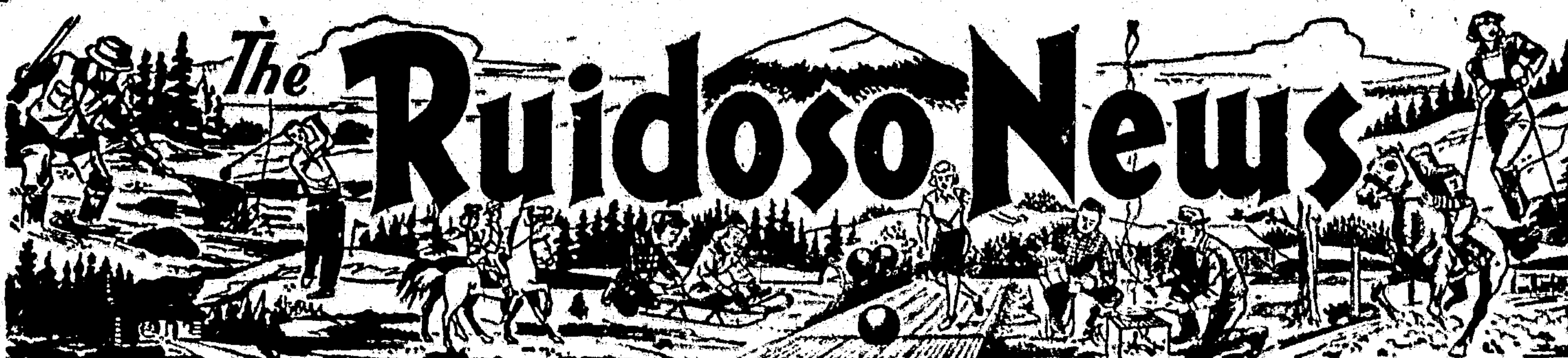

SAN PATRICIO MAN
FATALLY INJURED
IN TWO-CAR CRASH



LOWELL MORGAN
Is Manager
Of Airport

Lowell Morgan, native Ruidoso, died Thursday night as a result of a two-car crash on the Santa Fe highway near Apache Summit. He was 42 years old and had been in the Ruidoso area for several years. Morgan was the manager of the Ruidoso Airport. The crash occurred on Highway 70 near Apache Summit. Morgan was driving a 1957 Ford when it was struck by a 1957 Chevrolet. Morgan was killed instantly. The driver of the Chevrolet, David Crawley, was injured but not seriously. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

A North American Van Lines truck became an ambulance Sunday night near Ruidoso when one man was killed and three men were injured in a grinding two-car crash near Apache Summit. The truck, traveling empty across the high mountain pass southwest of Ruidoso, took the survivors of the accident to the Ruidoso hospital. The name of the driver of the truck was not available after his "ambulance run."

An ambulance driving to the scene from Alamogordo, arrived after the injured had been removed from the wreckage. Dead at the Ruidoso hospital was Ray Sanchez, 19, of San Patricio, who was alone in his vehicle at the time of the accident. State Police reported today that Sanchez lost control of his 1957 model car shortly after 11 p.m. on an icy curve near the top of Apache Summit and smashed head-on into an approaching vehicle. The approaching car was said to have slowed to an almost complete stop. Driver of the other car was Clifford L. Herring, 22, formerly of Roswell, but currently working in Ruidoso as manager of Louie's grocery store.

With Herring was David Crawley, 17, and Forest Hodrick, 22, both from Ruidoso. Herring and his passengers received only minor injuries in the accident. Both vehicles were total losses. State Policeman Ken Shockey said. A coroner's jury, summoned by Justice of the Peace Harold M. Graham at 11 a.m. Sunday, returned a verdict of death by accident. On the jury were Doctors Bram Vanderstok and R. L. Annala, R.

LOCAL AMBULANCE FAILS TO ANSWER CALL
Several local officials, including peace officers and others, stated that an ambulance summoned from Ruidoso to bring the injured to the hospital here, never did arrive at the wreck scene late Saturday night. A passing truck was pressed into service to bring one man and an ambulance from Alamogordo was summoned after a lengthy wait on the local vehicle.

H. Hedgetoke, Wayne Wantles, G. B. Wallrip and Leon Murray Judge Graham said death was apparently caused from internal injuries. The victim had suffered a severe blow on the chest. It was determined. He lived for more than 45 minutes after the crash but was dead on arrival at the hospital. About two hours earlier, in another one-car accident, passengers in a vehicle escaped serious hurt when they skidded at the same place in Dark Canyon. R. H. Hedgetoke, one of the coroner's jury members, said he had heard of five accidents in ten days in the same place, and reported of having skidded on the ice there two weeks ago as he drove to El Paso early one morning. He lost control of his car, but it did not leave the road, spinning around to face the opposite direction, he said.

