It was pointed out to me last week-end that this week, Nov. 6-12, is National Education Week, and that thought pointed me in the direction of thinking, with so many folks critical of their schools these days, maybe they should consider a school is only as strong as its curriculum, and that, in turn brings me to say, "Have you discussed with your school board members, your faculty, your school administration, the status of your own schools. How much do you know that they have and offer—how much do you know they don't have and don't offer? Rather than talk it with your neighbors and your heads and o'clock 'til, let's do some thinking, some asking, some planning and offer some help if your school people need your help. "There is no reason why our schools can't be the BEST in the country," says one mother here to me. "Well, maybe they are," says we in answer—but do you know they are not—or do you know they ARE?"

Are there weak links in our children's high school program, does it offer them the best in biology, physics, algebra, trigonometry, foreign languages, chemistry, music, art, language, arts, home arts, social studies and vocational subjects? Does it use the latest audio-visual aids? Does it have well-equipped and adequate laboratories and shops? As a parent, you can make sure your schools serve the many talents and abilities of all the children in the enrollment. Make a tour of your schools—you know you are always welcome. Ask questions, learn on the spot, answers to things you've wondered about.

Talking and worrying about your schools over the fence with the neighbor won't do a bit of good unless you are often there to talk it over with your school leaders.

3-Year Audit Shows Shortage Over \$15,000

A complete, three year audit for the Village of Ruidoso's fiscal years of 1947-48, 1948-49 and 1949-50 reveals shortages in various funds of more than \$15,000, Mayor Robert Pearson told the Ruidoso News last week-end.

Pearson said this week members of the Village Board of Trustees would sit in with him and the Assistant District Attorney, Richard Parsons, and with the auditor who made the three-year financial report, George England, to discuss the next action to take in recovering the money that is missing, and what steps should be taken to prosecute the guilty.

The special audit cost the village \$3,000, and proved necessary to determine the complete state of affairs of the village's financial situation, city officials said. Previous audits did not come near showing the amounts that were missing in the various funds, the mayor said when the special audit was ordered.

Mayor Pearson said some of the money may be recovered through bonds on city employees for those active, Mayor Pearson said he understood.

Write-In Voting Wins For Bobo

Several write-in campaigns in the Ruidoso area added interest to Tuesday's election.

Incumbent V. E. Bobo, village marshal here, was elected constable in precinct 19 by write-in votes, getting a total of 283, while another write-in hopeful, Pat Williamson, got 103. Fred Riley, whose name was printed on the Democratic ballot, got 192.

Harold Graham, seeking re-election for the office of justice of the peace in precinct 19 here, received 557 votes. For both jobs here, there were numerous single write-in votes for "favorite sons," totaling one or two each.

In precinct 10, Alton Gray, Democrat for re-election as justice of the peace there, beat down a write-in campaign handily, receiving 250 votes to Nick Nickolich's 7. For constable in Ruidoso Downs, Bert Judis came out in front 223 to 20 for Nick Nickolich.

At Hondo, Santiago Herrera won the justice of the peace post from Leo Jolner, incumbent, 170 to 103. In Carrizozo the justice of the peace post went to Raymond Sherrill, 151, over McDaniel, 59.

State Highway 70 Meet Slated Here, Thursday, Nov. 17

A meeting of the New Mexico U. S. Highway 70 association is to be held in Ruidoso Thursday of next week, Nov. 17, with delegates expected from communities all along the noted east-west Treasure Trail through this state, Mrs. Emma Redmann, state secretary, said.

Bill Moore of Mesquite is state president of the organization, Working with Moore in the meeting here next week will be J. J. DiPaolo, national U. S. Highway 70 president, who is a Ruidosoan, as is the national secretary, Mrs. Wayne Winters.

A state meeting was to have been held earlier this fall here, but had to be postponed until this month, Mrs. Redmann said.

Library Becomes Part Of Village

The Village of Ruidoso last week published an ordinance in the Ruidoso News making the Ruidoso Public Library a part of the village, and under municipal authority. The board will elect its own chairman, assistant chairman and secretary-treasurer, and will employ its own librarian, and is to make regular financial and progress reports to the village.

G. O. P. Captures Lincoln County

Lincoln County voters approved the hospital levy, a tax that must be voted on each two years, for support of the two hospitals of the county in the Tuesday voting, by a 1,090 to 480 count.

The state bond issue of \$8 million was approved in this county, 959 to 400, and almost all amendments were approved.

