

'I Made a Mistake' Says Tucker Regarding Radio Statement On Eagle Creek Water Rights

Mayor-elect Warren Tucker told the Ruidoso News at the conclusion of an interview lasting about 45 minutes last Friday afternoon, "I made a mistake" in referring to his radio talk at 8 a.m. the morning of the city election last Tuesday in which he declared Ruidoso faced the possibility of losing its water rights in the Eagle Creek. In the talk he said the possibility of the loss of rights in Eagle Creek could be blamed on "our representative on the Eagle Creek board." In other radio remarks he said "my worthy opponent" Tucker's opponent in the mayoralty race was Dan D. Swearingin who has served on the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association board since its inception about six years ago. In the interview with Tucker, Vic Lamb, Ruidoso News editor, recounted the history of the association, and how Swearingin and others here had secured for Ruidoso water, and that it also had provided additional water for Captain and Ft. Stanton. Lamb told Tucker "The reason I am asking you for a statement about your radio remark is that one of your supporters came into the News office and said, 'I'm distressed to write an article concerning his statement, and Tucker said he would consider doing that.' Tucker's concluding statement 'I made a mistake' was enlarged by his adding 'Your newspaper makes mistakes too' to which the News editor readily admitted.

Core Tests Are Made Of Paying

Acting on a petition of property owners in upper Ruidoso to determine if paving materials used in hardening streets here in the Paying Assessment District No. 1 met specifications, Ruidoso's board of trustees last week had a laboratory crew here to take cores from Ruidoso residential streets in ten different locales for testing. Mayor Robert Pearson said early this week that results of laboratory tests would not be known until the middle of this week, and what action the board of trustees might take was not certain at this time.

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FIRST CONTRACTS ARE SIGNED FOR AIRPORT IMPROVEMENT

Planning and Zoning Commission Faces Opposition at Hearing To Parts of Proposed Ordinance

More than 375 persons attended a hearing here Monday night on proposed zoning ordinance that has been drawn after a about three years' study by the village planning and zoning commission. Most of the spokesmen heard during the evening were in opposition to portions of the proposed ordinance. Carl Morrison opened the meeting by asking the co-operation of those present to assist the commission in changing or correcting the proposed city law before it was enacted. After more than an hour and a half of discussion, and with no conclusions reached, Morrison said a second hearing would be held in two weeks, on Monday, April 23, at which time he invited those persons who still had questions to submit them in writing.

At one point in the hearing, sentiment of the audience was that the zoning ordinance be dropped and that it not be enacted, that it would take away the citizens' rights and liberties, Chairman Morrison and Member Bennett expressed the idea the zoning ordinance was to protect the people's rights and liberties.

Speaking the most often and challenging the panel's system of zoning was Dr. Bram Vanderstok, who was joined sometimes by his wife, Another, and possibly one of the fiercest critics of the zoning ordinance, was Mrs. Morrison Quabhorn, who, at one point, said the commission's subdivision regulations, previously passed here without opposition, covered some zoning proposals as set up in the proposed zoning ordinance. She felt it would make the zoning mandatory.

property values, Bennett stressed the statement that deed restrictions and covenants could not now be changed by the zoning ordinance—that they were written in the purchasers' abstract, and that they could only be changed when a majority of the property

owner's neighbors and the owner himself requested a change. "Zoning in no way affects the restrictions and covenants," Bennett repeated.

"Then why do we need zoning?" was a question next asked. "To give you the protection of the village law in case deed restrictions or covenants are broken by your neighbor. As it is now, you must go to court yourself to protect these rights if violated—under zoning the village has the power to do it for you," Bennett said.

Among the several who spoke in favor of the commission's work was Rod Courtney, developer of a subdivision in the Alto area, who



Second, basic plus a package of building materials. Third, the most popular stages, carries construction a step further. The purchaser can move in and finish his nearly completed home at his convenience, meanwhile saving rent. Fourth stage is the completed home.

The IEH home is not a prefab, but it is built by local businessmen he said. Bradley said the man said the break-ins occurred more than a year ago, in January or February of 1961.

AMERICAN POST OFFICE
FIRST ESTABLISHED IN BOSTON IN 1609
"Everybody uses the post office, but few know what part it really plays in our lives," says Postmaster Mabel Wimberley at Hollywood.
Most people think of their post office as a place to buy stamps, deposit letters, and conduct a few other simple mail transactions. Actually, the Post Office Department is one of the largest and most complex businesses on earth.
The United States Postal Service employs more than 500,000 people in almost 36,000 post offices across the land. It handles some 68 billion pieces of mail annually, and transacts over \$4 billion dollars worth of business each year.
According to Postmaster Wimberley, the United States has about 1/18 of the world's population, but does over two-thirds of the world's postal business. Offices vary in size from New York City with over 39,000 employees and annual receipts of 225 million dollars to some crossroads settlement where the postmaster is a part-time employee

and receipts are less than \$100 per year.
"Contrary to population trends and popular opinion," says Postmaster Wimberley, "the number of post-offices in the United States is steadily decreasing. In 1910, there were 97,246 post offices throughout the United States and its possessions; and in July of 1960, there were 85,260 post offices."
The first American post office was established at Boston in 1609. Benjamin Franklin was appointed by the Continental Congress to head up the American Postal System in 1775. Our first Postmaster General under the Constitution, however, was Samuel Osgood. He was appointed in September of 1789.
