Small Plane Lands On U. S. 70

A two-passenger Aircoupe, listed as owned by Dr. Bert Eas and Frederick Cooper of Wichita, Kans., made an emergency landing on busy U. S. Highway 70 in Dark Canyon about 4:30 Sunday afternoon. No one was injured in the popular accident.

A passing motorist carried the men into Tularosa that afternoon. When State Police Sergeant Bill Kruse found the plane beside the highway, he called the Ruidoso Airport. "Have you got a plane missing?" he asked Ralph McGuire, the manager of the port.

McGuire answered, McGuire told Kruse the plane he was looking for was in the mountains of this area, for it made a very laborious take-off, skimming trees as it left the runway of Cree Meadows Airport, and apparently struggling to gain altitude as it flew down the Ruidoso canyon.

McGuire and Ralph Brown, another local pilot, drove to the landing scene late Sunday but did not find the passengers—they had already gone into Tularosa when they hitch-hiked a ride. Monday wings were removed from the ship and it was hauled into Tularosa to be reassembled for take-off.

Egt. Kruse told the News late Tuesday the two men named as owners of the craft were two passengers, that he had to climb into court for recklessness when they were hauling the plane to Tularosa. "They were hauling the heavy ship with a rope that was too small for the task, and it was 20 feet in length, causing the craft to be hard to maneuver on the highway. We also learned the plane was not cleared for flying by the FAA, it was certified as not airworthy, and in addition, the FAA has filed on the pilot for flying when his license had expired."

FOUR DIE IN CRASH ON 70-380

In a few brief seconds Saturday night, the lives of four Roswell residents were snuffed out when their car missed a curve near Riverside and plunged into a ravine. The accident occurred about 35 miles east of Ruidoso on a U. S. Highway 380-70 shortly after 10 p. m. Two of the dead were identified from their drivers licenses as 24-year-old Desmond Blanchet of 1611 S. Jackson Ave. and Ramon Guerrero, 28, of 1611 S. Mulberry.

One of the women victims was identified as Doris Blanchet, no age available, the wife of Desmond Blanchet. The other woman who died was identified as Manuel Guerrero, the wife of Ramon Guerrero.

State Policeman Bob Jurney said the car missed a curve on a detour and flew through the air for 75 feet, landed on its top against a rock pile, then flipped over and landed about 30 feet away on its top.

The Highway Commission issued this report on the local project: "Lincoln County—White mountain ski road, 9.86 miles of grade, drain, miscellaneous construction; Jack Adams Santa Fe, \$245,299.00; estimate of project's total cost was \$400,000. Flying Farmers State Convention To Be Here June 10



RUIDOSO GROWTH

It was prohibited by Governor Mechem's enforcement of existing law. Horse racing began in Ruidoso in 1945, but did not really become big business until the mid-fifties. Since then, the popularity of racing has brought rather drastic changes in the economy of Ruidoso.

"Failure of employment in restaurants, bars, motels, and amusements to keep pace with the growth in race track employment raises some questions which should be of interest to city planners and officials as well as local businessmen. This reflects the strong influence of restaurants, bars, motels, and amusements in which employment fluctuations follow the racing season quite closely, as well as such establishments as food stores which have a similar seasonal pattern, although with smaller amplitude. Building and Construction, and Logging Contractors and Sawmills are the only major types of employment which reach peak employment at other than the summer months. From the standpoint of both the workers who provide personal services and the owners of business property in the Ruidoso area, anything which could help to reduce the seasonal fluctuation with its inherent wastage of manpower and property resources would be of great economic benefit.

"We have noted in the discussion of the employment data, that the number of workers at the track has increased much more rapidly than employees in related industries such as motels, restaurants, and other commercial recreation, with the result that the latter groups were a relatively smaller percentage of total employment in 1960 than in preceding years. Analysis of track data, bank deposits, and the employment statistics available indicate that 1959 was a peak year for Ruidoso. During the second quarter of 1960, employment of the categories was below the like period of the previous year, but total employment was up by four per cent. The impact of these developments on the economy of the city cannot be determined at this early date, but should be closely watched by those interested in the future of the community.

