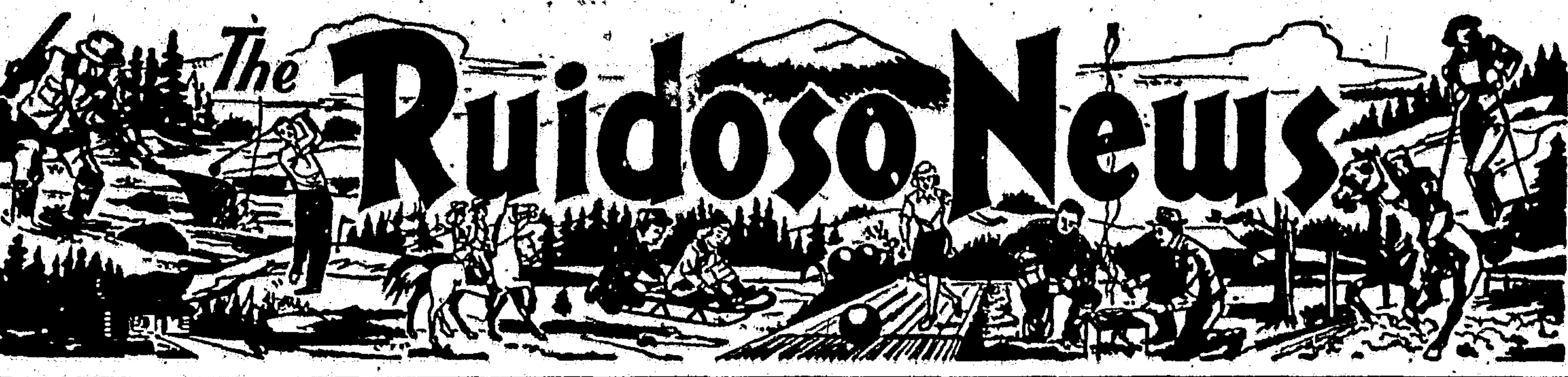


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Around Town

Shier, and copies to other board and school officials. She said she felt she had reached an impasse in working with the board in view of a disagreement she has had regarding her lone stand on the policy of relatives of a board member receiving compensation for the school system. She said in view of the fact school board election is coming up in February and that there are to be three members voted on now instead of two, she hoped that voters would determine the stand of all the candidates on the matter she felt is unethical. "It may be that today people had rather not be disturbed over this issue—they had rather accept it than fight it, and if that is so, then I cannot continue as a board member for I do not feel this is right," she stated.

The new directors will serve in the following capacities: Jack Hobson, chairman of the board; T. A. Bonnell, president; Gerald Dorsey Bonnell, vice-president; Dan W. King, vice-president; and Kenneth C. Bonnell, cashier.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Griffith: The letter is given below: Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico January 7, 1961 Mr. H. H. Shier, President Ruidoso School Board Hollywood, New Mexico

In 1961 I was elected by the voters of this school district—and since, re-elected to serve as their member of the school board. I have felt a deep obligation during these years, not only to the people who elected me, but to all parents and students present and future.

A basic disagreement has arisen between myself, as a lone minority, versus the other members of the school board as a majority, over a policy which could, if construed, affect the integrity of our school system. "Should a member of an immediate family of ANY school board member be given employment in our school system?" This is not in line with established principles of our larger school systems, and to me is morally wrong.

Whether the above mentioned policy is right or wrong, is not for me to decide, nor can it be decided by me or by other voters. The voters will have to make this decision at our next school board election, when new members will be elected. Yours Truly, s/ Georgia Griffith

Calm Winds Favor Sky Divers Program

Three members of the Southwest Sky Divers Club, made up of young men from the military establishments at Alamogordo and Escondido, took advantage of cool, calm and clear weather Sunday to entertain about 100 spectators with exhibitions of the new hobby of parachute jumping.

The three men each made two jumps, from different altitudes. They bailed out of Ralph McGuire's charter plane as quickly as they could, then maneuvered their parachutes to hit a target almost dead-end when they landed near Ruidoso's airport. Their last jump was from an altitude of about 10,000 feet, and they experienced a free fall of several seconds before pulling their rip cords. They carried smoke flares on their descent from the higher altitude.

The three were George Mulcahy, Mike Figuro and Chel Soules. Mulcahy has made about 600 jumps to his credit; Soules has about 20 and Figuro has about 25. Accompanying them was Ernie Hackett, who has been jumping with his buddies, but who stayed on the ground Sunday.

The Lions Club had its chuckwagon on hand to serve breakfast to all comers Sunday morning before the sky divers make their jumps. About 75 persons had breakfast of bacon and eggs, toast, squash bread, coffee and honey special guests at the table. The chuckwagon was in the hangar at the airport, were delegates here from various parts of the state who came to attend the 1961 Conference of the Federation of New Mexico Zoning and Planning Commissioners.

Former El Paso Mailman And Wife Carve New Career In Lodge Here

By MARSHALL HALL (In El Paso Herald-Post) The party, headed in 1958 when the couple moved to Ruidoso, are all my friends. In the Herald-Post I guess some of them remember me.

