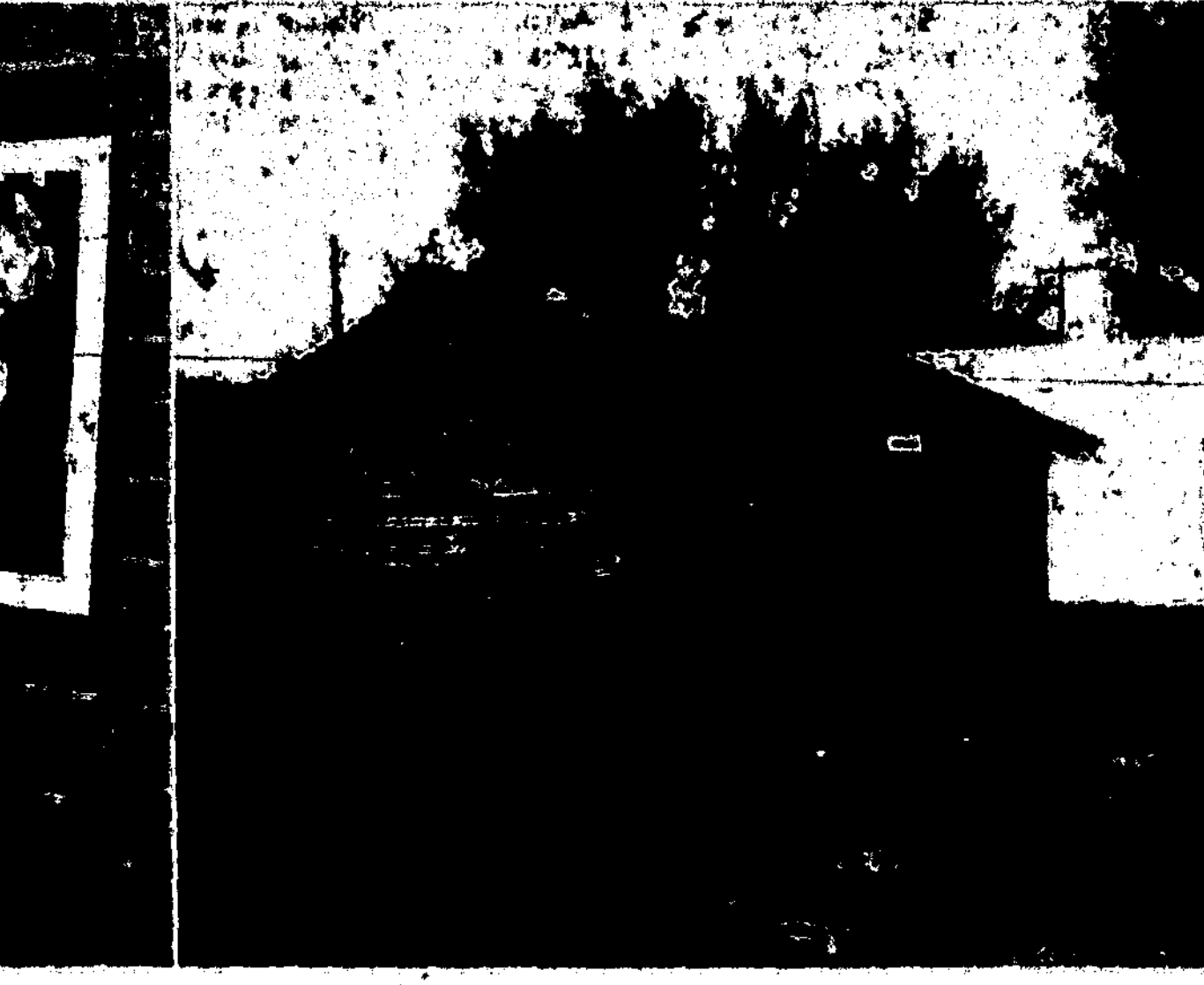

ONE CENT SALES TAX GOES INTO EFFECT HERE NEXT THURSDAY

The Village of Ruidoso will begin collecting a 1c on the \$1 sales tax on Thursday of next week, July 21. The tax will be collected on all items sold and all services rendered except on agricultural products and on cigarettes and on gasoline—just as the state's 2c on the \$1 sales tax for schools is now assessed.

