

## RECORD CROWD VISITS RUIDOSO FOR CHRISTMAS-NEW YEARS; SKI RESORT SETS STATE RECORD

Ruidoso had a taste of summer business in the middle of winter last week.

Hundreds of skiers came here to try the snowy slopes of the new Sierra Blanca Corporation's winter and summer resort in White Mountain Park, 16 miles northwest of here.

The resort set a new record for New Mexico with the largest crowd of skiers and spectators on Saturday, Dec. 30 that has ever attended any ski area on one day in this state.

Buz Bainbridge, public relations man for Sierra Blanca, said the gross for the day was approximately \$8,000.00, then reported that on Sunday, Dec. 31, the gross was just about 450 under the all time record of the day before.

Kingsbury Pletcher, president of Sierra Blanca Corporation, said there were at least 1,000 people in White Mountain Park on Saturday and again on Sunday with about 500 of the visitors enjoying skiing while the other 500 were spectators each day.

Pete Tolomeff, of the U. S. Forest Service and attached to the Sierra Blanca resort area as official representative, concurred with the two Sierra Blanca men in saying the crowds for the New Year's week-end were the largest any ski resort has ever had in the state's history.

Bainbridge said all skiers had nothing but praise for the snow conditions and the runs available. In Ruidoso, interest in the new ski resort was reflected with many of the local motels and tourist courts hanging up a "No Vacancy" for several nights for the first time in the winter in the playground area's history. Cater service stations and ski top shops also reported a big upsurge in business, and officials of Ruidoso State Bank reported deposits by local retail firms on the days following the large crowds during the Christmas and New Year's holidays also showed that business had been given a big boost by the ski resort opening.

With an excellent snow condition that promises good skiing for many weeks yet, there was a general optimism expressed here by many persons that Sierra Blanca Corporation's first season was much better than anyone had anticipated.

### BABY'S DEATH RULED DUE TO SUFFOCATION

Funeral services were held Tuesday this week at 2 p.m. in Mason Funeral Home Chapel for John H. Taylor, Jr., age 7 1/2 months, who died of what a coroner's inquest said was suffocation Saturday night in a Ruidoso motel. Rev. Vanzandt of the Gateway Assembly of God Church conducted the service and burial was in Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Taylor of Modesto, Calif., who were on their way home from visiting in the Eastern States, had car trouble near Roswell and had caught a ride to Ruidoso last Friday. They were staying in a local motel. The infant was brought to the Ruidoso Hospital at 3:18 a.m. Dec. 31 and was pronounced dead the next morning, that the infant died of suffocation in an overheated room.

Survivors include the parents and a sister, Sherri.

### THRILLING SAGA OF LOST PARTS

Sierra Blanca Corporation began assembling final machinery to have three T-Bar lifts in operation for its opening on Dec. 23, two days before that it was discovered the essential T-bars were missing from the shipment of components. Long distance telephone calls across the nation determined they were still in the hold of a ship just outside the Houston Tex., harbor. Buz Bainbridge, public relations man for the ski resort made a hair-raising motor trip to El Paso in time to catch an airliner out of there for Houston, arriving in Houston Thursday before the Saturday opening here, and chartered a boat to go out to the Dutch freighter that had the T-bars in a crate. "Luck was with us," said Bainbridge, "for the T-bars were stored in the top hold, and not below decks. It was fairly simple to unload them from the freighter, then put them on a truck we employed for that purpose, and send them on to Ruidoso. The only other hitch we had was the truck we hired had to stop at the state line and the crate had to be transferred to still another truck for the final lap here." The parts arrived and were installed only minutes before the ski resort opened.





## Quarter Horse Given President Ike Has Ancestry Traced 67 Years

Mrs. Maxine Lee Smith, of Uvalde, Tex., and Bulldog, has a memory few people can boast of—telling Grandmothers rave about their grandchildren; men talk about a hole in one and the fish that was "that long". Mrs. Smith, however, thrilled a President of the United States.

In March 1954, at the Gettysburg Farm of President Eisenhower, Doodle De Doo was presented by Lester Goodson of Magnolia and Houston, Tex., to Ike at that time Goodson was President of the American Quarter Horse Association. Doodle De Doo was a prize quarter horse and the pride of Maxine Lee Smith.

The ancestry of Doodle De Doo goes back 67 years. Old Jim, No. 10 in the American Quarter Horse registry, was one of Doodle De Doo's ancestors. The AQHA was formed in 1940 and Mrs. Smith is a member of it. She owns the Weatherwax Stables of fine quarter horses. A thoroughbred, Hilly Diamond, is a famous horse. Others in the Weatherwax stables are Spanish Charge, My Texas Dandy and Flynn Charm. The latter holds the world's record of 870 yards in 4 1/2 seconds.

