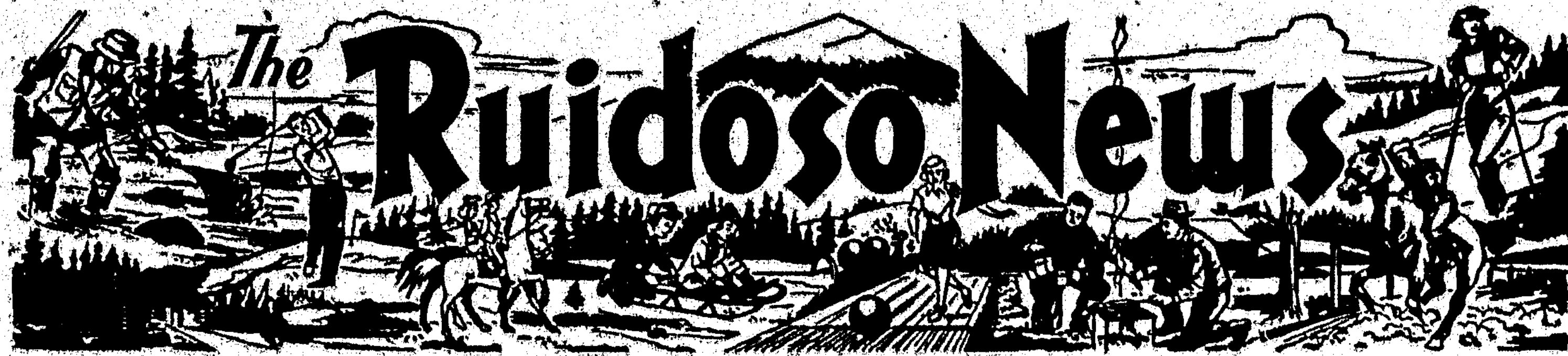

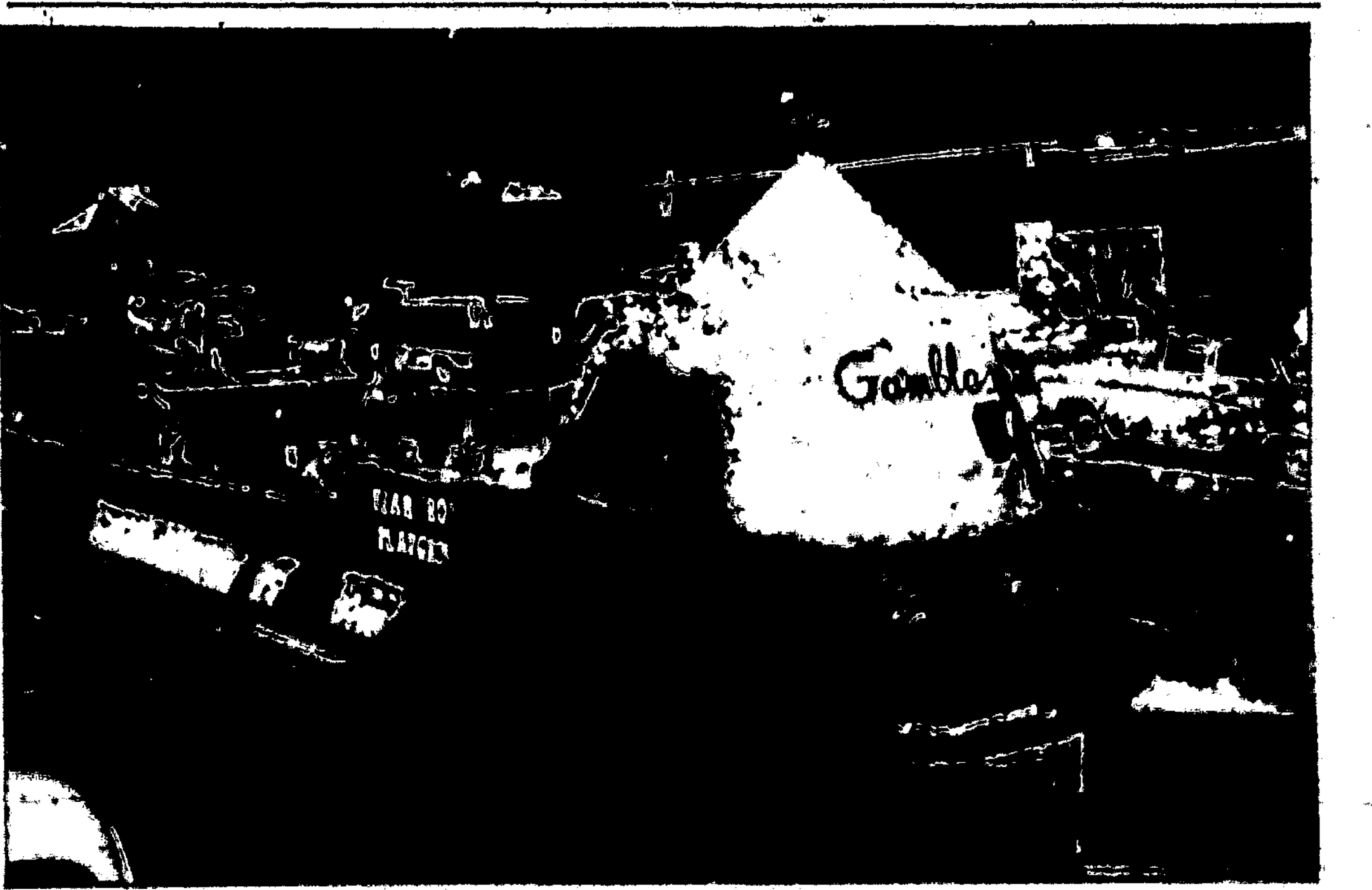

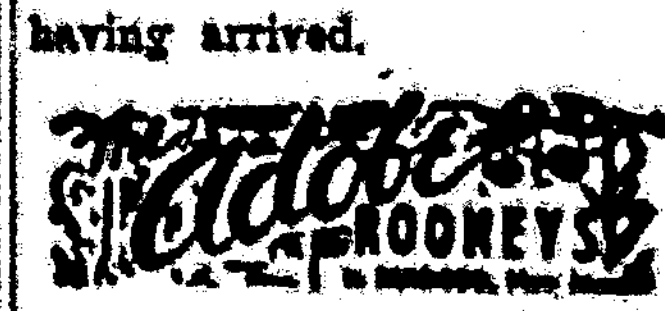

(On this 8th anniversary of our arriving in Ruidoso, we have done some reminiscing—and would like you to join with us in reviewing some of the past.)

When we arrived here Oct. 8, 1953, Ruidoso had a lot of things, and in the eight years we have been here, it has gained many of them, so many that it makes an astonishing list to count up. Such as:

We once had a telephone system that was so crowded we were on a party line with 14 other people, and the doctor was on a line with 12 other parties—now we have a modern dial system. We had to go to Roswell to get change to operate our business—now we have a fine bank; our newspaper was printed in Alamosa—now we have the News in its own plant with some of the finest equipment for the size town to be found in New Mexico; we did not have an adequate water system, and we do now; we had no sewer system, and we do now; and we didn't even have a cemetery—another facility that has been obtained.

Our town has quadrupled in size, with expanding village limits and many new subdivisions and additions, with dozens and dozens of fine new homes for our people; and we have many new businesses, located in their own new buildings—some of these being a radio station.

We have seen the Downs grow to where not a single piece of the old wooden facilities are in use now—all have been replaced with modern steel and concrete. Also underway is a fabulous winter and summer resort, the Sierra Blanca Recreation area in White Mountain Park that will help us grow even more. Another progressive step has been the addition of wonderful new paved streets and roads throughout the community; mercury vapor lighting has been installed too. And, we can boast of a wonderful new postoffice, too. We are happy we have been here to see such progress, and want to take our hats off to those civic minded people who have striven to bring the better things to this little progressive city—that hasn't lost any of its home town flavor. We hope we have had a part in the growth, and feel the way our business has grown that our part in the development has assisted somewhat.

