

Operated by Bob Delpit, who also has the Steak Pit in Aspen and Chuck's Steak House in Honolulu, Hawaii, the dining room and bar at Tinnie are simply first class. The dining room, with red carpeting, has restored captain's chairs for diners to sit in, has a large salad buffet for you to serve yourself bread, butter and choice of salad; and has only about five main dishes (printed on the side of old menus) stained glass windows around the dining room are backlit—there is a large gallery at the rear equipped with wicker furniture only. If you'd like to dine out here, now have a menu to view the wine cellar in the basement if you so desire. The atmosphere is informal, yet has an elegance you appreciate. Much of the decor came from the fabulous old mansions of San Francisco that were recently rased. The prices are very reasonable. The menu is numbered and packed for shipping in such a way they could be re-assembled even though some of the parts had to be repaired. Considerable gingerbread around doors and windows from the old place is used throughout the place. You'll find a lot of the latter used in the carousel on a long breezeway that runs to the west from the main building. At the end of the banistered breezeway you'll find old wooden horses that are now being moved to a round, and a sandwich shop. The sandwich shop is open during the lunch hour only—the dining room is open in the evening hours only. They are closed on Monday but open the rest of the week. Quite a few more have been moved here. The treat of dining there—and all are happy such a facility is now available.

**GOV. MECHEM FAVORS ALL AMENDMENTS**

Gov. Edwin L. McChern, making a pop call on Ruidoso last week-end prior to his appearance at the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" pageant in Lincoln, said he was in favor of passage of all proposed amendments to the state constitution that are to be voted on in September this year by New Mexicans.

**5,000 SEE LINCOLN PAGEANT**

Perfect weather held sway for the three-day folkloric pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid," which portrayed some incidents from the Lincoln County War at Old Lincoln Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

A record crowd for each of the three performances was reported, with more than 5,000 people counted in the total attendance. Governor Edwin L. McChern was among the viewers of the pageant, sponsored by the Lincoln County Memorial Commission, a state agency. It had been sponsored in prior years by old timers of the county, who are still assisting in taking parts in the play. Lieut. Gov. Tom Bolack was also among state dignitaries in attendance.

Spectators were noted from many states. The pageant this year had the advantage of publicity in Life magazine in recent months on three occasions.

**50 Million To See Race At Ruidoso Downs**

Wall Wiggins, publicity director for Ruidoso Downs, says he can conservatively estimate that 50 million persons will see this year's All American Quarter Horse Futurity to be run on Labor Day at the local track. He said arrangements have been completed for the American Broadcasting Company to televise the race. The race will be filmed the day it is run, but will be shown on the following Saturday between halves of a professional football game from Dallas. Wiggins said there are some 200 affiliated stations with the ABC network throughout the U. S. and Canada, and that there are some 200 other stations that will also carry the ABC film.

He said a crew of ABC photographers and technicians, numbering half a dozen or more, will be on hand to arrange for televising the race, purse for which is estimated to reach \$170,000 for the third annual running in 1961.

# PAVING COMPLETED


Ruidoso's paving project is completed. The last of a seal coat of asphalt was laid this mid-week on the 5.58 miles of Sudderth Drive and Mechem Drive here, providing four-driving-lanes and two-lanes for parallel parking all the way from U. S. Highway 70 through town to Mechem Drive. From that point to the airport, Mechem Drive has also been repaved and improved.

The work has been done by Floyd Haake Construction Co., of Santa Fe at a cost of \$850,000.00 to the State Highway Department with the Public Bureau of Roads Sudderth Drive. The work was installed on both sides of the main street here except for one block for paying costs of damage to property whose fronts needed removing in the road widening. The village voted \$100,000.00 in bonds to care for that expense. With these two figures added together, and with the extra money property owners have spent who have modernized their fronts in keeping with the project, more than \$1 million has been spent here in the last six months on changing the face of Ruidoso's business area. Also a part of the modernization has been installation of sidewalks, three feet in width for the entire length of Sudderth Drive. The walks were installed on both sides of the main street here except for one block where properly owners protested its installation in a hearing held for that purpose this spring. Community Public Service Co. has put the finishing touch on the new look by installing mercury vapor lights along the new paved street, with a promise that more are to be installed on other streets here sometime in the future.

