Texas Visitor Electrocuted On Holiday Visit To Ruidoso

A Texas man was electrocuted Monday when a television antenna he was erecting fell against a power line at his trailer home in Ponderosa Heights here. Doyle Robert Allen, 30, Sudan, Tex., was dead on arrival at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital shortly after noon. Ruidoso City Marshal Bob Jurney said the television antenna fell over against a 7300-volt power line. Clinton Chandler of Sudan, who was helping Allen, received superficial burns as did Doyle Robert Allen, Jr., and Clint Chandler, sons of the two men who were playing in a nearby tree.

The three were treated at the Ruidoso hospital and released. Max McCoy and John Sigler, employees of Community Public Service Co., said that both Chandler and Jurney attempted two types of a artificial respiration on the victim prior to his being taken to the hospital. The man received the shock at about 12:30, noon. He was pronounced dead at about 1:30 by a local physician summoned to the scene. The two utility company workmen said the short caused by the antenna on the powerline knocked out electric service for an area of about a mile in Ponderosa Heights.

HAAKE LOW BIDDER ON ROAD JOB

Floyd Haake, construction contractor of Ruidoso and Santa Fe, was apparent low bidder last Friday on a seal job on U. S. Highway 70 for 3 1/2 miles running east from Hollywood through Ruidoso Downs. His bid was \$29,410.00, as compared with the engineer's cost estimate of \$21,350.00. Another bidder, Universal Grading Co., submitted a proposed cost of \$33,222.50.

Haake, successful bidder on the new Ruidoso airport job, and also the contractor for Boulder Drive four-lane paving in 1960, will probably start his crew on the job about mid-September.

All-American QH Sale Totals \$212,900 Thursday

Sixty-eight quarter horses auctioned last Thursday at Ruidoso Downs brought a total gross sale price of \$212,900.

Thomas McKay, Frankfort, Ill., purchased 19 horses at the sale for a total price of \$80,850. He is chairman of the board of directors of the Illinois Quarter Horse Racing Association which is a newly formed group pushing for quarter horse racing in Illinois.

McKay paid the top individual price at the auction. He purchased Nela Charge from Hugh Huntley of Madera, Calif., for \$20,000. He also paid \$14,500 for Easter Charge, another Huntley colt, and bought up \$12,000 for Sun Deep, consigned by Clyde Jennings of Corpus Christi, Tex.

Hagen Livestock Co. of Los Angeles paid \$10,000 for Go For Gold, a Go Man Go colt consigned by Quinby Farms of Denver.

The sale averaged \$3,130.58 per sale. State Senator Vince Lee of Otero county purchased three quarter horses, buying Mr. Pinky Bar, owned by Kaufman & Paxson, Inc., Madera, Calif., for \$3,500.

McKay also purchased Bright Deck, owned by H. B. Shaw, Tulare, for \$3,000.

Gerald Marr, Tulare, purchased McHutchins from W. H. Moore, Miami, Tex., for \$1,000.

Officers Investigate Shooting

State's Policeman Ken Shockey and Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Jack Bryan Monday evening questioned Graclano Mendoza, 28, of Dexter, who allegedly pointed a .22 pistol at his left side and fired it once in front of witnesses near the entrance to Ruidoso Downs race track.

Shockey told the News after talking with two witnesses the man told them "I want you to see me kill myself." The shooting occurred about 8:30 p.m. and the officers talked about 9:30 p.m. at the hospital with Mendoza and his two companions, Cecelia Gallegos of San Patricio and Ruidoso and a man named Torres, of Tulare.

Mendoza is in Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital in serious condition, a local physician said. He underwent an operation shortly after the shooting—but the bullet, which had lodged in the abdomen, had not been removed. It was removed Tuesday.

Shockey said any further investigation of the affair will be handled through the office of Assistant District Attorney Richard Parsons.

Village Trustees Change Minutes On Bobo's 'Leave of Absence'; Re-instate Phrase on Time

Ruidoso's Board of Trustees in its regular meeting Thursday night last week heard a review of its minutes of a special called meeting of a week previous in which Village Marshal J. P. Bobo was given a "leave of absence" and voted to insert the wording, "until the next political election." The board's action acceded to the former marshal's request. Bobo was represented by Attorney Richard Parsons, who stated that Bobo understood the board's right and privilege in hiring or firing, and that Bobo had no cause for objection to this, but that he had heard as many as three members of the city's original family say that the original motion concerning Bobo's "leave of absence" had contained the phrase "for 90 days, or until the election." He was insisting that this part of the motion be re-inserted in the minutes. A reading of the minutes at the opening of the session had revealed the phrase was not included.

The former village marshal is a candidate for Sheriff of Lincoln County on the Democratic ticket. Bobo was represented by about 20 friends at the meeting, one of whom was quite heated in his remarks concerning the board's action in giving Bobo the "leave of absence." E. H. Starr was the speaker who complained that the board was unfair and unethical in "firing Bobo when he was out of town." Bobo had requested permission to leave town to seek medical attention for an injury he had suffered in the line of duty, and the board's move to give him the "leave of absence" was what he was gone, Starr pointed out. "Bobo has served the Village of Ruidoso faithfully for more than seven years and he has kept gambling and prostitution out of the village and restrained juveniles better than any other municipality in the state," Starr declared in his opening remarks. He pointed out that he thought the board's action was political in view of Bobo's candidacy.

Former State Policeman Bob Jurney was employed as village marshal the night Bobo was voted his "leave of absence." During last week's board meeting, he asked to be re-assured his job was not for "just 90 days only." Mayor J. W. Tucker told him "the only way Bobo can go back to work is to re-apply for the job, and we will then determine whether to re-employ him."

Friends of Bobo, including Starr, this week asked if the proper interpretation of the term "leave of absence" was that given college professors who return to work after given leave of absence for research or other work. Starr said he interpreted Bobo's "leave" as being the same as being fired—and that it has a different meaning, that of temporary leave from work, such as sick leave, in other cases.

Other business talked included discussion of possibility of exchanging land needed for the airport with White Mountain Development Co. also an expression of opinion that cable television service in Ruidoso had not been improved appreciably, approved the final part of a report of lots 30-49 block G, lots 8-21 and lots 22-25, block J, Ruidoso Pipe Lodge addition.

A discussion was also held on the Johnny Williams tract of land south of Cree Meadows golf course, once proposed as a future civic center site. The city's need for an auditorium for conventions and other events, and a swimming pool were noted by Trustee Lloyd Davys who said an individual had proposed construction of such in that area.