Maxine Lee Smith rates her own stock for her racing stable. Her mounts give creditable performance on the Los Alamitos, Hialeah Downs, New Orleans, Albuquerque, Guilford and Ponce de Leon race tracks.

Mrs. Smith's son, Wesley W. Kyle, III, is interested in racing and Smith told her little granddaugh-

breeding. He lives in Uvalde and raises horses that can race or do any kind of ranch work. His horses are strictly the "using kind."

Doodle De Doo was purchased by Goodson, owner of the J3 Ranch, that was "that long". Mrs. Smith made the presentation on that historic day in 1954. The AQHA was seeking the perfect type quarter horse mare to present to the President. Mrs. Smith says: "If it had not been for the President and our knowing without a doubt what Doodle De Doo was in bloodlines and as a favor to the AQHA, we would not have sold her at any price."

A little child might have kept the mare from having the horse, Mrs. Smith's little granddaughter, Kathy Kyle, dearly loved Doodle De Doo and rode her all the time Mrs. Smith owned her. "But the President doesn't have a fine horse like Doodle De Doo." Immediately the tiny girl felt sorry for Ike and wanted him to have the horse.

The mare's bloodlines are of the best. Old Jim comes out of Texas Chief and Little Texas Chief, two great horses Doodle De Doo is owned by Mrs. Smith in part of a 32,000 acre ranch handed down to the heirs of T. P. Lee and is located near Uvalde, Texas.



### County Agent's Report

By RALPH DUNLAP

Sheep scab has been found in Lincoln County, near Picacho. This outbreak has been traced back to the most recent outbreak, last fall, in south Chaves County. Scab is a microscopic mite that causes the wool to fall off in patches and a scab to form. This leaves the sheep in a weakened condition and many will die if untreated.

Scab can be eradicated, but the sheep raiser must follow the precautions outlined in the bulletin on Parasite and Parasitic Diseases of Sheep. First if the disease is present all sheep must be clipped in BHO, Lindane or Toxaphene. Just one sheep left out in the pasture at dipping time can reinfest the flock and render the dipping useless as far as eradication is concerned.

As a precaution do not buy any sheep for the next few months, as the sheep may not show the scab sores but can still be carrying it. Report any unusual sores or loss of wool to the sheep inspector in your area.





The unpredictable weather of the last few weeks has forced logging operations into a slow and sporadic pace. The weather has also caused the cessation of operations on the Mistletoe Control Project until early spring.

Bids were opened on Nov. 27 for the timber on the Carrizo Logging Tract, C. A. Aron, representing Grants Lumber Co. Grants was the high bidder, C. A. Denton, Artesia, also bid on the unit and although his bid was lower, he asked his bid be submitted for consideration. This is permissible under timber sale regulations. We have not yet received word from the Washington Office as to the acceptance of a bid as a great deal of investigation must be carried out to insure that the party receiving the contract is a capable operator and financially solvent.

The proposal on the remainder of the Carrizo Logging Tract is being worked up now and will be submitted within the next few days.

Specifications for the aerial flight of the reservation are being refined so that bids may be called for. The flight should take place next May or June. The photographs and maps obtained from this flight will enable the staff to go ahead with a complete inventory of the timber resources of the reservation.

Larry Bronaugh, Area Soil Scientist, was here this month to assist local technicians in soil samples on Tularosa, Three Rivers, Marucha, and Carrizo to determine fertility levels and to determine the land classes to be used in the economic feasibility reports for the Mescalero Reservation. Mr. John Justice, Agriculture Economist, from the Washington Office, was also here to assist in the preparation of the economic feasibility report.

Dick Hull and Lloyd Nicholson of the Area Land Operations Engineering staff, were here this month to review progress made on the Tularosa irrigation project inventory. William Cushman and Larry Bronaugh of the Area Land Operations staff, and Mr. Hank Waugh and C. Knowles of the range survey crew were here this month to confer with local Land Department personnel in making preliminary plans for the orthometric tanks site and condition survey to be made on the Mescalero Reservation.

Irrigation engineering crews are continuing the survey of the main canal serving the Tularosa Creek area. A topographic survey was started by the Tularosa project but was not completed due to inclement weather in that area. A field investigation was completed on the present status of the CCCID structures existing on the reservation. Many of these old structures were found to be in need of repairs due to lack of maintenance through the years.

Land Operations personnel attended the Annual State Water Conference in Las Cruces on Nov. 1 and 2.

Right-of-way for the main canal survey on the Tularosa project was cleared and weeds removed along the ditch bank by Land Operations personnel this month.

Land Operations personnel worked in cooperation with the Branch of Law and Order and the Tribal Business Committee in the management and control of the special
