sheep demonstration at the Fuller Ranch last week. The morning program was highlighted by a discussion on cactus eradication led by Wesley Dross of Capitan. He pointed out that the cactus can be removed economically and that over 20,000 acres have pulled in the county during the past year. Cactus pulled during the winter may not need to be piled and will reduce the cost by over 50%. Phelps White discussed with the group the need for having all sheep when they are moved or sold. He stated that during the last 18 months there has been five outbreaks of scab and they have been unable to trace the animals as no paint brand was on the sheep. It has been estimated that the scab outbreak during the past year cost the sheepraiser a cent a pound on his lambs or over \$300,000. Anyone needing a brand should contact the sheep Sanitary Board in the Korber Building in Albuquerque.

The need for the wool grower to know more about his wool has been the object of the research project on core and hook sampling conducted by W. D. McFadden. He told the group how the core has helped and could be expected to help in the future. A delicious barbecue was served by Charles Fuller with Ray Izzard as chef. The program was concluded by a discussion by the grower of problems of concern to all of them. Some of the problems discussed State and Federal lands, and disease.



## 77 Two-Year-Olds Featured In Trials

Seventy-seven of the top two-year-old quarter horses in the nation, some making their first start on a recognized track other than a world of racing experience will parade to the post in eight futurity trials Friday at Ruidoso Downs. These will be the qualification trials to determine who will remain eligible for the 16th running of the Ruidoso open Quarter Horse Futurity, a traditional race that was inaugurated a year before Ruidoso Downs became a recognized track.

Back in the days when Ruidoso Downs was still called Hollywood Race Track, and part-mutuel wagering was something to look forward to a group of quarter horse men with foresight enough to realize the tremendous possibility of a futurity, combined with a race track that was destined to become the fastest growing track in America. These men raised their best horses in the first Ruidoso Futurity. The purse for that race was so small that no one can even remember the amount. The 1961 purse is expected to reach nearly \$50,000.

The Ruidoso open Quarter Horse Futurity became a tradition as time went by, and Ruidoso gained national recognition. More and more horses have been nominated each year until this race has become one of the largest Quarter Horse Futurities in the nation. This year's total of seventy-seven is the greatest number to remain eligible for the trials, making the eighth race necessary. Horses running in the trials will qualify for the finals on a basis of time alone, with the fastest horses securing a place in the finals, and the slower horses becoming eligible to race. With time the determining factor as to who qualifies, it is possible for a horse to win a trial heat and still not secure a spot.






