Following the Eighth grade graduation, a social will be held at Carrizo Lodge, sponsored by parents, to which 7th and 8th graders, and their parents, are invited.

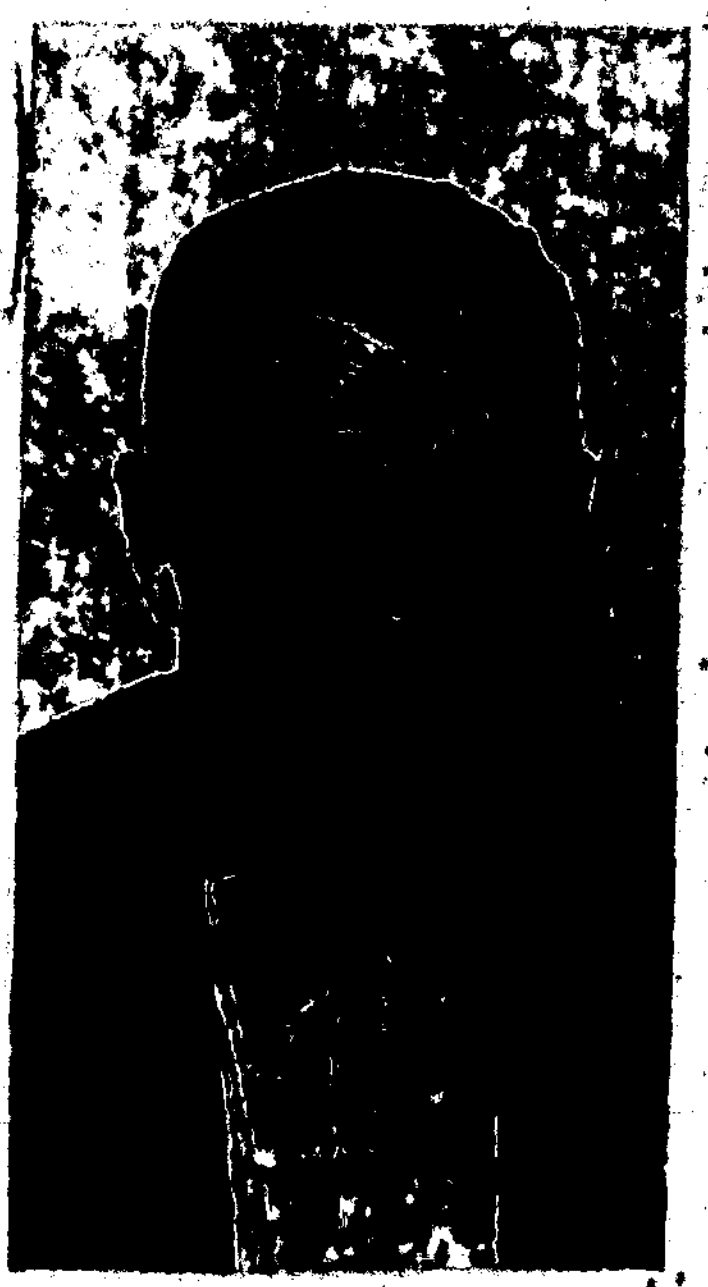

First Annual Chuckwagon Trail Ride Slated For 4 Days Here In Mid-June

A trip of Southeastern New Mexico horsemen are making plans for the first of an annual outdoor adventure experience for a group of horseback riders and campers, to be held this year June 16, 17, 18 and 19. The men are Homer Glover of Roswell, W. T., (Bill) Wingfield, Rexwell, and Karl Johnson, Ruidoso. They already have several applications, Johnson reports, for the 1959 event.

To be called Chuckwagon Trail Ride, plans are being laid for a trail of 100 horsemen to make a four-day junket. The ride is patterned after similar ones in California, Colorado and Arizona. A Palm Springs, Calif., trail ride is known as the Vistadoras, and another one in that state is known as Diana's Caballeros.

The New Mexico trip will start on a Tuesday and conclude on a Friday, with four overnight camps. On the tour will be a trail boss, an Indian guide for part of the tour in the Mesquero Apache Indian Reservation, a cook, a veterinarian, a doctor, and two or three wranglers.

The group will ride out of Ruidoso at dawn the first day and will camp in the Three Rivers country west of Sierra Blanca peak. The second night's camp will be pitched high in the Sierra Blanca mountains at the head of Santa Creek—the third will be on a plateau, spot on Eagle Creek and the fourth and last will be at the head of the Santa Fe River in the Ruidoso Mountains, near the head of the Santa Fe River.

