## 3rd Annual Chuckwagon Trail Ride To Be Held in Mid-June Here

The Chuckwagon Trail Riders of Roswell will begin their third annual horseback trail and camping trip in the Sierra Blanca Mountains here, to last four days and nights, on Monday, June 19, Karl Johnson, secretary-treasurer of the organization, reported this week. Johnson estimated from 25 to 30 persons will go on the ride which will follow little used trails around Sierra Blanca peak, which thrusts 12,000 feet high. The ride will begin at the Ralph Bonnell Ranch at Glencoe, and will follow Eagle Creek to a point about a mile east of the community of Alto where the first of the night's camp will be made. Accompanying the riders will be a cook, a veterinarian and a doctor, Johnson said. Other officers of the association are Bill Wingfield, trail boss, and Homer Glover, president of the riders. ## LIONS CAPTURE STATE CONVENTION

A well organized campaign that began three years ago culminated successfully in the approval by the New Mexico Lions Clubs of Ruidoso as a convention site in June of 1962. The convention will bring some 1,000 delegates to the Playground of the Southwest. More than a dozen members of the Ruidoso Club staged a winning fight to get the big meeting here during the 1961 session that was concluded Tuesday at Clovis. The local club set up a hospitality room, had souvenir editions of the Ruidoso News to pass out, did personal lobbying, passed out advertising novelties from various businesses here, and pressed its campaign in all fields to assure Ruidoso would get the nod. Lion Boss Bill McCarty, and Lion Boss-elect Don Bovell took active parts in the campaign, taking turns spearheading Ruidoso's delegation to Clovis. Some of the Lions who attended said Ruidoso was the overwhelming choice, but that they encountered some static from some sources who claimed Ruidoso's motels and hotels were charging exorbitant rates for lodging. Ed Wimberly said one delegate to the convention from another town declared he and his wife were charged \$26 for a room for one night here on Memorial Day week-end this year. "It was hard for us to convince the convention that that was an isolated instance, not a general rule here. We heard of other exorbitant charges, too," he added. J. D. Locke, chairman of the Ruidoso Tourist Association, an organization of motel and cafe businesses here, sent a telegram to the Ruidoso delegation in Clovis assuring reasonable charges for the period of the convention next year—quoting fair rates actually interviewed about three dozen tourist accommodation operators. "The fact that a few opportunists in Ruidoso charge all the traffic will bear on special holidays reflects on all of our motel businesses, and our club is going to do its best to help correct that," another delegate, Carl Wright, said on his return Tuesday. Lions Club members here figure that a convention of this size, with 1,000 or more people expected for three or four days, will bring business to Ruidoso worth total \$150,000.00. A banking magazine estimated that convention delegates spend an average of \$40 per man per day and that figure was used as a basis for the expected business from the 1962 Lions gathering.

## City Trash Pit To Be Opened Two Days a Week

Taking cognizance of the need for an area in which to dump trash other than wet garbage, and to forestall any further indiscriminate dumping of trash of all kinds in various residential areas of this community, the Village of Ruidoso Sanitation Department this week issued this statement: "Ruidoso News and always will have a serious problem in disposing of trash such as pine needles, tree stumps and limbs, waste from construction jobs, old refrigerators, car bodies, etc. For a limited time, the Village's sanitary fill site east of Ruidoso Downs will be open two days a week, Mondays and Tuesdays, for disposal of trash other than wet garbage. "An accessible place where some of the items could be burned without danger of fire hazard to the surrounding area generally has a higher and better use and consequently is very expensive. "If any individual has a canyon or gully that needs filling and leveling, we would be most happy to properly prepare the site with our bulldozer and supervise dumping on designated days, and afterwards return with the dozer to pack and cover the area with dirt so that it would not be unsightly. ## STATE CONTRIBUTES \$44,823 TO STREET

