

self, according to Mrs. Charles U. Oulmer of Libertyville, Illinois, Girl Scout National President, has expanded and changed to keep pace with our changing times. "The basic purpose of Girl Scouting, however, has remained the same," Mrs. Oulmer added. "It is to in-

spire girls with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism, and service that they may become happy and resourceful citizens."
Girl Scouting is part of an international movement. In many countries, Girl Scouts are called Girl Guides. The Girl Scouts and Girl Guides are linked through membership in the International World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts. Girl Scouts of the U. S. A. carries on an extensive exchange with other member countries of the

World Association. Girl Guides visit Girl Scout councils in the United States and attend events such as Senior Roundups; in turn, Girl Scouts from this country visit Guides and participate in international meetings and encampments abroad.

During the last six years, Girl Scouts of the U. S. A. has served as hostess to almost 700 international Girl Scouts and has sent close to 1,000 Girl Scouts abroad in exchanges involving 61 countries.

These exchanges are largely financed by the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund which is supported by voluntary contributions from Girl Scouts all over the United States.

Girl Scouting is open to all girls even through 17 years of age, regardless of race, creed, or nationality. They are united by the Girl Scout Promise in which each girl pledges:

"On my honor, I will try:
"To do my duty to God and country,
"To help other people at all times,
"To obey the Girl Scout Laws."
The Girl Scout Laws require members to be trustworthy, loyal, useful, friendly, courteous, kind to animals, obedient, cheerful, thrifty and clean in thought, word and deed. The Girl Scout motto is "Be Prepared."