The board voted to pay Bobo time for his leave before the session ended.

Caution Lights Planned in Gateway

Two caution lights will be installed at strategic places on Boulder Drive in Palmer Gateway, the Village of Ruidoso board of trustees decided in its meeting last Thursday night. The installation is on recommendation of Marshal Bob Jurney. Other recommendations Jurney proposed which were adopted were: Employment of a combination daytime dispenser and filling clerk; put in operation an accurate filling system on all cases handled; place a siren on Police Car No. 2; give police a day off as soon as a plan can be worked out; begin forwarding copies of reports on accidents to Santa Fe as required in the state statutes; re-painting of faded pedestrian crosswalk markers, and identifying traffic zones; new uniforms for police. 4-Day Handle At Ruidoso Downs Hits \$1,443,912

Two headline stories explored out of Monday's Labor Day holiday racing program at Ruidoso Downs.

Hustling Man, a Texas two-year old from the J. B. Ferguson farm near Wharton, won the fourth annual All-American Quarter Horse Futurity, the third richest race in the U. S. this season, to earn more than \$80,000 first money.

The four-day holiday week-end saw the largest crowds, and the greatest pari-mutuel handle for a like period of time, in the race track's history.

Perfect weather favored the big events of the week-end to lend a helping hand to establishing the all-time high in attendance and betting.

Friday's crowd, estimated at 2,200, bet \$27,406. Saturday's attendance was figured at 2,350 people with the betting total at \$30,040 but Sunday saw a whole of a different and a betting handle that set a new record for the track of \$427,010. The record stood for only one day, however, as Monday's crowd of nearly 8,000 fans pushed \$109,457 through the machines for a grand total of \$1,443,912. The season's total now stands at \$11,567,189, a low three-thirds above the 1950 total of \$11,567,445.

Hustling Man had already won five races out of 12 starts, placed twice and had shown three times and had earned \$4,846 to date. The first prize money in the Labor Day classic amounted to \$26,425. His (Continued to Page 5)

