



Heeding this warning CAN save a life, save someone from serious physical hurt, and save some property damage. The last three week-ends here, some pranksters have been moving the burning flares from atop the high sewer main manholes tops on Sudderth Drive where construction work is underway. With the dust that is in the air from passing traffic, a flare that is moved from one of these manholes (that average from a few inches to two or more feet in height) someone will hit one with their car when there is no flare to warn them. The flares have been moved from the danger areas and placed at great distances from where they are supposed to be. Result: People will be confused; they cannot see the danger of unlighted manholes in the road and a wreck is bound to happen. Such thoughtlessness is hard to understand—but if it continues, there will be someone killed, or badly hurt, and someone's car will be wrecked. If you see anyone doing this, please do your part in helping prevent serious consequences by putting the flare back in its rightful place, or at least stand guard until a peace officer or other authority can be notified and he can do what is proper. Removing safety flares is a law violation and can earn the perpetrator a severe penalty. Let's all be on guard—and possibly save a life.

**ELKS WELCOME** — (Continued From Page 1) tution, a trained talent for efficient use of time and energy and a good sense of humor are the essential characteristics that have made it possible for Brother Wisely to invest so much of himself in civic and humanitarian work while developing a large and successful business.

During his administration as Grand Exalted Ruler, it was natural that, as a businessman trained in accounting, Brother Wisely would emphasize the application of business principles to the affairs of Elksdom. His goal was "Lodge betterment through improved administration and increased pride in membership." He inaugurated a number of successful programs and procedures aimed directly at that objective. One of his most important measures dealt with "Stray Elks," members who move from their home lodge, frequently to cities where there is no lodge. Under these circumstances, many tended to lose interest and eventually drop their membership. Brother Wisely's solution was simple: When a member moves, his name will be sent to the lodge nearest his new home. That lodge will then extend him a cordial wel-

come and invite him to participate in its activities. This procedure filled a long-felt need.

Supplementing this program, Brother Wisely asked every lodge to hold "Stray Elk Round-ups." More than 8,000 "Stray Elks" attended these special functions in their honor and nearly 3,000 transferred their membership to the lodge where they had moved. Another major contribution of his administration was the distribution to all lodges of manuals covering the selection of members, the indoctrination of new members, and the prevention of lapsation through business-like dues collection methods. The manuals incorporated methods and systems that had been tested and found successful, and proved of great value to the lodges.

Brother Wisely's administration was marked by another significant achievement; when contributions to the Elks National Foundation, the Order's charitable trust fund, set an all-time record of \$488,533. Wisely was born Sept. 29, 1908 in Terry, Ind. He attended Indiana State Teachers College there, completing his college education at Stanford, where he was graduated in 1925 with a major in accounting.

After practicing as accountant and auditor for several years, Mr. Wisely became Managing Partner of the Salinas Laundry & Dry Cleaning Co. in 1931. In that same year, he became a member of the Salinas Lodge No. 614 of the Benevolent and Patriotic Order of Elks. Nine years later, in 1940, Brother Wisely was elected Exalted Ruler of Salinas Lodge, and the following year he received national recognition through appointment as District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler. This was followed by appointment in 1949 to the Grand Lodge Committee on Lodge Activities. In 1954, Wisely was elected to a five-year term on the Board of Grand Trustees, where he was serving as Vice Chairman and Approving Member when he was elected Grand Exalted Ruler. While advancing in national councils of the Order, he was building a reputation as a man who gets things done through his work in the California Elks Association. He was elected a Vice President of the Association in 1942 and President in 1945. When the Association began its great program of aid to the cerebral palsied and other physically handicapped children in 1950, Wisely was called to the Chairmanship of the Committee that organized this pioneering project. When he relinquished the Chairmanship of the Committee in 1954, the program had grown to four mobile therapy divisions in the field, staffed by 11 therapists with a caseload of 250 at an annual cost of \$200,000.

As an Honorary Commandant, Brother Wisely has seen this program expand until today it serves every part of the state. Wisely's civic and business activities are many. For more than 20 years he has been a Director of the California Rodeo. He is Secretary and a Director of the Employers' Council of Monterey County, and is a past President of the California Laundryowners' Association. He was also President of the Salinas Rotary Club and of the Chamber of Commerce. He is a former Trustee of the First United Presbyterian Church of Salinas, and is a past supporter of the Boy Scouts.