Limited Closing Ordered In Lincoln Forest

A limited closure of the Lincoln National Forest has been approved by Regional Forester Fred H. Kennedy, reported by Supervisor Everett R. Doman, of Alamogordo. The closure, which prohibits camp fires except at designated camp sites and smoking while traveling except on paved or surfaced roads, goes into effect at 6:00 p. m. May 8, 1959.

"Smoking can be done safely," said Supervisor Doman. "The restriction applies to people traveling in the woods and on unpaved roads. Those wishing to smoke should stop and make camp" so that cigarette butts and matches can be put dead out in mineral soil."

The Lincoln National Forest already has had 11 fires this year, all man caused. By taking preventive action, fire crews have kept fires to small size. Any one of these fires under the proper combination of wind, continued dry weather, and fast burning forest fuels could get out of hand. The 3500 acre Pendleton fire of 1958 was started by a smoker. The Forest Service requests care by all forest users to prevent such catastrophes.

As a result of this mailing device, which was introduced in 1928, merchants and businessmen are able to send out advertisements on merchandise, magazines, business offers, etc., and pay postage only on the mail business which they actually receive back, if the addressee never returns

the card or envelope, the sender never has to pay postage for it. Before the business reply card and envelope were inaugurated, reply letters sent to prospective customers were of the type which require payment of postage by the sender. If the merchant or businessman wished to pay the postage bill for prospective customers, he had to send coins or stamps to everyone on the mailing list. This meant that many coins and stamps were kept by the receiver. They were never returned or used to mail back a reply. A lot of postage money was obviously wasted so far as the sender was concerned. Those who use business reply mail must pay an extra charge—that is, something beyond the regular postage—for the mail which they receive back. However, it is usually found that this extra charge for the special benefits received is far more economical for certain uses than the blanket-type approach of sending out reply mail with coins or postage attached. The extra charge for returned business reply items amounts to 2c for each piece of mail returned in addition to the regular postage if the piece does not weigh more than 2 ounces. If the piece in question is over 2 ounces in weight, the additional charge is 5c. Before any individual or firm can send out business reply mail, a permit must be obtained from the local post office. There is no charge for this permit, and application forms

are available at the local post office. The principal requirement of applicants is that they be responsible persons. For example, stores and businesses sending their tardy customers reminders of bills due are more frequently enclosing the business reply envelope nowadays for the convenience of the customer. Many stores have reported that it aids in the prompter collection of bills. Often a customer will delay sending in a payment simply because he has run out of stamps and does not have an opportunity to pick up a fresh supply. The reply envelope solves this problem. Postmaster Dryden welcomes inquiries from persons interested in business reply envelopes and cards.