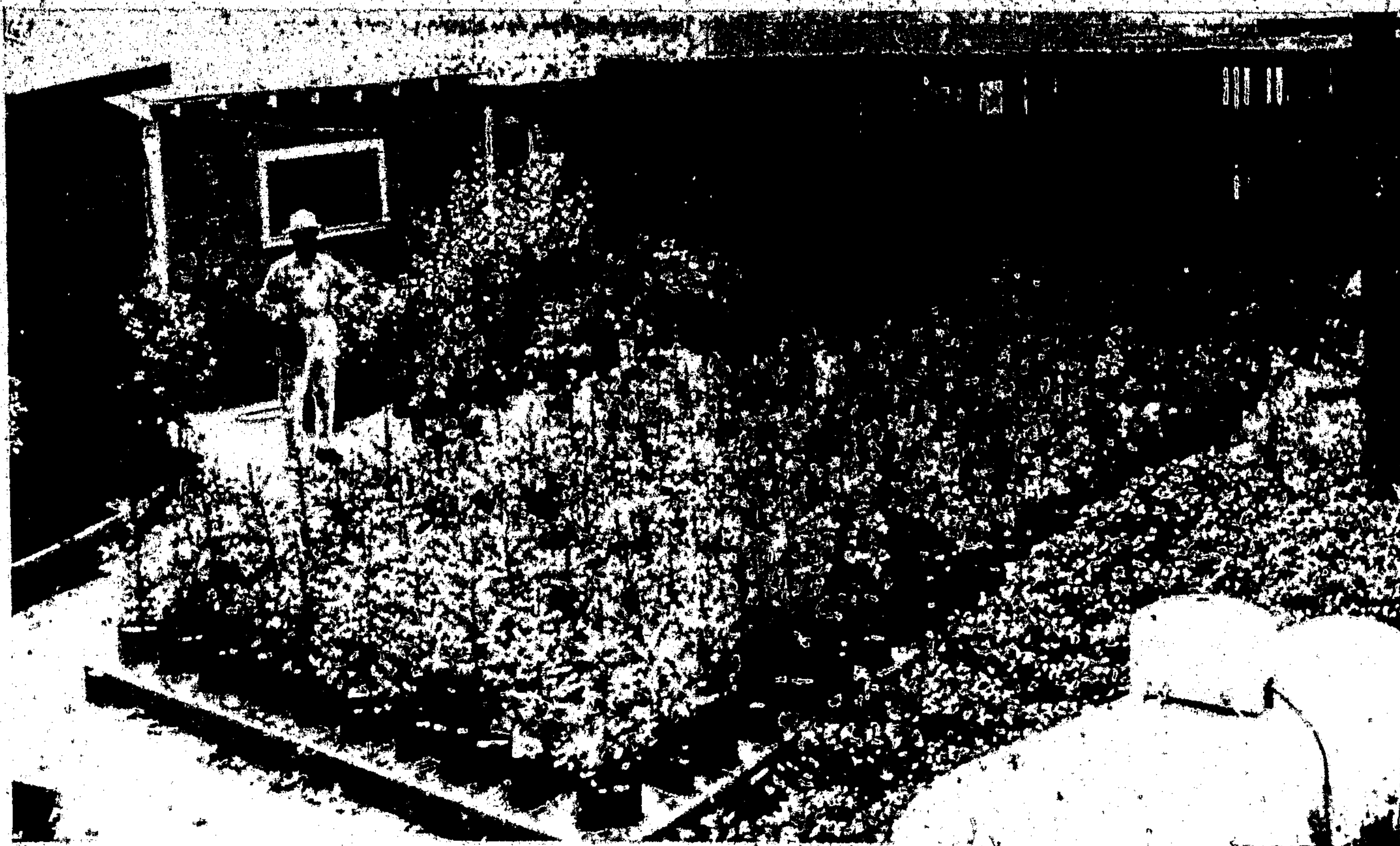

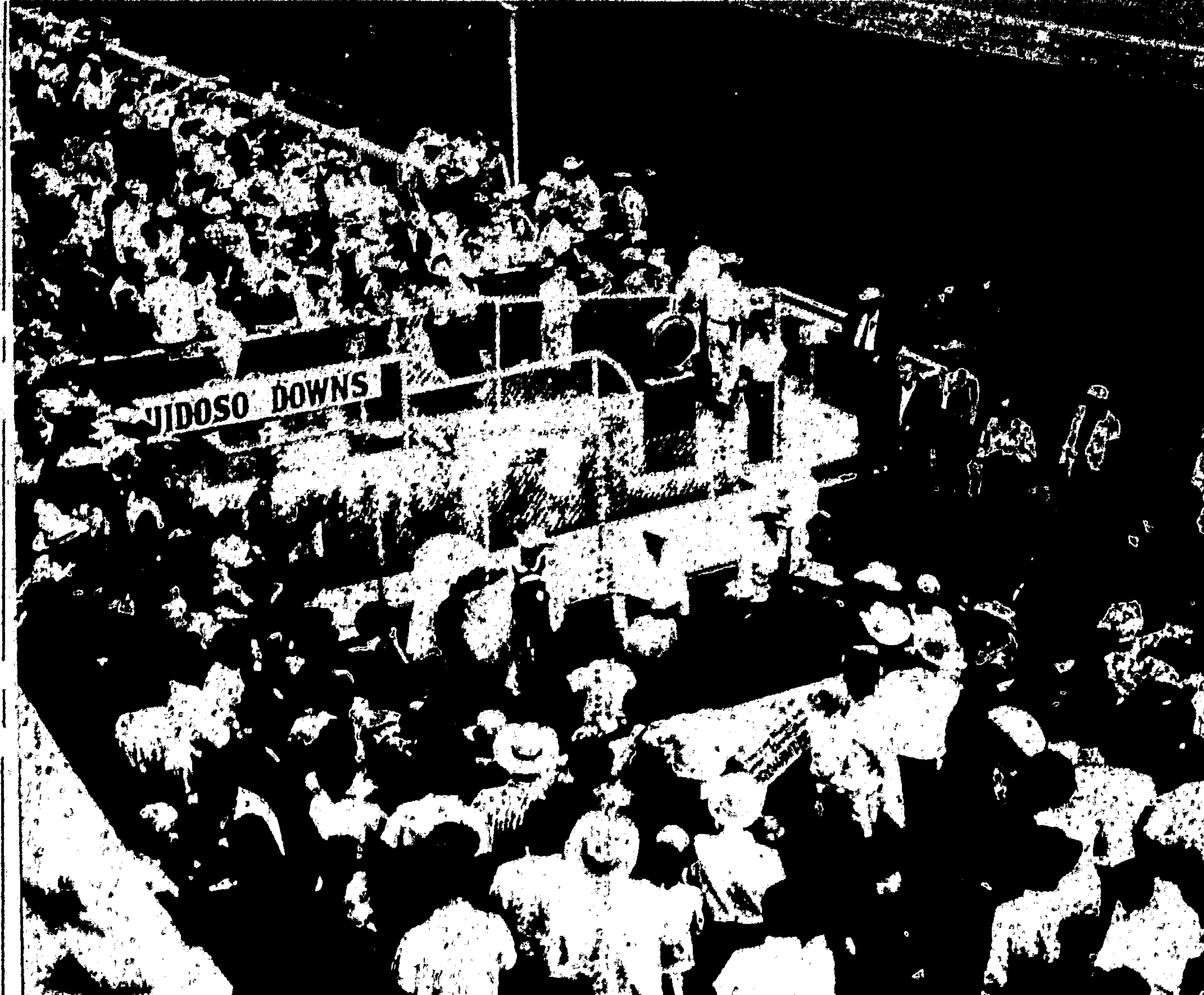

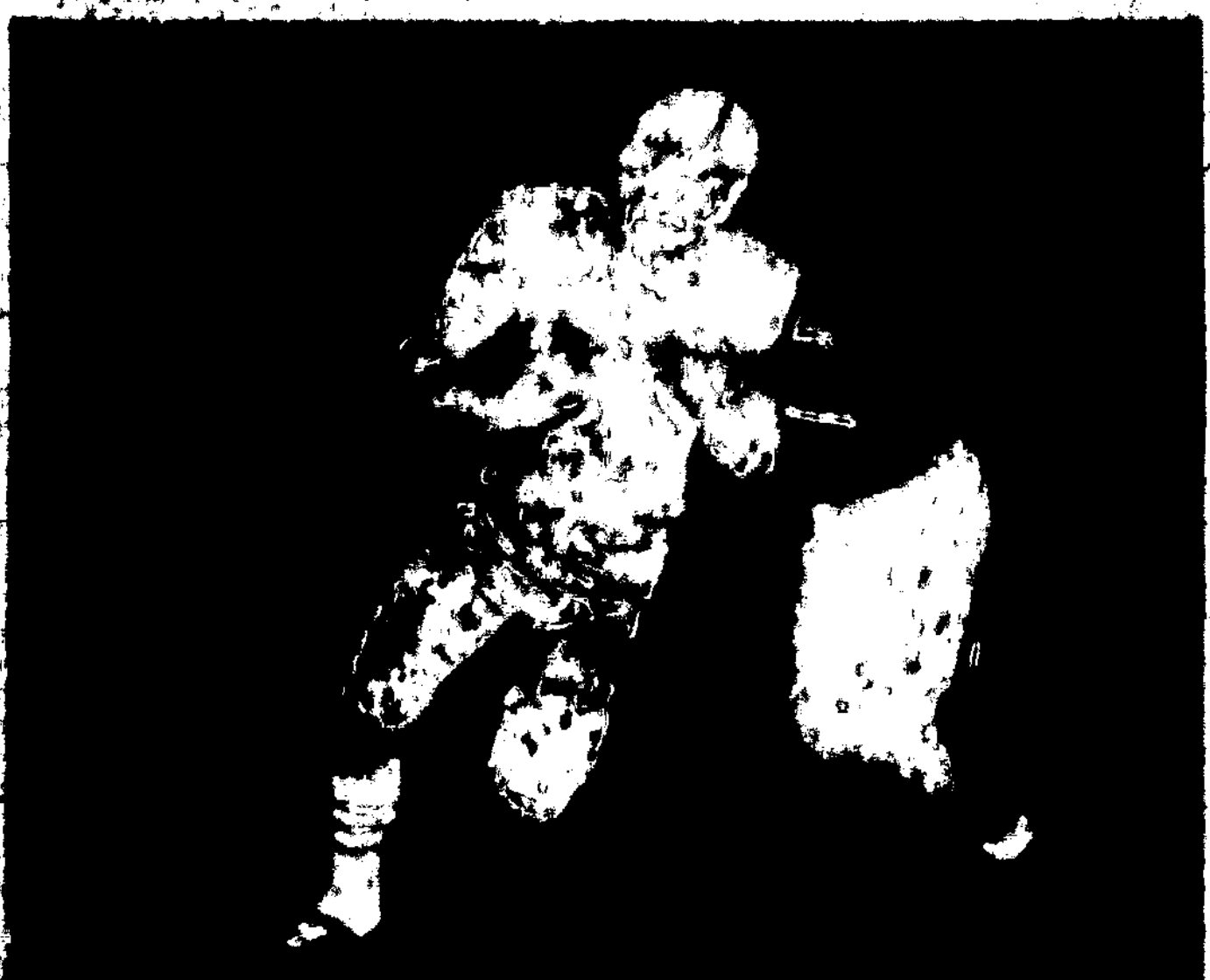

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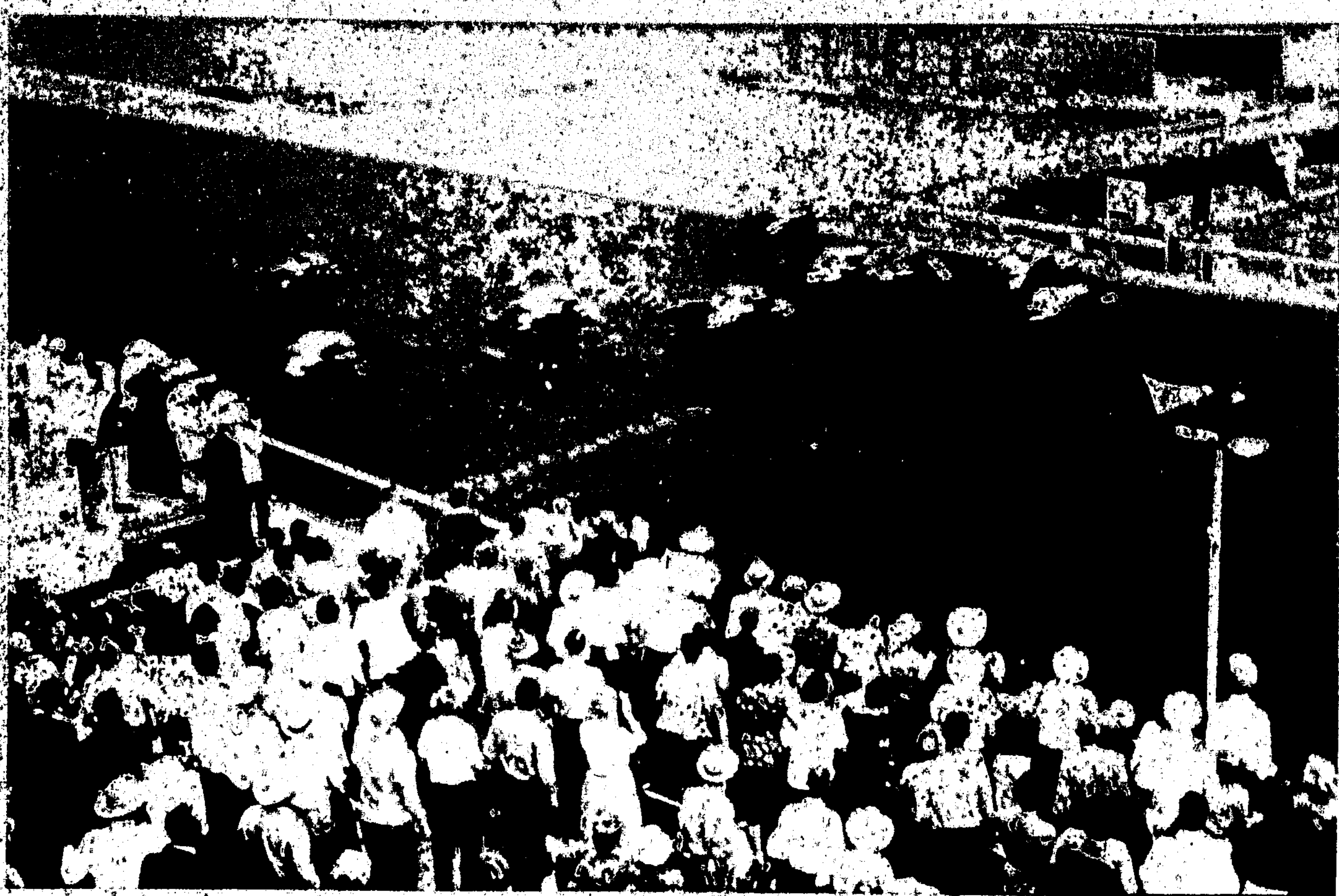

The fans had to wait several minutes until stewards viewed movies of the race when an inquiry was asked on Hustling Man's veering to the side as he spurted from the starting gate. The inquiry was over very quickly and the winner was cleared.

Another royally-bred youngster, a colt by the great Go Man Go out of the swift Diamond Mae, Hustling Man led all the qualifiers for the All-American when he staved off Little Chloe to win by a head in 20.44 seconds for 400 yards. Hustling Man is owned by the man who bred, developed and raced Go Man Go, generally recognized as the fastest "blur in the stretch" in quarter horse racing history. Ferguson also "dabbles" in oil, cattle, etc., and has taken quite a fancy to the fact that Hustling Man already has had a song written about him—it's called "Hustling Man," oddly enough—by western warbler Ray Reed. Hidden in most of his races by Cliffon Delege, Hustling Man was reined to victory in his Trial division by Efrain "Chum-lino" Garza, pinch-hitting while Delege was setting out a 10-day

WARRIORS OPEN GRID SEASON WITH 6-0 WIN OVER CAPITAN

Instead of footballs flying through the air, flags from the hip pockets of referees dominated the action of the first game of the new season as the Ruidoso Warriors downed the Capitan Tigers at Capitan last Friday night, 6-0.

The Warriors received 130 yards in penalties while Capitan picked up 85 in setbacks for a total of 215 yards stepped off against both teams.

Winner of the second spot and \$42,427 prize money was Tiny Charger, bred by his owner, Frank Vessels, Sr. and Jr., operators of the quarter horse meeting at Los Alamitos, Calif. They also own the Western Stables there. D. Cochola was on board in the race. The trainer was Chuck Tallafiero. Bar Depth Gets \$34,713.

Third prize of \$34,317 went to Bar Depth, owned by Lester Goodson, Magnolia, Tex. Trainer was Clarence Graham and the jockey who showed was H. Page. Goodson is an auto dealer at Houston and former American Quarter Horse Association president.

