



News Items From the Ruidoso News Issue of Nov. 28, 1947

The Ruidoso Lions Club announced that a total of \$70 in cash prizes were being offered in the local Christmas lighting and decoration contest. Everyone in the canyon was being urged to join in the contest to make Ruidoso a winter show place.

Snow fell on eight consecutive days during the month with a total of two feet being measured in the higher mountains. A low temperature of 11 degrees and a high of 48 were recorded.

Application was made by the Hollywood Racing Association to the State Racing Commission for four weekend's racing at the Hollywood Race Track.

The Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce had its annual banquet at the Navajo Lodge. The speaker for the evening was General Hugh Melton of the New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell. Directors in the local C. of C. organization were:

Harry Cornelius, John Stanley, W. D. Croley, Raymond Buckner, Carson Phillips, George Fuchs and Lloyd Bloodworth.

The prize for the largest deer slain during the hunting season went to Paul Vane and Jimmy Venter. Both shot at the buck at the same time and examination of the one slug found in the deer failed to establish who shot it. The buck weighed 191 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds "head dressed". The two hunters divided the \$25 prize money.
