

**County Agent's Report**

Interested in horses? Plan to attend the Horse Clinic in Carrizozo on April 28 at the Rodeo grounds just east of the overpass on Highway 380. The program starts at 9:00 a.m. with a session on unsoundness and ailments of horses. R. C. Barham is in charge of the session.

The Quarterhorse, ideal in conformation and action, will be discussed by the group. Following the discussion will be a film on "The Quarter Horse Conformation — Points to Consider in Judging". A horse judging contest will be held from 10:30 to 11:45 and a trophy will be awarded to the high point individual. Classes of Mares, Yearlings and Geldings will be judged.

For lunch, hamburgers and hot dogs and cold drinks will be available on the grounds. The afternoon will start off with an exhibit of Arabian Horses by Ed and Abraham Hindi. Western Horsemanship will be featured in the afternoon program. How to exhibit a horse at halter, riding, reining and working cowpony classes will be demonstrated to the group. Properly exhibiting the horse often means the difference between winning a class and not placing at all. Whether you exhibit a horse or just watch, you need to know the correct way to exhibit.

Put April 28 on Your Calendar. Anyone interested is invited.

The apple trees are in full bloom in the Hondo Valley now. Several growers have commented that there are more blooms on the trees this year than there have been since 1951. I have noted that there seems to be more trees in bloom now than normal. Generally there is a week to 10 days difference between Glencoe and Hondo, but not this year.

The peaches did not bloom this year due to being frozen in the bud in January or February when the temperature got below zero in most of fruit growing areas.

If you did not get a dormant spray on your apple trees for miles, plan on putting a milicide in your clay spray, especially if you have milo trouble last year. Some of the milicides you can use are lodon, kethane and guthion. Check your trees in the center part of the tree and see if there are any milites on the underside of the leaves.

To reduce weed growth, moisture loss and labor in the garden use a mulch of plastic, sawdust or straw. Black plastic is the best but costs the most, and is usually put on at planting time with holes cut in the plastic for the holes to come through.

If you use sawdust or straw, put some with the mulch. Use from 1 to 2 pounds of 18-20-0 per 100 square feet. When you use sawdust or straw put 2 to 3 inches on the soil to retard weed growth.

Fruit growers will meet April 28 at the Hondo School starting at 7:30 p.m. Frost and preventing damage to the orchard will be the topic discussed. R. M. Beece, who has had several years of experience with fruit frost control with the U. S. Weather Bureau, will talk to the group on frost prevention and control. All growers are encouraged to attend.

### NEW MEXICO 1962 ELECTION CALENDAR

Compiled Under Supervision of Secretary of State Betty Florida Santa Fe, New Mexico

April 23—County Commissioners appoint Primary Election officials, and County Clerk mails notices of appointment.

April 23—County Clerk begins preparation of voting machines.

April 26—Earliest date for publication of Primary Proclamation of County Commissioners.

April 27—County Clerks of counties wherein voting machines are used must have available for distribution facsimile diagrams of front of voting machines as they will appear at Primary.

April 27—Last date for County Clerks to furnish certified lists of registered voters to Secretary of State and to County Chairmen.

April 27—County Clerks check all precinct registration books, for use by Election officials.

April 30—Deadline for notifying the press of schools of instruction for polling place officials.

May 1—Latest date for publication of Primary Proclamation by County Commissioners; latest date for posting Proclamation.

May 4—Schools of instruction for election officials and interested citizens.

May 7—Deadline 12:00 Noon for receipt of Primary absentee ballots; thereafter no receipt can be counted except in counties.

May 8—PRIMARY ELECTION: Polls remain open 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.; Election officials arrive for duty 7:30 a.m. Absentee Ballots delivered to polls during voting hours.

Office of County Clerk remains open until all returns are received, or 24 hours after polls close.

May 11—Latest date for County Canvassing Boards to canvass Primary results, for certification to Secretary of State and issuance of certificates of nomination to successful candidates.

May 11—Candidates for County, State or District offices may take similar action within ten (10) days after issuance of certificates of nomination therefor.

May 18—Last date for Primary candidates to file Primary campaign expense statements.

May 18—Deadline for County Canvassing Board to complete canvass of the returns and ascertain results.

May 21—State Canvassing Board convenes to canvass results.