Lightning Belle Fourth Getting fourth place money was Lightning Belle, ridden by S. Smith, and earning \$19,285. L. R. French, Odessa, Tex., is owner and Jerry Fisher was trainer. Her jockey was national quarter horse champion rider in 1961.

There were cash prizes for the other six racers, also. Mister Juniper Bar got \$9,000 for fifth and Little Chloe won sixth and \$7,000.

Dan's Sugar Bar took seventh place money of \$5,000. Christy Go finished eighth, winning \$1,000. Will Win was ninth. Big Reward was last.

Before the first game jitters took over, the Warriors scored the only touchdown on the fourth play from scrimmage with a 52 yard scamper by Halfback David Scott. Scott broke through the right side of the Tiger defense behind good blocking to race half of the field to paydirt.

Seven Warrior drives were stopped by penalties during the contest with the Ruidoso crew finding itself with a first down and 25 yards to go several times.

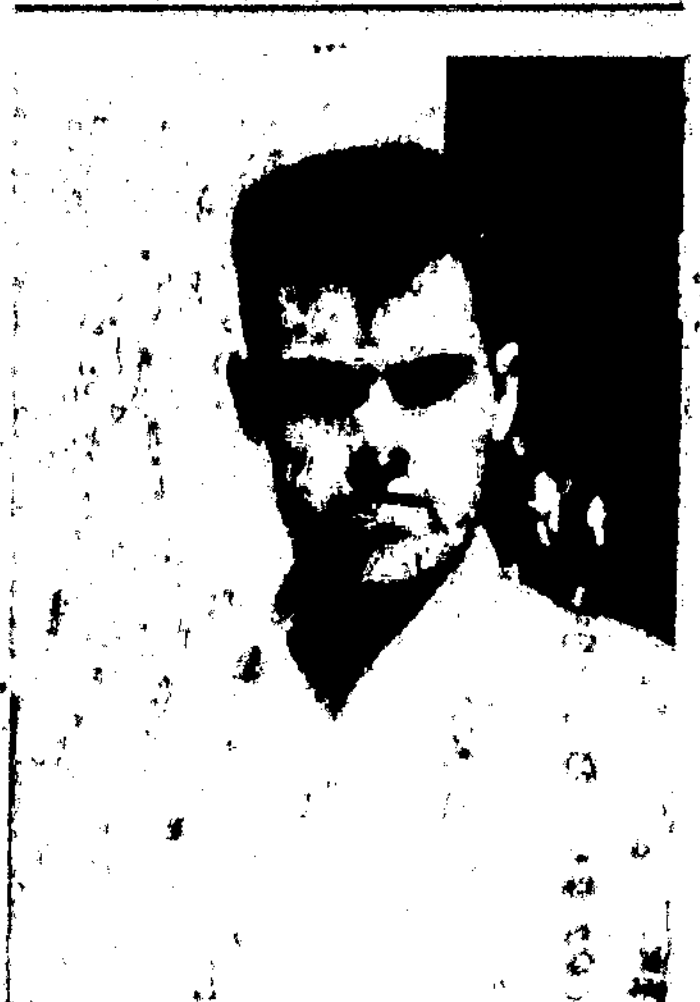
Capitan made only one threat which came in the second quarter when the Warriors were forced to kick and a pass from center was dropped. The Tigers took over on their own 40 yard line and with the assistance of penalties, two nice gains by halfback Leo Lujan, and quarterback David Silva, Coach Wally Ferguson's charges marched to the Ruidoso 15-yard line only to be stopped by penalties themselves.

Practically all of the game was played in the center of the field in the second half as Capitan moved the ball only as far as the Ruidoso 37 where once again flags thrown by the referees interrupted the Tigers' last chance to install a drive.

Late in the fourth period the Warriors drove to the Tiger 27 yard line in one of the longest series of plays of the night only to wind up again with a 15 yard penalty for offensive holding to end the march.

The Warriors picked up 10 first downs to the Tigers' seven and the locals also led in total yardage gained with 188. Capitan attempted two of them for a total of 40 yards to end Kenny Cozens. Ruidoso attempted six passes and connected for only one.

