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## Around Town

Says Jim Hines, village clerk: "When filling for your occupation license, be sure to fill in all blanks on the form provided by the village. (They were mailed to prospective licensees last week-end.) Especially we want you to complete the blank calling for your school tax state license number."

One trustee said he had knowledge of the Ruidoso dispatcher relating to help in locating police assistance after a wreck on the road was called to by Ruidoso Downs—saying "that's Ruidoso Downs' problem?" the trustee quoted. Another person present at the meeting said he had found the Ruidoso dispatcher had been most co-operative, yet another said the dispatcher's operation had been lacking at times.

## More Than a Dozen Roswell Airmen Questioned in Series of Burglaries in Ruidoso Area and in Roswell

Three peace officers from this county have been stolen," he declared. Including Village Marshal J. C. Bobo, Deputy Sheriff Albert Richardson and State Policeman Kenneth Wilson, working for four days with peace officers of Roswell, Walker Air Force Base and also with other Lincoln County officials, have turned up evidence that more than a dozen airmen stationed at Walker AFB were involved in a series of burglaries which affected both Lincoln and Chaves Counties, and perhaps other areas. The trio, returning to Ruidoso Wednesday night, reported loot recovered to date from barracks they have searched on Walker AFB will total about \$15,000, and that perhaps much more will be accounted for shortly. There were at least nine burglaries in Lincoln County, most of them in the Ruidoso area.

The homes and businesses entered, practically all of them by breaking door glass, have included: The R. O. White saloon, entered on both nights of Jan. 1 and 2; the D. L. Borman residence, entered the night of Jan. 4; the Pal's Sporting Goods store, also entered the night of Jan. 4; The Casa Frenia, entered sometime between Dec. 28 and Jan. 10; the Tom Zeller saloon, entered the night of Jan. 10; the Max Oliver, formerly operated by Max Oliver, entered one night about five weeks ago; the Fred F. Bowser store of Picacho, entered the night of Jan. 4; the Home and Aste store in Ruidoso, entered one night two weeks ago; an unidentified residence somewhere in the vicinity of the Pal Farrar building here. Also reported solved were thefts from two cars owned by tourist visitors here, parked on Sudderth Drive, during a night sometime in the last two months.

The amount of loot taken by the men, which involves about 14 men we have questioned, is almost unbelievable," Bobo said. "Liquor, guns, ammunition, television sets, cigarettes, binoculars, men's clothing, flashlights, sporting goods, auto accessories, cameras, radios, and various electrical appliances and many, many other things were stolen in each case." Bobo said some of the Walker airmen involved in the earlier break-ins have been shipped to posts in other countries, but would likely be brought back to Roswell by the Air Force for officers to question.

"Some of the loot is now in Spain, Greenland, in Germany and many other places. Some of the airmen also have been moved to other air fields in the U. S. At this time we have no idea how many men have been involved nor how much loot has been recovered."

## FLANE SEARCH IS DISCONTINUED FOR CIVIL MEN

The Civil Air Patrol of Arizona has called a halt to the air search that was participated in by dozens of privately owned aircraft, and many military ships, for about three weeks looking for a twin-engine plane, piloted by Jack Hobson, Alamogordo, barbed excelsior, and carrying Frank Boyce, former Lincoln County resident and an attorney in Alamogordo. The pair was last heard from in a radio broadcast from their plane out of Phoenix Saturday, Dec. 16. It is presumed they went down in the mountainous area of Arizona, somewhere along their proposed line of flight from Alamogordo to Phoenix or Flagstaff. The terrain they traversed has received numerous heavy snowfalls since the search began. They disappeared in a snow storm it was reported. Two Ruidosoans, Ralph Brown and R. H. Hedgecock, volunteered their services in using their planes in many hours of co-operation in the search over a two-state area.



5. Money from the Club is to be used to buy sites for new churches, to assist in building new churches, and Wesley Foundations.
6. A person may buy more shares or terminate his membership at any time.
7. This plan will make \$10,000 available to the District Board of Missions each time a call is made.

Churches established in the district in the past seven years are: In El Paso, Mountain View, St. James, St. Paul, St. Luke, John Park, and the Wesley Foundation. In Valley View, Las Cruces, and Bayard, New Mexico, Dell City, Texas and a site in Cloudcroft, New Mexico.



