Ruidoso got some front page publicity this week out of Mechem's announcement that he would be a candidate for governor. Naturally his decision got top headlines. Here the story behind the news coverage on that: The Ruidoso Newsman was in the lobby of the Navajo Lodge Hotel where the big G. O. P. rally was being held when Mechem came down the stairs from his room to be for the smorgasbord supper at 7:30 p. m. We met him at the bottom of the stairs and we said being a newspaperman we'd have to ask him the same question every newspaperman in the state was asking him. After our tip, the news media of Albuquerque gathered for a telephone conference with Mechem—calling him here and questioning him over the phone about the tip we gave. There were eight reporters on the phone during that one time. TV stations recorded their conversation with Mechem. Actually, there were a number of people in Albuquerque who knew Mechem was going to run before he made the announcement here at the dinner at about 9:45 p. m. . . .

Former Governor Edwin L. Mechem told some 200 banqueting Republicans in Ruidoso at Navajo Lodge Hotel Monday evening at 9:45 p. m. that he would be a candidate for governor on the G. O. P. ticket. He ended his announcement with this statement: "The only salvation for the state of New Mexico is the Republican Party." His final jab at the Democratic administration brought thundering applause. . . .


Post Office Takes Option On Another Possible Site