"They care do, Herb. All the old timers in that part of town remember the party and remember. Whatever happened to Herb Gregerson, the square dancing postman?"

Well, Herb Gregerson and his wife, Pauline, are doing all right as owners and operators of a 40-acre slice of mountain land and the Carizo Lodge, near Hondo. M. M. They have built a new kind of life for themselves, and are busy and happy.

But El Pasoans on his old mail route wouldn't recognize Herb, though Pauline is as slender and graceful as ever. Herb Gregerson has become quite a chef and, by sampling his own cuisine, has added considerably more pounds than he had as a mail carrier. The extra weight, plus a dark beard, has given him a Falstaffian appearance.

It has been 13 years since Herb Gregerson delivered mail in El Paso. He was the kind of postman who knew everybody on the route—men, women, children and dogs.

Mr. Gregerson led a double life. After walking all day with the mail he would dress up in western garb in the evenings and pursue his hobby of square dancing. He became an instructor and had his own studios.

Finally, in 1947, Mr. Gregerson decided to quit his postman's job and devote all his time to square dancing. It was a hard decision, leaving Government service, and he arrived at it only after talking it over with people on his route.

In the next several years Herb and Pauline Gregerson traveled all-over the nation. They taught square dancing in universities and colleges and in recreation centers throughout the U. S., Canada, Alaska, South America and the West Indies. (Herb already had traveled a lot in the Navy during World War II.)

In 1952 they bought Carizo Lodge near Hondo. The place is on the bank of Carizo Creek, 10 minutes from downtown Ruidoso. It is bordered on two sides by the Lincoln National Forest, and on one side by the Mesquero Apache Indian Reservation.

Ask For Bids On Ruidoso Road January 27

State Highway Commissioner John Wadsworth Saturday informed the Ruidoso News that advertising bids for Ruidoso's proposed Lane Sudderth Drive improvement project is being inserted this week in publications read by contractors throughout the area, and that the work would be opened Friday, Jan. 27, in Santa Fe. He indicated it is very likely a contract will be let on the work on that date. Additional surveying has been underway by state highway department engineer crews here for the last three weeks in preparation for the bid letting.

Also to be let on Jan. 27 will be a contract for work on almost eight miles of U. S. Highway 70-380, from a point 10.7 miles west of the Lincoln-Chaves county line to include both Pecos and Border hills. The work for removal of the old road, in buildings in preparation for the road improvement program. The three were Allen Lullin's Skyland Garage and Tadlock's Laundry in Skyland, and the Central Grill in downtown Ruidoso. Hino said there are only two private owners of the affected buildings who have not signed easements, and that at least four of those five had given indication they might sign in the next few days.

The state highway department has opened a temporary project office for the Ruidoso project, which may become the permanent headquarters for the project after Jan. 27.

GOV. MECHEM PROCLAIMS FARM BUREAU WEEK

The week of January 15 to 21 is Farm Bureau Week in New Mexico, Governor Edwin L. Mechem has announced. In a proclamation issued from the Executive Office at Santa Fe, Governor Mechem cited the farm-ranch families of New Mexico for making "an irreplaceable contribution to the economic progress and stability of the State of New Mexico."

(Editor's Note: Taking their cue from the Russians, the U. S. State Department has entered on a program of harassment by declaring various areas of the United States "off limits" to Russians. Among the areas is Lincoln County, according to the following Associated Press dispatch from Washington, D. C.)

The American maneuver seemed to say: "Isn't this whole business ridiculous?"

Before Friday, about one-fourth of American territory was off-limits to Russian visitors. After the reshuffling, about one-fourth still was off-limits.

The Russians now can visit Disneyland without a visa, but they can't tour Houston and Cincinnati any more.

The new restrictions were the U. S. answer to a Russian move in 1959. Then, the Russians moved their off-limits signs around, apparently without a visa, to Mexico.

In New Mexico, new areas closed to Russian travel include Chaves, Lincoln, Otero, Sierra and Socorro counties.

Previously closed to Russian travelers were an area about 10 miles wide, south of the Mexican southern border, and an area in north-central New Mexico including Bernalillo and Los Alamos counties and parts of Santa Fe, Rio Arriba, Torrance and Sandoval counties.

The American copying of Russia's action was almost exact. The U. S. State Dept. decided to "let Americans" drive from Mexico to Brest Litovsk on the Polish border in 1959. So the State Dept. now is letting Russians drive from Baltimore to Niagara Falls on the Canadian border.

Russian travel restrictions date back to 1941. The United States first retaliated in 1955 and repeated a long-standing request that the Russians ease their ban. The Russians ignored it. U. S. revisions came in a note to Soviet Ambassador Mikhail Menchikov (coupled with the request was a plea to ease the ban).

The United States said the Russian closed area of ten on to enter a state on only a "border crossing" and a "visa" and "presenting a passport."

The arbitrary measures which the State Department's administrators have taken to restrict travel sharply with the Soviet Union have been a major cause of better relations with the United States, the note said.