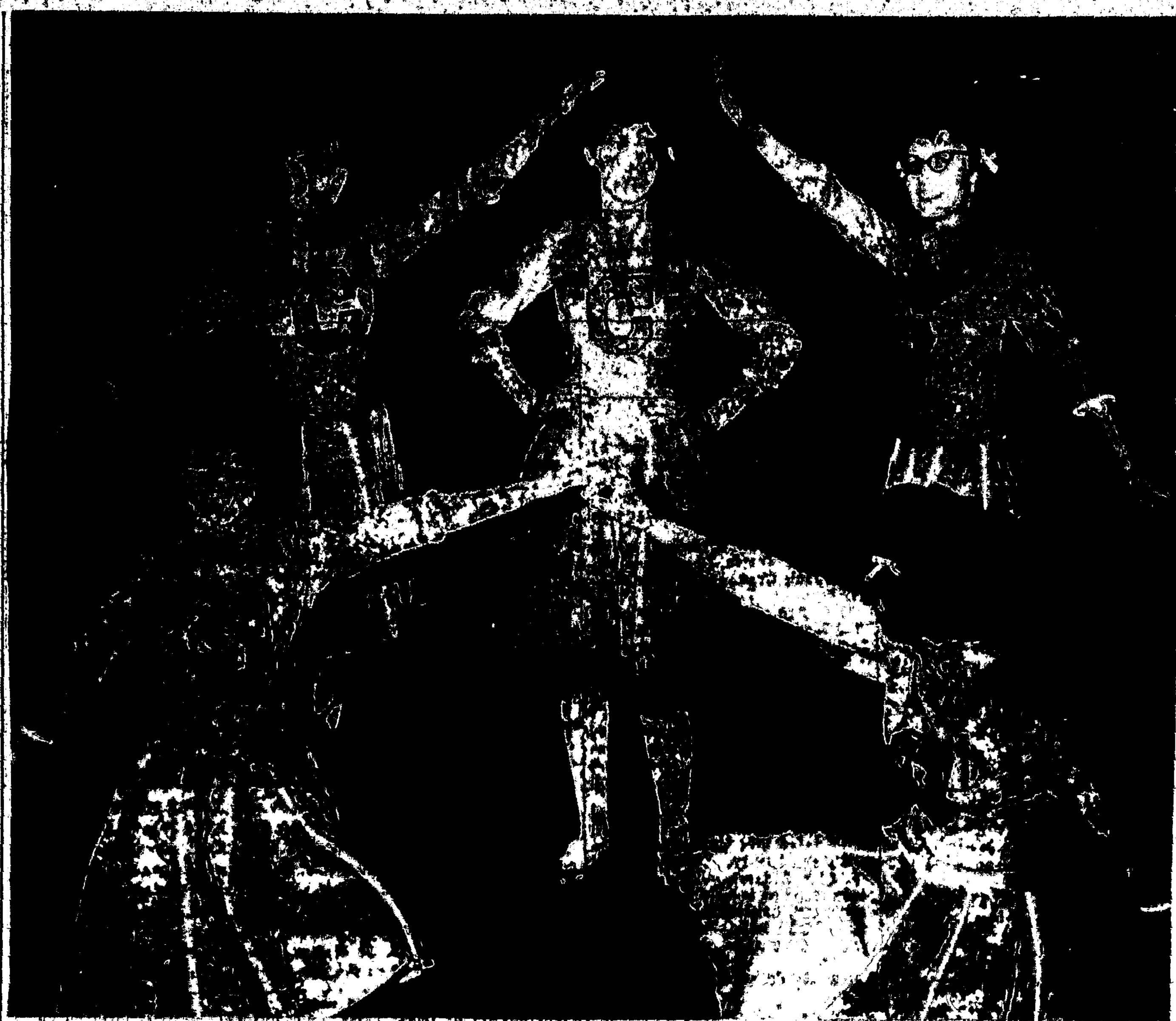

Almost a third of a million dollars in purses and premiums; new stalls and new facilities; and even a brand new futurity event, are all set for the 1962 show.

The addition of two new breeds—the Appaloosa and the Tennessee Walker—at last year's fair added new horsemaster interest to the New Mexico State Fair and made it one of the big horse shows in the country.

should make the 1962 exposition even bigger, Dillon says. Here's the outlook for the Sept. 12-22 show, as far as horsemaster are concerned.
Purses at the track should reach about \$270,000, and added on to the \$21,726 in the horse departments will bring cash awards for the richest season yet at the New Mexico State Fair.
New construction on the grounds this year has resulted in additional livestock facilities, which in

turn have added about 100 new stalls for horses, bringing the total facilities to house horses to more than 1,600 individual units.
New facilities are provided this year to make for easier, more comfortable space for animals. Included are items for easier feed storage, handler disposal of waste materials and similar time and space savers.
Last year, approximately 2,400 horses were featured in show rings and on the race track. This figure includes about 750 animals exclusively on the track.
A similar capacity crowd of horses is anticipated for the 1962 show.

Naturally, a great deal of interest at the New Mexico State Fair is on the one-mile track, which regularly produces one of the richest and biggest—yet briefest—race meets in the southwest.
Last year the pari-mutuel handle was almost \$4 million, and expectations are that this will be higher than ever again in 1962.
Purse schedules have been increased for the 11-day meet, with a daily card of 12 races planned again this season.
Of interest to many horsemen is the addition this year of the staging of the first world-wide Appaloosa Futurity under the pari-mutuel setup. The event is planned for Monday, Sept. 17, the fifth day of the 1962 fair, with about three dozen horses competing for more than \$10,000 in purses.
The event is of interest to Appaloosa breeders in particular because of the fact that the race will be a milestone in the career of the breed. Appaloosas made their first appearance in the show ring of the 1961 Fair and resulted in much favorable comment.
Another new breed, shown for the first time this year, is the Morgan horse, which will be featured in show competition on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 15-16.
One of the big drawing cards at the State Fair is the horse shows and the daily competitions staged in Tingley Coliseum always attract much interest and spectators.
Again this year, a full slate of daily events are scheduled in the coliseum for horse breeders and horse lovers.
These are the breeds that will again this year be prominently represented, in addition to Morgans and Appaloosas: Quarter Horses, Palominos, Arabians, Tennessee Walkers, Cutting Horses and Hunters and Jumpers.
Popular at the State Fair are the many junior classes, which always offer a strong spirit of competition to younger horse raisers.
Plans call for a premium outlay of \$21,726 plus trophies, ribbons and awards in the show rings of the 1962 exposition.
Horses also figure prominently in the popular nine-day championship rodeo competitions at the State Fair, with another 300 animals involved. These include the tough rugged animals in saddle and bareback bronc riding, plus the animals used by the participating cowboys.

