that this area has 41 members for 1936.

## Early Winter Storm Dumps Snow In County

An early winter spell brought sub-zero temperatures to Ruidoso early this week and snow that measured 8 1/2 inches in the canyon. All of Lincoln County benefited from the snow, which measured about four inches on the average in all parts of the county. Below freezing temperatures were recorded all over the county, also, as an accompaniment to the snowfall. The snow, which fell late Sunday and Monday had melted considerably in the Ruidoso area by this week-end, but the cold weather was holding on.

The storm that swept this county was the fringe of a more severe weather disturbance that hit several southwestern and mid-west states, dumping heavy snow and bringing extreme cold and high winds.

## Forest Service Curtails Sales Of Yule Trees

"Christmas tree sales on the Lincoln National Forest will be sharply curtailed," reported Everett Damon, Forest Supervisor of Lincoln National Forest, Alamogordo. Douglas fir and white fir will not be sold this year. The Lincoln has tried to meet the demands of individual demands for trees over the past 12 or 15 years, but most areas within two or three miles of an accessible road have been over-cut. In past years, Christmas trees were sold from Douglas fir and white fir areas which would benefit from thinning. However, there are few such areas left on the Lincoln forest.

The biggest demand for Christmas trees on the Lincoln National Forest has been from the Cloudcroft Ranger District. People from El Paso and other points in West Texas, as well as Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Tularosa, Carrizozo, Roswell, Artesia, Carlsbad and other points in Southeastern New Mexico, usually flock to the Lincoln for Christmas trees. Last year thousands of individuals and families lined up to buy trees for the holidays on week-ends trying to buy trees. This year, trees are so scarce for the Christmas trade that Ranger Menninghaus suggests these people go to other areas for their trees. Even Pinon and Juniper areas have been picked over so many times that the shaped trees are difficult to find. The Mescalero Apache Reservation will be selling good Douglas fir and white fir at Mescalero, according to Paul Clement, Forester for the Indian Service. Individuals who planned to come to Cloudcroft for their trees should reconsider to avoid possible disappointment.

The big reason for the shortage of Christmas trees in the Southwest generally is that they do not reproduce as prolifically in areas with heavier rainfall. Practically all areas in accessible places have been cut so heavily that there are not enough to provide for a full stocking of trees for the next generation of timber. Even Pinon and Juniper of good shape and suitable for Christmas trees, are difficult to find. The Lincoln will sell these tree species but it will be up to the individual to locate his own tree. District Forest Rangers are located at Captain, Cloudcroft, Carlsbad, Ruidoso and Mayhill.

The Forest Service will have patrol out to protect the Lincoln forest from unauthorized Christmas tree cutting.

## Hobbs Couple Opens Automatic Laundry In Skyland

Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Spry of Hobbs last Saturday opened a new business in Ruidoso, a coin-operated laundry, equipped with 12 General Electric automatic washers and three dryers, in the building formerly housing The Record Shop in Skyland. The laundry will be open 24 hours a day, the new business owners report. The Sprys have one child, Jay Dale, aged 9.

Mr. and Mrs. Spry are inviting their people to call during an open house Wednesday next week when coffee and doughnuts will be served, and when come attendance prizes will be given.

Rocket Company and was turned over to us complete with supplies and all the camera and radar controls and equipment needed. The final price tag was twenty-eight million dollars.

We arrived on Mars May 2, 1997. We all had to admit we were quite disappointed at just the simple green plant life. We had expected some one or something to greet us. It is very doubtful there will ever be any more than the simple green plant life on Mars. We did, however, discover water in the form of snow and frost. The conditions on Mars are like that 62,000 feet above the surface of the earth. Nearly twice as high as Mount Everest. We had to use tanks whenever we got out of the ship. These were necessary because of the high air pressure, and the low temperature. Only at high noon does the temperature rise above freezing. This was quite a job to adapt ourselves to this big change. Our tanks were made of hard steel and were heated and pressurized and had the necessary supply of oxygen. Mars days is thirty-seven minutes longer than our twenty-four hour day.

We were all delighted at Mars' two moons, Phobos and Deimos. Phobos is less than four thousand miles from Mars and Deimos is 9,000 miles farther from the surface and takes thirty hours to make his revolution. Phobos has a diameter of 22 miles and makes three trips per hour. They are so small it is really more like loose mountains tumbling around in space. Phobos, the inner moon, is only about ten miles across and Deimos can hardly be more than five miles across. They are both very dark and the attraction isn't great.

We didn't have any difficulty at all getting Sirius turned toward the earth because of the skill of our pilot. We left Mars with many things we didn't come with, hundreds of pictures, rocks, samples of the simple green plant life. We tried to bring some of the snow and frost but we couldn't provide the temperature necessary to keep it in the form we wanted. We left Mars on May 21, 1997, and "glided" the earth through our telescope on June 7. We all concluded that the best part of every going anywhere is the getting home.

We landed as expected on dawn of June 8, 1997. Everything had gone off as expected and the launching crew was there and waiting for us. We all think the earth is a much better place to live than Mars. We sincerely hope some day there will be other men that feel the same way about their planet. We all had an exciting story to tell. But just to get

our feet on solid ground once more was more important.

"I don't think it was all the other boy's fault but the only thing I could have done was to take the shell out of the chamber, but if I had seen a deer I couldn't have shot at it because my gun wouldn't have been loaded. I don't think anyone had any business messing with my gun after I told him it was loaded. I think that a hunter knows his own gun better than anyone else and he should be the only one to handle or use it."

At a given time all 600 men started gesturing and talking at once; when Jack and Ann were asked if they would like to see a film on operation of the Board of Trade, they did so, this explained that the men were buying and selling, each gesture meant something; what they had, what they wanted, and how much—wheat was the largest commodity sold—explained also that 85% of world's commodity bought and sold here—future crops were also bought and sold, the men in the pits were not bonded but their word their bond. Ann said the above impressed her the most, she guessed, as it stayed with her—can imagine for the documents housed in the Hall of Archives are taken for granted most of the time by citizens and we know that commodities are bought and sold but to read the documents and see how they are safeguarded also to see the Board of Trade in operation; well Ann said it was a wonderful vacation and I'll buy that. Thanks Ann.

I guess I was the one that was excited. Word was received by Lee Anderson that his son Carroll had passed away the 14th. Carroll resided in Wichita Falls, Tex., and will be interred there. Macle Edmondson and I received a letter from Mrs. Keathly, and after considerable time to decipher her hand writing, which she said I might have trouble doing and did, here is the best part of her letter: "After

couple days rest we (Oliver, wife and Keathly) left Fort Smith Sunday morning and had at least 12 hours on the road going up to Eureka Springs, where among many interesting things, we saw a church where you entered through the bell tower, this strange entrance a necessity for the church clings to the side of the mountain, much as if it were a huge fly. It is believed to be the only church of its kind in the world. In my book Eureka Springs is unique, the highest point in State of Arkansas. There are, I believe, over 50 streets with not one cross street. There are many, many springs and Eureka Springs clings to the mountain side in fact one huge hotel is named "The Castle in the Air." At one point pedestrians cross the street high above the traffic, which was very heavy last Sunday; even though most of the hotels and motels are closed for the winter, I saw another while rear was 2 and 1/2 stories high. We got the most marvelous panoramic view I've seen, however, we saw many "million dollar views" returning home; and at one time we were within 3 miles of the Missouri river. It is beautiful in a different way; too inadequate to describe it even where it is considered up to par.
