





### Teen-Age Knife Collector Speaks To Ruidoso Service Clubbers

Mike Warren, 16-year old Wilmer, Tex., knife fanatic, spoke here this week at the noon meeting of the Ruidoso Rotary Club at Watters Steak House and also to the evening meeting of the Lions Club at 7:30, both engagements on Tuesday.

Mike's collection has been one of the outstanding prize winning displays at the Texas State Fair in Dallas since 1967 and each year the number of lethal weapons in the collection threatens to grow out of its assigned display case and at the same time the stories attached to each new item is more interesting.

It all started with a stiletto, Mike was nine at the time, an age when most boys may swap marbles for a busted barlow knife, Mike was proving to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Warren, that danger-

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ous dirks and daggers, with parents' patient guidance, can carve good citizenship as surely as a switchblade spells woe and delinquency to a neglected child. In seven years, Mike has built a collection of 125 knives valued at more than \$5,000.00.

From the stiletto of World War II, the collection began to grow, an ex-Navy pilot contributed a samurai sword once wielded by a Japanese officer. A police inspector gave Mike a Marine Corps knife. A great-uncle surrendered a WWI trench knife, another relative turned over a WW II trench knife, wicked looking with its sword-like stubby blade and handle that boasted of a detachable pair

of spiked brass knucks. A spear thru, the battle dirk carried by killed Scout warriors, was added by a former sailor. A merchant seaman gave up a couple of Turkish pocket knives, an inland tribal knife from Saudi Arabia, a handmade knife from the island of Cyprus and a pearl and turquoise handled weapon from Iran.

Knives soon covered several display boards. Today they cover the major portion of a fifth wall at the family home in Wilmer, Tex. In addition to keeping up his collection and a constant round of "Guest Speaking" engagements Mike is a "B" average student at Wilmer-Hutchins High School.

On any trip that Mike makes as a guest speaker, he is always ready to say thanks to members of civic clubs such as the Lions and Rotary for helping in programs that sponsor projects such as the Boy Scouts. He feels they are just a little bit responsible for his having the wonderful opportunity to be involved in the Scouting program,





**A Historic Coffee Break**  
 The coffee break is a fairly well established practice in many business organizations. No doubt, it is a definite benefit to have a few minutes relief from the office, store or factory grind. But it has been abused in many places and has been the issue in some of the country's most costly and disastrous strikes. When it is used right and not taken advantage of, it is welcomed by management and labor. It is a term loosely used for a brief period of rest whether the people stop for coffee, a soft drink, or a glass of milk.  
 But there was one historic coffee break that stands out for two reasons. It occurred under most trying circumstances, and the man who served the coffee later became the President of the United States.  
 On the afternoon of Sept. 17, 1862, Federal troops crossed Antietam Creek and were pressing toward Sharpsburg against fierce resistance. The sergeant in charge of the Commissary Department for an Ohio Regiment voluntarily carried a bucket of hot coffee and a box of cooked rations to the men of his regiment along the firing line. He ladled the coffee into a tin cup and let each man have his fill. He also served the warm food from the ration box. The sergeant, who instituted the coffee break, later became the President of the United States was William McKinley.  
 A tall granite monument can be seen today on the site of this historic engagement in Western Maryland. It bears an inscription citing this thoughtful and considerate action voluntarily undertaken in the face of grave danger.  
**We Need Real "Yes" Men**  
 For many years now the "Yes" man has been in disrepute. In the popular mind he is a fellow who, if he thinks he can gain some advantage by so doing, will "Yes" his boss or the head of any organization to which he belongs. He is often called an "Apple polisher". That popular notion is all wrong. Real "Yes" men are solid citizens and the world needs more of them. All businesses need them. When some one proposes a program to improve a product or a service, to introduce new methods, to cut costs, to find ways to work more efficiently, to increase sales, does he want to hear a chorus of "No, it can't be done"? Certainly not. The welfare of everyone concerned depends upon men who will say, "Yes! It can be done and we will pitch in and help get the work accomplished."  
 Many communities in our great country have sub-standard schools, poor sewage systems, deteriorating buildings and terrible streets, inadequate street markings and in need of house numbering. When communities with any of these definite needs finds someone with enough vision and energy to propose that something be done about it, does the community want to hear only those who protest, "It won't work. No use trying. It can't be done"? A great chorus of "Yes" men can change undesirable aspects, help carry forward reasonable plans of progress, be concerned about wild ideas and burdening being made to raise funds to build a priest's residence in connection with St. Eleanor's Church.



