



Contractors should be familiar with New Mexico Law, relative to labor. The minimum wage is \$1.14 to all skilled, intermediate grade, and unskilled labor employed on these contracts shall be as shown in the special provisions.

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

Over 100 listened to Floyd Lee talk on land problems of New Mexico in the wool growers meeting.

On survey of recreational needs it was found that 85% of the people in the United States did not travel over 50 miles from home in a year. This was done to find the needs for wilderness areas, for recreational use. Also any wilderness area does not allow mining or mineral development.

Reviewing the Taylor Grazing Act, laws administered by Bureau of Land Management, 14 million acres in the state were in this group. Of these lands 4303 were parcels over five sections.

Mr. Lee suggested that the group support a proposal that the mineral rights to these federal lands be transferred to the state. This would be in line with the recent federal action that gave the offshore lands to Texas, Louisiana and Florida.


