

**JURY AWARDS SIX OF 10 PLAINTIFFS \$19,785 IN DAMAGES**

Jury trials of damage suits in which property owners along Sudderth Drive in Ruidoso sought money for payment of land taken and damages to property when the road was widened and improved awarded six of ten plaintiffs a total of \$19,785.00 last week in Third Judicial District Court in Carrizozo.

The trials were held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. One suit was heard by Judge George L. Reese, Jr., and he has not returned a decision in the case of Ben Rice's request for damages. Pat, Leon, Nora and Marie Farrar, owners of rental property and a sporting goods store, had asked for \$40,000.00 damages originally, and were awarded none by a jury. Robert Hollis, barber shop owner, had asked for \$2,000.00 and was awarded none; R. Dempsey Collins, owner of Thunderbird Curios, had asked for \$12,000.00 and was awarded none; H. C. Boyd, owner of Home and Auto Store, asked for \$3,500.00 and was awarded none.

Damages were awarded in the amount of \$11,700.00 to W. A. Carter of Midway Courts. He had been offered \$10,000.00 by the village of Ruidoso, but had sought \$27,000.00 in his suit. Mrs. Edith Johnson, seeking \$5,500.00, and who had been offered \$3,166.00 by the village, was awarded \$3,350.00. She operates the Cafeteria in downtown Ruidoso. Carl W. Estes, who had asked for \$35,000.00 was awarded \$1,845.00. W. J. Powell of White House Apartments had sued for \$13,000.00, had been offered \$1,500.00 and was awarded \$780.00. George T. Trimble, who has Win, Place and Snow, a cocktail lounge, had asked for \$50,000.00 and was awarded \$1,250.00. He had been offered \$1,306.00 by the village. Lowell Cunningham, who has Sunflower Courts, asked for \$3,500.00, and was awarded \$800.00.

John W. Thompson was the attorney for the Village of Ruidoso. Village officials attending the suit hearings included Mayor Bob Pearson, Trustees Tom W. Jones and Lloyd Davis, and City Engineer Jack Kannady.

Leonard Neal, appraiser for the village, received a fee of \$66.93 for his work, approved by the board of trustees last meeting.

**\$64,170 DAMAGE SUIT FILED BY RUIDOSOAN AFTER GAMBLING LOSSES**

A Ruidoso resident, H. C. Rice, has filed in Third Judicial District Court a civil suit seeking \$64,170.00 from a list of seven or eight defendants. The suit, filed in August, asks for a sum of \$10,995 which Rice alleges he lost through fraud and conspiracy. The balance of the sum being sued for is for punitive damages, Rice declared. Rice said his attorney is William W. Osborne of Roswell and that he employed him to file the suit as an outgrowth of losses he suffered in gambling at a local bar over a period of about a month in the summer of 1961. He made his first complaint to Assistant District Attorney Richard Parsons of Ruidoso, who filed gambling charges against the several men Rice alleged fleeced him. Several of them were arrested and they were found guilty in court and they were found guilty and fined in trials in Carrizozo in Third Judicial District court.

The Lincoln County district court clerk filed the news Wednesday this week Rice had not demanded a jury trial yet, but Rice told a jury trial in his civil suit. On record in district court clerk's office are these names as defendants: Leon Watte, Frank Graham and Jack Newsum, who have employed C. C. Chase, Jr., as their attorney to answer the suit; Bob Hill, who has employed Albert Rivera as his attorney and Leon Hoyle, who has employed Neal and Neal. Rice said there were other men named in the suit as defendants. He also said there were "six or seven girls" who assisted in the fraud and conspiracy's store last Sunday despite a severe snow storm, and will be coming to Ruidoso this Sunday for a winter fete from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Old Mill. The Pete Gillespies report they will be in Ruidoso Dec. 24 through 31 and will have their Youth Center open in the evenings. Ruidoso Board of Trustees, recently voted \$489 for new street lighting here. They also have approved transfer of liquor license here from Virgil Connors to Ray Bissell. Trustees Tom W. Jones and Lloyd Davis have made trips recently to Santa Fe and to Fort Worth in regard to the possibility of the village of Ruidoso acquiring some land in Gavilan canyon. Ruidoso Village officials are most happy—and especially is Clerk James L. Hine, over State Auditor Robert Casner's approval of the audit of the village's books for 1960-61, conducted by the firm of Bassett, Johnson and Deason, certified public accountants. Another item of city business. The village officials are seeking information on the cost of some snow plows. Wonder why?