Additional aid from the State Highway Department for improvement of streets in Ruidoso that was promised a year ago, on June 9, 1960, for improving Sudderth Drive for eight tenths of a mile westward from the junction of Sudderth and Mechem Drive, was recalled this week by State Highway Commissioner John Sudderth, who visited here briefly Monday. Sudderth said that on that date the State Highway Commission had promised \$44,823.58—and had allocated this amount for widening and improving Main Road (its name at that time) westerly from Mechem Drive up the canyon 0.81 of a mile. The State Highway Department agreed then to pay 100% of the center twenty-four feet, and one third of the balance of the cost of widening, including the curb and gutter. Property owners along the route are to bear a proportionate cost. Sudderth said he understood. The \$44,823.58 grant includes \$2,827.18 for engineering costs, Sudderth added. He said the money is to be given to the Village of Ruidoso to be administered on this particular stretch of road improvement. Work on it will likely get underway when the city's proposed lateral street paving district is activated, which may be later in 1961. One hearing has already been held, and another is scheduled shortly on a proposal to set up a Paving Assessment district to harden about 60 of Ruidoso's streets, from widths of 16 feet to 32. The Village Council tomorrow (Saturday) is to open bids on a sidewalk paving project to run from one end of Sudderth Drive to the other, another facet in the current modernizing program for Ruidoso's traffic control. "The Corporation, having no debts will apply every dollar, from the sale of stock toward the building of the hotel," he said. "The hotel will be owned and operated by the corporation. The profits from the operation of the hotel, plus the profits from the sale of lots, plus cash paid in on contracts, should enable the corporation to pay substantial dividends to all stockholders each year. 

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



There are such things as letters to be written, perhaps some trips to be made to press for this project in person, perhaps there will be some log rolling necessary, or lobbying—who knows what all the problems may be before we attain the goal. Anyway, we need to band together in support of the agencies, and promise them our aid when needed.

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## BONITO LAKE OPENS FOR THREE-MONTH FISHING SEASON

Bonito Lake is a small impoundment of water in the Sacramento Mountains about halfway between Ruidoso and Carrizozo. In many parts of New Mexico this would be considered a minor fishing water, but in the arid southeastern part of New Mexico it is very important. The Department of Game and Fish has rehabilitated this lake to improve the fishing and increase its value as a recreational site in the area.

Back in the early 1930s, a need for water to service the now extinct steam-driven locomotives used on the Southern Pacific Lines brought about the construction of Bonito Lake. Due to the water quality in the vicinity of Vaughn, New Mexico, the water from Bonito Lake was more suitable for the operation of the steam-driven locomotives. The water from the lake was piped to Nogal Lake and then to Vaughn.

In 1957, the City of Alamogordo purchased Bonito Lake from the Southern Pacific Lines since the railroad had changed from steam-driven to diesel locomotives and no longer needed the water.

At Ruidoso's insistence, since the area was an excellent recreation site, the City of Alamogordo allowed fishing and pick-nicking at the lake, charging a small fee to keep the area clean so that the water could be used as the city supply. The fishing was not the very best, however. There were many species of fish in the lake that had become over-populated and stunted, reducing the quality of trout fishing. The Department of Game and Fish has at various times in the last 20 years, recommended that the water be rehabilitated.

Finally with the demand for more and improved fishing water, another meeting was set for February 14, 1961, with officials of Alamogordo, Hildreth, Hildreth and Air Force Base, Otero County Wildlife Association and the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. The object was to see if plans could be formulated to remove the existing fish population in Bonito Lake, which consisted of both game and rough fish, and establish a game fish population which will consist of several species of trout.

At the meeting, a tentative date of February 28, 1961, was set to rehabilitate Bonito Lake. Preparations were made for that date and personnel were on the scene to begin the rehabilitation. How-

ever, because approval had not been received from all agencies concerned, the plans to rehabilitate Bonito Lake were postponed.

Again plans were made and authorization was received from all agencies concerned to treat Bonito Lake on March 11 with rotenone. Prior to applying the rotenone, the lake was mapped and marked off into sections. This was to insure an even distribution of the fish toxicant. Early in the morning of March 11, the application of rotenone on Bonito Lake was started. Three hundred people including volunteer workers and eight-secre were on hand to witness the job. The powdered rotenone was first mixed into a paste by using a cement mixer and also by hand in wash tubs. It was then placed in burlap sacks and towed in the wake of an outboard motor. All personnel helping to apply the rotenone were assigned to specific sections which had been previously marked off. Two hours elapsed from the time the application of rotenone started until it was completed. Sixteen hundred pounds of five per cent equivalent powdered cube root were used for the rehabilitation.

One hour and fifteen minutes had elapsed when the first distressed fish was observed. The species first observed was a rainbow trout. Four hours from the time the application started, Carp were being observed and picked up.

To treat Bonito Creek above the lake, drip stations were set up and maintained for a 48-hour period. A fisherman's bubble, a one-man floating device operated by biologist Richard Navarre, was used to distribute the rotenone in beaver ponds at the head of the lake.


The estimated poundage of fish eradicated is as follows: carp 8,000; rainbow trout 1,300; goldfish 400; minnows including longnose dace and fathead 400 and largemouth bass 6.

Checks are made periodically to clean up the dead fish which have washed ashore.

During the month of April, boxes were placed to determine whether or not the toxic effect of the rotenone had sufficiently subsided so the lake could be planted.

