Barroughs Includes Ruidoso In Edict On Gambling

Gov. John Barroughs declaring New Mexico will not welcome gamblers driven out of neighbor states, last week renewed his recent warning for professional gamblers to keep their activities out of the state. His office said the new warning was especially prompted by a recent warning to gamblers. There have been reports some of this element were drifting into New Mexico, particularly heading for such a recreational center as Ruidoso. The governor's stand was represented as seeking to see that these types be blocked before they set their foot in the door. Barroughs recalled that about two months ago he warned professional gamblers against setting up their activities in New Mexico's recreational areas, especially those near race tracks. "In recent weeks," he said, "there has been a crackdown on gamblers in neighboring states, particularly in Texas. I would like to reiterate my previous stand that New Mexico does not welcome professional gamblers and will not tolerate their activities here. "With the tourist season approaching, I have asked the State Police to redouble their efforts in those areas most likely to be frequented by the professional gamblers. "We have the responsibility of protecting our own citizens, as well as our tourists, and New Mexico will not serve as a haven for these cast-offs from our neighboring states."

In the year of 1938, Iida Mae Browning, mother of Dede Browning and also Ruidoso's first school teacher, was preparing to leave the valley when she had lived in and





## 'Smokey Bear,' 'Lincoln Forest' Honored With Races At Downs

Friday's feature race at Ruidoso Downs on the 11th day of horse racing in the cool pines, is a six and one-half furlong event dedicated to the famous Smokey Bear and the Lincoln National Forest.

For three-year-olds and upward in the claiming class, this event has attracted seven fine claiming horses who have not fared so well in previous outings during the year.

The White Sands feature, limited to horses that have not won two races during 1960, still looms as one of the best baited races thus far at the mountain track.

Top weight is on the hard hitting Johnny Dark, moving into faster company after an imposing win at Ruidoso Downs last week-end; Charlie Joy's feet footed Justa Bull, who just missed in his last and Gary R., who turned in a fast win in January.

All have been asked to carry 121 pounds. Gallately, from Phoenix, Ariz., Paul Oliver stable, will be dropping down in class after cooting a rather easy Phoenix win in a race that carried a \$2,000 claiming tag.

Along with Hyzard, a winner last December at Sunland, Jaccery, a winner of six in 1959 and Jay Ten, from the stable of trainer Clayton Gulliver—all are scheduled to carry 118.

The co-featured tenth race on the card has attracted some sprightly short sprinters at the 870 yard distance, one of the most popular races at the Downs. The 870 looms as a wide open affair when both the long running quarter horses and the short sprinting thoroughbreds draw support from their many backers.

A thoroughbred allowance at one mile, and a top AAA quarter horse dash will share the spotlight on Saturday's card at Ruidoso Downs.

The eleventh race, a thoroughbred stakes allowance, has attracted some top distance horses, with many going the mile route for the first time at the meeting. The feature, appropriately named The Lincoln National Forest, will see Joenik, from the stable of Richard Hamilton, Phoenix, looking for his third win at the meeting. Named to carry the top weight of 123 lbs. and the racing silks of Helen Hyde of Wichita, Kans., Joenik, a four-year-old gelded son of Reddy Boy—Fiery Brown, has turned in a total of four wins for his twelve starts this year, with three seconds and one third adding to his total winnings. In fact, a newcomer from the west coast and Phoenix, also stands as a strong contender.

From the racing stable of George Tim, and under the capable riding of Joe Valdez, this feet-footed sprinter suggests an unknown but possible strong element.

The Smokey Bear quarter horse feature will see some of the top AAA horses in the nation matching their speed at the four hundred yard mark. Here again, looms an unknown factor as Old Mary's Colt, from the stable

of C. M. Kiser, Denver, moves into faster company. After a rather easy victory in his first outing, he will be matching strides with nine of the top sprinters in the quarter horse world, all looking for their first AAA win of the year. It will also mark the return of one of last year's top winning horses, Spanish Charge, from the stable of M. J. Petry, Uvalde, Tex. This feet-footed sprinter, a Deepth Charge thoroughbred, scored a total of five wins last year, defeating some of the best.