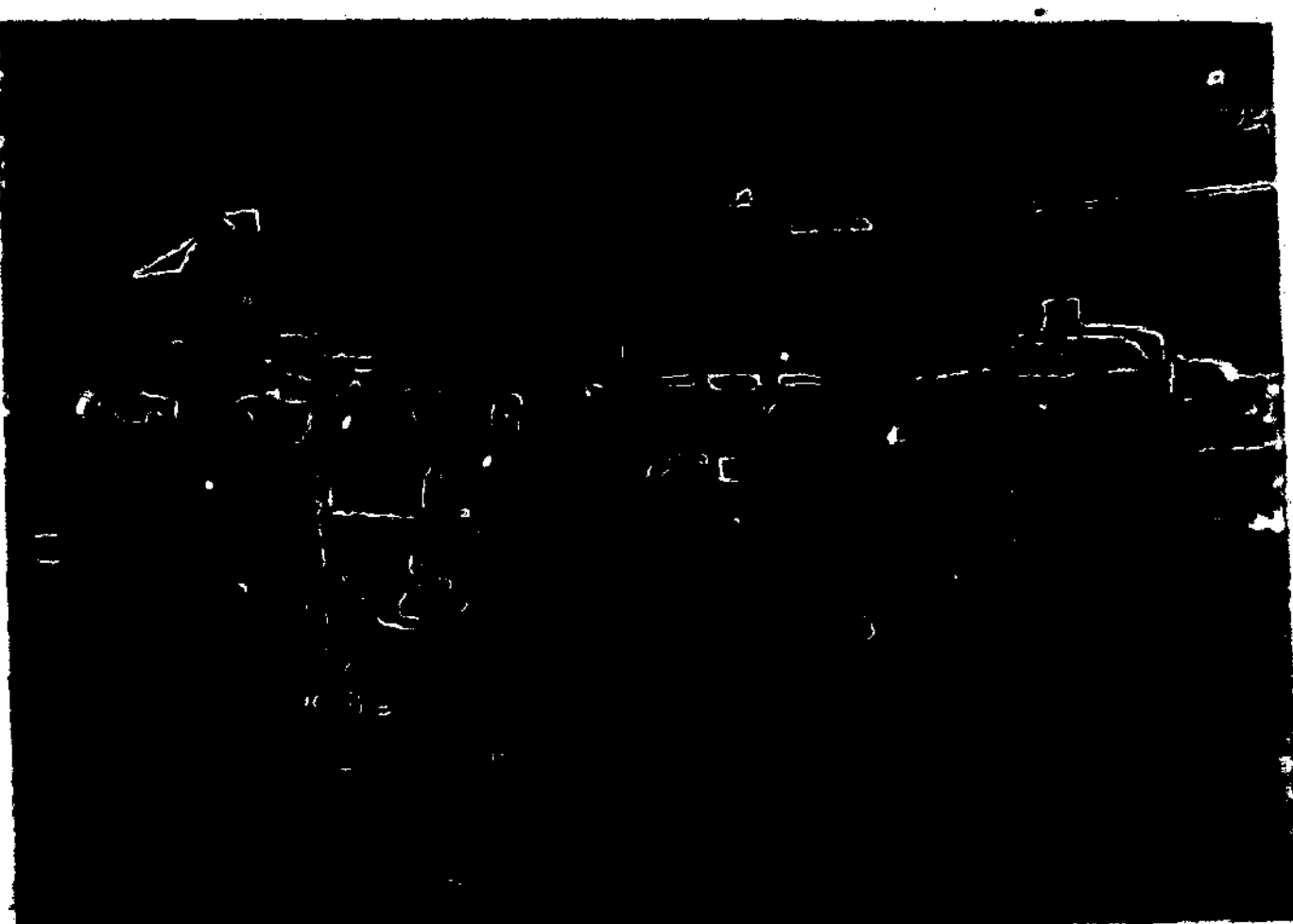

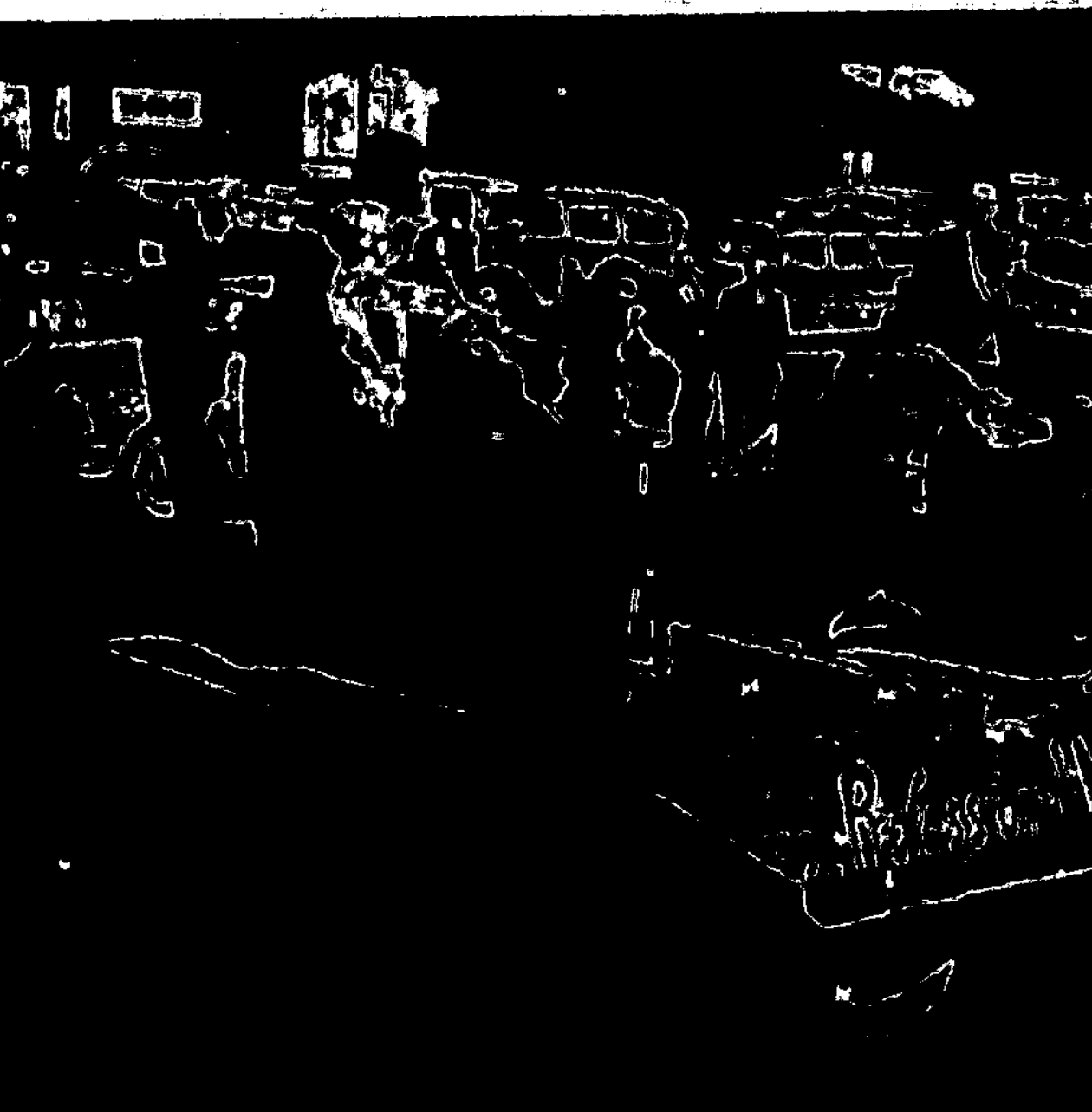
ORDINANCE NO. 123

AN ORDINANCE MODIFYING AND CONFIRMING THE PROCEEDINGS TAKEN IN PROVIDING FOR IMPROVING CERTAIN STREETS AND ALLEYS IN STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 60-1 OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE COSTS AND EXPENSES OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS; PROVIDING FOR THE FILING OF A CLAIM OF LIEN; ASSESSING THE COST OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS AGAINST THE LOTS AND PARCELS OF LAND BENEFITED BY SAID IMPROVEMENTS; DESCRIBING THE MANNER FOR THE COLLECTION AND PAYMENT OF SAID ASSESSMENTS; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR DELINQUENT PAYMENTS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Section 2. That for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of the said improvements there be, and there hereby is, levied and assessed against the lots and parcels of land specially benefited by said improvements, in the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and described in the assessment roll for said District, as filed in the office of the Village Clerk on the 14th day of September, 1961, and as modified and confirmed by resolution duly adopted by said Board of Trustees on the 6th day of October, 1961, the amounts and assessments shown in said roll.

That in case any such lot or parcel of land assessed as such assessment or in installment of principal or interest, the Board of Trustees shall set forth with cause Quinn & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, or any person, partnership or corporation hereafter designated in writing by that firm or its successor, a representative of the holder or holders of the bonds to be hereafter authorized to be issued by ordinance for the purpose of defraying a portion of the cost of the improvements in said Street Improvement District No. 60-1, and insert streets and alleys, and parts thereof, in the district.)

Section 6. That the Village Clerk shall publish, as soon as reasonably possible, a notice in the Ruidoso News, a newspaper which is the official newspaper for said Village, once a week for two consecutive weeks, stating that said assessments have been levied and are due and payable.

Section 7. That said notice shall be in substantially the following form: (Form of Notice) NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 60-1

Section 8. That all ordinances or resolutions, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or resolution, or part thereof, heretofore repealed.

Section 9. That the Village Clerk shall publish, as soon as reasonably possible, a notice in the Ruidoso News, a newspaper which is the official newspaper for said Village, once a week for two consecutive weeks, stating that said assessments have been levied and are due and payable.

Section 10. That the officers of the Village of Ruidoso be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 11. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not change any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 12. That all ordinances or resolutions, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or resolution, or part thereof, heretofore repealed.

