Mechem 'Secret Session' Talk Proves Not So Secret








Democratic leadership of the New Mexico Legislature threw the state's tax structure "out of gear," Gov. Edwin L. Mechem charged in a speech before Republican leaders of the state here Saturday.

The governor, speaking at a party leaders' meeting prior to a statewide barbecue and rally declared it is up to the Republicans to tell the people of New Mexico about the conduct of the leadership of the Democratic Party.

About 100 persons, including a number of apartment heads in the state administration, attended the two-hour meeting, most of which was a secret.

Approximately 100 persons attended the secret session. Included were members of the state GOP executive committee, county Republican chairmen and chairwomen and heads of departments of state government. The latter group included Ed Hartman, director of the




### REV. AND MRS. FRANK TAYLOR TO OBSERVE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY AT DAUGHTER'S HOME IN ARIZONA

Ruidoso—Rev. and Mrs. Frank Taylor are celebrating their golden anniversary on May 9 this year at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Fritz Riese, 3026 North 3rd, Phoenix, Ariz. Rev. and Mrs. Taylor are now living in their home in Ruidoso, N. M.

Rev. and Mrs. Taylor were married at the home of Mrs. Taylor's parents in Horton, Kans., on May 9, 1911, and went to live in Mr. Taylor's home town of Osborne, Kans.

Mrs. Taylor, formerly Miss Ethel McKinley, was born in Baker, Kans., on Dec. 24, 1894. Her first schooling was at a little country school close to Horton, Kans. Later, moving to Horton, she attended grade and high school there and finished her schooling in Osborne, Kans., where she was living with her sister and husband, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Imler, at that time Taylor was a cripple and Mrs. Taylor worked at the motion picture theatre in Osborne and Miss McKinley worked at the theater at night, while attending high school there, Mrs. Taylor has one sister living, Mrs. Imler, two half brothers, Charles, living in Idaho, and Thomas of Idaho Falls, Idaho, and one half sister, Mrs. Elma Abbott of Ft. Knox, Ky.

Mr. Taylor was born Aug. 16, 1886, in Osborne, Kans. He received his schooling in the local school in Osborne which was a cripple until after marriage. It was there he met Miss McKinley.

While in Osborne Mr. Taylor followed the painting and decorating trade of his father. Mr. Taylor has eight brothers and three sisters, all living. The youngest is 55 years old and the oldest will be 80 in December.

As young married folks, the Taylors left Osborne for Phoenix, Ariz., arriving there Feb. 5, 1913. At that time Taylor was a cripple and soon regained his health and worked as motion picture operator from 1913 to 1921, leaving the theater and going to work for Ed and Leo Weinkick in Weinkick's Market. He was known to his many friends in Phoenix as Tommy Taylor.

Leaving Weinkick's in 1924, he went into business for himself, and after seven years returned to Weinkick's Market as partner with Leo Weinkick. Ed Weinkick having retired, Mr. Taylor, before deciding to enter the ministry full time, was an active Elder in the Phoenix Christian Church, and studied for almost seven years under the tutelage of the late Fred J. Downs and the late E. W. Leeson, both former ministers of the Phoenix Christian Church. It was in January 1931 that the Phoenix Christian Church licensed Rev. Taylor to the ministry of the church, Rev. and Mrs. Taylor, sold their interest in Weinkick's Market to Mr. Leo Weinkick, sold their home in which they had lived for 21 years, and moved to El Paso, Tex., on April 20, 1931, where they had accepted a call from the Byron Street Christian Church. The congregation consisted of twenty-five men, women and children meeting in another church on Sunday afternoon. On July 22, 1931, the congregation held the first meeting in the new chapel built by Rev. Taylor and the men of the congregation at 3417 Folk Ave. By mid-summer a seven room educational unit had been built by Rev. Taylor and the men of the church.