Merchants will collect 3c on the dollar, remit the taxes collected to the State Board of Revenue, just as they do now for the 2c sales tax—making a separate item report on the sales tax rendition sheets they now use each month.

The State Board of Revenue will then remit to the Village of Ruidoso the tax money sent to it. The remittance may come to the village several weeks after the tax is collected from sales here. A slight fee is charged by the state for accepting the tax and handling the rebate to the village.

Severe penalties are invoked in the case of non-collection of the tax, as outlined in the city ordinance passed by the new administration headed by Mayor Robert F. Carr during his first week in office. The city officials, in announcing passage of the 1c tax, said the bulk of the tax money will be spent on street improvement within the village.

Several city officials and individuals received letters this week from the State Revenue Bureau instructing them to start collecting the 1c sales tax on July 10. This is in error—the ordinance voted by the village board of trustees set July 21 as the date the tax would begin.

"A copy of the ordinance in full, which appeared in the Ruidoso News May 20, is posted in the window of the Ruidoso News for public information. There is also a copy available at the municipal building for those who wish to review it."

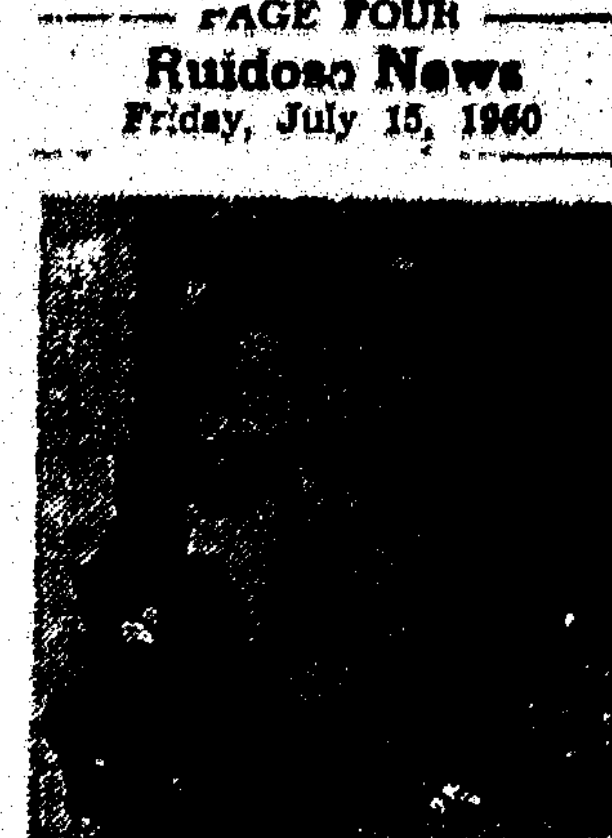

Gran Quivira National Monument recorded a 19 percent increase in visitation during June, as compared to the same month last year, according to Channing Howell, superintendent. A total of 1,243 persons visited the National Monument during the month, bringing the total for the year to 4,874 to date.
The National Monument contains the ruins of a large Indian pueblo