Section 13. That because of the fact the Village does not now have adequate streets and it is necessary to defray forthwith the cost of improvements thereto, this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and that this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency on the ground of urgent public need; and, therefore, immediately upon its final passage, this ordinance shall be recorded in the book of ordinances of said Village kept for that purpose, authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and Village Clerk, shall be published in the Ruidoso News, a legal newspaper, of general circulation in said Village, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after such publication.

WARRIORS STOP HATCH 41-6; TAKE LEAD IN CONFERENCE

COOK PASSES WAY TO VICTORY

The Ruidoso Warriors, led by the passing of Quarterback Mack Cook, completely over-ran the Hatch Bears at Hatch last Friday night 41-6 to take the lead in the 3B District race.

Cook threw five touchdown passes and kicked five extra points in leading the way to the Warriors second conference victory. Ruidoso was never halted from the opening gun, scoring every time they had the ball, but three times when a penalty and two fumbles ended marches that looked goalward bound.

Three TDs called back. Early in the first quarter the Warriors gained possession of the pigskin on their own 46 yard line after Hatch gambled on fourth down and lost with an incomplete pass. The Warriors marched down to the Bear 21 behind the running of Alf Lane and Clifford Watley and the help of a personal foul penalty. From there three consecutive penalties nullified two scoring runs by Lane and one by Clifford Watley. Cook finally marked up seven points on the scoreboard with six yard toss to Gary Russell and Alan completed the PAT, his first of five successful conversions.

The Warriors forced the Bruins to kick after the kick off and marched again to the goal line. Cook again capped a drive after setting up the touchdown with a forty yard pass to Lane. He striped out non-halantly and pitted a perfect strike to Lane in the end zone from 10 yards out for the second tally. Cook again added the conversion.

Again the Warrior line held the Hatch crew on a fourth down try and with four minutes left in the half Cook threw a screen pass to Lane and the shifty halfback raved 50 yards behind the vicious blocking for the marker.

Quarterback Bob Ortiz also scored three times in routing Mountainair. Carrizozo opened with 26 points in the first period and held a 33-0 lead at halftime.

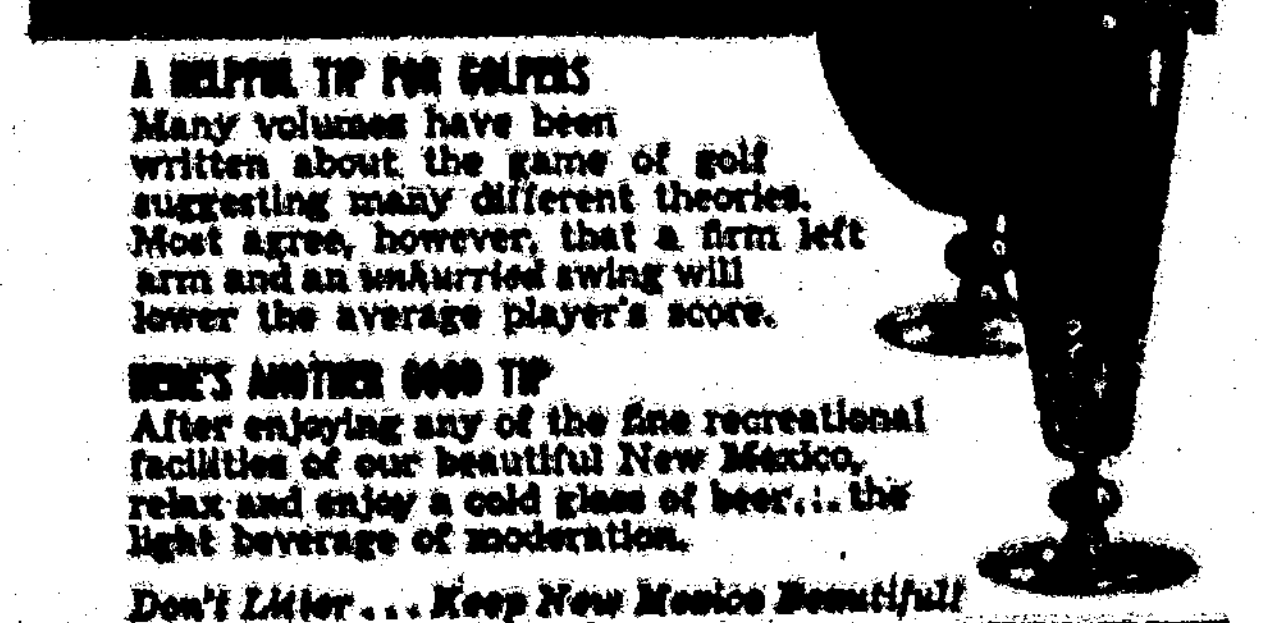
The victory marked Carrizozo's sixth win in seven games this year with the only loss coming from Tularosa in the first game of the season.