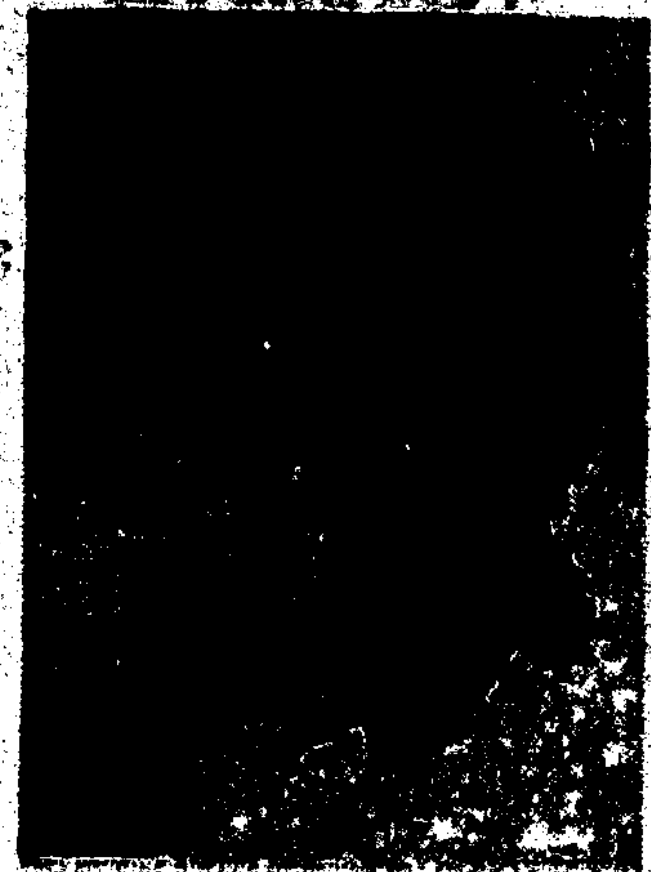

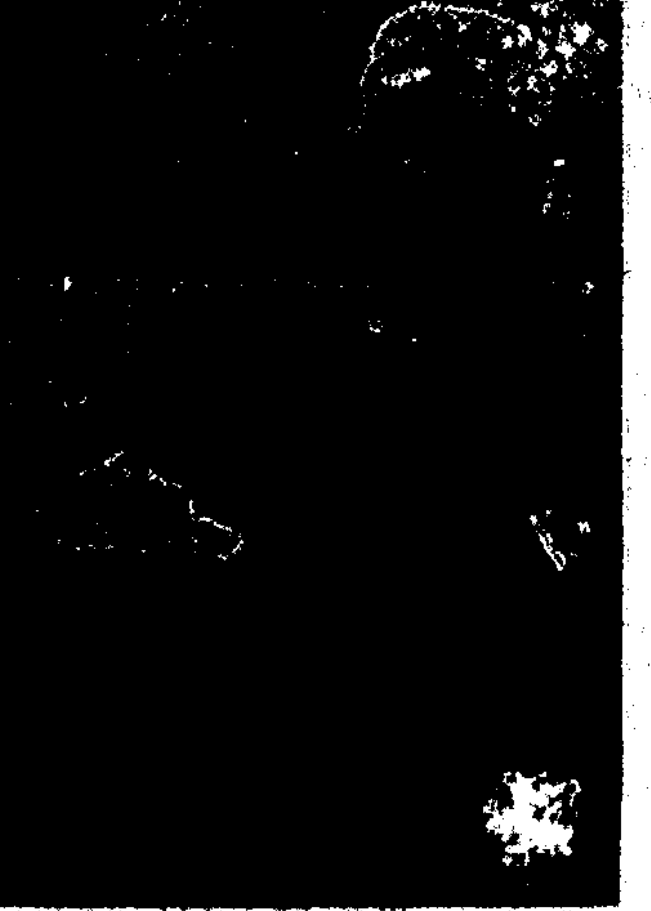

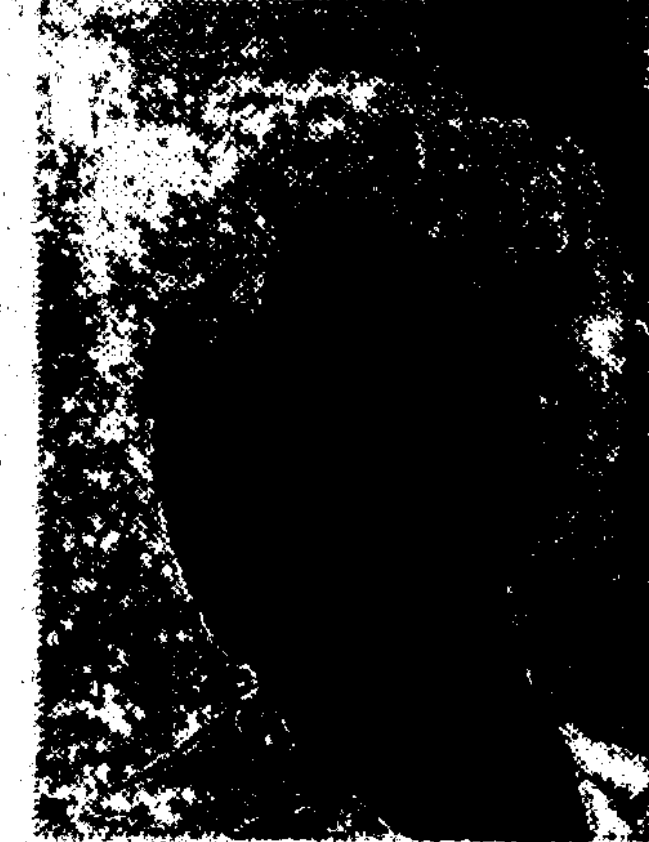

Eight students at Ruidoso High School completed the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, Tuesday, April 28.

The test is the first step in competition for Merit Scholarships provided by the Atlantic Corporation, foundations, professional societies and individuals, as well as by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself. Some \$15 million in Merit Scholarships has been awarded in the first four years of the program.

Students taking the test were: Gerald Tully, Mike Shultz, Eleanor Sparks, Brian Noker, Jerry Fuchs, Jimmy Long, Shelby Miller and Paula Donnelly.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. The basic continuing program is for one million dollars a year (for ten annual years).

Let's Listen, Ladies!