The amendments and the votes were:

- No. 1—Staggered terms for state senators, 658 for and 688 against.
- No. 2—Permitting annual legislative sessions, 705 for and 568 against.
- No. 3—To let legislature set own date for deadline on introducing bills, 711 for and 528 against.
- No. 4—Adding some institutions to official state institutions list, 911 for and 424 against.
- No. 5—Four year terms for top state officials, 537 for and 801 against.
- No. 6—Location of state agencies, 530 for and 78 against.
- No. 7—Change in names of some state institutions, 814 for and 463 against.
- No. 8—To permit counties to divide into districts, requiring commissioners to reside in respective districts, 763 for, 524 against.
- No. 9—Continuity of government preparation in case of disaster, 1026 for and 337 against.



Republicans were most successful in the races in Lincoln County in Tuesday's election. They swept through on most of the county offices, won in some state offices, and went heavily for Nixon and Lodge, opposite the state vote. The county gave a good majority to Edwin L. Mechem for governor over incumbent John Burroughs, the fifth time this county has supported that Republican in this race.

In county offices, Olen Bradley polled more votes than anyone on the ballot in his race for sheriff over Democrat Frank Barajas. This will be Bradley's third term as sheriff. Charles A. Jones, who has served as county commissioner in District 2 for two terms, was again elected to that post, the only Democrat to get a county position, besides Lewis Cummins, who had no opponent for county treasurer.

Other winners in Lincoln County in state races:

- U. S. Senator Clinton Anderson over Colwell; Congressman Joe Montoya re-elected over Balcomb, Congressman Tom Morris over Robb; Tom Bolack for lieutenant governor over Democrat Montoya; Republican Amelia Lake over Betty Fiorino for county clerk; Democrat State Auditor Bob Castner over Republican Valdez; Joe Callaway, a Demo, for state treasurer over Burson; Johnny Walker for land commissioner over Wilson of the G. O. P.; Republican Warren Cobean over Edgar P. Gentry for county clerk; Democrat for corporation commissioner; and for supreme court, both Democrats were winners in the county, Moise and Noble over Shillinglaw and Keefe.

In the county all these Republicans won. Democrat was a victor over Herman Kell for state senator, William O. Sherrill over W. A. Hart for state legislator; Ignacio Torres for county commissioner in district 1 over incumbent R. C. Nunez; Kenneth Hocker over Jack Dierker for county clerk in district 2; Alice King for county clerk over Clarence Shaw; Lloyd Vigil for county assessor over Austin Wooten; and Marvin Roberts for probate judge over incumbent Tennil Smoot.







Teachers See Ft. Stanton Booth At Meet

When the New Mexico Education Association convention, more commonly known as the annual teachers' convention, convened in Albuquerque there were 80 booths representing the most scientific school equipment, the latest school supplies, and the most modern methods of teacher to student instruction.

Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital, for the first time, had a booth for superintendents, principals, teachers and the general public to help them increase their knowledge of the disease of tuberculosis. The booth contained a large map of New Mexico showing by colored circles the areas of New Mexico visited by the doctors of that area in chest clinics during which unaccepted and suspected cases of tuberculosis are given a follow-up by the clinic physician with further testing on the tentative diagnosis of tuberculosis. The map, also, contained colored map pins to designate the following: red pins, five patients per locality; yellow pins, one patient per locality; white pins, chest clinic in that area. In the booth also were x-rays showing a "before and after" of a tubercular patient. There was an automatic slide projector too, that showed Fort Stanton Hospital, the rehabilitation facilities, and improvements for the welfare and treatment of the tubercular patient.

Mrs. Eva Henderson, occupational therapy supervisor, attending the Fort Stanton booth, gave this writer the questions most frequently asked by the attending personnel:

Boons?" They are referred to their private physician and the local Public Health Department for the follow-up care.

"If an ordinary citizen, how could they go about getting a tuberculin skin test?" By an appointment with their private physician or the local Public Health Department.

"Where could the school, wishing to show films on T. b. and public health, obtain them?" By writing the New Mexico Department of Public Health, Division of Educational Films, Santa Fe.

"How is the hospital operated?" The New Mexico Tuberculosis Hospitals' Board is responsible to the governor of New Mexico for the operation of the hospital. The Fort Stanton Hospital medical director and the superintendent are in turn responsible to the Hospitals' Board for the operation of the hospital.

