





lack of money stood in the way of doing something about it. They all agreed the survey's predicted growth projection was overly conservative. "We feel we will have a much greater growth than this survey indicates," Mrs. Quiltrough said.

Fetty said from this study, perhaps a priority list should be made up from which the local school board and administrators could outline a program of work that would finally solve some of the district's problems. "However, there are many more such surveys and sets of recommendations lying on shelves gathering dust than are ever acted upon." He said Ruidoso was to be complimented on asking such a survey be made—that this community was one of three in the state having made such a request—which indicates awareness on the part of its citizens. The other two communities did not request a complete study as did Ruidoso, he said.

After the recess Chairman Swearingin called on Ruidoso B. Goode, a statistician of the Bureau of Business Research of the University, who gave a summation of a similar study of the Village of Ruidoso's growth, financial structure and projected growth from data gleaned from records of the last several years.

He spoke on ways and means of financing village projects—noting that current revenues from sales of utilities and from services could never be expected to provide any vast amount for major projects—that bond issues of the two types that are legal—general obligation and revenue—were the only means open to financing expansion of the city's needs for the expected growth in population.

Mayor Robert Pearson and others of the village council on hand said they needed more time to study the village financial survey before they would give comment—but that from brief glimpses of it, the report appeared very comprehensive.

to White Oaks, then a booming mining town. He went in the mercantile business there and in 1899 moved to Eagle Creek and opened the Alto postoffice. That was in 1891. The home he built and the postoffice building are still standing. He left Alto in 1900 and moved to Lamesa, Tex., where he was engaged in farming for four years. From Lamesa he moved with his family to Lexington, Okla., and remained there for six years.

But, the call of Lincoln County never was quite stilled in the cowboy-merchant. He came back to White Oaks and went in the grocery business. He was appointed a postmaster for the second time in Lincoln County at White Oaks, holding that position until he died in 1922.

When William Henry Walker came to Lincoln County the first time, it was to visit a sister who lived at another pioneer residence up Eagle Creek a short distance from Alto. In 1891 he married Ruth Ollie Lacey. Her parents were ranchers in the old Texas Park country north of Capitan.

## Old Letter Found in Capitan Creates Question as to Date Of Billy the Kid's Escape

The mystery of why a June 26 date appears on an unauthenticated 1891 letter reporting Billy the Kid's escape at Lincoln deepened today as the history books' accounts were more or less confirmed by Vic Lamb, editor and publisher of the Ruidoso News.

Mike Francis, 14, of El Paso, visiting his grandparents in Capitan, two weeks ago found an old letter addressed to Sheriff Pat Garrett, written by Florencio Chavez, reporting the Kid's escape from the Old Lincoln County courthouse and jail at Lincoln.

Will Kelsner, in his book, "Violence in Lincoln County," reported that the Kid escaped from jail on April 28, 1881, while former Territorial Gov. George Curry in his autobiography places the date on April 20, 1881.

The mystery of the letter is why Chavez, who apparently was a member of the Lincoln County Riflemen, sent to keep order in Lincoln County by Gov. Lew Wallace, would report the escape two months after it occurred, to Sheriff Garrett who undoubtedly knew of the escape within hours after it happened. Garrett was in White Oaks when the escape occurred—not too many miles from Lincoln.

Lamb said that in his research on the Kid's escape, done to promote the Billy the Kid pageant at Lincoln, scheduled Aug. 4-8 in Lincoln, he came across a feature story in the White Oaks Eagle of Thursday, Feb. 14, 1901, which gives evidence on the date of the Kid's escape.

The Eagle quoted from a news story that appeared in the May 5

Those present were told that approximately 50 copies of the research team's complete report on the Ruidoso school system will be made available to the public shortly. Another 75 copies will be included in a Master Plan portfolio to be issued at a later date.

Mrs. Morrison Quiltrough and Dr. W. D. Horton of the local school board said the school survey revealed to them a minor number of changes that could be made to provide better schooling here, but that many of the problems touched on were known to the board and its members were anxious to do something about them.

Mrs. Gerald Tully, another Board member, said she had no comment to make on the survey until she had time to study it thoroughly.


### RUIDOSO CHARACTERS



### Lie Detector Helps Clear San Patricio Man

Roswell Police arraigned Marcello Fred Lucero, 23, Clayton, N. M., on a first degree murder charge Thursday, July 6, after he broke down during a lie detector test in Lubbock, Tex. and admitted he was the killer of 80-year-old Thomas Ogas, 108 S. Mulberry Ave., Roswell. Chief of Police Tommy Thompson had taken Lucero and 46-year-old Carlos Merinda, San Patricio, to the Texas city for a lie detector test after their stories on the stabbing death of Ogas didn't match up. Lucero first told officers he had been with Merinda and Ogas Monday afternoon, July 3, under the railroad bridge behind the city water works in the east part of Roswell when Merinda and Ogas started arguing over a bottle of wine. He said Merinda threw Ogas down and stabbed him once before he was able to take the knife away and throw it into the brush.

Police filed first degree murder charges against Merinda on the strength of Lucero's story but continued investigating the case because of discrepancies in the two men's stories. Merinda had told officers he was too drunk to remember anything that happened during the afternoon of July 3 and couldn't remember being with Ogas at all. Merinda had steadfastly refused to say anything else to police and entered a plea of not guilty to the murder charge when it was filed against him.



AND SO . . . THE SONG BEGAN. This is not a sermon, it's a little talk together about one of the most fundamental things anyone has ever known. This story comes from the source book that meets any life-situation that arises. The book is called the Bible. There is a verse that says, "When the burnt-offering began, the song of the Lord began also."  
This is the story of King Hezekiah. In the first month of his rule he restored the worship in the temple and called the people back to the true God. They made the sin offering that was the custom under the old law under which they lived at that time and then they made the burnt-offering that signified the re-consecration of their lives to God. An animal was placed upon an altar and fire was made under and all around the wood altar, holding the animal for the burnt-offering. Then it was, when the smoke and fire began to ascend toward the heavens, when the animal began to be consumed by the flames . . . "when the burnt-offering began, the song of the Lord began also." This meant the giving up of self to Him in whose name the altar had been made and the burnt offering placed thereon. The point to note is that in the very moment when the flame began to ascend there was a burst of music. It was not mournful music but, "the song of the Lord." It stirred the hearts of the assembled crowd, and some who had been depressed looked again. Some who had been fearful were encouraged. It has been said by Bernard Iddings Bell that, "Perhaps the newest thing there is, is old truth re-discovered." So, in that ancient and dramatic scene we have a parable of living truth. I think that always when the burnt-offering begins, the song of the Lord begins also. Wherever there is devotion there is gladness. Where there is consecration there is music. Let a man be ignorant of self-surrender and under the faintest sky he will be miserable. But let him devote himself with heart and soul to his duty, to his calling, to his God and voices that were silent yesterday will break forth into singing as he moves.

**Woman Linotype Operator Sets Most of the Type Now In Publication of the News**