Funeral Services Held December 6 For Ray Sanchez
Funeral services were held in St. Patrick's Catholic Church in San Patricio Thursday this week, Dec. 6, at 10 a.m. for Ray Sanchez, 19, who died in an automobile accident Dec. 2 near Apache Summit. Father Laurier Labreche officiated and burial was in the San Patricio Cemetery. Survivors include the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sofia Sanchez of San Patricio. Five sisters and four brothers; the grandmother, Mrs. Augustina Sanchez, San Patricio. Ray Sanchez attended San Patricio Grade School and graduated from Hondo High School. He was an unemployed laborer at the time of his death.

Max Oliver is getting the Highway Committee set up. It has a steady program of work confronting it.

Both Sierra Blanca and Santa Fe Ski Basins are owned and operated by the Sierra Blanca Corporation. The group bought out the Santa Fe Ski Basin interests last year.

Two of the guiding lights of the corporation, and they probably more than anyone had a great deal to do with bringing the races to New Mexico, are Kingsbury Pitcher and Robert Anderson.

Anderson, a prominent Roswell oil man, also is one of the top men at Aspen and formed the Aspen Institute. Pitcher also has considerable interests at the Aspen area of last year came to New Mexico to help open Sierra Blanca.

Concert Organist Moves to Ruidoso, Teaches Piano, Organ and Voice

A concert organist who has traveled in many parts of the world and who has a strong musical background has moved to Ruidoso to make his home. He is Cleo (Pete) Peterson, a Negro, who is presently serving as chef at The Potosi.

Peterson is a native of Pittsburgh Pa. but has been a resident of the Southwest for about 12 years, ten of them in this part of the country. He is a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh where he majored in foreign languages and had a minor in music. He studied the same course in the University of Southern California. He also studied under Father Rosmini and Ed St. John, famous organists, at the University of DeQuincy. He began teaching the organ and voice in 1947 in California, and also taught classes in Texas. For a year he was the star of his own radio show on Radio Station KRDD in El Paso.

He has toured Europe and South America, and was presented in a concert in Havana, Cuba. His father is an instructor in music at Morehouse College in Atlanta, Ga., which knided his

Apples Are Used For Heads, Hands On Dolls Made By Ruidosoan

A Ruidosoan's hobby of making dolls has an unusual twist—the woman uses dried apples for the heads and hands to give them a pitted, old-folks' look that captures everyone who sees them.

Mrs. Wayne Adams, who manages Moejeu Motel here, has been making the dolls for three years, and has turned out almost 100. She has completed about 40 in the last few months, making the clothing for each one.

All are of the same size, a little more than a foot high, but each is a distinctive character. She makes little old ladies, old men, some ancient red men and some Negroes, too. The clothing is complete down to the finest of buttons, and even high-top button shoes for some old men. The little old ladies have underclothing, including petticoats, to make them a doll collector's delight. She has sold a number of the dolls, and has given away some to friends and relatives, too.

This week she planned to ship a large number of them to a California firm that has a market for them, she said.

The shoes are carved from wood and painted, and sometimes she carves the hands from wood, but usually they are made from apples, too.

A few of her dolls were made with dried pears, and the texture of the faces is quite different. She carves the facial features for the dollheads on an apple or pear, then lets them dry for several weeks—and she says she never knows just how they will turn out. After painting the lips, cheeks, eyebrows, and inserting beads for eyes, she covers the heads with shellac as a preservative. The bodies are made of cloth and stuffed. Each doll has its own stand for the owner to put it on display.

The Adams came here from Kermit, Tex., early this year. Her husband is operator of the Ruidoso