**Sunday State Is Star Cast**  
Named in honor of the famed Bottomless Lakes State Park, a quarter horse sprint, fashioned for three-year-olds which still remain eligible for the Ruidoso Quarter Horse Derby, shares top billing with a thoroughbred event at 5 1/2 furlongs as racing moves into the final day of the fourth week-end at the mile high track. With more than 40 top three-year-olds still remaining eligible for the Derby, many of these derby hopefuls have chosen to pass up this race while looking for greener pastures in other featured events.

This feet-footed chestnut crop of three-year-olds, under the best ever with more than 20 of these top bred sprinters graded in AAA. Carl Mercer's fine filly, Aunt Judy (Vandy—Aunt Marnie) will be placing on the line one of the best records in the quarter horse world. This feet-footed chestnut speedster has a racing record of 8 wins in 14 starts, with two seconds and a third to show for her other efforts. Her strongest contention will be expected from James L. Finley's derby nominee, Miss Annie Bar, who fared badly in her only outing here (the Charles C. Cotten, and L. E. French's Panama Ace, another winner here at the Downs).

The 5 1/2 furlong thoroughbred colts, campaigning at the Downs for the summer season. R. E. Hirst's cap, as well as the Memorial Day Handicap. Other entries include Mott, a four time winner in 1959 and Late Evening, a two time winner in 1960. Billed as the featured race of the day, this might well be the feature race of the season.

from the Indians. Attempts to get the road built with Federal aid went on for many years. Senator Anderson has worked longer and harder on this project than any other public official that I know of, and it was through his continued effort that the final approval was worked out. To him goes the credit for the approval of the Sierra Corporation, a Horwell group, to go into the area and develop it. Their plans will be made known to the public soon and this brings to an end over 20 years of effort to provide Ruidoso with facilities so that the natural resources of winter sports can be utilized. This will be the southernmost ski run in the U. S., yet records show that the snowfall compares favorably with many of the northern runs, and the terrain cannot be excelled anywhere. This development, economically, is going to mean the leveling of our income curve, by increasing winter business when we need it most, thereby making investments in Ruidoso financially sound.

It has been my dream these many years and I get a great deal of personal satisfaction out of the hope that I am going to live long enough to see thousands of people enjoying

years and public demand increased for more adequate runs, the same group of business men started trying to find a better location. Horton, S. L. Peterson, C. L. Milligan, Thomas B. Forbis and (W. A. Hart) myself. Dr. Horton and I are the only two of this group still here. The officers the following year were Carmon Phillips, president; Bill Hart, secretary; Bob Boyce, Lloyd Bloodworth and Orland Bonaguido, directors.

The record of activities from then until now runs through a period of surveying first across the Mesquero Indian Reservation and later by way of Monjeau. We surveyed and engineered a cog railway route from Cedar Creek to the Park but were never able to get a right-of-way

test in skiing in Ruidoso. An occasional hiker would find his way into the canyon looking for a place to ski. We natives knew nothing about the sport but I was anxious to give it a try. I ordered a pair of skis from Denver and they came in by railway express to Capitan. After much delay getting them here on account of bad roads, I found they came without binders and poles, so

another order and delay before being able to try them out. This was the first pair of locally owned skis in the canyon that I knew of. Everyone interested gave them a try. Most of the early day skiing was on the hills now made into Cree Meadows Golf Course. We had much more snow then than now.

We found the snow stayed much better at the head of Cedar Creek, so a group of men, some who are still here, cut out trees and smoothed up beginning of the present Cedar Creek practice run. Both the road and the run were very crude in those days. We had to provide a tractor to get people's cars in and out of the area, and from 10 to 15 local business men kept busy parking and turning cars around at the run. The use of the area was so tremendous that the Forest Service became interested and while they had a C. C. Camp where the Ranger Station now is, they proceeded to improve both the run and the road to the condition they are today.




