
The Junior Class has selected the play, "Peter, Beware" for the Junior Play which is to be presented some time before Christmas.

**MESCALERO PAIR HELD FOR CATTLE THEFT**

Two Mescalero men left Alamogordo this week for Albuquerque in custody of a U. S. Marshal after they had been charged with theft and butchering of a yearling calf, allegedly stolen on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation. The two, Anthony Smith, 20, and Harvey Marden, 35, were arrested by Otero County officers and Indian Agent Robt. R. Thompson after the two had disposed of the beef in two widely separated locations in Otero county.

Parts of the stolen calf were located in Tularosa and part, less the amount they had eaten, were found at Mayhill. The case had been under investigation since Sept. 28. The calf allegedly was stolen on the reservation and butchered it before making the two separate sales. They were arraigned before Mrs. Tom Charles in Alamogordo, the U. S. Commissioner for this region.



**TRUCKER STILL IMPORTANT**

**Tully Bros. Introduce New Mode In Marketing Valley Apples**

(Editor's Note: A neighbor, visiting the Tully Bros. Ranch in the Ruidoso Valley recently, noted the entire family at work harvesting the 1959 apple crop. Besides Jim and Gerald and their wives, the children were also involved—including those old enough to contribute labor—and the visitor also noted that the littlest baby, nicknamed "Trickle," was gnawing on an apple, and that the family pooch had an apple core between his paws studying it for a bite. The article below concerns the Tully families and the apple marketing problems today. It does not touch on another facet—that of the year-round business of cattle ranching—another very important part of their life. They have some Santa Gertrudis cattle among their livestock—but all that is still another story.)

It's a fast changing world. That is the opinion of the Tully brothers—Gerald and Jim—who have lived all their lives in the beautiful Ruidoso Valley.

Gerald and Jim have been associated with apple-growing and selling—since the first apple orchard was planted on the sprawling Tully Ranch in 1930.

The big changes they're noting in this fast changing world concerns their apple business.

Ranch, which was bought in 1902 by Gerald and Jim's father, James V. Tully. (The brothers also have 6,500 acres leased from the U. S. Forest Service.)

"Apples just seemed to grow then," Jim said. "We sold them to neighbors and travelers passing by along the road, which now is paved U. S. Highway 70."

By 1939 the Tullys' increasing crops of fine apples demanded some sort of an organized commercial outlet.

"That year," Jim said, "we built our big tin shed close by the highway. Truckers took them to cities, where stores sold them by the bulk."

In the last few years, the picture of a groceryman reaching down in a basket and selling a customer 10 or 25 cents worth of apples is a thing of the past.

"Yes, there's been some changes made in the apple business," the Tully brothers said, "and unless we growers follow the changes, we might as well go out of business." The big change today, said the Tullys, is from bulk to package selling, even at the very site where the apples are picked.

"Now-a-days," Jim said, "we've got to have our apples packaged at the shed and ready to be delivered

planted. "Many of these growers," Jim said, "have plenty of time and labor potential, but no money. They need cooperation and assistance if they stay in business, and that's why Gerald and I are glad for them to use our shed to market their product." "They need boxes and cellophane sacks for packaging their apples—and that's where Sheffield also will help them solve that problem." An orderly flow of the fruit to market is a paramount aim at the Tully shed.

that way."

He explained that produce firms have buyers in the field to secure the packaged fruit.

"These buyers have all the know-how of the apple business—all the way from the tree to the supermarket."

Such a man, said the Tullys, is O. E. Sheffield of Austin, who this year is assisting with production at the Tully apple shed, as well as buying the supplies for produce firms all over the country.

Sheffield bought a new machine for use at the shed.

"The machine does everything to an apple that's necessary to market it," Jim said. "The apple comes out sized, graded, polished and prepared for market—along with whatever necessary man labor that may be involved."

"Our shed is especially designed for the little grower," the Tullys said.

According to the brothers, there are 125 machines down Hollywood and Hondo, with 90 per cent of them Spanish American. Many of them have owners that are just starting to mature, and it is for such growers that the Tully shed is especially

designed.

"The Tullys' best 'money crop' today is a double red Star King Delicious and a Golden Delicious. Few winesaps are grown anymore, in the Tully orchards."

### Logging Grows On Reservation

**BUILDING NEW HOME**  
 Under construction in the Green Meadows Subdivision here is a new two bedroom frame residence for Paul Brown of Clovis. Ben Donathan & Sons contractors, are doing the work. It is being built next door to a house Donathan is building for himself.

Logging activity in the Mescalero area has increased recently, following the end of the summer rains. Since Sept. 1, forest areas have been drying out, allowing more logging operations on the Mescalero Apache reservation to be started.

Severe rain-all damage, however, has been reported at several spots on the east side of the reservation following these unusually heavy rains.

Two logging shows currently are operating on the Elk Spring fire salvage sale. One show was slowed to a standstill during recent rainy weather, while the other, operated at partial production.

Brush piling is current on the South Cow Camp unit to the adding. Production on this unit has been at a standstill because of muddy, impassable roads through the forest, but production is expected to begin by the end of September.

The North Cow Camp unit has produced some lumber during the wet season, with production increasing following the end of the summer rains. Conditions are now favorable for this unit to meet top production goals.

Also producing at the present time is the Whittell-hill-damage-unit, which was completely stopped during the rainy season.

From 30 to 50 ant hills are counted on the trial plots by Gerald Nielson, survey entomologist, with the State Department of Agriculture. He put out the trial plots of insecticide. If you are interested in controlling ants you might check with Corbin Hester and see what he thinks of the different insecticides tried.

### Illegal Use Of Mails

#### Topic Of Talks

Illegal use of the U. S. mails, especially pertaining to sending of obscene literature, was discussed at a meeting of the executive board of the New Mexico chapter of National Association of Postmasters Saturday and Sunday at Truth or Consequences.

Mrs. Mable Wimberly, Hollywood postmaster and state secretary-treasurer of the chapter, attended the meeting.

"The topic was discussed," she said, "by Glenn Armstrong, field officer of Albuquerque, and W. D. Spangler, postal inspector."

Mrs. Wimberly said the speakers explained the many ways the send-

ers of such literature have of securing mailing lists.

"The senders even have devised ways of securing names of teenagers from libraries, as well as from many other channels," she said. "The obscene literature business is a \$1 million dollar racket, according to the speakers."

Both Armstrong and Spangler urged the postmasters to help educate the public about the evils of the racket by addressing various civic groups in their communities.

"Both speakers feel that obscene literature is a contributing cause of juvenile delinquency," Mrs. Wimberly said.

Also appearing on the two-day program was field officer L. A. Mitchell, Jr., of Albuquerque. His talk concerned mail improvement service.

Meeting sessions were held at the T or C Country Club.

Other area postmasters attending included Louise Babers of San Francisco and Corinne McNalt of Mescalero.

A total of 35 postmasters was present.