APACHES TO ISSUE HUNTING PERMITS

The Mesquero Apache tribe has determined it will offer for sale a limited number of hunting permits again this year.

The permits to be sold will be \$15.00 for deer, \$15.00 for bear and \$20.00 for deer and bear. A total of 250 deer permits and unlimited bear permits will be sold.

The date of the hunt has been set from Nov. 11 to 26. The tribal permit will be good for any of these three areas: Eagle Creek, Ruidoso Recreation Area and the Rinconada area. These areas can be reached by roads that will be indicated by a map that will be issued to the hunter. All other roads will be closed to traffic.

The country is rough and much of it is being opened to hunters for the first time.

Camping will be permitted in each of the three areas at a designated camp ground. There will be no charge for camping.

Reservations for permits will be accepted by mail if the fee for the permit is inclosed. Once reservations are made, the permit will be held for the hunter and there will be no refunds. A New Mexico hunting license number is required before the permit can be issued.

Hunters must abide by all of the New Mexico state regulations and those of the Mesquero tribe.

This hunt can be on either sex, but the Mesquero Apache tribe hopes the hunters will try to fill out on bucks first.

Natural boundaries for the hunting areas have been selected and hunters must stay within these areas. Maps showing the areas and access roads will be provided. Lack of information will be no excuse.

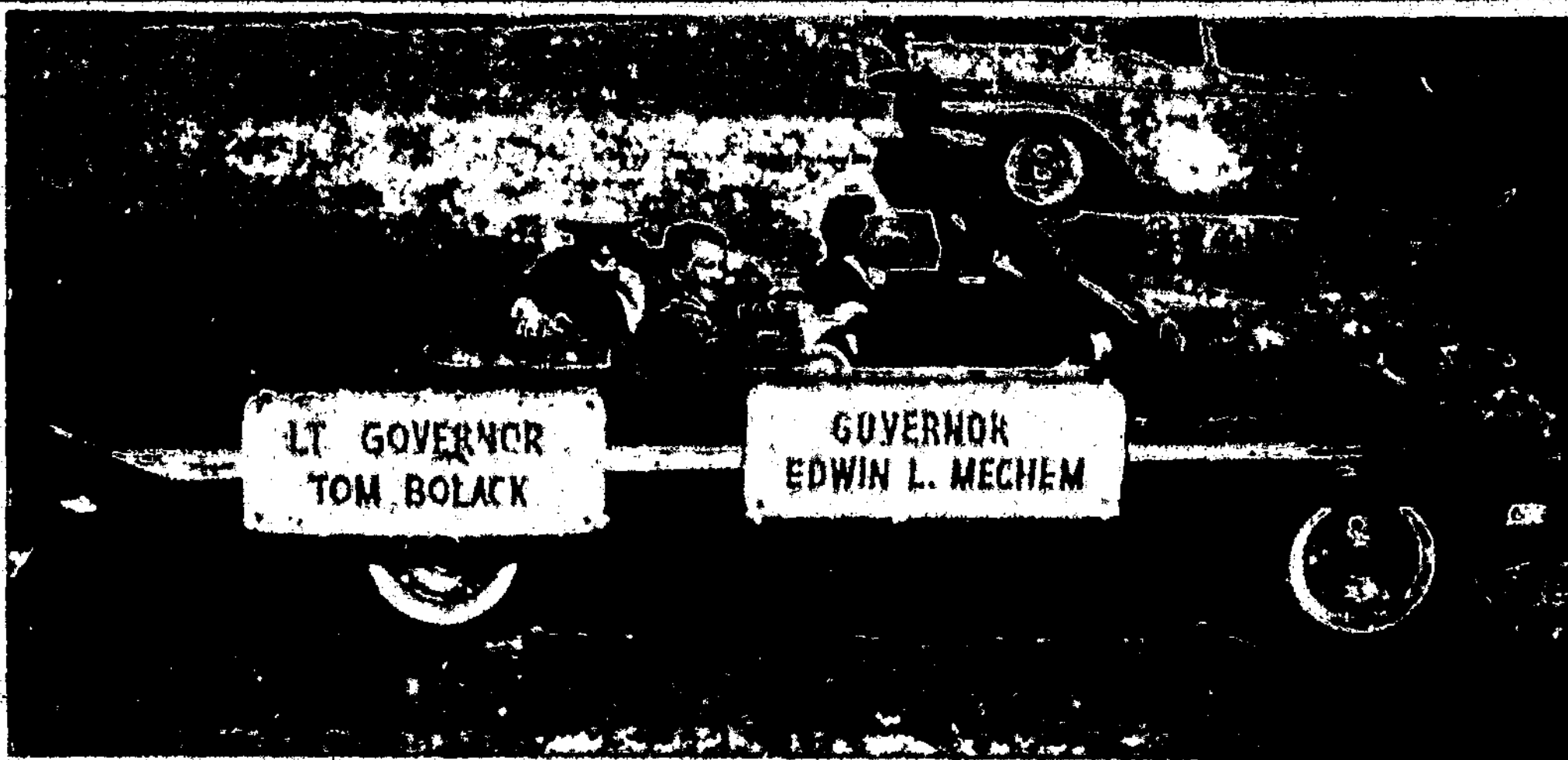
This was the Warriors' second straight victory in the district 3B race.