## 144 Mile Warm-Up Necessary For Ruidoso Youth With Go Kart Who Wants To Enter Races

For over a year a good looking youngster in T-shirt and blue jeans has been training over to Roswell to see how he is doing. Hannaford Davis makes this little log of 144 miles to find out how his go kart will perform. He is a go kart racer, and a pretty good one.

Hannaford, 17 years old when he got interested in karting, has two trophies for first place winner at the Roswell Kart Track and three seconds and five thirds. The one time he took the tiny racing sled to Biggs Air Force Base in El Paso he outran every kart that happened to be on hand.

Now 18 year old, young Davis has his third kart, a Fox Kart with a Mc 20 on it. The Mc 20 poses an interesting possibility. It has 9 in take ports and three exhaust ports.

Modifying the ports helps get more power. He has honed up the engine and ported the engine to get every extra bit of power. With 12 ports to tamper with the "power combinations" are endless.

Every chance he gets Hannaford puts his time in on his hobby. He is a screen processor at the Karl Johnson Advertising Agency in Ruidoso. His home is in Ruidoso.

"You can make this hobby expensive," warns Hannaford. "It depends on how far you want to go with it. A fellow can have a lot of fun and do a good job on the track without spending a lot of money. I first went into karting and had a big time with \$100 in the sport."

The \$100 was spent for his kart. This youthful driver of go karts finds it helps a lot to learn how an engine works when porting karts and handling them, both in the shop and on the track. The numerous adjustments make a top mechanic out of a fellow. "I like to tinker with anything that has a noise on it," in his enthusiastic summing up of making adjustments on kart engines.

Davis observes that several boys in the Ruidoso area are interested in karting. He hopes a go kart track will be set up in Ruidoso some day.

These youngsters have strict rules to go by when competing on a track. When they are observed, the sport is perfectly safe, says Hannaford. He is a member of the Go Kart Club of America, a world wide organization. The club has never had a close call. His experience shows that endurance on the

track is what counts. He keeps himself in perfect condition for this. Sometimes kart racers will run around the track at 100 miles an hour. A recent race at the Roswell Kart Track was for 120 miles, quite a jaunt for the tiny wheels to accomplish.

Hannaford's gift to the kart tracks has made nice friendships through rubbing shoulders with other contestants. He gets into sessions at the track with the other boys. They try to help each other. "The more karts out there," says Hannaford, "the more fun it is. Competition is what does it. I like to make it real close."

The youngsters not interested in his hobby through watching his cousin, Derald Waltrip of Ruidoso, tinker with the engines. Derald has a trophy for first place and several ribbons. He wants it known his wife is a pretty good racer in her own right. She has won many seconds and thirds. Derald records "Kids start karting when they are 12 years old. And there are people in their 50's running

karts." The little terrors of the kart track weigh around 90 pounds, blunt rubber wheels and everything else included. Hannaford is one of the better racers to appear at Roswell. He opinions, however, there are several competitors over there who have been giving him trouble. This calls for more adjustments of the toy-like engine that goes into a go kart.

Both young men insist the sport is exceptionally clean. They say, in almost the same breath, that for sportsmanship, you cannot find anything its equal. "The main thing," observes Derald, "is to have your car in a safe condition. This includes all your wheels and your steering."

Porting and polishing. This is the cycle of devotion required of every loquacious devotee of the sport. The timing has to be perfect. Derald joins his younger cousin in pointing out the whole process is a hit and miss proposition. Anything off in the adjustments and the result is poor performance on the track. These youthful Ruidosians tear down and completely rebuild their respective engines. If the engine does not run right, they do it all over. It takes patience. Sometimes the lads go into an engine 20 different times.