Monday, April 9, the first forest fire occurred in Brady Canyon above Ruidoso. No major damage was done, however, it should serve to warn us of the drying forest conditions at hand. This fire, two weeks later might have well been disastrous. The cause of the fire has not been definitely determined, except one fact is certain, that it was man-caused and resulted from someone's carelessness.  
With the new subdivisions being built around the outskirts of the city, threats of devastating fires become more prevalent because of topographical features coupled with larger concentrations of fuels and human activity. Our job of fire prevention cannot be too strongly stressed if we are to survive without the big one.  
I don't think anyone would question the fact that over-all we are doing a pretty good job of prevention, considering our fire potential in the Ruidoso area. However, it will only take one fire, under the right conditions, to ruin us.  
When forest fires do occur, men and equipment must be put to effective work to control and completely extinguish them to the last spark. 

# FOUR HOUR SESSION OF VILLAGE COUNCIL HAS MORE THAN 30 VISITORS; PYRAMID OF WORK

(Editor's Note: To give our readers an idea of how the elected village officials "earn their pay" actually they receive no remuneration for the job—below is reprinted a part of the minutes of a recent board of trustees meeting that lasted more than four hours and which saw more than 30 visitors in attendance on various business matters. Added to this—the board of trustees, after the regular meeting reported below, held five special called meetings in a few days after this session—two of them in one day.)

Mayor Robert Fearson called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. with the following Trustees reporting present: Tom Jones, Bernard Rooney and Lloyd Davis, Jr. Attorney Thompson, Marshall Bobo and Engineer Kennedy were also in attendance. Visitors included Bert Rice, Bob Moore, Dan Swearingin, Carl DeBord, George Powell, Billie Clarke, Wayne Estes, Ben Donathan, Jim Chandler, Bud Crouch, Bill McCampbell, Roy Lawson, Lloyd Davis, Sr., Mr. Pierce, Jarrett James, Leo Page, Leon Farrer, Jim Spencer, Marshall Wylie, Al Pearson and Warren Tucker.

Mayor Fearson called for the bids on water meters, which were as follows: (18/3/4" direct reading.)

1. Hersey-Sparling Co. 427.20 each without connection, 429.24 each with connection — Minimum \$10 a month.
2. Clowe and Cowan Co. 240 5/8" x 3/4" Neptune meter, with couplings \$28.95 each.
3. McCaffrey-Way Co. Badger meters model A-SOT, six meters to case (minimum order of 1 case), \$28.95 each without connection, \$28.97 each with connections.
4. Rockwell Manufacturing Co. Minimum of 10 meters a month, \$27.00 each without connections, \$28.02 each with connections. (Trade allowance of \$3.50 will be made for each old meter with the purchase of each two new meters).

Trustee Jones made a motion, seconded by Rooney, that the contract for meters not be awarded at this time, but at a later date. The motion carried with a vote of all ayes.

Mayor Fearson next called for the opening bids on the proposed Fire Sub-Station to be constructed in Palmer Gateway.

1. Jodie Tillman — \$3,200.00.
  2. Kimer Firrell — \$3,100.00.
  3. Knox Electric (wiring only) — \$188.47.
- Fire Chief Robert Moore asked the Trustees to defer action on awarding the bid until he could meet with the other firemen. Trustee Davis made a motion that the Fire Chief's request be granted. Motion seconded by Jones and carried with a vote of all ayes.
- Mr. Dan Swearingin appeared before the Trustees as spokesman for the Fire Dept., asking that Mr. DeBord approve a call for bids for a State Fire Marshall's and

Mountain States Bureau approved Fire Truck in order that the Village continue to receive sub-station state money. Mr. Swearingin also stated that the Fire Dept. was petitioning the Village to pay the Fire Dept. \$1,000 for the short wave radio base set being used by the Village. (The \$1,000, it paid, to be used as a down payment on the new Fire Truck when purchased). Trustee Davis made a motion, seconded by Jones, that the Fire Dept. requests be granted. The motion carried with a vote of all ayes.

Billie Clarke, Wayne Estes and Ben Donathan, members of the Cemetery Board, appeared before the Board of Trustees, seeking information pertaining to the Cemetery Land, and in particular to a road being cut northwest of and adjacent to the present cemetery. The Trustees stated and produced maps and minutes of earlier meetings, that Davis Developments was doing that portion of their recent Forest Land exchange, to the Village for Cemetery purposes only. (Total of acres). The Council apologized to the members of the Cemetery Board for having not advised them of the land exchange sooner and thanked them for attending the meeting.

Bert Rice, Building Inspector, appeared before the Trustees and presented plans for the following, all within the Fire Zone:

1. George Bonal's proposed swimming pool at La Fonda Motel.
2. Leon Farrer's request for addition to building behind Pat's Sporting Goods.
3. An eight-unit addition to Tomshawk Motel, Inc. (Mr. McCampbell, Lawson and Pierce presented the plans together with Mr. Rice). The proposed Zoning Ordinance relative to off-street parking was checked.