**Senator Skeen  
Asks Details  
On Hunting Leases**

Joe Skeen made a trip to Santa Fe to attend the State Game Department meeting on April 10. The main purpose of the trip was to get specific information from the Game Commission officials on the new state land hunting lease program and how the Game Department intends to implement this program. There has been a great deal of speculation among ranchers who lease state lands and hunters as to how this new proposition will be administered. Information has been sent and in some cases so vague as to be confusing. Skeen interviewed Fred Thompson, State Game Department chief, who supplied him with copies of Attorney General Earl Hartley's opinion concerning whether or not the Land Commission has the right to make such a lease, and a copy of the easement agreement made between the Land Commissioner and the Game Commission. It is the Attorney-General's opinion that the Land Commission has the right and duty to issue easements for the purpose of the game from public lands, in addition to the grazing and agricultural leases. The Commissioner, as trustee of the public lands, must administer these lands in such a manner as to return to the beneficiaries—the maximum amount of revenue. The opinion also states that the right to harvest game from state lands is valuable and is not granted to the grazing or agricultural lessee, unless the lessee is a person other than such lessee, including the State Game Commission and its permittees. The opinion further states that no one has the right to hunt or fish on land belonging to the State of New Mexico without the permission of the Land Commissioner and this right is not to be granted without payment of compensation. The easement agreement mentions the following main points: The Commissioner will lease all of the state lands, which are now leased for grazing and agriculture, to the State Game Commission for 1/2 cent per acre per year and this lease will be for a period of 5 years. The Game Commission, its agents, and permittees shall have unrestricted rights upon these state lands for the purpose of managing, propagating and harvesting all wildlife and fish therefrom, and to use as much of the surface as may be reasonably necessary for such purpose. Any permittee of the Game Commission, using these state lands, shall reimburse all other lessees for any damage to property of these lessees. The Game Commission has the right to enter into agreements with other lessees or land owners for the purpose of establishing and maintaining the most beneficial game management units. Thompson calls this last point of the easement the "utilization agreement" which he hopes to transact with ranchers who have mixed private and state lease lands. This agreement would allow the rancher and the Game Commission to set up hunting areas in blocks and thus prevent hunters from travelling over all of a rancher's private lands to reach smaller or isolated tracts of state lease lands.

Thompson stated that the Game Commission will pay the Land Commissioner \$53,564.48 for the total hunting lease this year, and he hopes to pay this with Federal monies which are returned to New Mexico from taxes collected on the sales of firearms and ammunition. There will be no increase in hunting license fees.

**Hunting, Fishing  
Rules Listed  
By Apaches**

The Mesquero Apaches have announced certain hunting and fishing restrictions for the Reservation, over and above the limitations set by the Department of Game and Fish. For example, the creel limit on fish is 12 a day, all fish to be above a minimum length of six inches. No person may hunt on the Reservation except "during the hours between daylight and sunset." Non-Indians are required to have state license and Reservation permit before hunting or fishing. And persons not enrolled as members of the Mesquero Apache Tribe are required to have the tribal permit. Non-Indians are subject to state laws. Indians found in violation will be taken to Tribal Court, deputy special officers' commission or the Game Department officers to enforce tribal laws on Indians fishing in the open waters of Tularosa Creek as defined by the tribal regulations adopted last October. Superintendent Hobart A. Johnson of the Mesquero Indian Agency has asked the Department of Game and Fish to provide a conservation program for the schools and for the community. The Department has made arrangements to fulfill this request. Lectures and movies will be scheduled.



## Film on Dangers Of Smoking In Youth Shown to Students

How goes the campaign to inform young Americans of the cancer risk in smoking cigarettes? Surprisingly good, both locally and nationally. This was the answer today at the local office of the American Cancer Society.

"To Smoke or Not to Smoke?" is a filmstrip the Cancer Society has for using in the local schools. The ACS program is not an "anti-smoking campaign" but it is bringing the facts about cigarettes and cancer to the attention of youngsters to help them make an informed decision. The youngsters should be reached before their smoking habits are formed.

The results of statistical and other scientific studies point to cigarette smoking as the main causative factor in lung cancer. As a consequence, millions of American parents are becoming increasingly concerned about the attitude and habits of their children in smoking.

This concern has been heightened by a national survey which shows that more than 40% of high school students become habitual smokers by the end of their senior year.

Lung cancer is a preventable disease. Thousands of lives could be saved from this disease each year if smokers would stop smoking cigarettes.

Progress in the campaign to warn teenagers of the risks of cigarette smoking will be slow unless the Cancer Society can rapidly step up its program, now sharply limited by available funds and manpower. All workers in the Cancer Crusade appeal to the residents of Lincoln County to give generously to the Cancer Crusade.

I wish to express my very sincere appreciation of the action taken by your Ruidoso Lions Club in endorsing my actions in raising the grazing fees and giving the Game Commission an easement for hunting on all the state lands. I have long been aware of the danger to the general public in having these state lands posted against hunting. In Colorado sportsmen have organized into groups and have begun buying up grazing leases for private hunting clubs. This creates private hunting preserves which may only be used by dues-paying members and deprives the person who cannot afford membership of the privilege of hunting on these lands.

Recently several groups here in the state have expressed interest in doing the same thing in New Mexico. If this practice began it would only be a short time until some of the best hunting lands in the state would be under lease to private clubs and the opportunity for the average sportsman to use these lands would be gone forever.

I appreciate your offer of support and I believe the best way to make that support effective is to convince people who are unaware of the situation which has developed that this move really was in the best interest of all of the people of the state.

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