**15 Contractors Bid On Hotel Mechanical Jobs**

Bids were opened on Dec. 12 in Ruidoso at the construction of the Cree Manor Hotel overlooking Cree Meadows Golf Course and the White Mountains for the Ruidoso Enterprises, Inc. Bud Reeves of Williams & Reeves, Architects and Engineers of Dallas, Tex., conducted the bid opening. The apparent low bidder on the electrical installations for the hotel was Gamble Electric Co. of Albuquerque, with a bid of \$79,300.00. Apparent low bidder on combination plumbing, heating and air conditioning was Alma-Torres Co. of Fort Worth, Tex. with a bid of \$198,170.00. Kitchen Equipment: Dallas Fountain and Fixture Co. of Dallas, Tex., \$47,300.00. A total of 15 contractors submitted bids. The general contract for construction of the building will be negotiated. It was reported by Carl DeBord of Ruidoso Enterprises, Inc. Estimated time for the construction of the entire project is 10 months, DeBord declared.

**Heavy Snows Delay Opening Of Ski Resort**

A pair of unpredicted early snowfalls in the White Mountains near Ruidoso before Thanksgiving and last week brought seven and a half feet of snow to the Sierra Blanca Recreation Area, being developed by Sierra Blanca Corporation into a fabulous winter and summer resort, and has caused postponement of the opening date first set for Dec. 16 until Saturday, Dec. 23 for the ski facility.

President of Sierra Blanca Corporation Kingsbury Pitcher said this week it was probably the best advertising a new ski resort could have—no snow. He expects a late opening next week because of too much snow. The seven and a half feet of snow has settled down to a level of approximately four to five feet at this time, assuring skiers a wonderful snow pack for a very long season. Ruidoso received a total of four inches of precipitation in rain and snow while the Sierra Blanca area was covered with an additional 40 inches last week-end. The ski resort is at an elevation of about 11,000 feet in the Ruidoso section of 16 miles from the mountain resort, is at an elevation of 7,000 feet.

There has been such a heavy snow cover in the Sierra Blanca recreation area that the final finishing touches on some of the operations in the entire park which are to be opened to the public are being rushed to a point of being used for serving "snack-stand" type lunches, and to serve as offices and headquarters for ski rental and ski equipment sales needs. Buildings for this purpose, which will include a large ski rental shop, etc., will be built during the next few months to be ready for the 1962-63 winter season.

The main purpose now in opening with limited building facilities is to let many hundreds of skiers and snowmobilers know that the area so they might know what can be expected in this new sport for the region. There will be three T-bar lifts in operation on the opening date, and there will be qualified skiing instructors and there will be ski rental facilities, and despite the delay in opening and the delay, also, in finishing some of the construction.

The 12 mile access road from Alto is being put in readiness to allow safe travel into the park. It has been a daily maintenance activity through months of work by Adams Construction Co., and will be completed by the Dec. 23 week-end, Pitcher declared.

In connection with the announcement of the postponement of the opening, Sierra Blanca Corporation this week mailed 5,000 letters concerning the new date, along with Ruidoso brochures and other information to a mailing list of confirmed ski enthusiasts in a wide area of the Southwest. A copy of the letter follows:

**BANK INCREASES SAVINGS INTEREST, UPS STOCK DIVIDENDS, ELECTS NEW DIRECTOR IN BUSY BOARD MEET**

Ruidoso State Bank board of directors Tuesday evening this week went through an item-packed agenda which saw the board take several actions. Voted to increase interest on savings deposits, possibly those that are \$2,500 or larger, from 3 1/2% to 4%; elected a new board member to fill a vacancy; decided to pay a special stock dividend of 3 1/2% on the 1961 stock owned by C. A. Culver, cooperative member to replace outworn and outdated equipment.

In the increase in interest, it was voted to put a new rate of 3 1/2% to 4% in effect Jan. 1, 1962, to be paid under the plan to be outlined by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. T. B. Hood, executive vice-president, said the greater interest will likely start on those savings deposits that are \$2,500 or larger, he said, and whether they will earn 3 1/2% or 4% will depend on whether the board desires for six months or a year. Hood said the policy will be explained fully in a letter to all of the bank's customers and through advertising later this month.

Jack Stewart, El Paso and Alto resident, was elected to the board of the bank, succeeding Warren Tucker. Stewart has a wholesale oil company in El Paso and owns property in the Eagle Creek area.

New posting equipment has been ordered to cost about \$10,000, and to replace outworn machines. The institution has used its opening eight years ago. The latest models in such equipment will also speed up this department in the bank, and care for an ever-growing load of work, it was stated.