Only a Trace Of Snow Recorded Here In November

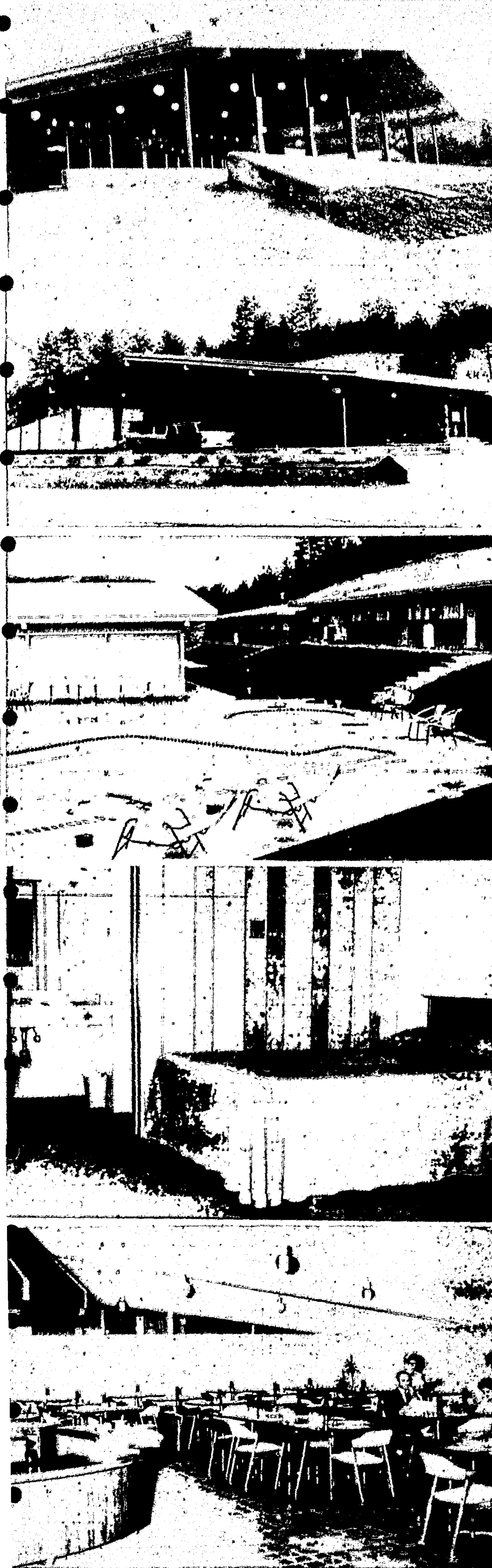

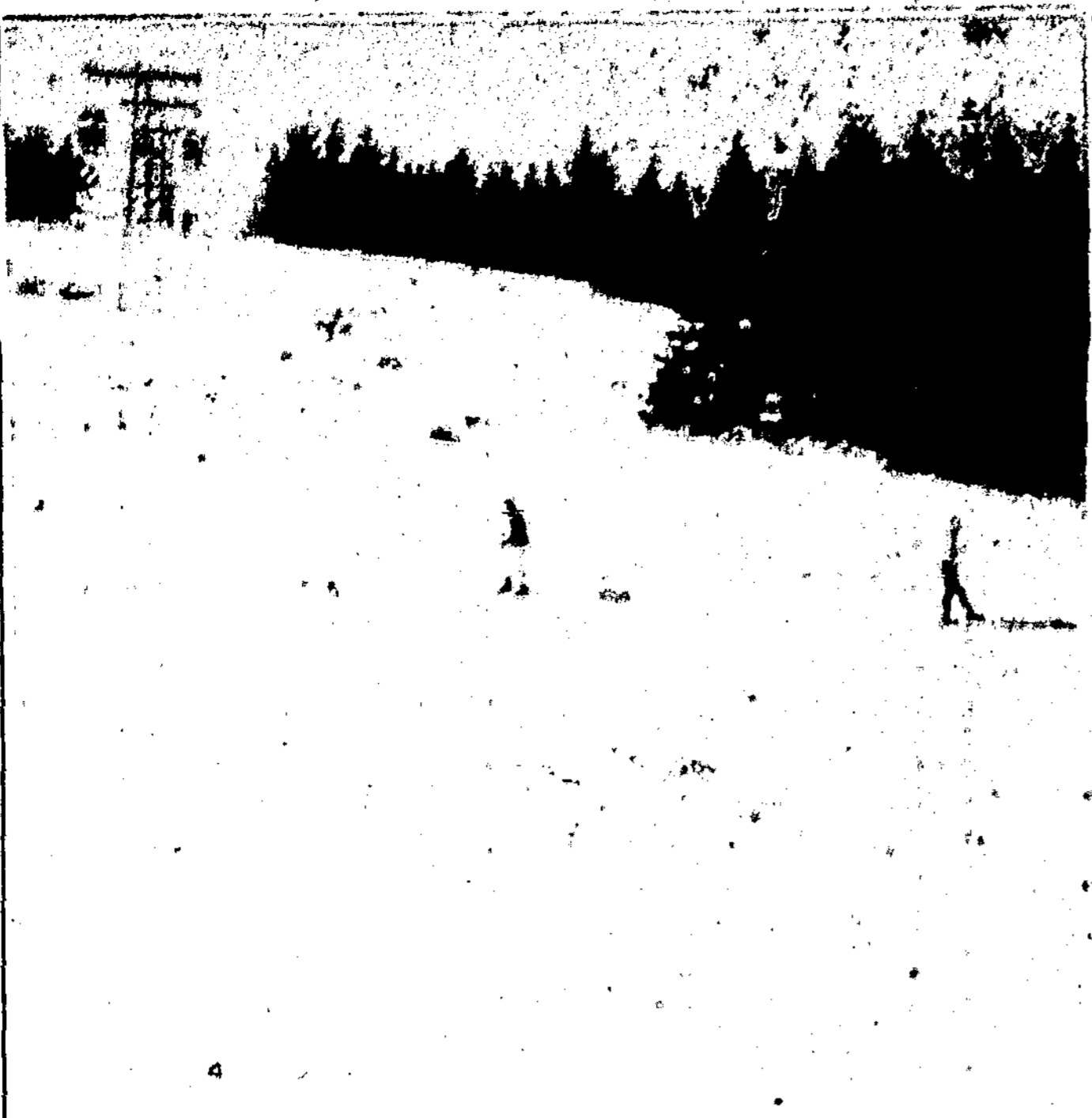
