Around Town

From the State Game and Fish Department's news service: Director Thompson of the Department of Game and Fish was in Ruidoso for a meeting of the Lions Club recently. The Lions Club requested a planting of elk in the White Mountain area. A compromise arrangement was reached, whereby the Mesacero Indians agreed to the planting of elk on the reservation, possibly with the financial help of the people of Ruidoso. The area under consideration for this planting is adjacent to the White Mountains. About 35 people attended the meeting held in the C. of C. building.

Ray Taylor, Lincoln, was probably among water well drillers of the area attending the state association meeting in Alamogordo recently. He didn't tell us he did, but since he helped organize the association, we figure he was there. (We learned later he was elected President!)

Justice of the Peace Alton Gray called on the newspapers last week where a damage suit against the owner of one of the two vehicles involved in the auto crash near Tatum last July 4th in which eight persons were killed instantly, and which was seen by the Ruidoso News editor and publisher's family just as it happened, ended with the heirs of a family almost entirely wiped out being awarded a half million dollars. . . . Bernard Rooney, village park commissioner, says: "We extend each and everyone an invitation to visit your new Riverside Park. A new road is now complete, also a new shelter and new fireplaces. There will be more improvements in a short while, made from funds collected from the cigarette tax. Visit and use your city park."

Lots of nice comment lately about R. H. Hedgecock and his work as juvenile probation officer in this area. Referrals to his office have steadily declined since he took the job. He handles half as many cases now as when he began. . . . Admission prices at baseball games here have been reduced from \$1 to 75c for adults; from 75c to 50c for high school students; and from 50c to 25c for elementary school pupils. . . .

Woman Dies As Home Burns At Nogal

State Policeman L. G. Raney of Tros, arson expert, and Sheriff W. C. Bradley of Lincoln County were continuing an investigation Wednesday this week into a fire which Sunday took the life of Mrs. Grace Comery, 58, retired school teacher at Nogal.

Mrs. Comery's small home burned to the ground late Sunday after a second fire in the area badly damaged the showplace ranch house of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Dunn nearby.

"We've definitely eliminated the possibility of arson in the Dunn ranch fire," Sheriff Bradley said this morning. He said he called in Officer Raney Tuesday because he suspected arson in the Comery house fire.

As has at the site of the Comery house fire were combed Monday and the remains of a 1951 Buick sedan found in the back bedroom of the house.

Debris, charred bones and rings were all that were discovered in the ashes, Sheriff Bradley reported.

The sheriff said that faulty electrical wiring in the Dunn ranch fire, Mrs. Dunn is the daughter of Mrs. Deane Sawyer of Crossroads, National Democratic Committee woman.

Sheriff Bradley said investigation was continuing in the Comery fire. He said that because the house was totally burned it will be hard to determine whether or not arson is involved.

Mrs. Comery was apparently a woman of moderate means who frequently loaned money to neighbors and friends, peace officers said they had heard. The rumor was going around Lincoln County that Mrs. Comery didn't trust banks and kept large sums of money at her house.

Sheriff Bradley said he determined that Mrs. Comery used banks and that she kept little money at home. She had lived in Lincoln County since about 1910.

Assistant District Attorney Richard Parsons said last week after a preliminary hearing was held in District Court in Carrizozo for Morris S. Books, against whom a complaint was filed Jan. 10 this year charging embezzlement by a public official or office holder, that Books' case was bound over to the spring term for trial in the district court.

Books was represented at the hearing last Thursday in Carrizozo by Stanley, Baeger and Marchion, State's witnesses at the hearing were Trustee Tom Jones and Village Marshal J. P. Bobo of Ruidoso, and George England, a certified public accountant of Roswell. Parsons, who represented the state, said there were no witnesses for the defense.

Books was charged after it was determined from a series of audits covering a three year period that there were shortages in various funds of the Village of Ruidoso.

Floy William Skinner was born as the Floya June 29, 1887. He was married May 15, 1907 to Doris Alice Zumwalt, who preceded him in death Feb. 8, 1958. He died Jan. 20, 1961, at his home in Nogal.

He attended New Mexico Military Institute, from 1908 to 1909. He began working for the Southern Pacific Water Service in 1908 and retired after 48 years of service.

He was a charter member of the Nogal Ranchmen's Camp Meeting, and served as chairman committee. He was an inactive member of Odd Fellows.

He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Blye S. Cox, Nogal; two granddaughters, Mrs. Mary Ann Hox, Hobbs, Dick A. Cox, Taos; one sister, Mrs. Effie Zumwalt, Carrizozo; one aunt, Mrs. Chloie White, Albuquerque; and five great grandsons, David, William and John Cox, Kendall and Samuel Houx. Also surviving are a number of nieces and nephews.

