Continued Bank Progress Is Noted In Annual Report To Stockholders

(Editor's Note: As is our custom, the Ruidoso News again this year reprints the report given by Executive Vice-President T. B. Hood in the annual stockholders meeting held the second Wednesday in January each year. For comparison, note these figures that told the story at the end of 1957 after about 20 days' operation: Cash and due from banks \$129,648.53; U. S. government bonds \$158,384.44; municipal and other bonds, none; loans and discounts \$34,584.50; bank premises, furniture and fixtures \$26,078.23, for a total of \$348,695.70 for resources; and demand deposits \$280,100.17; savings accounts \$3,423.82; capital \$50,000.00; surplus \$25,000.00; reserves \$7,493.61; to give a total of \$348,693.70 in total liabilities.)

In the absence of a program, Den D. Swearingin filled the gap Tuesday noon in the Rotarians luncheon meet in the O. E. S. hall with a dissertation on "Property Appraisal." Among the points he stressed were that appraisals can be made only on utility value, and not on absolute standards. Land is judged on comparative value, buildings on replacement cost. Established businesses deserve special consideration. "The economic principal of substitution must prevail, which is a science or technique he observed," he declared. There are the exceptions of an inflationary market in "boom towns," but normal principles and values will eventually prevail. All investors consider the return and spend their money with this principle in mind, he stated.

Peter Hurd is a great hand to bring out the beauty in the simplest and humblest of little things here around us. And the Soil Conservation Service is working away at one of the mightiest and worthwhile tasks of all time.

The Humble Tumble Weed

Now if somebody told you that in some country there is a weed that grows up and forms into a kind of light bouncing ball—and that this weed is carried for miles over the land rolling along and sometimes flying for several yards in the wind, then we would think this was quite a wild story.

That is, if we had never seen the tumble weed. Of course we have seen it all our lives, and it is an old story. A lot of us think the tumble weed is a pest. It piles up in fence corners, and in sandy, dried up countries, the sand comes and heaps up on top of it, so that the fences are buried up in great sand dunes. Lots of times you come to a gate in the windy times of early spring in some dry place, and here the tumble weeds are all hanging and climbing all over the gate, and you let them through and they go rolling on across the flats.

Maybe you come late at night and there is a great big tumble weed right in the doorway, trying to get in the house and there you stumble over the tumble weed.

On a cold and frosty morning maybe the tumble weeds are caught under the jeep so you have to get them out of the way to crank the little feller up.

And if you leave the pick-up window open there will be a tumble weed inside there, wanting to take a ride.

You might think these poor tumble weeds are just trying to be a pain in the neck, but that is not the way of it at all.

Where are these poor restless things going? And why are they always getting in the way and always under foot? Because they are stopped by things that get in their way in their journey to do a great favor for us.

The tumble weed has the mission of healing up our poor broken and wounded land, filling a thousand gullies and stopping a million arroyos, and healing up the countless scars in the face of Mother Earth. I will tell you a little more about this later.



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

Originator Of St. Joseph's Mission Continues Good Work In Arizona

(From Alamogordo News)

Heart-warming details of his reunion with Father Albert Braun—renowned as the "church builder" of the Franciscan Order of the Catholic Church—has been brought back to Alamogordo by Richard Bond, more familiarly known as Chief Waterfall.

The colorful Indian saw Father Albert in Phoenix, Ariz., where the Franciscan at 69 still bustles about the duties of his calling.

Chief Waterfall had made the trip to visit his own father, aged 80, a Protestant minister.

Father Albert is known and beloved on the Mesalero Apache reservation for his long service and for his building of St. Joseph's Mission, the native rock structure that is now a landmark on the reservation.

There were reminiscences of Father Albert's several tours of duty at Mesalero and the Franciscan told how he had been honored last summer at Sacred Heart Church in Phoenix, of which he is now pastor.

Called back into the Army in 1940 as an instructor of chaplains at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., Father Albert left the following year for duty in the Philippines. He was one of the survivors of the Bataan death march and spent the rest of World War II as a prisoner of the Japanese.

At war's end, Father Albert again returned to Mesalero to complete his church there, St. Joseph's. When it was dedicated, Gen. Jonathan Wainwright of death march fame,

brought an Army band to play. Sacred Heart Building

Again in 1947, Father Albert was recalled to the Army and sent to Fort Sam Houston for duty. On retirement from the Army, he went to Phoenix, at first teaching at the St. Mary's High School and in 1954 becoming pastor of St. Mary's Church. Somehow he found time to attend Arizona State College at Tempe and obtained his doctorate in history.

In Phoenix, his church-building zeal reached its climax. He has been instrumental in building four churches in the Arizona capital, doing much of the work himself, from digging foundations to chinking roofs.

Besides his service and fellowship with the Indians and his amazing record as a builder of churches, Father Albert was an Army chaplain in both World Wars. He was once wounded in World War I and received a citation.