Now being considered is a paving project to harden surface approximately 60 lateral streets in the village. Two protest hearings have been held on this proposal, which will be paid for by owners of property fronting the paving—and only a small portion of the originally proposed district has been omitted.

Great progress has also been reported on construction of an access road into White Mountain Park where Sierra Blanca Corporation is building a winter and summer resort. Jack Adams Construction Co., of Santa Fe is doing this road work, which starts on the South fork of Eagle Creek and climbs upwards to the winter sports region. The County of Lincoln's road crew is assisting in improving portions of the road from Alto, on State Road 37, westward to the Butte Eagle Creek junction with the Adams' contract. Reports this week from the access road project is that the widening and grading of this route is more than half done.

# GROUND BEING LEVELED ON HIGHWAY SITE FOR 90-UNIT HOTEL IN RUIDOSO DOWNS



Ground is being leveled here on a portion of a tract of land 18 1/2 acres in size that lies between the Ruidoso Downs race track and the village of Ruidoso Downs, on the north side of U. S. Highway 70, just above the old Nelson farm, as the first step in the construction of a 90-unit hotel with the facilities needed for a resort community and for entertaining conventions of considerable size.

On hand Tuesday watching the dirt being moved was Wiley T. Culpepper, a construction contractor of El Paso, who is one of four partners in the venture. Wiley told the Ruidoso News, "We started this project without any fanfare, or special promotion, because there has been so much written and talked about hotels in the Ruidoso area in recent months we decided we would just go ahead and build one—and show the people we meant business."

The hotel at Ruidoso Downs is one of five that have been proposed in this area in the last 12 months. The others are being sponsored through sale of stock by local corporations—either by stock sales through a Roswell corporation and the fifth has been strictly a rumor.

"There is no more stock to be sold in our hotel," Culpepper said. "We have the financing available among our four owners for this project."

He listed the other three investors as being Richard B. Austin, a real estate man of Dallas; John W. Ellis of San Angelo, whose occupation is listed as insurance agent and consultant; and Barney Koogle, who has the Triangle Electric of El Paso.

The new hotel is being built on land secured originally by Barney Bedford and a group of people from Texas who had hoped to erect a series of hotels in the Ruidoso area in recent months. Bedford originally became interested in the development of the Ruidoso Hotel Corporation's plan to build a large hotel in Ruidoso. The latter corporation is headed by Dr. W. D. Horton. The News received a letter from Bedford about a month ago stating Southwest Community Inns had turned their land holdings over to the four-man organization which is now at work building a hotel.

Culpepper said the quartet has not yet decided a name for the hotel, but it will be announced shortly.

Showing blueprints of the hotel, Culpepper pointed out it would be built on a two-level site, with entrances to the group of rooms from a series of elevators. Property on a lower level and entrance to the other rooms on an upper level where the main buildings would be constructed. The main building will include a dining and meeting hall that can accommodate 600 people; a large club room to which membership will be sold, with monthly, or annual, or three-day holiday as one of their regular vacation tours this summer.

Prehistoric eggs and a small, strange crystal type rock containing very tiny feathers in blue and green and a wee skeleton were exhibited to friends by George Bruce of Alamogordo when Mr. Bruce was a guest recently of Mrs. Harold Graham.  
Desert rat, amateur geologist, tracer of underground water George Bruce loves the desert and the desert yields up her secrets in return.  
High on a ledge on the eastern slope of the Guadalupe Mts. overlooking what was once a great perimian sea George Bruce has found 1/4 acre of eggs of some giant prehistoric animal, probably amphibian. These eggs never had a hard shell and today are a roundish brown mass some eight inches across with a petrified yolk in the center. These yolks come in various hues ranging from red and green to ochre and yellow and off white.  
An Indian metate found at this location showed signs that the egg yolks had been ground for color by some by-gone artist, and George Bruce advances the theory that these colors were used by the Indians in their painting in prehistoric times. He exhibits a painting by Martha Julian, an Alamogordo artist done with colors from these eggs mixed with a plastic substance.  
He made this statement: "The find of petrified eggs is no doubt absolutely unique and should be preserved as a national or state monument. How to bring this to pass is Mr. Bruce's present problem. These eggs must not be carted off to the various museums but preserved where they are as an added attraction to New Mexico and the great Southwest."
