

All of Lincoln County, including the Ruidoso country, shared with New Mexico in soaking rains last week-end. A soggy, extremely large low pressure area, lying over three states in Southwestern U. S. and Old Mexico, collected around to dump inches of moisture in this country in slow, soaking showers and rains.

Total rainfall here from 2 p.m. Sunday until mid-morning Thursday this week was 4.08 inches, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau's official rain gauge located at the local Chamber of Commerce office.

Democratic nominee for governor, Jack Campbell of Roswell, will be the headline speaker at a gathering of Democrats and friends in a supper meeting slated for tonight (Friday) at 8 p.m. at the Chaparral Hotel in Ruidoso Downs. Besides Campbell, all other state Demo candidates who can will be on hand to greet and visit with voters and party members. Campbell's arrival here will end a tour of the county that begins at Carrizozo in the morning and winds through most of the county's communities.

For entertainment, the banquet will hear from a trio of singers and guitarists. The Coronados, noted TV and supper club artists, who will appear for two 30-minute acts on the program. Phillip Richardson, in charge of publicity, reported. Plates for the dinner are selling for \$3 per person, and party workers in all precincts have the ducks for sale. ## Texan Takes Home Top Trophy In First 'Fast Draw' Contest

If Billy the Kid had lived to take part in the Fast Draw contest held at Lincoln last week-end, he would probably have been placed second to the winner, C. E. Hook of Brownfield, Tex. C. E. not only won the Standing Reaction — Walk and Draw Wax Shoot both days, but also took home the Billy the Kid trophy made by Pat Smith of Corralles, New Mexico.

The winner is a 24-year-old handsome cowboy who shot a 377 Ruger. He made the lowest single shot score of 56 on Sunday. His total for 10 shots on Saturday was 794 and on Sunday was 821. Besides the trophies, he won \$400. The Brownfield Club took home 22 trophies, and \$500 prize money. All nine members of their club were contestants. Five of them from one family. C. E. Hook, the "fastest gun in the west," was accompanied by his wife, May, the top woman shooter each day. His father, C. C. Hook was a contestant. His sister, Betty Sue, only 16, won second place in the women's shoot.

Thomas Hook, his 17-year-old brother, was a money winner both days and holds the 1962 Southwest Championship, won at Fort Worth this spring. He was 1961 All-Texas fast gun. The Roving Gunslingers, Chuck Menell, George Virgins and Vince Vaccarino from Chicago, were credited with not only thoroughly entertaining the spectators, but managing the smoothest run "first-time" national Fast Draw Contest.

Five men from Colorado Springs and three from Las Vegas, Nev., brought their electronic timers. The comradie and sportsmanship displayed by all contestants recalled in the Sunday rain being considered a minor inconvenience. Experienced shooters were quick to help beginners. Ammunition, even guns were loaned to contestants in need. Louie Runnels placed 4th in the Women's Shoot Saturday when a fellow contestant loaned her a gun and ammunition.

## SECOND CHANCE ON S. O. S.; 800 RECEIVE SABIN VACCINE IN FIRST CLINIC SUNDAY

Eight hundred persons, men, women and children, received the Sabin oral vaccine as a preventative against polio, in the first of a series of S. O. S. clinics here, similar to ones held throughout the state last Sunday. Dr. W. D. Horton, local chairman, said slightly more than 800 partook of the Sabin vaccine in a Carrizozo clinic. He said the county's percentage was figured at a little more than 19% of the population taking part. A goal of 80% is being sought in the campaign to make the campaign effective. Throughout the state, the percentage was much lower for the first Sunday than had been anticipated, and a concerted drive is underway to get the balance of the percentage wanted on the final Sunday of the first series.

"The Lord Is My Shepherd"  
One of the carols we sang from our house this week to a family that had experienced the death of a loved one was a sympathy card with the Twenty-third Psalm printed on it. Now, I have known this psalm for a long time, have used it on many occasions and have used it in sermons on the Psalms. But, this card with artistic etchings on the borders, showing the sheep, pastures, the shepherd, a stream of water and a sheep fold, all of it took on added meaning. Perhaps we have become so familiar with the twenty-third Psalm that we repeat it by rote and miss a great deal of its true meaning. The imagery and the language of this psalm are in complete harmony with David's experiences as a shepherd boy and as a Hebrew king. We are entirely justified, therefore, in thinking of it as an exact description of the spiritual experiences through which David passed.

There is a glorious message of faith and confidence and can only be appreciated when we think of it not just as a lovely song (which it is, and more) but it is a sublime prayer of faith. We have been so long accustomed to think of prayer as an avenue of approach to God wherein we ask God for things. We have not realized its power as an expression and way of affirming faith. David did not begin his prayer with a petition or a plea such as, "Oh Lord, be my shepherd I am going to be in need of having my soul restored, of being led by still waters and I will need thee as I pass through the valley of the shadow of death." No, the singer and writer began his prayer with the confident and positive assertion that, "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want." This is not a request that his condition shall be considered, and that God shall have mercy, but it is a calm assertion of his confidence that nothing he shall actually need shall be lacking—all his necessities will be—yes, actually are—care for by the Great Provider. It is probably true that a great many people never pray a prayer other than in terms of a petition. It should always be impressed upon us that it is possible to establish

"Returned checks covering police fines and fees need to be cleared," he said. "The amounts should be collected from the police judge."


He noted that warrants were used from the juvenile recreation fund for material which has not been received. Castner said the warrants have been cashed.



The Tularosa Wildcats capitalized on a blocked punt last Friday night to come from behind seven points and tie the Ruidoso Warriors in the last 90 seconds, 13-13 in the Warriors' district opener.

Just before the end of the third quarter, tackle Jim Beall pounced on a Tularosa fumble on the Wildcat 20 and the Warriors pushed into the end zone in five plays with Howard bulging over from the one yard line. Then came the heart breaker. The Warriors punted the extra point to prevent a tie. The kick was good from placement by Clark, but a penalty for offside nullified the point. The next try for the all important point never got underway as a low snap from center prevented the kick.

A defensive minded Carrizozo team dropped every Capitan scoring drive and finally scored once to pull out a 6-0 victory at Capitan last Friday night.


Carrizozo, the defending state Class C champions, went ahead as halfback Garvin Griffin tallied from the 1 in the third quarter. The pass for the extra point failed.
