

Gov. Mecham to the Rescue: 'Bring Smokey Back to Capitan'

If Gov. Edwin L. Mecham of New Mexico has his way, Smokey the Bear will have a new home. Learning that Smokey has become the center of a controversy in Washington over an application for new quarters at the Washington Zoo, Gov. Mecham decided it was time to bear down on the situation and set the ball rolling towards bringing Smokey back to his original home, the Lincoln National Forest.

It was there that Smokey was rescued from a raging forest fire in 1950. After being nursed back to health, Smokey became the living symbol of forest fire prevention.

He was taken to Washington and turned over to the U. S. Forest Service which became his legal guardian.

Recently Smokey got involved in the government argument in Washington. Seema he has been living in substandard quarters at the zoo, Sen. Lee Metcalf of Montana asked the Housing and Home Finance Agency to consider a single-dwelling housing loan for Smokey.

It was then Gov. Mecham decided to step in. He told Merle H. Tucker, director of the Department of Development, to get Smokey back to New Mexico.

Both the governor and Tucker could think of no better place for a home for Smokey than Capitan, near where he was born and later rescued from the forest fire.

Many Emergencies Handled At Local Hospital Recently Numerous emergencies have been handled in the last few days at the local hospital due partially to the large number of visitors in the canyon. Also several of the emergencies were from the Ruidoso Downs race track.

Jockey Raymond Adams was bitten by a horse while he was watering it on July 18. He was bitten on the left side of his chest and was treated and released.

Jockey Manuel Lopez was hospitalized for four days when he was thrown from a horse while exercising it. He received numerous contusions. Jockey Jackie Myers was hospitalized for one day and released following treatment after he was thrown from his horse in the starting gate last Sunday. He was not seriously injured. Leonard Richardson, another jockey, was treated and released after x-rays were taken when he was thrown from a horse at the track on July 25 as he was exercising it. Terrence Shoemaker, 16, of Hollywood, N. M., suffered severe injuries about the face and head when he was thrown from a horse at the track Monday this week. He was flown to an El Paso hospital the same day by McGuire Air Service accompanied by Dr. W. D. Horton.

Cynthia Cox, 11, of El Paso, suffered a fractured left arm when she fell from a horse as she was riding near Monte's. A cast was applied and she was released. Vincente Herrera of San Patricio was treated and released after he was stung by a honey bee on July 21.

George Daniels of Big Spring, Tex., suffered a broken back when he was thrown from a horse as he was riding in the local hospital about three days and was flown by McGuire Air Service to Midland for further treatment.

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1,000 Persons Expected For Nazarene Camp Here During Next Week

Opening service is Monday, July 31 at 7:30 p. m.; Tuesday through Sunday August 1-6 services will be at 10:00 a. m., 2:30 and 7:30 p. m. The public is always welcome and many from all denominations around Ruidoso and the Lincoln county area enjoy the annual camp.

Dr. Coulter is executive secretary of the Department of Foreign Missions in the Church of the Nazarene with offices at world headquarters in Kansas City, Mo. He is the chief administrator in the denomination's program of world missions that now has nearly 500 missionaries in 42 world areas.

Dr. Eckley has been superintendent of the Northwest Illinois district of the Church of the Nazarene since 1958. He formerly was superintendent of the New York district for six years.

Village to Bid on State Land For Community Park Site

At a meeting held on July 19 in the Ruidoso City Hall to discuss subdivision regulations, the village officials disclosed they were attempting to purchase 300 acres of land just north of Ruidoso airport to be developed as a community park. The village hopes to purchase this land from the state at an auction to be held in a few weeks. They stated that this land is absolutely essential for recreation purposes, but not only for village residents, but for tourists, in view of the great shortage of such land available now within the village limits.

The action to acquire the property for recreational purposes by the village council was heartily endorsed by representatives of the Planning Consultant firm to both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, Flatwood-Moore-Bryan & Fairburn of Albuquerque.

Al Rorer and William D. Tools, planning director of that firm, also presented proposals for the revision of subdivision regulations for the Village of Ruidoso which could also be incorporated in a new ordinance for the Village of Ruidoso Downs.

Supporting the subdivision agreement to the steps taken by Ruidoso to acquire this land for recreational purposes, the consultant presented alternative proposals for the control of subdivision regulations, both villages could reduce hazards and avoid uncontrolled development within an outside village limits. Both villages have jurisdiction over subdivisions for three miles outside municipal boundaries.

Approval was given the planning consultants to draft subdivision regulations providing that subdivisions locating more than one quarter mile outside the city limits and water lines in anticipation of future incorporation into the city, dedicate or set aside for dedication land for recreation and other public purposes within the subdivision, provide for high standards and develop only with large lots, 3 to 5 acres minimum per dwelling unit.