The board set the ninth annual stockholders meeting for Saturday, Jan. 13 at 1 p.m., the first time the annual meeting has been on a week-end. It usually is held in mid-week.

A special \$250 per share dividend has been authorized for stockholders to be paid at year-end, and a regular \$250 per share semi-annual dividend will also be in checks to be sent out. Total to be paid holders of 1,625 shares will be \$412,000, Hood said.

**Snowfall this Winter May Set a Record Here**

**Ruidoso Moisture Measures 4 Inches in 10 Days**  
 Residents of this area awake Thursday morning this week to find another snowstorm had moved in and had dumped about three inches of new snow during the night in the Ruidoso Village limits. Snowfall this winter measured by C. A. Culver, cooperative observer for the U. S. Department of Commerce weather bureau, totals a little more than 30 inches in Ruidoso, as compared with 40 inches throughout all of the winter of 1960-61. A new record may be in the making if the pattern already set is followed the next several months.

Moisture received in Ruidoso in a ten-day period has totaled more than four inches, including a thorough soaking during a rain which preceded an eight-inch snowfall last week-end.

**Apache Reservation To Get Federal Aid On Development Plan**

An Over-All Economic Development Plan (OEDP) submitted by the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation under the Area Redevelopment Act has been approved in Washington. Merle Tucker, director of the State Department Development, announced the federal approval last week.

The OEDP was submitted by the Southern New Mexico Indian Reservation Oct. 16 to the Department of Development. The DOD approved the program and sent it on to Washington.

The program submitted by the reservation was the second New Mexico program to receive federal approval. Socorro County was the first area to submit a program which was approved.

Tribal President Fred Pellman, as spokesman for the Reservation, listed four points upon which the Mescaleros seek help. These are: 1. Loans for expansion of existing plants or construction of new ones. 2. Loans for constructing facilities such as water, sewage, drainage, etc. 3. Job retaining, subsistence. 4. Technical assistance in solving problems.

Many of the Mescalero Indians have in the recent past worked on jobs at Holloman Air Force Base and nearby White Sands Missile Proving Grounds.

**Four of Seven Local Band Members Make All-State**

Four Ruidoso School band members out of seven who attended trials in Roswell High School Saturday for chances to perform in the New Mexico All-State Band next spring were picked. Director Leroy Gooch announced Monday. Getting berths on the all-state band were Ingrid Vanderstok, a freshman, and Ruidoso's first freshman to earn this honor, rated as second flute; Wendy Lamb, first clarinet; Joyce Lackey and Cheryl Curry, fourth french horns. Others at the trials were Tom Tully, Pat Lamb and Carol Lynn Wright.

**New Vehicle Stickers Go On Sale Today**

Stickers for motor vehicles, to be pasted on the lower right hand corner of the present metal tag, go on sale today for 1962. James L. Hine, Ruidoso Village Clerk, said this week. He urges all owners of vehicles to save the registration forms mailed them from the state license bureau and bring them with them when buying the new stickers. "It will save time for all of us," he said. He added that the new stickers must be on vehicle tags no later than March 2, the deadline, and that stickers must be paid for with cash. "We cannot accept checks for vehicle registration," he warned.

### Sudderth Says State to Maintain New Mountain Road

John Sudderth, State Highway Commissioner for Southeastern New Mexico, told the Ruidoso News by telephone Wednesday that it will be the state's job to maintain the new access road into White Mountain Park where Sierra Blanca Corporation is building a winter sports and summer recreation area. He said the highway department would accept the task of clearing the road of snow, as is done by the department on state roads into Taos, Red River, Santa Fe and Albuquerque ski areas. He said the new road, built by the state highway department but with funds provided by the U. S. Forest Service, the Sierra Blanca Corporation and the state, will have a state designation number.

He said the highway department maintenance crews would have to concentrate on the most pressing needs in clearing snow on routes in his district, and that he was hoping additional equipment could be secured to help get the road into White Mountain Park cleared of snow as soon as any other traffic artery.

**Postmaster Exam Set In January At Ft. Stanton**

An examination for Postmaster at Fort Stanton, at a salary of \$4,600 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until Jan. 2, 1963, the Civil Service Commission announced. This examination has been announced under revised qualifications standards recently agreed upon between the Commission and the Post Office Department.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least one year of experience (education about high school level may be substituted for six months of experience) showing that they have the ability to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can meet and deal with the public agreeably and effectively.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of their ratings on the experience and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the postoffice for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.