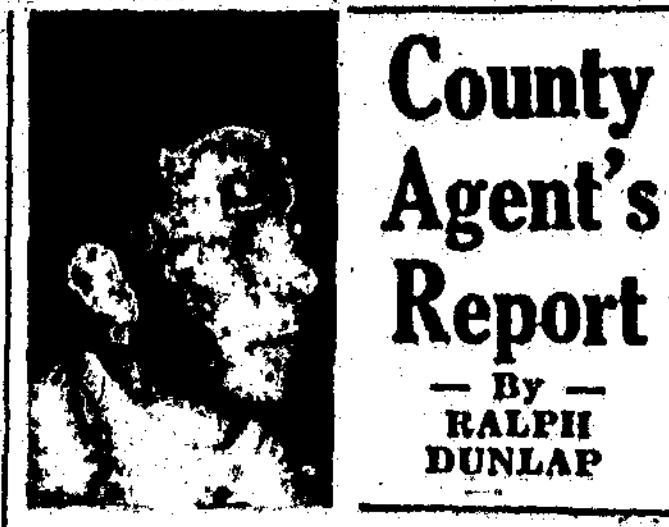

County Agent's Report
By RALPH DUNLAP

Farmers Home Administration loans will be available to a larger number of farmers after October 15th. One of the changes is that part time farmers with a job off the farm are eligible. The income still has to be enough to meet the requirements. This is designed so a person can get an economic unit by getting additional land while still working off of the farm.

If you are interested in seeing a bigger and better calf show, contact the county agent in the county house, at Carrizozo. Plans are to give an added boost to the calf program during 1952. To have a calf in a show it needs to be fed four to ten to eleven weeks and sell for 350 to 400 pounds calf this fall.

Contract now for cotton seed meal and grain for next spring feed period. The price is usually cheaper at this time of year than in the spring when everyone is buying feed.

Check storage buildings for insect pests before storing grain. Use Malathion as a spray in cracks in barn to get rid of pests.

Planning on storing a few apples here a few days for property for storage at home. I prefer Rome, Winesap, Golden Delicious or Jonathan apples. Next get a small or normal sized apple as they store better than the large apples. Store in a cool, moist place. Store only sound apples, wormy apples bruised fruit spoil and ruin the good fruit around it.

He said this week his station will continue to handle all of the popular Chevron lubrications and motor fuels as well as a full line of accessories. The station also features wash and grease service.