# National Monument 30 Years Old Jan. 18— Little Known New Mexico Lake Is Source of White Sands

**WHITE SANDS NATIONAL MONUMENT**—Thousands of New Mexicans are familiar with White Sands National Monument near Alamogordo, 65 miles southwest of Ruidoso on U. S. Highway 70, but few have seen or are aware of Lake Lucero, the spawning place for the 745,000 acres which make up the world's largest open gypsum deposit.

Second in tourist travel only to Carlsbad Caverns, White Sands is adjacent to White Sands National Monument in the Tularosa Basin in south-central New Mexico. Great shifting white dunes of almost pure gypsum cover an area 30 miles long and 10 miles wide.

The sands are formed from selenite, which abounds in large crystals a scant three feet from the surface of the ground west of the monument. The crystals jut above the ground on the shore of Lake Lucero, an alternately dry and filled alkali lake at the southwestern end of the sands. It is here the selenite (some crystals measure three

feet in length), acted upon by erosion, begins its transformation into fine grains of gypsum.

Tularosa Basin was originally a high plateau. But several thousands of years ago, great pressure built up beneath the surface, creating a fault in the earth's crust. The pressure, with no outlet, caused the entire area to collapse, leaving only the San Andres Mountains to the west and the Sacramento to the east.

"As a result," said Park Ranger Forrest Benson, Jr., superintendent of the monument, "the selenite found on the floor of the basin and near Lake Lucero is also found near the tops of both mountain ranges."

Selenite, in its pure form, is almost perfectly clear. However, the majority of the crystals exposed to the surface are amber-colored and

made up of paper-thin layers of the substance.

The process of erosion, coupled with the various elements, accounts for the breaking up of the selenite into coarse grains of gypsum. Water, rushing from the mountains, weakens and crumbles the selenite, and expansion caused by temperature changes further break up the crystals. Strong winds whip the small particles of selenite into Lake Lucero, where evaporation completes the process. And winds carry the grains into the White Sands proper.

Selenite has a hardness of 2 on a scale of 10. The diamond is ranked 10, which indicates the comparative softness and eroding qualities of selenite.

Lake Lucero, while it is the "birthplace" of the sands, is not open to the public and special permission is necessary to visit the area. Ranger Benson said no plans have been made to open Lake Lucero to the public because of the additional cost and the proximity of the missile range.

An unusual feature of the sands may be observed during a typical Southwest dust storm. The gypsum, which is heavier than sand, is not actually carried away by the winds but rather is blown along about two to four feet above the surface of the dunes.

Wind effect plays a big role in monument maintenance, said Benson. He said several roads have been lost to the shifting dunes and a roadgrader is kept busy throughout the year to prevent the sands from "completely" taking over. Benson estimated the sands are mov-

ing to the northeast at a rate of six to 12 inches per year.

Increasing automotive travel and the establishment and expansion of Armed Forces installations in the area has brought an increasing number of visitors to the sands. Visitors have increased from 85,000 in 1946, to 378,847 at the end of December 1961, or a gain of 230 percent. Total visitors to the monument since records have been kept (1938) now total more than 4 million.

A planned expansion program for the monument, including building and construction, will cost an estimated \$705,000, Benson said.

Many business concerns have tried unsuccessfully to use the vast deposit for commercial products, said Benson, but transportation to major outlets and federal law have proved to be the sizeable stumbling blocks.

White Sands National Monument will celebrate its 30th anniversary Jan. 18. The sands were proclaimed a monument as the last official act of former President Herbert Hoover in 1932.

There, Stanley, daughter of Mrs. Joyce Stanley, underwent major surgery here Tuesday this week in the local hospital. She was reported as doing satisfactorily at press time.

# CIVIL SERVICE OBSERVES 75th ANNIVERSARY NEXT WEEK

In these 75 years we have grown from a nation of fifty-four million people to one of one hundred and eighty million.  
The relatively simple tasks performed by Government serving a small, in the main agricultural, economy, Government has moved to large and complex operations that call for the productive work of specialists in hundreds of different occupations. Government programs, and thus Government employment, have grown too, to meet the demands for service from the people as expressed through their elected representatives in Congress.

Lindane is the only recognized control and on infected herds must be used in two dips 10 to 14 days apart. This kills both the adult and the newly hatched mite from the