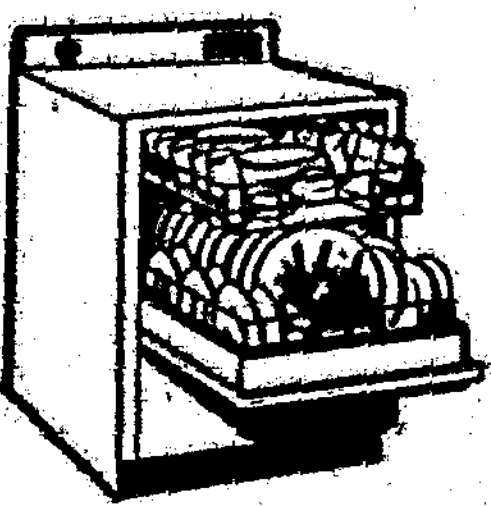

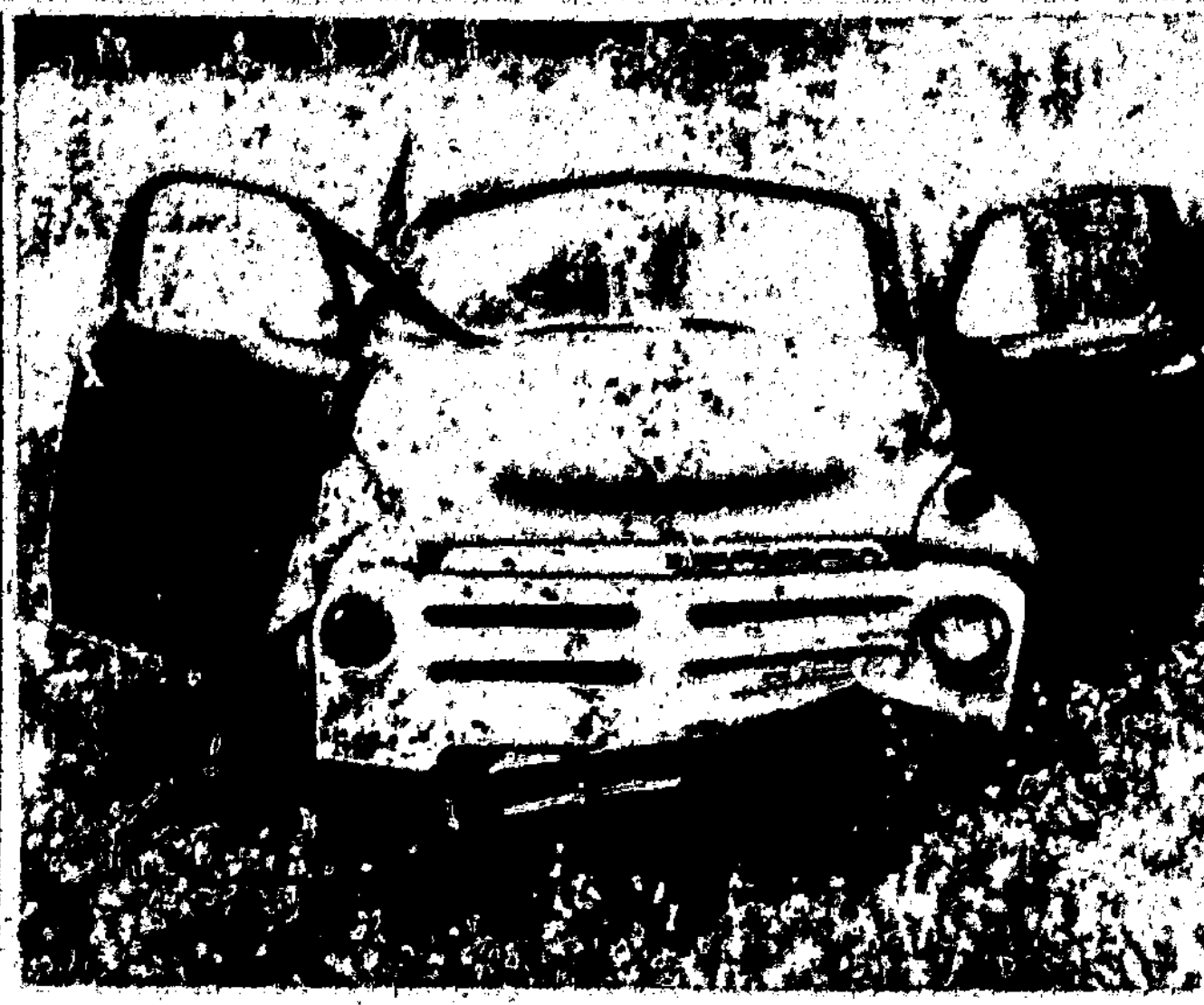

'Uncle Felix' Miller Rites in Tularosa

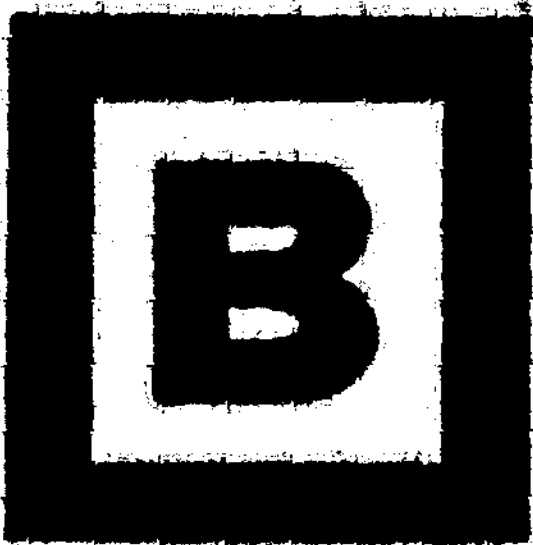

after a period of being the governess, tutor and nursemaid for the daughter of a wealthy family. When the son of the wealthy parents came home from the university he skated and danced with Manya, fell in love with her and asked her to marry him. His parents roared their disapproval, declaring that their son could not marry a girl who had neither money nor social position.

While Manya Sklodowska was hurt, she had too much pride and real character to allow disappointment in love or even the fact that she had neither money nor social position to destroy her. She left Poland and started a new life in France as a student of science in the University of Paris. She did not enjoy any kind of scholarship or government grant. She paid her way with the money she had saved as a governess plus a little help from her father, who was a mathematics teacher. Hers was a life of personal hardship, a life that only a dedicated scholar would endure.

About three years after she entered the university, she met and married the only kind of a man with whom a girl of her character could be truly happy. Manya Sklodowska became Madam Curie. The story has been told many times, of how the bitter struggle of Madam Curie and her husband went on for years. She and her husband, a distinguished scientist himself, labored sacrificially and often with heart aches to produce the first small particle of radium.

It was the only way they could prove their theory that an undiscovered element accounted for the light rays emanating from uranium. They knew the value of their discovery but they made no effort to hold it for profit to themselves nor to patent their process. They gave it unreservedly to the world. Relatively modest financial rewards did come to Madam Curie. She received the Nobel prize for physics in 1903 and the same prize for chemistry in 1911. Of course, the world did bestow a full share

of honor and distinction. It is significant that Madam Curie believed the happiest years of her life were not the earlier years that followed achievement, but those years when she and her husband were struggling toward their great discovery.

Thus, did Manya Sklodowska run her obstacle course of a peculiar name, the absence of money and social rank, disappointment in her first love, and through dedication and self-giving, proved the world with the great discovery of radium and its attendant blessings. Most of the things we think are difficult

are as nothing compared to what many bright-shining lives have overcome and have gone on to world-known victories. "Let us run with patience the race that is set before us." St. Paul

The weather for August of 1947 was reported as almost normal. The highest temperature was 90 which was reached on two different days, and the lowest was 42 degrees. Total rainfall for the month measured 3.54 inches.

El Morro . . . Inscription Rock! These are magic names. For here in western New Mexico, the early Spanish explorers, carved the record of their passing.

In the shadow of the great rock, alongside the pool of sweet water, Coronado camped in 1540. The Rodriguez Expedition made camp here in 1570. And in 1605, the first Spanish governor of New Mexico stood at the base of the rock, and with a dagger point carved in the soft stone the famous inscription "Paso por aqui . . ."

"Here," the message translates, "passed the Governor Don Juan de Oñate from the discovery of the Sea of the South on the 16th of April of 1605."

Throughout the centuries that followed, the rock was the best known landmark on the trail. More

than 400 parties in all left their "signatures" on it.

Today, this first written record in New Mexico is preserved for all time by the National Park Service, for El Morro is now a National Monument, a shrine of history.