"Our big problem," says Derald, "is we completely tear down and rebuild an engine but we do not know how it will run till we get to Roswell. There is no place in Ruidoso to try it out. It is all guess work. This is the fun of it—the ever present question of who can overdo the other."

Quite a number of boys in the area would go in for karting if there were a place to run their vehicles, the two young men said. This general sport of the tiny racers helps a person's driving, develops his mechanical skill, and improves his coordination a great deal. Driving is just as important as the engine. A 16-year-old at Roswell can win driving almost anything. He is not reckless. His "gimmick" is his uncanny driving ability.

Flag men, announcers, safety men on bad turns, judges, and pit—all are used at a go kart track just like in the big time. 48 pages of competition regulations and track specifications are made up by the Go Kart Club of America and are followed wherever there is a kart track and a race. Improvements are being constantly developed in the engines. Hannaford's McCulloch will have to be replaced one of these days. There are several new models out.

A recent issue of a Karting World Magazine gives a report on karting in Venezuela. Young Davis, and his youthful competitors are torn between what newest manifold, clutch, steering, muffler, engine, lubricant and other innovations to try.

For a new wrinkle there is now karting on the water. Plans are underway in some parts of the nation to have parades of karts. A youngster will find his time well occupied, his mind on the alert with competition and imaginative conquests ahead, when he goes in for the hobby of karting. Just ask young Hannaford Davis! He wouldn't trade it for anything else in the world.



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

**LETTER TO EDITOR**

Dear Vic:  
This is a copy of a radio talk I made over Radio Station KRRR Wednesday evening and I have been requested to give you a copy to be published in The Ruidoso News, if you wish.

On the subject of the planned airport project and the proposed Zoning Ordinance, I will express my own personal views from a citizen's standpoint. I chose Ruidoso for my home approximately twenty years ago and have seen it progress and grow. I hope to see its continued growth under the guidance of wise planning but at the same time preserve our mountain community for people of all walks of life.

In Bill Toole's recent talk on the local Radio Station which was published in The Ruidoso News, he states that he has been educated in the field of Urban Planning and Development but I would like to see the textbooks or hear professor's lectures in the Connecticut and Massachusetts schools he attended that can tell the Ruidoso business people what is best for them.

Many, many Ruidoso residents are well educated, well traveled and well informed individuals but I believe in the inherent good common sense of the American people, with or without a formal education. Along the college education, most of us have been to church and learned the precepts set forth by our Maker—most of us also know the basic concepts of the Constitution of the United States which guarantees each citizen certain freedoms and rights free from interference from any governing body.

Now, let us get to the meat of this whole matter. I have talked to many people who voted for the airport bond believing that by electing wise leaders at the same time, that only a reasonable amount of maintenance and improvement would be done. As you will remember,

the party, elected to fill our Village slate, promised that the gasoline tax would be used only for street maintenance, the purpose for which it was levied. I do not believe the citizens ever dreamed of an outgoing administration submitting us to debts for a period of twenty years. Doing this after their successors had been elected on a promise contrary to the old administration's actions. Common sense tells us the streets are used a thousand fold more than the airport runway and needless to say, they will need some maintenance during the next twenty years.

The airport is an asset to our community and I feel sure the majority of us wish to maintain it and keep it safe.

Mr. Pearson, you say "get the facts". I say prove to us that the airport was to be condemned, that it is necessary and sound economically to spend over half a million dollars to keep it from being condemned and to enlarge an airport against a mountain where airliners will never be permitted to land other than in an emergency! The fact is that municipally-operated airports usually operate in the red. If Mr. Toole has figured insurance, utilities, building and runway maintenance, salaries, etc., along with the payments on these large loans, can he and Mr. Pearson conscientiously tell us that the taxpayers will not have a great additional tax burden to bear? I assure you that an airport of this proposed size will require more than one employee.

A. Lawrence Lowell, late President of Harvard University once said, "The mark of an educated man is his ability to make a reasoned guess on the basis of insufficient information." We are certainly doing that in this case and my reasoned guess is, "We'll be sorry."

