Committees for the ensuing year, working with the new state of officers, will be announced later.

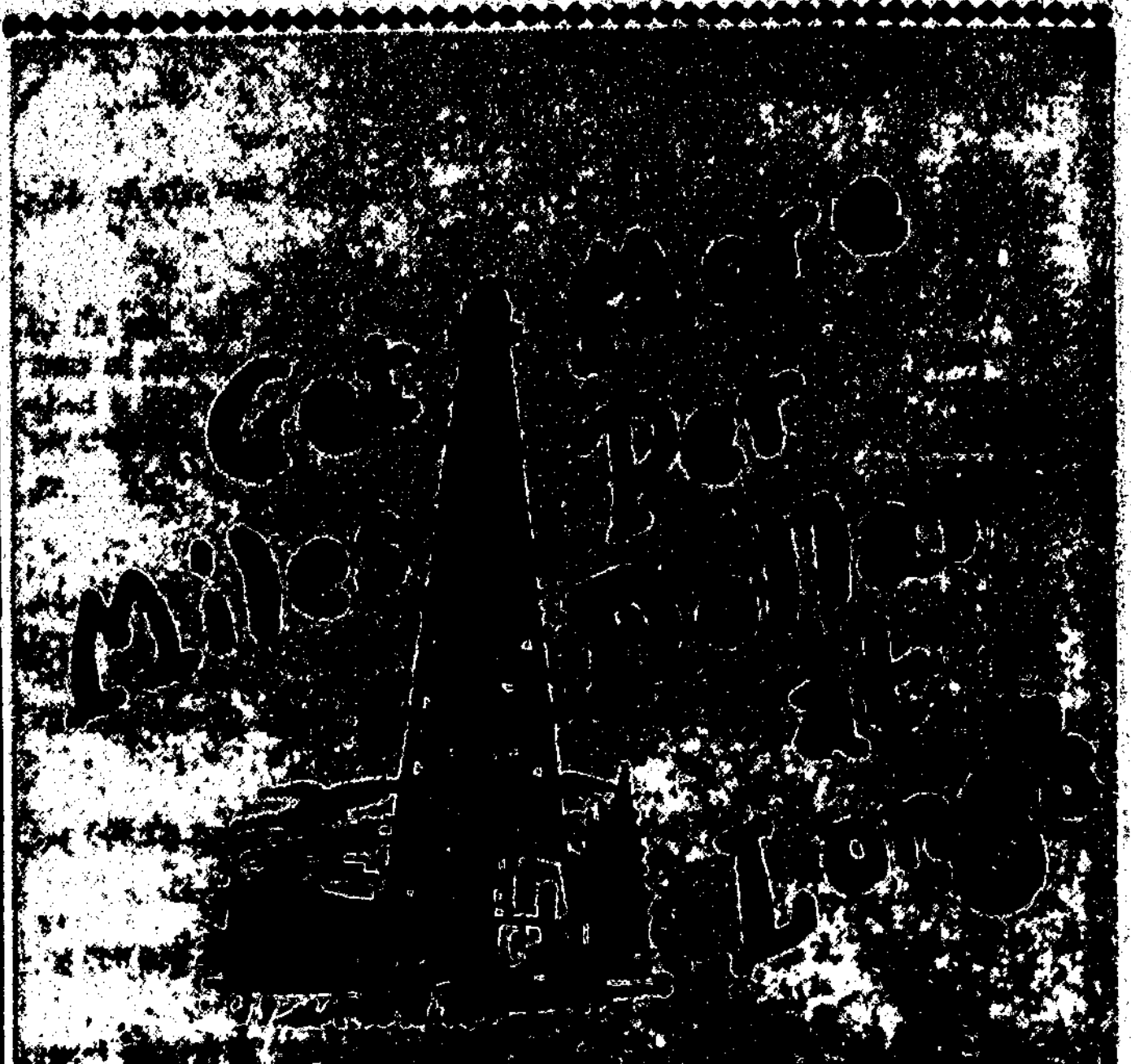