LOCAL POLICE SOLVE SERIES OF ROBBERIES

Two teen age youths have been charged with burglary while armed in 48 cases of breaking and entering into 46 summer cabins, residences and business places in the Ruidoso area.

The solution of a series of break-ins that has harassed local police here since mid-October last week came Sunday and swiftly a week ago from a tip received from an elementary school student who reported seeing school supplies in use by one of the two suspects. The school supply items came from one of several burglaries committed and were easily identified.

Village Marshal J. P. Bobo, who with Village Patrolmen Charlie Byers and O. S. Monica, and Chief Deputy Sheriff Albert Richardson, spent as many as 10 hours a day searching and searching the county roads hereabouts to turn up the property stolen from the various places, said the final break in the case came last Friday when the two boys were picked up by him. He said they confessed the break-ins and thefts and that they cooperated in locating and recovering the various places entered, and also assisted in helping locate some of the stolen property. Marshal Bobo said he was not sure if all the loot could ever be recovered. It was valued at an estimated \$2,000.00, and included such items as rifles, coats, cot mattresses, radio, leather goods, school supplies, a chain saw, cigars, lighters, cartons of cigarettes, tools, watches, chronometers, spotlights, boots, moccasins, sleds and a wide variety of other things.

One of the youths was 16, the other 18. Bobo said they told him they began their raids in mid-October and that they had entered as many as ten houses in one night.

They came from a place they entered here, wrote Mr. Van Sledright and Indorams on McChern Drive, Jack Rankin's Restaurant in Ruidoso Downs, Karl Johnson's Advertising and Design firm on U. S. Highway 70 east of Ruidoso Downs, the Ruidoso Leather Shop and possibly other homes entered were in all parts of the Playground area.

Bobo said the loot was found in caches scattered from Biscuit Hill on the east to Ponderosa Heights on the west. "We found the stolen goods behind rock walls, in ditches, stashed behind hulk unmarked, and we still don't know if we will ever turn all of the items up," he stated.

The two boys were brought before Justice of the Peace Harold M. Graham last Saturday. Both were charged with the same offense, burglary while armed, but the older boy was placed under \$500 bond while the younger was turned over to the custody of his parents. The older boy spent Friday night in the village jail here. Both are due to appear before a district judge in Carrizozo Jan. 30th for a trial, Bobo said he had been informed.

Juvenile Cases Decrease Here

Below is a summary of the types of juvenile cases handled by the Ruidoso Probation Office for the year 1960, according to R. H. Hedgecock. From June 1, 1959 to Dec. 1, 1959, there were 123 juvenile cases handled. (Figures are not available for first part of 1961.) From Jan. 1, 1960, to Dec. 31, 1960, there were 114 juvenile cases handled. These figures definitely show juvenile delinquency is not on the rise in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley, which is contrary to the national trend, Hedgecock said.

In the Ruidoso-Hondo cases, truancy led the list with 42, traffic next with 29, (many of these were out of community and out of state), scandalous conduct was next with 9, drinking 7, malicious mischief 6, investigation 6, incorrigible 4, running away 4, delinquent behavior 4, violation of probation 3, prowling 2. There were 18 girls (mostly for truancy) and 96 boys. Of these cases 22 were boys and girls who had been referred before, he concluded.

School Finance Crisis Is Topic For Local Meet

President Earl Hickam of the Ruidoso Parent-Teacher Association said this mid-week the school finance problems of the state and of this district were at a point where a mass meeting of citizens had to be called for this week to urge action from the state legislature, now in session in Santa Fe. These letters concerning the crisis, and telling of the special called meeting, were mailed this week here to parents and patrons of the school by the P. T. A. and the Ruidoso Teachers Association:

Dear Parent,

Which of these programs would you be willing to see eliminated from your child's school next year? Home economics, sports, physical education, distributive education, counseling, music, art, driver's education, shop, vocational agriculture, other (specify). Or would you prefer that it be the gifted program, remedial courses, special education classes for the retarded or the handicapped? Perhaps you would prefer a 7-month school term, 40 students to the teacher, or a cut in teachers' salaries.

The financial crisis presently suffered by the schools of New Mexico could result in one of these decisions being made in Santa Fe. Your presence is requested and urged at this meeting.

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State Tourist Bureau Publicizes Coming Recreation Project Here

Editor's Note: Hundreds of copies of the news release reprinted below were mailed last week to newspapers and other publications throughout the Southwest by the tourist bureau of the New Mexico Department of Development. It tells of plans for the White Mountain Park development here.

Santa Fe, N. M.—New Mexico will have a major ski area ready for use by December 31 of this year, according to Merle H. Tucker, Director of the Department of Development. Announcement of the new ski development for the Ruidoso area was made at a luncheon here Monday by Kingsbury Picher, project supervisor of the Sierra Blanca Corporation.