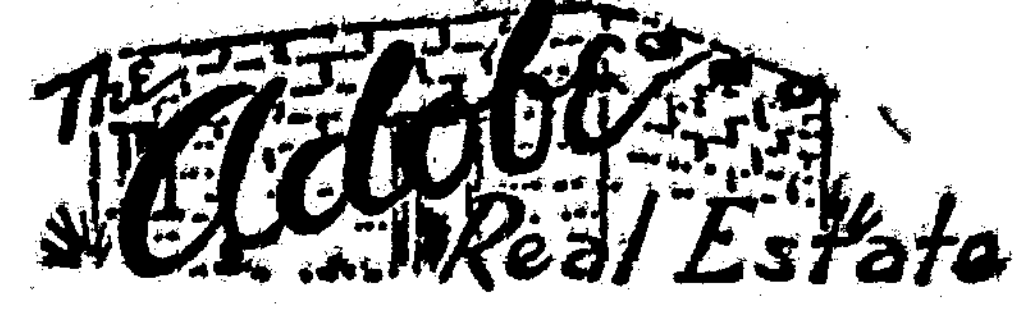

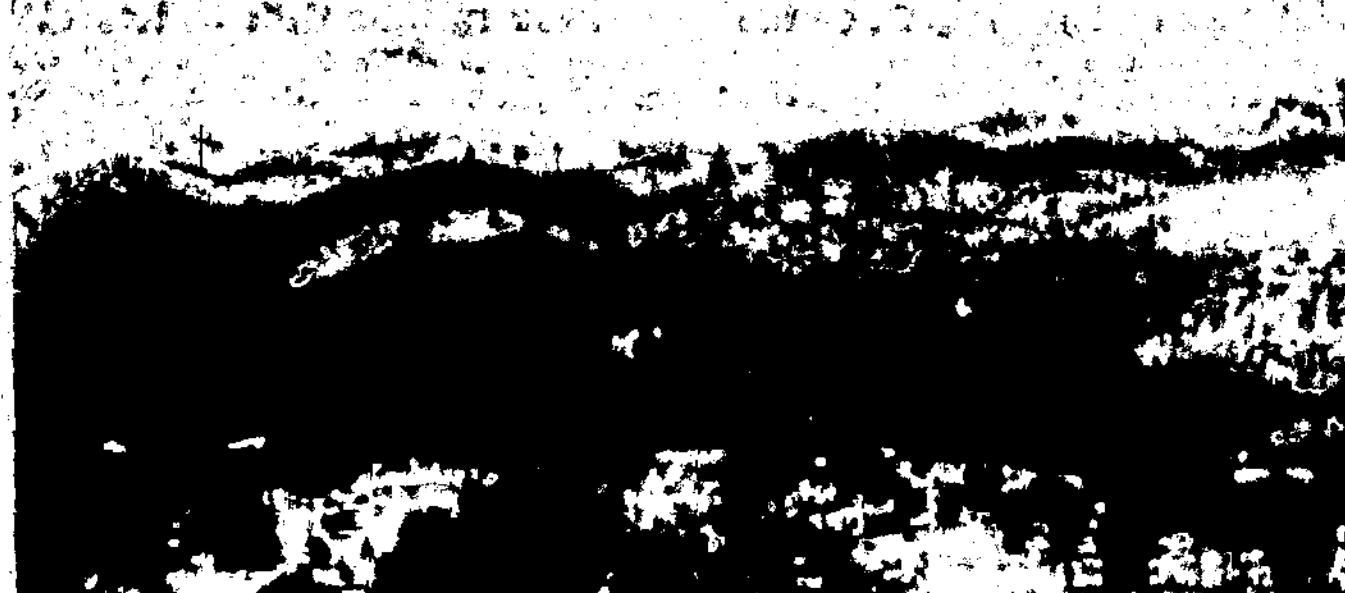
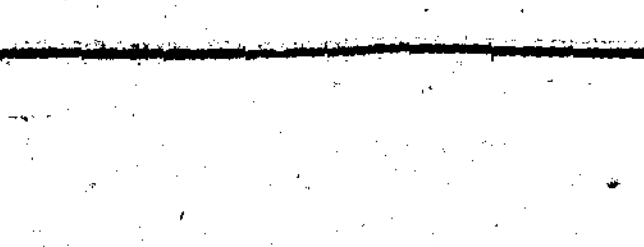

Ruidoso residents last week-end were interested in reading circulars describing a proposed new luxury motel to be built near the Ruidoso airport on State Road 37, and which is being financed through sale of stock in Texas.

Bringing the circulars here and placing them in several business houses last week were Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Pierce and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Keeton, all of Fort Worth. There may have been others of the organization's partnership here also. The pamphlet had 20 pages, liberally illustrated with photographs of the area, quotations from the Ruidoso News of last winter's phenomenal ski season and information from Ruidoso Downs.

Below are excerpts from the offering circular describing the project and its financing.

"This offering circular describes the partnership formed for the purpose of constructing and operating a motor hotel at Ruidoso, New Mexico. The partnership is known as the Western Hills Motor Hotel of Ruidoso, New Mexico, Ltd.

"Ruidoso, New Mexico, is located on U. S. Highway 70 and State Road 37 between Ruidoso Downs and Captain. This year 'round resort in the Sierra Blanca Mountains is within the boundaries of Lincoln National Forest.

"Two major entertainment enterprises account for its great popularity. The Ruidoso Downs Race

Track, operating 4 1/2 months, and the Sierra Blanca Ski resort for 7 months, making practically a full 12 months recreation center, the only such double-header attraction in America. Ruidoso in the past decade has become known to many as the 'fastest growing' resort area—anywhere!

"Opportunities abound for scenic fishing and hunting with bridge paths and foot trails criss-crossing the area. "Western Hills Motor Hotel of Ruidoso, New Mexico, whose principal office is Fort Worth, Texas, is a Limited Partnership (hereinafter referred to as partnership) organized under the laws of the State of Texas, with A. N. (Tony) Carvajal, J. Woodrow Keeton, Sam E. Smith, Edson D. Deering, Don D. McFall, William H. Hicks, Don W. Shiner, Robert E. (Skip) Johnson, A. T. Pierce, and William E. no cash for their interests as General Partners, they intend to invest a minimum of \$20,000 in cash as Limited Partners.

Terms of the Purchase
The Partnership has an option to purchase 12.47 acres of land located 1 1/2 miles North and West of Ruidoso on State Highway 37, which will furnish the site for the Hotel.