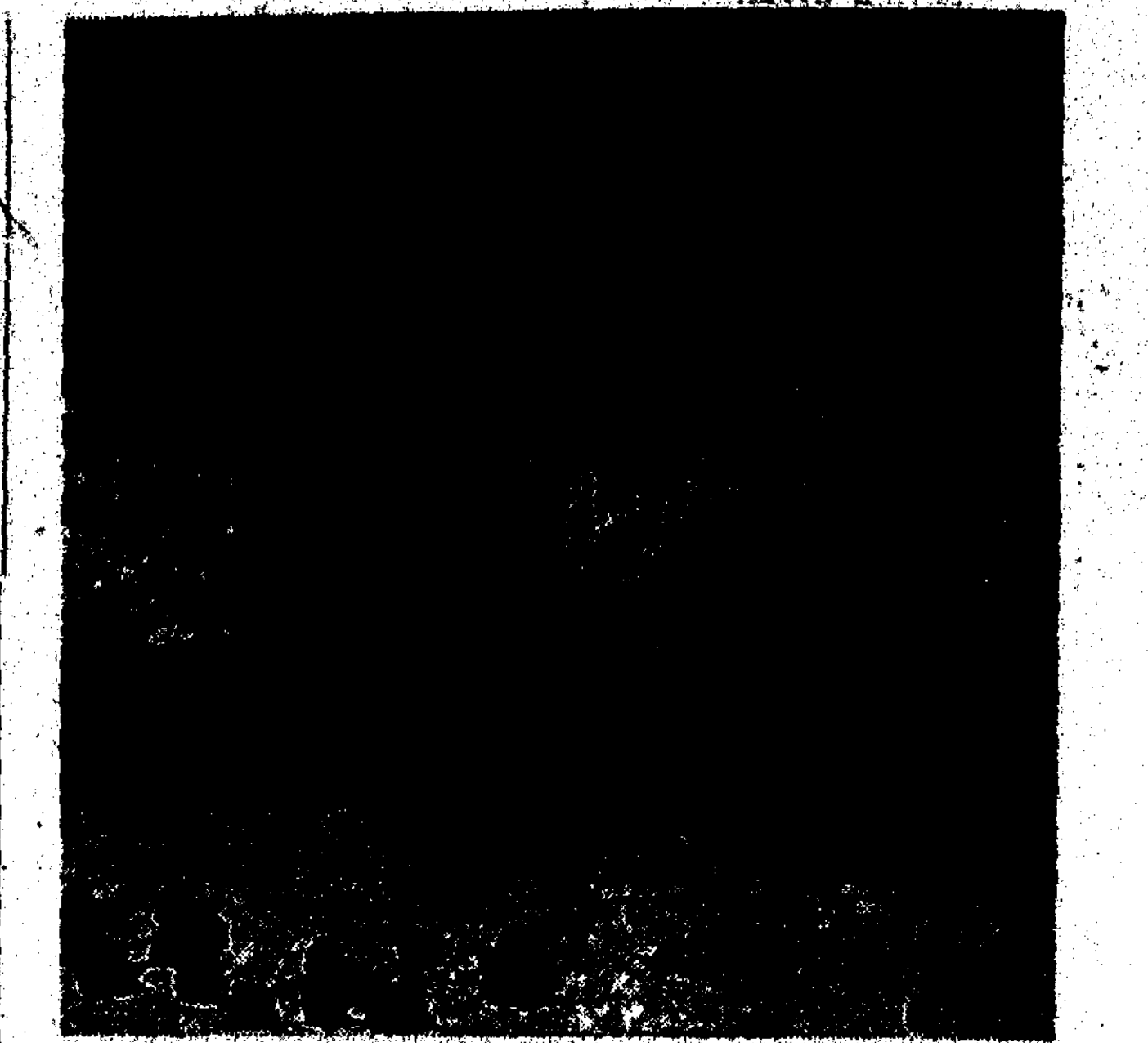
village and two early mission churches. The Spanish missionaries began to Christianize the Indians here early in the eighteenth century. In 1629 the first mission church, San Isidro, was built here by Father Leirado. Construction of the larger mission, San Buenaventura, began a few years later and was brought to completion by Father Santander. The village was abandoned about 1675 because of drought conditions and attacks by the Apache Indians.
There is no admission charge to visit the museum or to use the self-guiding trail through the Mission and Indian ruins. Picnic and camp grounds are also available without charge. Gran Quivira National Monument is located between Mountain and Carrizozo on State Road 10.

FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION LOANS \$376,500 IN YEAR
Loans totaling \$376,500 were made by the Farmers Home Administration to farm families in Chaves and Lincoln counties during the 1960 fiscal year, according to Tom Dwyer, the agency's county supervisor. Dwyer's office, located in Roswell, serves farmers and ranchers in both Chaves and Lincoln counties.

The bulk of the funds borrowed are in operating loans, those made to pay costs of fuel, fertilizer, pesticides, livestock, machinery and equipment, and to make recommended adjustments in farming systems. Loans of this type totaled \$272,020 for the 1960 fiscal year.
Farm real estate loans during the year amounted to \$103,680. Farmers used these loans to improve or purchase farms or farm land, to build or repair farm dwellings and to finance other essential farm construction, to install or repair irrigation systems, level land, and otherwise improve farms.

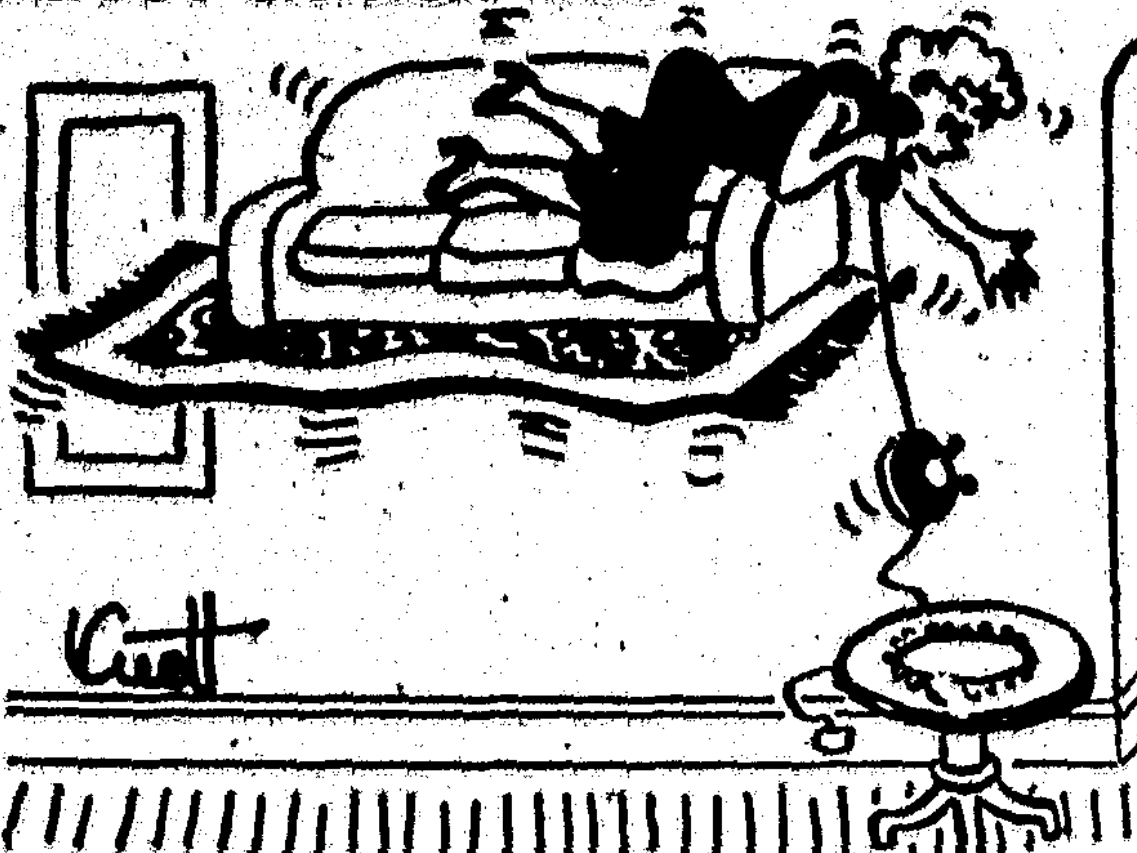

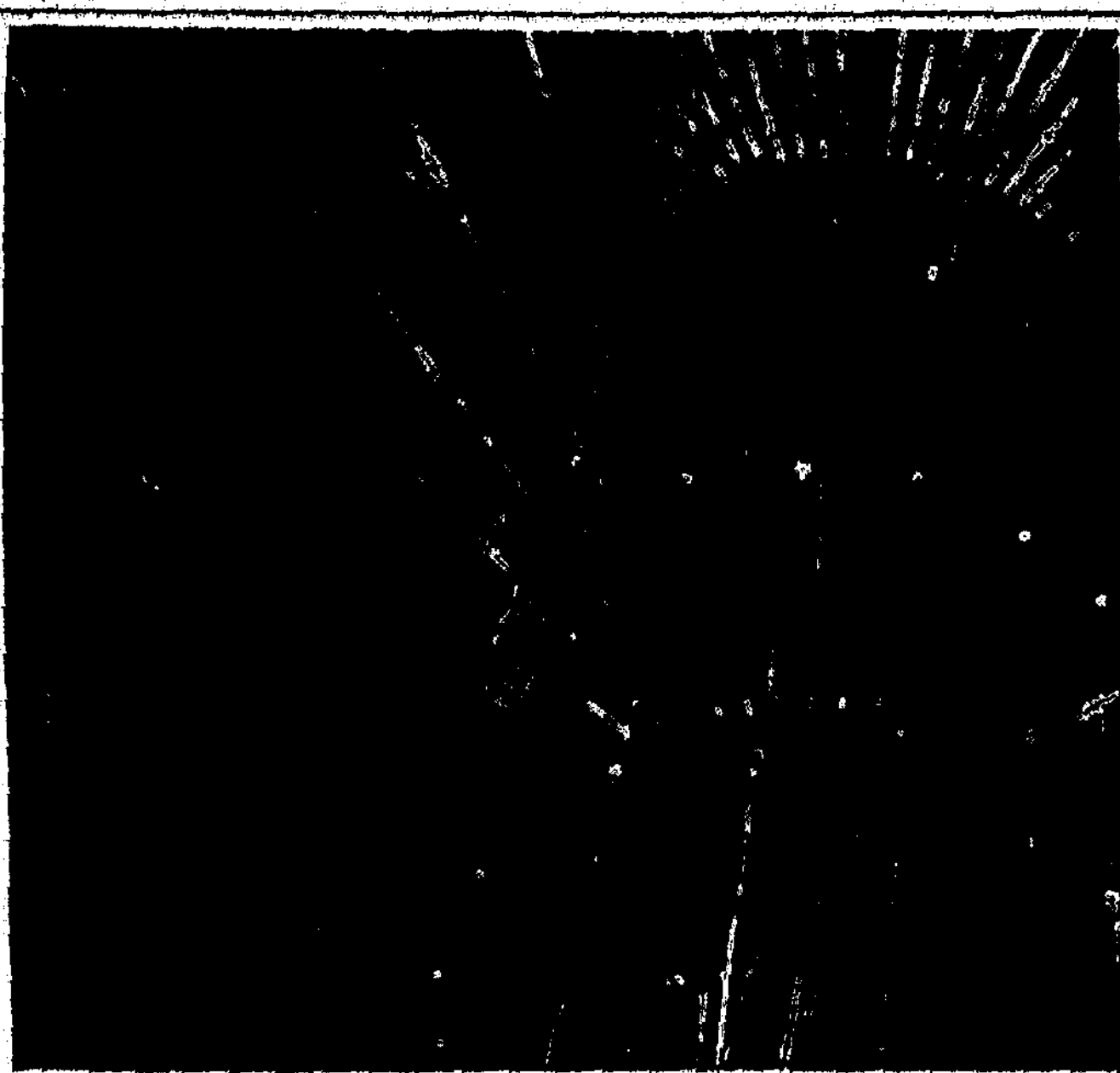

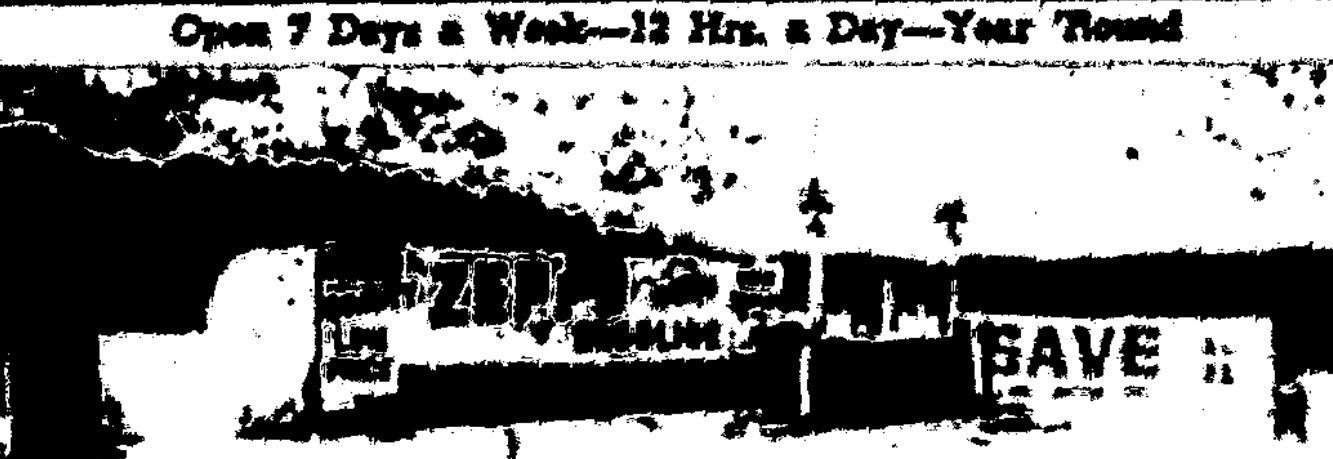

Old San Francisco Landmark Homes Preserved In Water Color Sketches By San Patricio Artist John Meigs