The million-and-a-quarter dollar development will be located within the Lincoln National Forest and the top of its main lift will be at an altitude of 11,400 feet, approximately the same as the site at the Santa Fe ski area.

Picher said that it was estimated that 70,000 persons a year would visit the recreation area after its third year of operation. The ski run will be the southern-most such facility in the United States. A long range study of the area showed that an average of 68 inches of snow was available for at least four months of skiing each year.

A restaurant and place-in observation lift will be installed at the top of the main lift, and plans call for an overnight lodge to be built in the future. A gondola-type lift will be constructed by the Sierra Blanca Corporation. It will be the only one of its kind in the West and its three lifts to be put into operation in the United States. It will be utilized for both skiers and non-skiers who wish to ride to the top for the view.

Preliminary construction of a right-of-way for the lift and a tree-lined all-weather gravel highway to be built in cooperation with the State Highway Department.

Upon completion of the project, the area will have three lifts. Two of these are tentatively scheduled for completion in time for the 1961 season. A beginning run will be serviced by T-Bar lift to be known as the Lincoln lift, and an intermediate lift of the T-Bar type will be known as Captain lift. The main lift, the gondola type, will be known as the Sierra Blanca lift.

The new ski development will bring to the number of ski areas in the state. Tucker pointed out that the importance to the state of the winter sport was one of the phases on which a continued emphasis will be placed by both the Tourist and the Industrial Divisions.

St. Joseph's Mission, Mescalero, Stands As Monument To Minister Who Spent Two Decades Building It

Editor's Note: A letter from Mrs. Dorothy Palmer in Arizona gives us an insight into the work now being done by Franciscan Father Albert Braun, who was a minister for more than 20 years among the Mescalero Apache Indians. He directed the construction of the picturesque St. Joseph's Mission at Mescalero. This article came from the Phoenix Arizona Republic.

Franciscan Father Albert Braun gave up smoking when he was 40. At 60, after serving 12 two-year terms as Catholic Chaplain and accumulating such medals as Purple Heart and 40 months in Japanese POW camps—he retired from the Army.

But today at 72, Father Braun is still a rather-bent man with a wry sense of humor and a deep faith in the basic goodness of man—all works with a youthful vigor for the welfare of his "flock."

Father Braun's "flock" is comprised of the men, women and children of the South Side neighborhood surrounding Sacred Heart Chapel on E. 16th Place.

Here, during the past nine years, the Los Angeles-born padre, in his brown monk's robes, has become almost a legend.

Here on the South Side, the people remember the night when Father Braun, after his warnings failed to break up a noisy gang gathering outside his chapel, doubled up his fists and dispersed the trouble-makers in the best Pier 6 tradition.

They recall the time when the padre traveled across town with an expensive stolen camera hidden in a flowing sleeve of his robe, returning it to the store from which it had been taken to save a young partner from jail.

They recall how Father Braun was chosen, from his obscure little parish, to sit on the Governor's Narcotics Study Committee.

It was a sound committee selection, for as he frankly admits, Father Braun has had close experience with the tragedies of dope addiction during his years on the South Side.

"Narcotics traffic is a very critical problem on the South Side," Father Braun says.

"It's an evil that spreads everywhere, widening patterns of crime throughout a community, and its earliest victims are the youngsters. The only effective way to stop the spread of narcotics traffic is through tougher laws."

Father Braun also is deeply concerned with other aspects of the delinquency problem. Delinquency, he feels, can be combated only in the home.

"The child is the product of the parents and the home," he says.

"Parks and recreation programs are fine, but we can't get away from the fact that they can't take the place of parents. There's just no substitute for parental love and parental guidance."

Father Braun's years of service on the South Side are but a part of the 45 years he has spent in the Franciscan Order.

As a young priest, he served as Catholic chaplain in the 8th Division in World War I, receiving the Purple Heart for wounds received in the Meuse-Argonne campaign.

During the years between wars, Father Braun served as a missionary on New Mexico's Mescalero Apache Reservation. His first task was to undertake construction of a mission chapel—a project which he completed after 20 years with little money and little help. But today a large, native-stone chapel, Joseph's Mission, stands as a monument to two decades of labor and devotion.

Before the onset of World War II, Father Braun returned to military duty as chaplain in the 2nd Division of the Philippines. He was captured in the fall of Corregidor, and spent the next 49 months in POW camps in the Philippines and Tokyo.

"During the last days of Corregidor, when it was obvious that we couldn't hold out, the medics told us that Jap prison rations consisted of 700 grams of rice a day—that no human could live more than six months on such rations," the padre recalls with a gasp.

"Well, we didn't get 700 grams of rice—we got 400. And yet most of us lived through the experience."

The moral of this ordeal? Father Braun says:

"Man can suffer more and en-
