**SMOKEY BEAR MUSEUM TO OPEN FOR SUMMER SATURDAY IN CAPITAN**

By DOROTHY GUCK  
 The log cabin museum in Capitan, featuring the life story of Smokey Bear and the natural resources of Lincoln County, will open for the summer season on Saturday, May 27.  
 New exhibits of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, the Soil Conservation Service, and the Mesquero Apaches will be in place. There is no admission charge, but Smokey Bear items are for sale. The building will be open 7 days a week from 11 a. m. until 6 p. m. with Mrs. Eltha Merrill and Mrs. Grace Murphy in attendance.  
 Mrs. Virgil Wallace, president of the Smokey Bear Club, wrote to Elliott Barker, noted author and conservationist, telling the troubles of Capitan in trying to raise funds for completing the museum and for running expenses. Mr. Barker made a copy of her letter and mailed it to many national sports magazines and conservation organizations in an appeal for funds.  
 Capitan, the birthplace of the famous forest fire prevention bear, started construction of the log building in 1958, working entirely with donated materials—labor and funds. Charles Pepper, former employee of the Forest Service was construction foreman. The museum was first opened to the public in July, 1960.

The museum contains a 350-year-old cross-section of Douglas fir marked with significant historical events; a native stone fireplace; a gold Smokey Oscar presented to Capitan by President Eisenhower; a hand-woven Mexican Smokey rug; specimens of the various evergreens and grasses of the area, besides beautiful wildlife pictures. Of course, the life story of Smokey as a cub in New Mexico and later at the National Zoo in Washington, dominates the display, and table exhibits complete.  
 A large wooden cub and pine tree, scotch-lite Smokey, and state historical markers will be erected outside the building. The landscaping was done this spring by Ruidoso Nursery.  
 Since the rescue of the 5 pound brown cub from the 17,000 acre fire in the Capitan Mountains in 1950, the town has been cited as the outstanding conservation community in the Nation. At various public functions in their forest fire prevention program they have had such guests as officers of the National Advertising Council, National Forest and Boy Scout leaders, Ruby Wendell, Smokey artist, and many state officials. State Forester, Ray Bell, who flew Smokey from the Capitan fire to Santa Fe hospital, along with his daughter Judy, continues to work for all Capitan conservation projects.



## Richest Quarter Horse Race May See \$200,000 Purse Next Year

On Labor Day, Sept. 3, 1952, Ruidoso Downs will stage its fourth running of the western All American, the All American Futurity, for the first time, the fabulous purse, \$200,000, will be divided between ten, not five as in previous years, competing Quarter Horse youngsters.

Ruidoso Downs General Manager, Gene Hensley, explains it this way: "The first nine horses will earn money while starting fees will be returned to the 10th place horse. Estimated monies for the first four horses are, first, \$85,000; second, \$74,000; third, \$30,000; fourth, \$17,000. Guaranteed purse money to the remaining five horses will be: fifth, \$9,000; sixth, \$7,000; eighth, \$4,000; ninth, \$3,000; tenth, \$2,000.

The inaugural running of the All American was won by Galobar, a fleet chestnut filly, belonging to Californian Hugh Huntley. The gross purse was \$120,000. Racing history was made in the second running when Tonto Bars Hank stepped over the 400-yard course in world record time—2:02.2, Tonto owned by C.G. and Milo Whitcomb, Sterling, Colo., is now the world's leading money-winning Quarter Horse. He has amassed \$106,580 to date.

Both Huntley and the Whitcombs have horses nominated for the 1952 running of the All American.

## Downs Opening Week-End Sees \$487,641 Handle

Opening week-end of a 56-day race season at Ruidoso Downs last week-end saw a pari-mutuel take of \$487,641, slightly under the 1950 opening, Gene Hensley, director of racing, told the News-Monday. He said the handle was about \$70,000 under the first days of last year. A big Memorial Day 5-day card, however, should see a big upturn in attendance and betting the next few days, it was predicted.

# Hotel Designed For Conventions Compares With Small Industry In Community Size of Ruidoso

By CARL DEBORD

Most of us realize that conventions held in Ruidoso certainly help everyone, but we seldom see this benefit down in cold figures. Let us begin by assuming that a first-class convention hotel in Ruidoso would make it possible to accommodate conventions. Now let us assume that the hotel, properly managed, could attract only one convention each week for ten months each year (July and August excluded). If these 40 conventions only averaged 250 people each, it would mean that 100,000 people would attend conventions in our town. It is reasonable to assume that each person attending a convention would stay in Ruidoso 2 1/2 days, which would add up to 250,000 man days of new business for our town. According to the best authorities there would be \$40.00 spent each man day. Multiply 250,000 man days by \$40.00 per day and the answer is \$10,000,000. This is extra money that a good, well-managed con-

vention hotel would bring to Ruidoso each year. Statistics show that 60% of this convention money (\$6,000,000) is spent at the convention headquarters hotel and 40% (\$4,000,000) is spent at other hotels, motels, cafes and other business firms. Of the \$6,000,000 spent at the hotel, 25% or \$1,500,000 is paid out by the hotel for wages, making a total of \$550,000 which is spent with all other merchants. Business management authorities say that \$1,000,000.00 is spent in a community that 60% goes out of town for taxes, vacations, supplies, etc. This being true, \$400,000.00 of convention money would stay with the hotel, other merchants and in permanent bank deposits in Ruidoso.

Let us compare a good convention hotel with an industry or factory that would have an annual payroll of \$400,000.00. With this payroll the industry would employ

100 people. The U. S. Chamber of Commerce says in the May issue of "Banking" Magazine that an industry with 100 employees will create the following growth factors in a community: 196 more people; 112 more households; 51 more school children; \$600,000.00 more in total income annually; \$370,000.00 more bank deposits; 107 more cars; 174 more employed workers; four more retail establishments; and \$380,000.00 more in retail sales each year. A good, well-managed convention hotel will mean all of this and more to Ruidoso.

If Ruidoso is to take its rightful place as a first-class resort and convention center, a first-class hotel is a "Must." If the dreams for such a hotel are to be realized, dreams must be turned into action. Action means the wholehearted financial support of every citizen in Ruidoso. To induce outside capital to help us build a first-class convention hotel in our town, we must show that people in Ruidoso want it and believe in it enough to invest their money in it.

Ruidoso Enterprises, Inc. plans to build such a hotel for opening next year. To get the job done, they will need the support of everyone in Ruidoso.