Returning from San Francisco with the plaudits of the whole city ringing in his ears, John Meigs of San Patricio, Meigs just completed a series of paintings, working just one jump ahead of a wrecking crew, of old buildings being torn down to make way for modern progress.

The results of his swiftly moving brush and feverish pace are on view through July at the Society of California Pioneers, 406 McAllister St., in San Francisco. His show is called "100 Years of San Francisco Building." Dean Wallace, San Francisco Chronicle columnist, had this to say of the artist's work: "Of the two dozen old dwellings that Meigs lovingly depicted, at least seven have already been demolished, and others may soon follow. But he did not con-

line himself to the neglected and doomed; he also painted the City That Might Have Been, by showing us the proud, well-kept mansions that date from the more exuberant era and will no doubt remain for many years only a few blocks away from the neighborhood now being razed."

He also predicted that the paintings would be around a good bit longer than the show of the city's architectural heritage and he was correct, for according to Meigs, nearly all of the paintings have been sold. The true mark of a successful artist's show in any man's language, I would say, is the sale of his work.

Meigs is quite excited over the sale of his work, and he has already been demolished, and others may soon follow. But he did not con-

There were gifts from the wrecking companies to the artist who apparently got all wrapped up in the flamboyant styles of the past—neo-Gothic, Renaissance, Victorian, Oriental and what he calls the stubborn individuality of pure San Francisco American.

Even in the black and white reproductions of the old buildings the fondness with which artist Meigs recorded them has a great deal of appeal and nostalgia.

Several other cities forced by economic pressures to tear down old buildings and modernize, have contacted John Meigs to "save their cities" in much the same manner that he used in recording the past for San Francisco.

But, at the moment Meigs is off on another project which also deals with the past though instead of destruction this new assignment will deal with re-creating what used to be, and this will be, loosely speaking, right in his "own back yard."