A number of comments were received on the following two statements: "People are unaware that patients at Fort Stanton had a Social Club, 'Los Amigos,' where they have their weekly games of bingo, shuffle board, ping pong table; movies once a week; a well-stocked library from which they select reading material." They have the services of a dentist, a psychiatrist, the V. A. district representative,

and the Social Security representative. Adult classes in reading, English, sewing and cooking, sewing student classes in typing are held daily, and the patients participate in holiday activities. The comments on the "before and after" x-rays were interesting. The length of hospitalization of a patient can be shortened if the disease is found in an early stage. This can only be done if a person will have periodic examinations. When a person has "symptoms" of tuberculosis, the disease is usually past the early stage, and a longer period of hospitalization is necessary.

ing country and Fort Stanton itself, have approximately 365 days of sunshine annually. The climatic conditions are most ideal for helping the patients regain their health.

Another frequently asked question was, "Could a tour of Fort Stanton be arranged if a party of school personnel were to go to Fort Stanton?" Most assuredly, the Fort Stanton medical and administration staff would be most co-operative in taking such a party on a guided tour of Fort Stanton and the hospital.

"How can the different communities have the use of the advantages of the mobile x-ray units?" The community seeking the use of the mobile x-ray unit should contact Dr. Stanley Leland, director of the New Mexico Department of Public Health, Santa Fe, requesting a survey be made of that community. A fact not realized by quite a few of the school personnel was that Fort Stanton has occupational therapy facilities. Among some of the facilities is the training in the art of leather tooling, copper tooling and wood work; training in shoe repairing and carpentry; training in home economics; training in the art of cosmetology with a qualified instructor, in the Fort Stanton Academy of Beauty Culture, an accredited school of Cosmetology, approved by the New Mexico State Board of Hairdressers and Cosmetologists.

"If school children are sent to Fort Stanton as patients can their schooling be continued?" Indeed it can. Fort Stanton has a school for all 12 grades. In 1939 a Navajo Indian boy, 18 years of age, graduated from Fort Stanton, the first to do so. The school teacher, Mrs. John Lacy, won second place in the State of New Mexico contest, "Teacher of the Year" in 1939, sponsored by the Federated Women's Clubs of New Mexico.

"After a person has a tuberculin skin test, how can their status be determined?" If the person having the skin test, is what is found to be a "positive reactor," then a chest x-ray should be taken. If the x-ray shows abnormal shadows then a complete diagnostic work should be done.

"How long does a patient have to stay in the hospital?" Approximately 285 days as an average, depending upon the extent of the disease.

"Are patients on discharge given any instructions as to how they should take care of themselves at home?"

Petition Alleges Overpayment On Rights-Of-Way

A petition in intervention stating that the U. S. Highway 70 right-of-way project in the Ruidoso Downs area "is grossly replete with instances of collusion and misconduct all tending to raise the cost of the project or to take payment," has been filed by three Lincoln County property owners in court in Carrizozo.

The petition states that the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners had entered into agreement with certain property owners along the recently acquired right-of-way in such a manner as to grossly overpay certain property owners and thereby wasting county tax money.

The taxpayers named in the petition are Roy Browning, Louis M. Smith and H. A. Barr, representing the petitioners, and others, "the number being too numerous to mention by name."

The Lincoln County petition, filed in connection with the condemnation suit filed against property owners by Lincoln County Commissioners, named situations which were:

(1) In at least one instance the Board of Commissioners agreed to pay and did pay, a member of said Board a grossly excessive sum for a parcel of land.

(2) In at least two instances payments of damages were paid to owners for land not taken, and not affected, or at most little affected, by said project, as consequential damages.

(3) In at least one instance a substantial payment of money was made to a party who owned no property whatever abutting on said highway as damages for the taking of property.

(4) In at least two instances excessive consequential damages were allowed on property adjoining property taken, on the other hand there are instances where because of advanced age, unfamiliarity with the legal system, or precarious financial conditions have been intimidated and "brow beaten" to accept less than the fair market value of the property taken.

(5) In one instance a property owner signed a settlement with the Highway Department stating at the time that he was settling under duress and because of threats and had the following written on said settlement: "settlement under protest marked" or this agreement.

"All of said collusion and misconduct raised the cost of the right-of-way taken and will and must increase the cost of the tax load borne or to be borne by these petitioners and those taxpayers similarly situated."

The petition further asked that the court allow petitioners to be allowed to intervene so that the collusion and misconduct of the Board of Commissioners could be brought to light.