On April 1, 1933, Rev. and Mrs. Taylor answered a call from the First Christian Church of Mesa, Tex., where they served for eleven months, then receiving a call to return to the Byron Street Church



## TOUR TO RHODES GRAVE SET EARLY IN JUNE

Plans are being completed for the Annual Pilgrimage to the Grave of "Eugene Manlove Rhodes" which is scheduled for Sunday June 4th. Rhodes, claimed by critics to be the world's best writer of southwestern stories, grew up in Otero County and became nationally known by his Saturday Evening Post stories and his southwestern books. At his death in 1935, at his own request, his body was returned here for burial in his beloved Rhodes Canyon of the Andros Mountains where he was homesteaded in the early days, which formed the setting for many of his stories.

Today, those who ride Gene Rhodes magnificent country in the San Andreas must gain governmental permission, for the area within the White Sands Missile Range, under the shadow of whooping rockets in Uncle Sam's most highly instrumented area. Through the co-operation of White Sands Proving Grounds and Holoman Air Force Base, the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce each year secures permission for the way to be opened whereby Gene's family, old friends and fans may visit his grave and pay homage to him and other old timers who brought development to the San Andreas country and the Tularosa Basin. Care in the long caravan each year bear license tags from many states.

Ken Garland, Past President of the Chamber will be in charge of the tour which will leave the Chamber of Commerce office at 9:00 a. m., Sunday morning, June 4th and will be escorted, both front and rear, by military police cars. The caravan, usually a mile in length, moves north from Alamogordo on Highway 70 to Tularosa thence west across the Mission Range. The first eight miles of road out of Tularosa are gravel, the then comes a fine paved road across the Mission Range to the foot of the San Andreas. Cars from Albuquerque, Socorro and other Rio Grande points will be admitted through Engle.

Tales of the Old West will be spun through the day and a picnic dinner will be spread on the grounds. Every one brings his own lunch and drinks. Among old timers expected are Bob Martin and Nate Smith of Truth or Consequences, who knew Rhodes in the '60's; former Governor E. C. Dillon of Encino and George Fitzpatrick, Editor of the New Mexico Magazine, long time friends of the Rhodes family. It is hoped that Rhodes son and daughter-in-law, Alan and Betty Rhodes, of Apalachian, New York, will be here for the occasion.

Rhodes left behind him a heritage of some 14 books and over 100 short stories and poems, most of them were about the West as he knew it in the Tularosa Basin. His books have been out of print for many years but in recent years Huntington Library in California, recognizing him as the greatest author of the Southwest's life and time, received a grant from Rockefeller Foundation for the publishing of Eugene Rhodes original letters and writings and W. H. Hutchinson, California, was chosen to collect and edit the material. From these files Hutchinson has published several books, "Bar Cross Man"; "Rhodes Reader"; and "Line of Least Resistance," which include reprints of his famous stories and much material never before published. The Alamogordo Public Library has acquired a fine collection of Rhodes material, including pictures of the author during the various stages of his career, and this collection will be given a prominent place when the new Public Library is completed.

Gene Rhodes books were not the "shooting up" variety, but throughout his writings his theme was the code of his great tradition—the honor, chivalry and gallantry of the men of the western range. Fred Esler, Beyond the Desert; Trusty Enaves; Paso Por Aquil and Good Men and True and others were the chronicling of the early day life in the Gene Rhodes country. His leading characters were often times the names of his friends whom he knew the best. "For Aquil" exclaimed by critics to be his best, became a requirement in the list of supplemental reading at Harvard University in their literature courses.

Rhodes is buried at a high point on his old ranch. His gravestone is a great boulder, inset with a bronze plaque, which was placed there by the New Mexico Historical Society. It bears an epitaph that Gene Rhodes would like "Eugene Manlove Rhodes, Paso Por Aquil."

When Rhodes left New Mexico his ranch was taken over by C. J. Grahman then became the property of Lewis Lennox of Las Cruces, and Lennox gave Gene a deed to the ten acre plot on which Gene's grave is located. Later the ranch was sold to W. W. Thredgill, who subsequently sold to Charles Harder, who still owns the property and is expected to join the caravan at Gene's grave.




**Funeral Is Held For Former Ruidoso Minister**