The intent of these proposed regulations is to discourage unrelated, unnecessary and uneconomical urban development and its related effects on the village. It is the intent of the village to encourage the development of public and private, passive and active recreation, to maintain property values within the village limits and to increase the local tax base. Stated was the fact that the village is the difficulty of amending such areas under present laws and of properly servicing them with utilities and other municipal services necessary for proper development of residential and commercial areas.

One of Ruidoso's Artists, Mrs. Martha Graves, Learned Painting as Miner's Wife

When you enter the home of Mrs. Martha Graves in Ruidoso, you know immediately that here lives an artist. On every wall there are paintings hanging, joyfully desert scenes, still lifes, adobe scenes and aspen in fall colors. In one corner of the room is an easel with a painting on it getting the final touch and nearby on a little table are the oil colors, brushes, palette and other such tools.

Mrs. Graves has a natural talent. She started painting as a hobby in 1925 and painted just for the pleasure of it. She did study art for a short time. Mrs. Graves was born in Gainesville, Tex. where her father followed the mining trade. In 1885 the family moved to White Oaks in Lincoln County which was then a booming mining town. Mrs. Graves, who was then Martha Dillard, attended a private school there.

The family lived in White Oaks a short time and moved from there to Nogal when a mining boom started there in the later 1880s.

Mr. and Mrs. Graves were married in El Paso in 1904 and in 1907 bought a 23 acre ranch at Yuleta. Mr. Graves also followed the mining trade and so did her brother. Mr. Graves was in the Spanish-American War before they were married and during the First World War served overseas in France and Germany. During his absence Mrs. Graves managed the ranch. She had one acre of roses and was known for many years in the El Paso area as "The Lady of the Roses." Mrs. Graves was the first landowner who tendered payment of construction costs on the Rio Grande project covering Elephant Butte Dam in 1922, with money derived from the sale of roses.





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

TV Actor Barry Sullivan Invited to Lincoln Pageant

The roar of the six-gun and the history and lore of Billy the Kid will come to life again Aug. 4-6 in the annual Billy the Kid pageant when this little mountain town relives its glorious high-point of 80 years ago.

For the first time since the pageant was initiated in 1940, a ninety minute spectacular will be presented daily under the sponsorship of the State of New Mexico. Previously, the production was staged by the Lincoln County Historical Society, whose president, Wilbur Coe, is the son of Frank Coe, a companion of Billy the Kid.

The 1961 production, expected to attract some four thousand from throughout the nation, will be written by Bill McGaw, Columbus, N. M., newspaper columnist for the El Paso Herald Post. McGaw also has a television show, "The Southwesterner," which appears weekly on KTEM-TV in El Paso.

McGaw's script marks the first major revision of the original script written in 1940. Since then, minor changes have been made each year of the pageant.

Since this year marks the centennial of the Civil War, McGaw says he has injected scenes from the Battle of Valverde — a decisive Civil War battle in New Mexico — into the script.

"Action and authenticity is the key to the entire script," McGaw said. "We'll use movie stunt horses in various scenes."

Mr. and Mrs. John Boylan, curators of the museum in the restored Lincoln County Courthouse said the entire cast will be composed of performers from Lincoln County, many of whom are descendants of principals in the famed Lincoln County War.

The fact that this will be the greatest spectacular ever put on in the more than twenty-year history of the pageant prompted an invitation to Barry Sullivan to attend the three-day pageant. Sullivan plays Pat Garrett in the television production of "Tall Man."

The invitation to Sullivan was made by Mrs. U. D. Sawyer, chairwoman of the Lincoln County Memorial Commission. Mrs. Sawyer is also a national democratic committeewoman.

Mrs. Boylan said the action will take place in the large amphitheater behind the restored courthouse. The amphitheater has a stage with building frontings recreating the town of Lincoln as it was 80 years ago when it boasted a population of more than 900. Today, the sleepy little town is a monument to the past and has a population of 100.

The action will be narrated from the viewpoint of Billy the Kid. It will open with the skirmishes with Indians and an Apache attack on Torreon, the old fort at Lincoln built in 1850.

The riding of a bucking horse, the actual branding of cattle—all these will add to the color of the pageant. There will also be square dancing and a reproduction of a mass marriage as it was performed by priests in Lincoln about every three years almost a century ago.

"Authenticity is of extreme importance here," Mrs. Boylan said. "The wonderful part about it is that the authentic history is so exciting, it needs no false melodrama."