The United States offered to negotiate on the curb. State Dept. officials were hopeful the Russians might accept the offer this week-end. The note, however, was well tempered by recollections of Russian's reactions in the past.

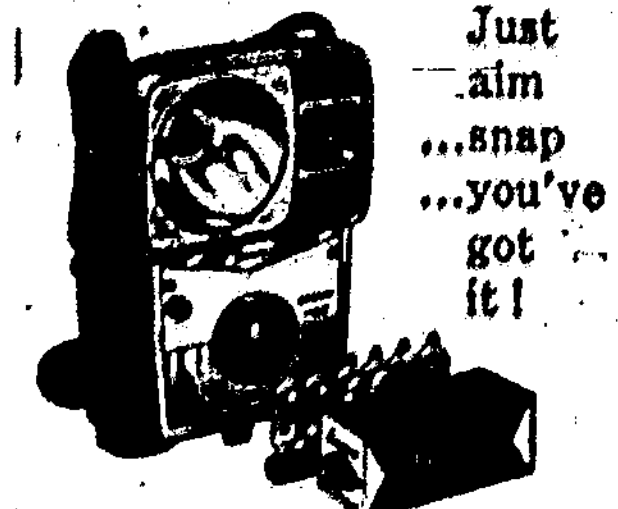

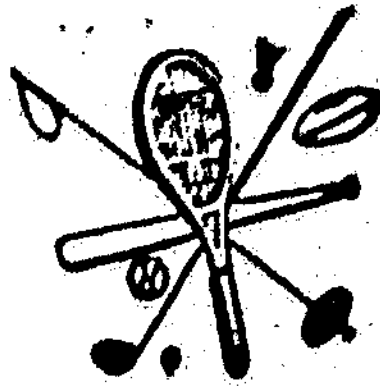

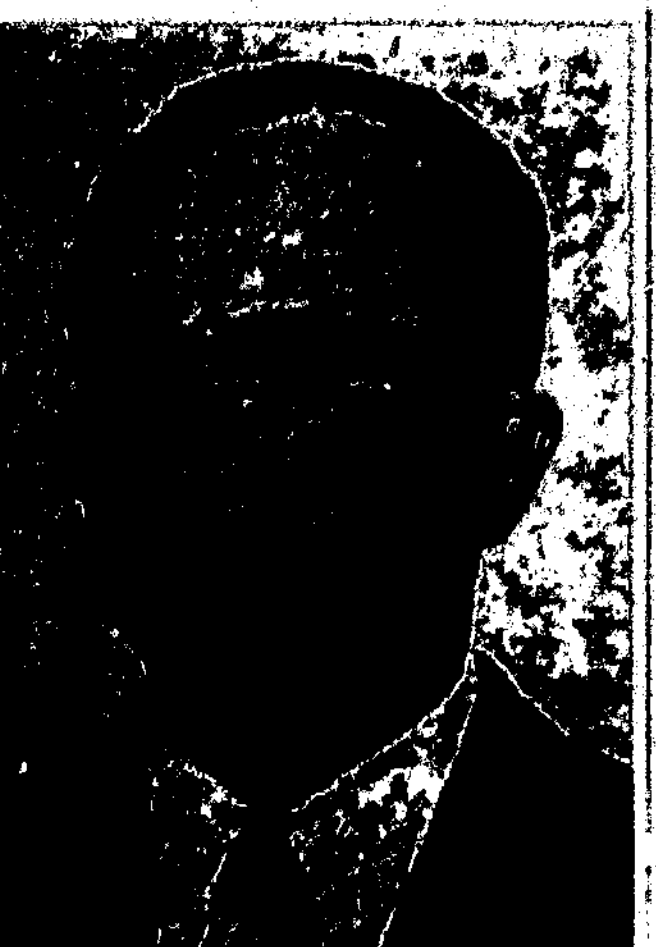

We are starting our weaving of belts in art this week. We want to have them done by Valentine's Day.

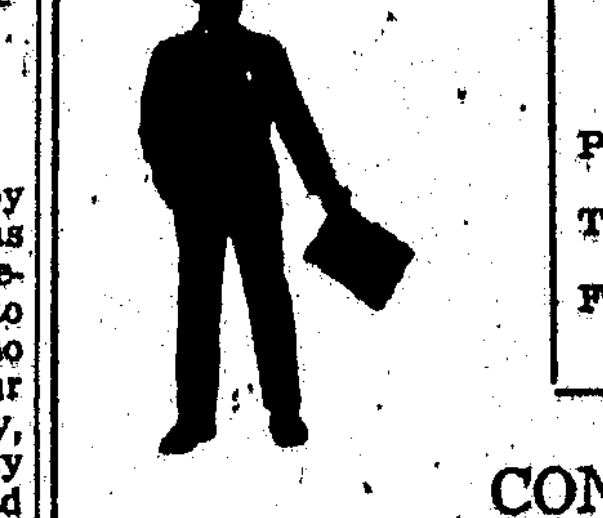