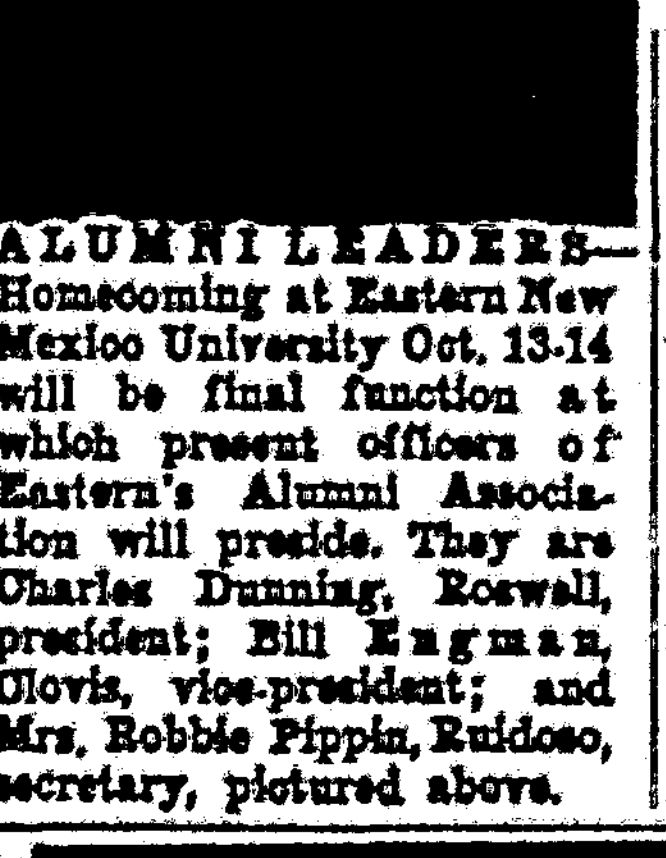

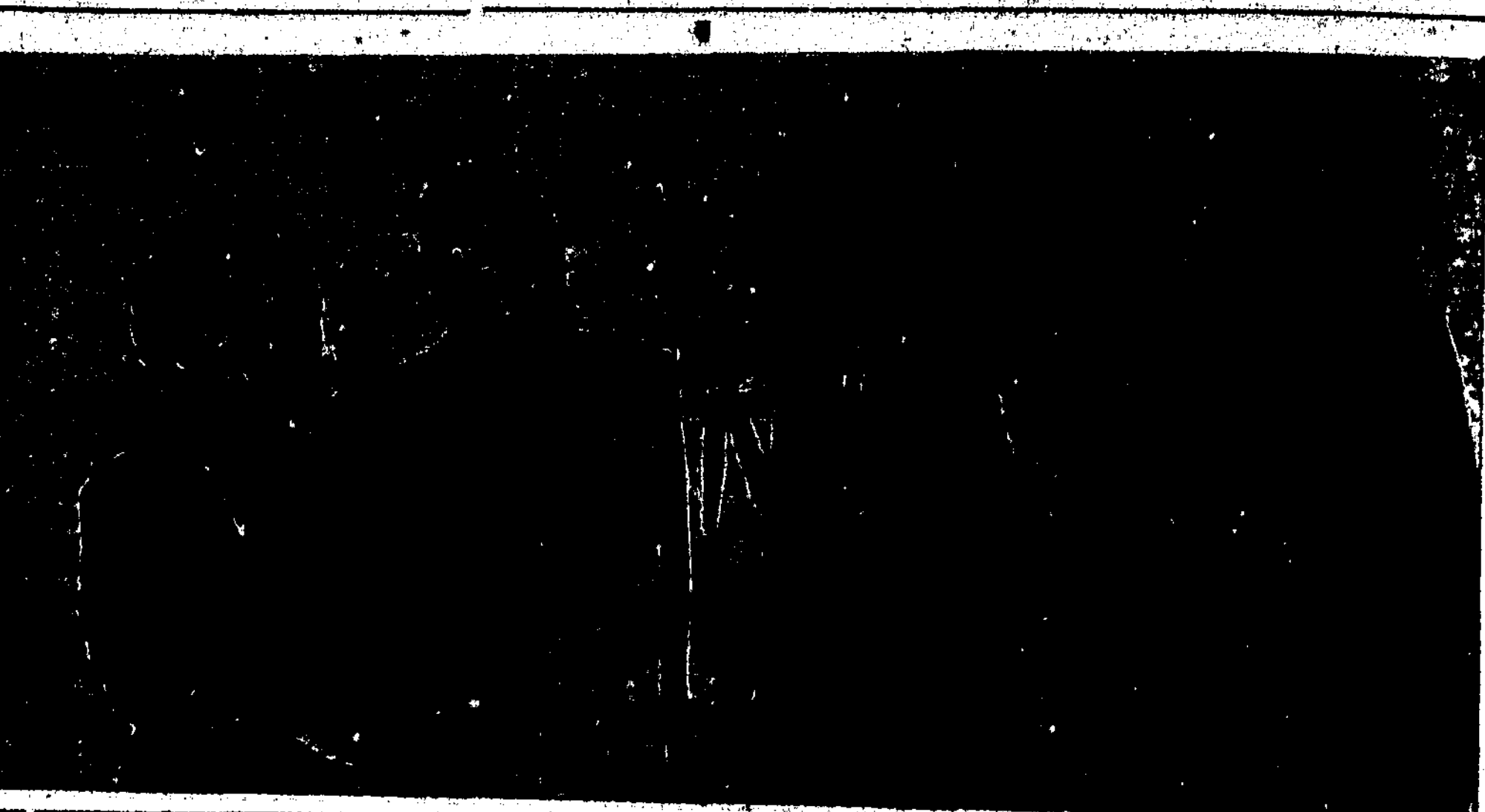