The first pageant staged in 1940, celebrated the 40th anniversary of the trek of the conquistadores through New Mexico. It was held on the porch of the courthouse. During the war, the pageant was temporarily shelved but it became an annual affair after 1946.

Fifty Lincoln County residents will take part in the pageant. Although casting will be held at the end of this month (July), Billy the Kid is expected to be played by Johnny Thomas of San Patricio, who has played it many times in the past.

Members of the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, besides Mrs. Sawyer, are W. A. Keleher, Albuquerque; Col. E. L. Lusk, Roswell; A. T. Pfingsten, Hondo; Mrs. Ora Lee Skipworth, Ft. Sumner; J. Frank Mahill, Tularosa; Mandel, Clovis.

The members are chosen from the counties which originally comprised Old Lincoln County. There is also a member at large, Keleher, in this case.




Quarter Horse Derby Highlights Sunday Card; Kansas Futurity Trials Set

The annual running of the Ruidoso Derby with a purse to exceed \$21,000 draws twin billing with the KRQD Radio and TV Allowance, a thoroughbred event at six and one half furlongs, on Sunday's fine card at the Downs. The Derby, which this year will carry the richest purse in history, will find the co-favorites, Rebel Cause and Diamond Charge so closely matched that it would seem almost impossible to choose between the two. Rebel Cause, property of the famed Dale Robertson, star of television and motion pictures (racing under the stable name of Haymaker Farms) was bred by Top Deck and out of Bankette and boasts one of the finest racing records in Quarter Horse history. With his winnings totaling more than sixty-three thousand dollars, the finishing one lifetime star, he has scored a total of ten wins, six seconds and two thirds. He holds the distinction of having beaten every horse that had previously defeated him under the capable coaching of trainer in America, Gene Chambliss, and the veteran Quarter Horse rider, Henry Moore named to the riding assignment, he must draw strong consideration. The other half of the favorite's claim must go to the hard hitting Diamond Charge, owned by J. D. Askew, of Fayetteville, Ark. Under the training of L. O. Culver, who conditioned last year's Quarter Horse star Vandy's Place. This brown son of My Diamond - Lovely Lupta has won a total of over ten thousand dollars and finished second to Rebel Cause in the Derby Trials in April at Los Alamitos. His racing record includes a total of twenty four starts, eight wins six seconds and the balance were out of the money in racing records in speed, in training and in ability, these two rank as equal.

The unknown factor in this race could be the Bright Bar filly, Bar Bright, from the stable of C. L. Maddon of Albuquerque. While racing record is not as impressive as that of Rebel Cause or Diamond Charge, her ability, training and breeding combine to make her a definite threat. Tomo Oinger (K. R. Pearce, breeder, Kana, Stock Bar, Hugh Olinger, Chino, Calli), Three Deep, (F. B. Collins, breeder, J. V. Straw, Charles W. Harper, Farmington), Miss Vanity, (table name of Diamond Charge and a close third to Rebel Cause in the Los Alamitos Derby), May Moon, (Osborne Belsey Amber, Washington), and Mr. Meyers (Amn and J. V. Hanch, Murray, Okla., round out the field.

The co-featured tenth race, honoring one of the Southwest's outstanding Radio and Television stations, has drawn a full field of top three year-olds including the Handmade Floyd Poole, Sandra J. Atomic Girl, Solar Orbit, Noni Porter, Penrock, Connie's Lad and Lucky Genius. Probable favorite's roll here should go to Atomic Girl, the richest Kansas Futurity in history, with a total purse of nearly \$40,000, has enticed a total of 59 of the best two-year-olds in the nation to compete in six trials carded as the sixth through the eleventh race on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs. The ten fastest horses will be determined by time, and they will find a spot in the futurity, set as the feature attraction Sunday, August 6.

One of the fastest growing futurities in America, this year's Kansas Futurity has attracted a record number of nominations, which in turn swelled the purse from total of approximately \$17,000 in 1960 to nearly \$40,000 in 1961. The Kansas Futurity, the second of three great quarter horse futurities carded during the season at Ruidoso Downs, will find many of the named two-year-olds which competed in the Ruidoso open returning again in the Kansas. Many of these will also be entered again in the All American, the third and final futurity of the season. Since the Ruidoso futurity is the quarter horse futurity must do so on time alone, it is always possible for a horse to win a trial heat, and still wind up as an also eligible or an also ran, when the placings are determined for the final.

Since weather is always a factor in any quarter horse race, the luck of the draw in the trials not only determines which horses will compete against each other, but from which post positions they will break, but it also determines whether the final trials race on the card. So, as a result, strong head winds, and various weather conditions become just another factor in a horseman's life as he attempts to qualify for this, one of the richest quarter horse races in America.