The Españoles and Auxiliary members are very proud of their decorated building—something really nice in which to hold meetings, joint suppers as well as other entertainments. As an Auxiliary member, I personally feel that all who contributed in any way should have honorable mention and be given credit, especially those who donated so much of their time and labor. And I understand that about three members' names were mentioned at the joint

annual programs). In addition, sponsor participation this year is expected to add about two million dollars more in sponsored Merit Scholarships. It is estimated that various outside-the-program sources will increase the present amounts offered to high scoring students by several million dollars.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is a three hour measure of educational development and college aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills, and on understanding and ability to use what has been learned, rather than on sheer knowledge of facts.

Some 10,000 Semi-finalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Each Semi-finalist will take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance on the second examination will become Finalists. Further evaluation of their grades, citizenship and extra-curricular achievements will follow, and the winners will be announced in the Spring of 1960.

The test results will be reported to all participating schools before the beginning of the senior year, in time for use by seniors and their class advisors. The scores may also be used in many high schools to help students make decisions about college and the most appropriate courses to take or in.

Many students throughout the country who do not expect to win have registered for the test, in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses.

Dr. John M. Stalnaker, President of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, recently cautioned that there are many reasons why test results CANNOT be used to evaluate school performance. The distribution of the population throughout the state, the size of the school, the native intelligence of its top students, the percentage of students taking the test, the nature of the community where the school is located, the pressure of the school, and many other factors having nothing to do with the total effectiveness of the school can influence its number of Finalists.

The test results will, however, enable students as individuals to compare their scores with other students across the nation.

The test has been constructed by Science Research Associates of Chicago, and will also be scored and reported by the testing agency.

Each Merit Scholarship carries a stipend based on the need of each individual winner, and is renewable annually without further competitive examination. The average stipend in past years has been \$700 per year. The minimum award in the 1958-59 Program will be \$100 a year and a maximum will be \$1500 a year.

The names of all Finalists will be sent to colleges and universities and other educational organizations throughout the country. In this way many non-winning Finalists are helped in winning scholarships awarded directly by colleges and other organizations.

About 700 Merit Scholars, winners of the 1958-59 competition, were named on April 29, 1959. They are winners in the FORTIETH Merit Program which began last April.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation directs the annual competition. It was founded in 1935, on grants of \$30 million by the Ford Foundation and \$500 thousand by the Carnegie Corporation of New York.



John Meigs One-Man Show

Twenty-one paintings and a drawing by San Francisco artist John Meigs went on display this week at the Roswell Museum and will remain on view until the last of this month.

Temperas, oils, water colors and a drawing are on view in the Main Gallery.

Paul Horgan of Roswell, Pulitzer-prize winning author, says of Meigs' work:

"Like any artist, John Meigs has a vision of a world which demands to be communicated. It does not happen to be a wholly subjective world; like that of many modern painters; but this does not mean that it has no inward, as well as outward, vision."

"If his delight rates in a view of objects and places that can be readily recognized by others, then to make these into more than common experience, he seems to stare fixedly at his subjects, and with no great a design to pierce them, that he gives us a sense of passing through familiar surfaces and textures until he reaches the secret of their abstract interest as design. It is this combination of an abstract anatomy of form with a sense of how things really look in surface, light and shade that gives Meigs his personal idiom."

The New York Times has said in a review:

"These are statements of what may be observed without straying from straight realism—dust devils, deserted ranches, the melancholy of dusk on a mesa, skies portentous of weather changes and old buildings that have long outlived their use. There is a vein of poetry or at any rate of poetic prose running through the work, objective as the viewpoint in Color is restrained in the nostalgically factual reports."

A fire in the Ruidoso garbage pit was discovered Sunday afternoon by the Forest Service Lookout tower in Ruidoso, and it was doused in short order with Forest Service personnel making the initial attack, reinforced by members of Ruidoso's Volunteer Fire Department.

Don't Overdo a Good Thing

Recent apple leaf and soil tests in the Hondo area should be a great help to the orchard grower.

The orchards of Wilbur Coe and C. B. Zambo showed an excess of Boron where they had applied it heavily for two or three years in succession. Bert Plimpton had one orchard that showed both an excess and a deficiency. He did not apply Boron to half the orchard. Boron, a trace fertilizer, is needed in small amounts by the plant, but can kill the tree if it is too heavily applied.

All leaf and soil samples showed a deficiency in Nitrogen, Phosphate and Iron.

The length of time the land has been in orchard greatly affects the need for fertilizers. Bennet's orchard was one of the few showing a need for Boron. His land has been in constant orchard for over eighty years.

It is important to put on the right amount of fertilizer. This means "the right amount and no more" as well as "the right amount and no less."