"To get complete coverage of all lodging accommodations is practically impossible due to the wide area over which they are spread, the difficulty of distinguishing commercial facilities from family-owned units, and the reluctance of some owners to register their properties for fear of occupation licenses or other taxes. Nevertheless, we were able to get the name and number of units for 95 different establishments having a total of 1,044 units. Included in this total is a bunk house which we have counted as one unit, but which is hardly comparable to a hotel room or small cabin insofar as accommodation of persons is concerned. The above totals give an average of approximately 11 units per commercial lodging enterprise. Only 23 of the 95 establishments are registered with the Ruidoso Tourist Accommodations

Association. These are somewhat larger operators, representing a total of 449 units for an average of 14 each. Their announced rates range from \$8.00 up, and facilities are available from the luxurious to the bare essentials, depending upon the price.

"The general consensus of motel and cabin operators seems to be that 85-90 per cent of their business comes from Texas, although the ones which we checked thoroughly ran 75 per cent for the entire year. Of course, this could easily be a random sampling error. There is little reason to doubt that the people of Ruidoso are approximately correct in their assumed percentage of 85-90 per cent."

Members of the local planning and zoning commission, and others present including Wm. D. Toole, state planning consultant, pointed out that the professor's economic study showed a need for more industry to provide solid, year-round employment—to "smooth out" the high and low economic pattern that now exists between summer and winter months. They said the study would be a basis for a portion of the community's master plan for the future, in assisting in making recommendations, sponsoring some changes and putting emphasis on efforts to improve the quality of the city's tourist attractions and accommodations.

Besides Toole, others at the meeting were Chairman Dan D. Swearingin, Bob McDonald, the local planning consultant for Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, Bob Shepherd from the Albuquerque planning firm's office, Mrs. Della Hale, Terry Easter, Carl Morrison, Elmer Pirelli, Jim Hine, the village clerk, Tom Hood, local banker, and Vic Lamb.





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

By studying the bill you can be more able to express your opinion on it to your separator or representative. One of the features is that committees will be appointed, by the Secretary of Agriculture, on the request of the commodity group. The committee appointed will be appointed from nomination of the County ASC committee. It also provides for setting up marketing orders on any commodity. Another change is that the commodity committee sets up the program, in relation to its problem, for the congress to reject in 60 days. I have a copy of the Bill (H.R. 1043) as introduced on April 19 for anyone to read if they are interested. 4-H County Camp will be June 19-22nd. 4-H members planning to attend should have their reservations to the County Agents office by the 10th of June.

RESIDENTIAL AREA IS NOW GARBAGE DUMP

One of the most flagrant evidences of lack of citizenship and disregard for neighbors has been displayed in the last five weeks here by indiscriminate dumping of garbage and trash of all kinds in a gully in the County Club area, three blocks north of the Cree Meadows Golf Course.

Wet garbage, household trash, refuse from construction jobs, beer cans and beer cartons from local bars is included in the mess that has been dumped in a dry wash area that runs into Cedar Creek.

Several of Ruidoso's most beautiful residences overlook the area that is being misused. Some of the finest building sites for homes in this community adjoin the site. The matter was called to the Ruidoso News' attention last Saturday by D. B. Morgan of White Mountain Development Corporation, which owns some of the land in which the dumping is being done. "I gave permission to the Floyd Haake Construction Co. to put tree stumps, tree stumps, branches of trees, etc., in the gully as an aid to halt erosion. The man working for the construction company did a fine job, cleaned up the area around the gully, and left it in good condition. In only a few days, other residents here who did not have permission began making use of the site for fires and possible jail sentences.

Speaking on behalf of the company he represents, and also some of the other property owners of the area he has contacted, Morgan said he had already begun requesting persons known to have dumped trash and newspapers with subscribers' names—all evidence that has helped us to determine who did it.

"There are some prominent Ruidoso residents involved—and some of our leading contractors, too," he declared. He said if the trash is not removed, then charges will be filed under a city ordinance which prohibits such malicious dumping, and violators will face jail sentences.