Thoroughbreds will dominate the balance of the card for the day, as the daily double and both quinella will be composed of distance horses.

The Coors Allowance, fashioned for three-year-olds and upward at seven panels, has attracted a total of eight of the middle distance sprinters. This looms as a wide open affair, limited to horses which have not won a race other than maiden or claiming at the time of racing secretary Rites Handers has enticed such stalwarts as Bangs Victory, now racing under the silks of Don Herber, Hollywood. This six-year-old gelded son of Victory Drive-Lant Bang was claimed at the current time for \$4000 and since then has shown his worth. A victor in four outings this year, he looked impressive in first start for his new owner, and must be considered a factor here.

Amajack, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Richard Hazleton of Phoenix and a four-year-old gelded son of Lillokid-Lady Luck has been claimed as one of the better horses at the meeting and will be seeking his sixth win of the year.

Hurd Paints Portrait Of Ft. Worth Banker

(Editor's Note: The art editor of the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram secured this interesting and revealing interview with Peter Hurd, San Antonio artist of world fame, in that city recently when Hurd was there to paint the portrait of an official of one of the banks.)

Architects for the new First National Bank building undoubtedly did not design it for the purpose, but one of the large offices on the 17th floor is serving beautifully as an artist's studio.

There the famous New Mexico artist, Peter Hurd, is utilizing north light to paint a portrait of J. Lee Johnson, Jr., the bank's executive officer. Hurd began painting the portrait on Friday, July 7, and expects to take the painting back to his ranch at San Antonio the first of the week, where he will finish the work.

The portrait will be a gift to Mr. and Mrs. Johnson from the directors of First National Bank, and will hang in the Johnson home.

Hurd is working in one of his favorite mediums—egg tempera on gesso—and the necessary fresh eggs are being kept on top of the air-conditioning unit, and he dripped down into the mechanism so that a portion of the air-conditioning system has been ripped out, and sent off for repair.

Hurd estimates it will require between 18 and two dozen fresh eggs to complete the 42 by 48-inch painting. Only the egg yolks are used, and the eggs must be very fresh to stand up under the necessary separation from the whites. Hurd holds the yolk in his hands allowing the white to slip through his fingers as he moves. After he has strained off the last possible drop of white, he catches hold of the sack around the yolk and cuts it with a razor blade, allowing the yolk to fall into the egg tempera. "I learned to do that the hard way," Hurd explains. "If a little piece of that sack is left in the egg, your brush will pick it up and then it will peel off the painting, leaving a little white spot."

Always a student of the craft, Hurd developed his tempera technique by absorbing the technique of Cennino Cennini, the Renaissance painter of Florence, and it's a wonder how much I have taken time to be home on the from the Renaissance methods of painting," the artist says.

Strangely enough, Hurd has used this Renaissance-inspired technique to paint—possibly better than any other living artist—the characteristic landscapes of the Southwest.

Hurd is a typical product of the Southwest. As he painted the Johnson portrait, he was dressed in blue jeans, black reptile high-heeled cowboy boots, and a green-striped western shirt, made with the characteristic yoke and snap fastenings. Peter Hurd's blue eyes look at you with the directness found only in men of this region, and his manner and ease are those of the Southwest.

Hurd is an artist of the world, however, not just the Southwest. He does cover portraits for "Time" magazine, his latest was of the senator from a neighboring state, Barry Goldwater of Arizona, and he was one of the accredited correspondents of "Life" magazine sent to make pictorial records of our armed forces in Britain, Africa, the Middle East and India.

"I don't think of myself as a portrait artist," Hurd remarked. "In fact, I limit myself to four or five portraits a year."

His usual custom is to have the subject come to his San Antonio ranch for two weeks, and the portrait is painted there. It came to Fort Worth to paint Mr. Johnson because Bob Winifor twisted my arm," Hurd admitted.

The background in the Johnson portrait is different from any previously used by the artist. It is a Hurd painting, so that the final portrait will be a portrait of Hurd within a Hurd. The background painting is of Texas prairie—similar to the terrain at the Johnson ranch northwest of Odessa—being swept by rainstorm. It calls for a "Hare Day in West Texas" and it's rare because it's raining," Hurd explained.

Hurd absolutely refused to paint portraits of middle-aged women because his realistic technique shows up wrinkles that make them unhappy. "But give me a young doll to paint, and I'm in clover," he said with a grin.

Like many artists, he checks his work in a mirror as he paints. "It's the best check I know against distortion and bad drawing."

He works quickly, carrying on a easy conversation both with his model and with those who drop in to observe the proceedings. His lack of temperamental has served him well.