After reviewing each proposal, Trustee Davis made a motion, seconded by Rooney, that permission be granted to construct each of the proposals providing those concerned made application for a Building permit. The motion carried with a vote of all ayes.

Jim Chandler, Bud Crouch, Roger Morris and Wayne Estes, in behalf of the Ruidoso Jaycees, petitioned the Trustees for use of a portion of Village Land in Two Rivers Park area for construction of a Jaycee Building. After discussion of same, Trustee Jones made a motion that the Village Attorney draw up proper lease agreement to be approved by both interested parties. The motion was seconded by Rooney and carried with a vote of all ayes.

Carl DeBord presented a plat of a subdivision to be known as DeBord Heights which he sought approval from the Trustees to have same become annexed by the Village. Mr. DeBord stated that he had tentative approval from the P. & Z. Commission. (It was pointed out by the Clerk that Mr. DeBord had received tentative ap-

proval from the P. & Z. Commission with certain recommendations on a single tract of land and not a sub-division). Trustee Jones made a motion that upon the final approval and acceptance of the land in question by the P. & Z. Commission, the motion was carried by Trustee Davis and carried with a vote of all ayes.

Jim Spencer of McCaffrey-Way Co., appeared before the Trustees and presented information pertaining to the Eagle Creek Water Storage Reservoir. Mr. Spencer stated that it had been calculated by his company that loss through seepage is about 101,000 gallons per day, plus an additional 17,000 gallons due to evaporation. Mr. Spencer further stated that if the compound sold by McCaffrey-Way were used on the floor of the reservoir, seepage would be cut a little, but not an appreciable amount. The report was accepted with no action by the Trustees, as Mr. Spencer did not have a report from the State Health Dept. relative to the compound.

Lloyd Davis, Sr., and Jarrett Jones presented a plat of tract of land in east Ruidoso, contiguous with the Village limits and parallel with Highway 70, which they sought approval from the Trustees to bring into the corporate limits. A letter from the P. & Z. Commission pertaining to drainage of the land in question was presented. Mr. Davis stated that in March the P. & Z. Commission had granted the developers tentative approval subject to the water and sewer Supt.'s approval of the proposed water and sewer lines that would service the area. Trustee Jones stated that he would prefer to see the plat showing water and sewer line proposals and streets. Mr. Davis stated that he only wished to have this single tract brought in to the Village limits and that plat of his adjacent land would be plotted according to the land subdivision regulations and presented to the P. & Z. Commission when all mapping and etc., was completed. Mr. Jones persisted that the tract of land in question should meet the annexation requirements. After continued discussion of same, Trustee Rooney made a motion that the tract of land be given approval to be brought into the Village limits on the basis that Davis check with the water and sewer Supt.'s, and get their approval on the water and sewer service lines to the tract. The motion was seconded by Trustee Davis. Trustee Jones raised the question of asking Trustee Rooney to amend his motion and add "that further providing the tract of land meets the requirements of Section

2.2 of the sub-division regulations." Trustee Rooney stated that he could not amend his motion to include Trustee Jones' request since the entire question centered around a single tract of land. Trustee Rooney and Davis voted aye with Trustee Jones voting nay. Mayor Fearson declared the motion passed. Mr. Davis stated that he would check with the water and sewer superintendents and get their approval before he would attempt to have water and sewer lines installed.

Next visitor received was Marshall Wylie of Wylie Paving Co. Mr. Wylie stated that he was in attendance in an effort to reach some sort of agreement with the Village regarding his company's share of work under Paving District 60-1. Mr. Wylie stated that there was a difference in his company's final cost and that of the Village's engineer. He stated that in his opinion, the difference was in the base course of materials used; and that work under the engineer had allowed for too much shrinkage.

At this time, a petition from some property owners affected by the paving district from the First Bridge to the Second Bridge was presented. Mr. Wylie stated that he thought the 21 protestants on the petition were correct in stating that their paving was not up to standards since he had driven over the same and that the bad conditions of the pavement was due to his company taking a calculated risk with the ensuing winter weather and further stated that his company would come back and re-pave the same. Mr. Tucker stated that throughout the entire road from the post office block up to the second bridge should be redone. Mr. Wylie stated that his company would live up to their contractual agreement regarding repair and maintenance. Engineer Kennedy stated that neither he nor the Trustees had accepted the paving as being completed; however, Engineer Kennedy did say that he had written a letter to Wylie regarding and acknowledging partial acceptance.