Regarding your remarks, Mr. Pearson, on the subject of individuals outside our Village expressing their views on the Airport Project, as I remember it, a number of citizens outside our Village limits spoke on behalf of the Airport Bond Issue.

If I lived outside the Village limits, I would certainly follow the Planning and Zoning with as much alertness as the Village citizens should. Many of those now outside our Village will be brought in before our debts are paid. In the Proposed Zoning Ordinance, regulations are included to seriously affect those outside the present village limits.

Since we are in opposition to so many of Mr. Toole's proposals, perhaps we have a different sense of values. The Zoning Ordinance prepared under his supervision would have adversely affected so many established businesses and summer homes in Ruidoso that I cannot embrace it. Many of the summer residents who would be hurt by such an inapplicable zoning ordinance built their cabins and helped build Ruidoso before many of these experts ever heard of this little mountain community.

A beautiful and prosperous community can be planned with the knowledge Mr. Toole has accumulated and progress is a good word, but to my way of thinking, the second

office and cost can be too great to some. Do we have a right to make such plans when many business people and residents who have pioneered this Village will be written off as expendable? They will tell you this is not true and I tell you to read this proposed Zoning Ordinance as I have. Its purposes sound noble but its effects will be disastrous to many. This ordinance has teeth including high fines and severe penalties for violation of any of its many cumbersome regulations.

The citizens of Ruidoso who were interested enough to attend the public hearings on this subject overwhelmingly objected to it in its proposed form and we now have an almost entirely new Zoning and Planning Commission. Surely we can work with this group and start anew to adopt a workable zoning ordinance, making certain that the public is informed as they go along. I, for one, can assure you that the information I was able to obtain from the previous Commission was conflicting and difficult to obtain.

Copies of the Proposed Zoning Ordinance were finally made available to the citizens after the recent Village election only a few days prior to the first public hearing. I sincerely hope we will have the good sense to start from scratch on the subject of zoning and work something out especially for our resort Village that will guide our future growth and afford protection for future investors without ruining existing establishments. If we need zoning at all, I am sure that some of our long time taxpayers are perfectly capable of performing the task.

In regard to the Airport Project, I feel that the taxpayers of this community must not be compelled to start from scratch on a half million dollars or more and every citizen of this Village should express their views on this subject. We do not have to sit idly by and see our street maintenance funds used for any purpose other than street maintenance. Remember, all we voted was a \$67,000 Bond Issue for the airport. This does not constitute the citizen's approval of an expenditure of almost ten times that amount and incurring indebtedness for a period of twenty years.

If we let this be done to our Village, it is only the beginning. Read the Comprehensive Plan and be prepared.

The following is a postscript—not a part of the radio talk. I just returned from a visit to Arizona where we saw many ancient Indian ruins. The story goes that the first inhabitants of these dwellings were a peaceful race, interested only in raising their crops and their families and taking care of their own affairs.

At first their land was poor but with hard work and a love for the land, they managed to provide the necessities for their people. A volcanic eruption drove them from

their homes but when things calmed down, they returned to find their soil greatly improved and enriched.

They rebuilt their homes and fields and harvested bountiful crops for the first time. Other Indians who occasionally passed through their part of the country now gazed upon these sweat drenched lands with an envious eye. This was the time to drive out the original dwellers and reap the benefit of the hard work and holdings of others.

Such warlike Indians were called Hohokam. They drove the peaceful Wapukis from their land and look over to profit from the sacrifices of the hard working old timers. The Hohokam stripped the fields of their corn and squash and then themselves departed for parts unknown leaving behind ruin and desolation because they were not farmers like the original inhabitants but were a nomadic tribe wandering over the desert wastes and reaping the fruits of the toil of more domestic tribes.

As a matter of history has a moral. While plowing our own fields, we must keep a watchful eye and a dry bow string. By the time this is printed in the Ruidoso News, the Village Trustees will probably have acted on the Federal loan for the Airport Project and should they allow this unreasonable expenditure, continued pressure by the taxpayers to abandon such extravagance will go a long way toward saving us from excessive taxation regardless of previous actions.

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

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


### Letters to the Editor