Hurd recalls that he was doing a portrait of Adm. Arthur Radford at the Pentagon at the time the admiral was chief of staff, and was under considerable pressure from Congress. A Marine Corps colonel, who was the admiral's aide, would give Hurd a nod whenever it was necessary for the admiral to transact top secret business. "I would have to disappear in mid-brush stroke," Hurd recalls.

The Pentagon considered the portrait top secret, also, and kept it locked up every night among its most secret files. The thing that amuses Hurd about the entire thing was that among the that stringent security, the old coveralls he wore while painting disappeared one night, and never were recovered.


It Was Eighty Years Ago Billy the Kid Escaped From Jail at Old Lincoln

(Editor's Note: Below is reproduced an article from the May 5, 1921 White Oaks Golden Era weekly newspaper which tells of the escape of Billy the Kid 80 years ago this spring, on Friday, April 23, 1891.)

"A REIGN OF TERROR"
 The city of White Oaks was startled on last Friday by the intelligence that Billy the Kid had killed two of his guards and made good his escape. About three o'clock in the afternoon of the same day a courier confirmed the report and the following account of the daring break for liberty.
 It seems that while Mr. R. Olinger was at supper on last Thursday evening as usual, Deputy Sheriff J. W. Bell was guarding the prisoner, when it is supposed that Kid, watching his opportunity, slipped his handcuffs and struck Bell over the head and then grabbed the revolver from Bell's scabbard while he was in a dazed

through the window with a double-barreled shot gun, and fired, hitting Olinger in the breast and after he fell emptied the other barrel, loaded with buck shot, in his shoulder. It is expected that Kid then came out on the porch, broke the stock of the gun from the barrel and threw the pieces at the corpse at the same time, as he said. "You will never follow me again with a gun." He then ordered a Mr. Goss, under cover of a Winchester, which he secured in the adjoining room from which he was being guarded, to saddle Billy Burt's horse, which Mr. Goss did, and as he (Kid) attempted to mount the horse jumped sideways, breaking loose from the new master. Again the Winchester came into position, threatening Mr. Goss, and again ordered (him) to get the horse. This done, Billy Kid bid the people of the town adios, and rode off at a rapid gait. The facts as reported to us in a nut shell. A great deal may be surmised as to how he secured the revolver and got his hands uncuffed and shackles off. But there is no surmising the fact that two brave and valiant men were killed and Billy the Kid was free. Lincoln County is at present, without a jail and prisoners must be closely guarded at all times, instead of closely confined, as is the custom and proper way in such cases, in other counties in New Mexico. Why Lincoln county was so long in this condition we are unable to state. Surely in days gone by she has needed one as badly as now. However, one is now being erected of sufficient size and character to hold all classes of criminals. But, this does not help matters in the least. It has in this instance proven disastrous in the extreme that such is the condition of affairs. It has been the means, in a measure, of depriving two good men of their lives in the flush of their manhood, and also turned loose a desperado whom the county and the people have spent much money in trying to capture.
 Rumors state that Kid said to one or two after he was free that he did not want to kill Bell, but Bell would not surrender to him and that he had to do so to effect his escape. Also that he had never seen him in his person ever since he left the Pecos River, when the posse of men were escorting him from La Mesilla to Lincoln, where

he was to be executed on the 13th of this month. Other reports say that he went around the town of Lincoln and bid several of the citizens good bye, and said that now he would still have a chance to kill the three men he spoke about while in the Mesilla jail. It is also reported that he carried away three revolvers and a Winchester, arming himself to the teeth. That his hands were smaller than his wrists and that he could slip any hand cuff that were put on him that after he got the cuffs off he procured a file and severed one cuff from his ankle and rode off with the other one dangling. It seems hard to get at the facts, as everything was done so quick and every one taken so by surprise.
 J. W. Bell was made deputy sheriff last January and filed the office becoming an officer of the law and had won the esteem of all law abiding citizens. His loss is greatly mourned by all the citizens of White Oaks and surrounding camps.
 Mr. Robert Olinger, was a deputy United States Marshal, and we understand was admired for his efficiency as an officer and his bravery and cordiality as a man. Mr. Olinger was buried at Fort Stanton and Deputy Sheriff Bell was buried at Lincoln.

Federal Aid To Local Schools Remains in Doubt

Congressman Joseph Montoya says. He has introduced two bills to ask for extension of Public Laws 874 and 815 from which federal aid has been received in the past. Schools in this area, and the amounts received under these two laws, have been: Cloudcroft, \$14,500; Tularosa, \$92,832; Ruidoso \$12,822 and Carrizozo \$4,900.