It was after his discharge and listing as a reserve chaplain in 1919 that Father Albert returned to the scene of his first assignment on the Mesalero reservation. With the help of the Indians, he built the unique native rock church at Mesalero—a task that took many years to complete.

We were assigned government quarters here at the Marine Corps School where my husband is stationed, just three days before Christmas. What confusion we were in! I hope we don't have to move again for a long time, but then again, in this business, we never know!

It is awfully cold back here, though to date we have had only one snow, and it was only about two inches. It's plenty cold enough for us, though, especially after spending

Mining Was Major Industry In County 52 Years Ago

(Editor's Note: From a book that is now out of print "History of New Mexico" published 53 years ago by Pacific States Publishing Co., a very compact report is given on mining in Lincoln County in the early 1900's. A previous reproduction from this same book was printed in the Ruidoso News Oct. 24 when a lengthy history of the county was given.)

Headlines bring one of the largest coal producers in the Territory, Lincoln County has for a number of years been second or third in the mining of gold ore. Socorro County is its closest competitor in gold mining for gold, the figures for 1902 being as follows: Output in ounces, Lincoln, 244,028 and Socorro, 202,647; value, Lincoln \$50,607 and Socorro \$42,050. The total ore mined during the year was, Lincoln 23,500 tons and Socorro 23,734 Grant County of course far exceeds either in the product of its deep mines, which of late has no competitor in placer gold.

The gold producing area of Lincoln County lies around White Oaks and toward the south as far as Nogal peak, and was known among

ers about 240 square miles, and the elevation is from 5,500 to 11,500 feet. The surface is not rough and broken, but the mountains (Nogal) have open inclines, with very few rocks, slides or alluvial deposits. Timber, water and good wagon roads also exist, thus making prospecting easy.


The old and famous American mine was originally conducted from Fort Stanton, probably by the soldiers stationed there. As was the common experience with the miners of southern New Mexico, those who attempted operations in the region around Nogal peak thirty years ago were largely at the mercy of the ranchmen, Apache and the graves of numbers of the early adventurers bear mute witness to this hard fact. No systematic mining was done in the district until 1890, and at that time it formed a part of the Mesquite Indian reservation, which, two years later, was partially turned over to the Mexicans.

The Helen Rae and Cross-Cut mines were located in 1880, and in 1882 came into possession of John Rice, from whom the property received its name. In less than a year, through shallow shafts and with mortar and pestle, the proprietors took out nearly \$15,000 worth of gold. The ores turned base at no great depth, however, although Mr. Rice sold his property finally to Rolla Wells for \$15,000, and in the first years of the 1900's it passed into possession of the American Gold Mining Company.

It is from the White Oaks district, however, that most of the actual production of gold has come, ledge being first discovered by modern prospectors in 1879, on Baxter mountain. This was the beginning of the White Oaks, which in the following year the story of the famous discovery is thus given: "A number of prospectors had been prospecting the immediate vicinity for placer gold, among whom were George Wilson and his partners, old Jim Winters and George East. While the party was eating dinner, Wilson took his lunch in his hand and strolled up the side of Baxter mountain, where he climbed on the top of a large 'blowout' and with his pick chipped off a piece of the rock. After an examination of the rock, he found that it contained gold. He immediately reported his find to those below, and staked out the North Homestake, which was the first ledge location made in the camp. On the same afternoon Wilson relinquished his rights in the property to the partners, who were given \$400, a pony and a bottle of whiskey. Not a great while after this deal, the discoverer of the ledge mines of White Oaks disappeared and was never heard of again."

North Homestake passed through various hands, the first for years a existence netting its owners handsomely, both in production and the sums realized in the sale of the property. It has been quite a steady producer, and to the present is credited with about half a million dollars. Soon after the first strike, the south Homestake, Old Abe, Little Beck, Camlock and Rip Van Winkle mines were located.

Although discovered thus early, the true vein of the famous Old Abe mine was not located until 1890. As a total depth of nearly 1,400 feet has been reached without tapping water so as to interfere with the working of the mine, it is not only the deepest in New Mexico, but one of the deepest dry mines in the world. It is a free-milling gold mine, and the main strata, varying from three to twenty feet in width, is a rich sulphide ore which has averaged \$8 per ton. A number of rich strikes have been made, and among the remarkable geological occurrences encountered has been virgin gold embedded in gypsum. The old shaft, 840 feet deep, collapsed in March, 1894, the new shaft having been sunk, as stated, to a depth of some 1,400 feet. According to the latest figures, there are about 3,800 feet

The total gold production of White Oaks district is about \$3,000,000, and the gold mills using in connection therewith are also large iron deposits in the district, averaging from 58 to 68 per cent hematite ore, as well as coal, indications of oil, and quarries of excellent marble and building stone. All in all, it is one of the richest mineral regions in the Territory.


