



These students will be at the Ruidoso High School on Dec. 19 to discuss their progress with Junior and Senior students and will also meet with the faculty.

During the afternoon session, presided over by Mrs. Martha Hall, Dean of Women, the following subjects were discussed: Advanced Placement, Honors Programs, Special Examinations, What Can the University Do? What Can the University Do? Also discussed were ways and means of coordinating high school and college work and all phases of instruction was covered. It was agreed that the high school curriculum should be enlarged to meet the entry requirements and that fields should be done away with.

Shults said that Ruidoso High School has been fortunate in securing a number of scholarships every year. Last year our school received more scholarships per capita than any other high school in New Mexico. In all 13 scholarships were given. Shults further stated that this certainly proves that our curriculum is standing the test, that our school has a good rating and that our teachers are doing a lot of credit for their work. - First we should like to point out some of the responsibilities of the pupils in regards to discipline:
1. To be regular in attendance, and to account for all absences.
 2. To make a real effort to learn.
 3. To be responsible for and expected to assume the consequences of his own actions.
 4. To be personally clean, neat and to dress appropriately.
 5. To have proper respect for those in authority.
 6. To follow all classroom rules and school regulations.
 7. To be honest and fair in dealing with others.
 8. To co-operate with his classmates and to share with them responsibilities and privileges.
 9. Each student is expected to contribute positively to his education and the education of others by the best use of his talents and his knowledge of good citizenship.

- Second, what are the responsibilities of the parents and what they should know about discipline:
1. Send your child to school with a good wholesome attitude toward school.
 2. Be willing to uphold the school in its disciplinary action.
 3. Refrain from discussing your child's conduct in school in the presence of your child.
 4. Be interested in your child's grades and quality of work and achievement.
 5. A school with a large enrollment cannot operate with the same policies as small school you attended years ago.
 6. Realize that the sole desire of teachers is to assist each student to achieve the highest goal possible.
 7. Understand that some students have no interest in school and will not conform to typical classroom conduct. Therefore, they must be removed.
 8. Statistics show that most discipline problems have their origin outside the school.
 9. Take time to confer with teachers and administrators when the welfare of their children are involved.
 10. Definite decisions should not

be made on disciplinary problems until the full story is known or reviewed.

11. The school is dealing with many students daily, resulting in many problems. These problems can be solved through mutual understanding of student, parent,