The season on Bonito Lake runs from June 1, 1961, to September 1, 1961. From all indications, the rehabilitation has been highly successful and the lake "ready to go" on opening day.

It was planted with trout a week before the opening.





**ORDINANCE NO. 119**  
**WEEDS, GRASS, DELETERIOUS GROWTHS OR OTHER NOXIOUS MATTER TO BE A NUISANCE; PROHIBITING THE MAINTENANCE OF SUCH NUISANCE; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR THE REMOVAL OF SUCH NUISANCE; FIXING CHARGES FOR SUCH REMOVAL AND ESTABLISHING A LIEN; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

**Section 1.** It is hereby declared that weeds, grass, deleterious growths or other noxious matter is a nuisance and constitutes a health menace and fire hazard and is prohibited.

**Section 2.** No owner of any lot, place or area within the Village of the agent of such owner, shall permit on such lot, place or area any weeds, grass or deleterious growths, or other noxious matter may be growing, lying or located thereon.

**Section 3.** No owner of any lot, place or area within the Village, or the agent of such owner, shall permit on such lot, place or area any weeds, grass, cuttings, trash or other noxious matter that shall constitute a fire hazard.

**Section 4.** The Superintendent of Sanitation and/or the Fire Chief, is hereby authorized and empowered to notify in writing the owner of any such lot, place or area within the Village, or the agent of such owner, to cut, destroy and remove the items set out in Section 2 above. Such notices shall be by certified mail, addressed to the owner or agent of the owner at his last known address, and it shall be the duty of the owner or agent of the owner to forthwith comply with said notice.

**b.** In addition to the penalties herein provided, upon the failure, neglect or refusal of any owner or agent of such owner to cut, destroy and remove the material as provided in sub-section (a) above within 30 days after receipt of the written notice provided for in sub-section (a) above, or within 45 days after the date of such notice, in the event the same is returned to the Village proper department because of its inability to make delivery thereof, provided the same was properly addressed to the last known owner or agent, the Village Clerk is hereby authorized and empowered to pay for the cutting, hauling and removal of the material set out in Section 2 and 3 of this ordinance or to order the removal by the Village.

**Section 5.** When the Village has effected the removal of such material, the actual cost thereof plus accrued interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of the completion of the work, if not paid by such owner prior thereto, shall be charged and assessed to the owner of such property based on the actual cost and shall be and constitute a lien against the premises so benefited by such removal.

**Section 6.** The assessment provided for above shall be made by the Board of Trustees from the data furnished by the Village Clerk and said Clerk, under the direction of the Board of Trustees shall make an assessment roll containing in columns the name of the owner of each lot or parcel of land separately assessed, if known to him, and the amount assessed separately against each lot or parcel of land. The assessment roll shall be prepared on or before December 1, 1951, and before the date each year thereafter.

**Section 7.** After the assessment roll provided for above is made and filed by the Village Clerk with the Board of Trustees, the Village Clerk shall give ten (10) days notice by one publication in a newspaper of the Village that the assessment roll is on file in the Clerk's office, which notice shall state the property against which an assessment has been made and shall state a time at which the Trustees will meet to hear the appeals or protests of parties aggrieved by such assessment.

**Section 8.** At the time fixed for such protest meeting the Village Council shall meet and hear and determine upon all appeals, protests and objections which may be made by any interested party; and if the proceedings are found to be regular the Village Council shall correct any errors which may have been found in the assessments and shall thereupon, by resolution, direct the confirmation of such proceedings and the proceedings and assessments as so confirmed shall thereafter be final for the determination of the regularity, validity and correctness of the assessment and the amounts thereof.

**Section 9.** On or before the first day of February, 1952, and on or before the first day of February of each subsequent year the Village Clerk shall certify to the Village Council a statement of all delinquent assessments describing the land affected, after which the assessment shall be a lien upon each lot or parcel of land described in such statement, assessment roll, and it shall be the duty of the Village Clerk to make out, sign, attest and file and record in the office of the County Clerk, a claim of lien therefor. Such lien shall bear interest at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum from the date of filing until paid together with reasonable attorney fees for the foreclosure of same, and may thereafter be foreclosed at any time in the same manner as provided for the foreclosure of mortgages of real estate.

**Section 10.** Any person who shall violate Sections 2 or 3 of this ordinance or any person who shall interfere with or molest employees of the city engaged in removing the materials as provided for in this ordinance or any person who shall refuse to obey and comply with Sections 2 and 3 to be removed from his premises, shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500.00 or ninety (90) days in jail, or both such fine and imprisonment.