Trustee Davis questioned the amount of, or lack of, base course put on certain roads and in particular that portion from the post office block to the Second Bridge, as well as School Road. Mr. Wylie stated that the materials as presented in his completion report had been used in the paving project. Mayor Fearson stated that he still could not figure out why the total paving project cost exceeded that of the original contract and the assessment roll. Trustee Davis added that he could not understand how the complete amount of base course used equaled that of the original contract.

like approximately three miles of paving was taken out as a result of the protest hearings. It was pointed out by the Engineer that there was an under-run of about 10,000 yards from the original contract as compared to the final project. Attorney Thompson related to the Trustees that a recently enacted law by the Legislature had provided for an additional or re-assessment where there existed an over-run on costs as compared with the original estimate. Mr. Thompson further stated that since the final cost is greater than that estimated, the entire question centered around not enough money available and that perhaps going through re-assessment actions would be the logical thing to do. The council expressed the opinion that they would prefer not to have this done.

Mr. Wylie stated that he would agree to have some outside person, preferably an engineer, act as arbitrator between he and the Village in determining the amount owed his Company. Upon mutual agreement of both parties, the matter was tabled until a later date.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as read. Ordinance No. 126, which had been presented, considered, and approved at an earlier meeting depending on the Engineer arriving at a definite cost for replacing paving that had been cut for purpose of water and sewer connections, and/or any other reasons. Engineer Kennedy stated that he based his estimate on the fact that the Trustees accepted the recommendation of the Engineer and instructed the Clerk to have this figure placed in the Ordinance.

Trustees Jones and Davis reported on lack of proper drainage at certain places in the Village and in particular around Leck Cowden's home. Trustee Jones and Davis reported that several east Ruidoso citizens (those persons who had lived in old Hollywood prior to their coming in to the corporate limits of Ruidoso) desired to have a water and sewer assessment district in order to get the benefits of same. Mr. Davis further stated that the property owners would draw up a petition for the afore-mentioned and pre-

sent same for the Trustees' consideration. Trustee Rooney stated that Burdette and Campbell had contacted him relative to the land exchange between them and the Village and that they requested a deed. Since Burdette and Campbell have not completed their agreement regarding the arrangement, the Trustees felt that no deeds could be exchanged.

Trustee Davis stated that the State had put an extension onto the culvert that drains toward the Butler property.

Trustee Davis also stated that the Village needed to have the new paving strip. Trustee Jones was in accord and he stated that perhaps the State crew could paint the Pedestrian Crosswalks and the No Parking areas along the Main Road and Mechem Drive.

Trustee Rooney stated that the Village should have the cemetery rules pertaining to markers enforced.

Mayor Fearson reported that a group of women known as the "Petunia Pickers" had asked him for permission to beautify the traffic circles and islands above the Post Office. Trustee Davis made a motion, which was seconded by Rooney, that permission be granted subject to the Petunia Pickers plans being approved by the council and further providing for the Village Water Dept. to make water available at the above designated area.

Marshall Bobo reported that the Village needed approximately 20 stop signs to be placed at proper places within the Village. Marshall Bobo also reported that he was seeking the aid of the State Highway Traffic Dept. in determining the placing and adequateness of Traffic Signs. The following applications for Occupation Licenses were presented. (At this point in the minutes were listed the names of 113 business firms issued approved occupational licenses.) After reviewing the applications, Trustee Jones made a motion, seconded by Davis that the applicants be issued an Occupational License subject to usual investigation. Mo-

tion carried. A letter from Locke Inn seeking permission to move their sign near the sidewalk was read. Trustee Davis made a motion that permission be granted providing that the sign not hang over the sidewalk or road. The motion was seconded by Rooney and carried with a vote of all ayes.

A letter of protest from Timberlodge of Ruidoso regarding the I. E. H. model home's location in the Gateway area, relative to the Fire Zone, was ruled invalid since several of the council had made a survey of the area and found that the I. E. H. was in compliance.

A letter of resignation submitted by Dan Swearingin, Chairman of the P. & Z. Commission was read. Trustee Jones made a motion, seconded by Trustee Rooney that the request be granted. Motion carried with a vote of all ayes. The Clerk presented information on Fluoridation. The Trustees de-

clined to table this until a later date. The Clerk was authorized to pay John Emde \$450.00 for work done on the Walton property as a result of the Main Road Construction.

The Trustees accepted a proposal from L. F. Jennings, Mobil Distributor on Oil. The prices quoted are to run through December 31, 1952:

- Mobiloil, all grades, 24 1-Qt. cans, \$7.50 per case.
- Mobiloil, all grades, six 5-Qt. cans, \$9.16 per case.
- Mobiloil special, 24 1-Qt. cans, \$9.53 per case.
- Mobiloil special, six 5-Qt. cans, \$11.70 per case.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, Mayor Fearson declared the meeting adjourned.