Apples need nitrogen for growth, but too much nitrogen retards apple ripening. Phosphate and potash are needed for fruit growth and fruit color, but too much phosphate is likely to be wasted in that it is likely to be tied up so the tree can not get it in the alkaline soil of this area.

Iron is always in the soil but it is not available to the tree due to the alkaline condition of the soil. I have several growers trying some samples of a trace fertilizer to see if it will supply the iron needed by the trees.

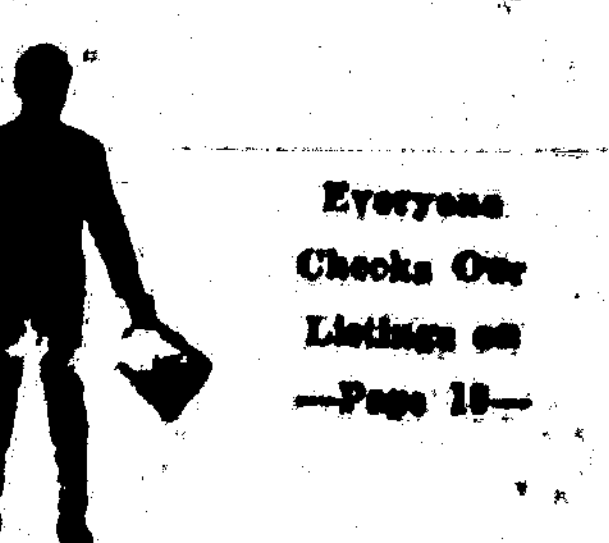
COPPER KETTLE CAFE TO OPEN ABOUT MAY 20

Lincoln Hotel Fund Approved

Gov. John Burroughs suffered a setback Monday when the State Finance Board refused to delay for 30 days a request for \$40,000 emergency funds to complete restoration of the Wortley Hotel in famed old Lincoln Town.

Leading spirits in the request for the money included Will A. Kelcher, prominent Albuquerque attorney, historian and writer, and Mrs. W. D. Sawyer of Crossroads, who is national Democratic committee-woman. Both are members of the old Lincoln Museum Board and Kelcher himself for years was on the finance board.

The spot in which the board found itself defeated when Burroughs vetoed the \$40,000 appropriated by the Legislature.

Albuquerque Attorney J. H. Modrall and Noble Irish of Las Vegas, two of Burroughs' appointees on the present board, were the leading advocates of delaying action on the emergency request for funds. Mrs. Sawyer and Kelcher declared that fast action is necessary if the \$10,000 already gone into the renovation is not to "go down the drain" through exposure to the elements.

State Sen. Gen. Lusk of Cortland and Rep. Jack Campbell of Heward, legislative members on the board, argued in support of approving the emergency grant. They contended the Legislature had committed itself to the project two years ago when it had authorized the fact \$10,000 and was aware of the fact

Ruidoso Band Now Among Outstanding In New Mexico

Since the organization of the Ruidoso High School Band in 1949, it has become one of the outstanding bands in this state under the direction of the present director, LeRoy Gooch.

"Our problems are still numerous; finances, need for equipment, and rehearsal area," stated Gooch. "The first school band in Ruidoso was organized by James Bright. In 1950 when Gooch became director of the band consisted of four accordions, one sax and two bass drums, two clarinets and two alto saxophones, with a total of eleven members.

For his practice rooms conductor Gooch has directed in the living room of the Home Economics building and the basement of both Ruidoso and Sitton Grade Schools.

The marching performances during the football season on the field and a spring concert held in the school gymnasium in 1958 marked the first public appearance.

From its humble beginning of only 11 members Gooch now directs a 40-piece High School Band, a 25-piece Junior High Instrumental, and an elementary class of 15. "Each year the band has received a II rating on prepared numbers at the district contests and has consistently rated a division I in the district sight reading contests," said the conductor.

Gooch was raised in Wilmer, Tex., and attended Wilmer Hutchins High School. He entered North Texas State College in 1945, played in the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra, and received a Bachelor of Music Degree. After finishing college he was employed as music director in the Sogaville High School. In 1950 Director Gooch moved to Ruidoso to fulfill his present position as bandmaster.

Gooch reported that he is overwhelmed with the possibility of securing an adequate rehearsal area in the gymnasium which is to be constructed. The plans are drawn to have two individual practice rooms with sufficient storage for uniforms.

"Band isn't completely a boys' chucked the director. "In Rowell at a district contest we decided not to play the warm-up exercise but evidently some students misunderstood, that the original expenditure had to have the protection of additional funds when it appropriated the \$40,000 later voted by Burroughs."
