

MURDER CHARGE FILED IN SLAYING

Mrs. Wilbur McKnight, 44, of Hondo, was bound over to district court under \$10,000 bond Monday after pleading innocent to her husband's murder last Friday evening. She posted the bond and was released until the next court term, to begin April 9, Sheriff Glen Bradley said. McKnight was shot three times with a .22 pistol in a bedroom of the McKnight ranch home two miles east and three miles north of Hondo at 7:45 p.m. last Friday. Sheriff Bradley said when he reached the scene about an hour later, he found the nude body of McKnight lying between a bed and the wall of the bedroom. "He was shot in the right chest, in the center of the back and through his right hand," Bradley said, and apparently died within minutes of being shot. A coroner's jury, summoned by Justice of the Peace Jim Herrero, returned a verdict of death by gunshot wound, Frank Traworth was foreman of the jury. Bradley said the body of the slain man was taken to a Roswell funeral home, and that an autopsy was performed. District Attorney Richard Parson investigated the slaying, along with Bradley. Bradley said Mrs. McKnight admitted to him she had shot her husband. She is reported to have said she was afraid her husband was going to get a knife and cut her. Funeral services for McKnight, 54, were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in Mason's Funeral Home Chapel, in Roswell, with the Rev. O. L. Dennis officiating. A resident of the Hondo area 36 years he was a rancher and is survived by his widow, Mrs. Pauline McKnight of Hondo; two daughters, his mother, Mrs. Mary McKnight of Roswell; two sisters and two brothers. Burial was in South Park Cemetery.





Watkins. Bobby Boyce was the caller for the group.






