



The stout 2-year-old son of Moon Deck-Miss Night Bar fought back like a true champion to finish a surprising and most amazing second to Ray Baldwin's Miss Pay Bracket, but the effort went for naught when the luck of the draw frowned on Jet Deck.

With a better break in racing luck, Jet Deck would have regarded a prohibitive favorite for this 350-yard straightaway classic. 



 New Mexico, Land of Disenchantment. Or—How not to succeed without really half trying. Call it sour grapes, righteous indignation, or what you will. Nonetheless, I'm more than a little hot under the old collar over an isolated incident of the past week-end here, and would like to warn you

West Central Texans of what to expect in case you're contemplating a trip over in the near future.

It has nothing to do with losing money on the ponies, although one's chances in that area continue to be strong. Neither does it concern a speeding ticket I became saddled with, which could be charged off to "experience." Instead, it is a forewarning in the manner in which such alleged violations are handled here, which to a sensitive motorist such as I—found to be in extremely bad taste.

The hope is that these simple words may aid some future unsuspecting traveler.

It all started with that little black box, to which I hold no personal ill will. It rattled, and said that I was going 65 miles per hour in a 55 zone. None of our four-member party spotted the thing, but suppose it had to be there.

(Unlike our own state of Texas, New Mexico's speed limits for the most part run either 55 or 70. However, the highway starts to get snaky several miles out of Ruidoso due to the mountainous terrain, hence the speed limits fluctuate around over that stretch of road.) So There You Are, Car 54

Speeding tickets are uncontemplated aggravations anytime. Fortunately, it was the first such ticket I had ever been dealt. Not being financially bolstered for such an occurrence on such short notice, I figured to myself to pay it off by check so as to have sufficient funds to "lavish" over the week-end.

That theory went up in smoke, however. The time was 12:08 p.m., and the officer in charge specified that it was required of me to report in to a certain justice of the peace's court no later than 1 p.m.—less than an hour away—and that failure to comply would constitute an additional violation, a misdemeanor.

Congenially, he described to me the whereabouts of the JP concerned—a motel on the left hand side of the road just before coming on to the race track. (Nope, the name isn't Kangaroo Courts, if that's what you're thinking—it was Greentree Motel.)

# FAMOUS NAMES IN HISTORY AMONG PATRONS OF POST OFFICES IN LINCOLN COUNTY; NEW BOOK GIVES DATA ON MAIL SERVICE

## Tales of Early West Interwoven In Story of 70 Establishments

All the type has been set and the presses are rolling now in the Ruidoso News printing office on a new historical publication, a collection of stories of the post offices in Lincoln County.

Written by almost two dozen people, the stories give details of early experiences of postmasters, mail carriers and patrons of some 70 post offices that have existed within the bounds of Lincoln County. Some of the 70 are now in other counties, since almost half a dozen counties or parts of counties have been carved out of the original huge area that was Lincoln County when New Mexico was a territory.

Many famous names are on the post office records as patrons—including Mary Roberts Rhinehardt, Helen Hayes, Charles MacArthur, General John J. Pershing, Linda Darnell, Paul Horgan, Peter Hurd, Emerson Hough, Eugene Manlove Rhodes, and of course the principals in the Lincoln County War, whose stories are included in many other publications recounting that infamous event.

Many of the 70 post offices existed for only a few days, or weeks or months, serving mining camps and early day ranch headquarters.

Some of the anecdotes included are humorous, others are tragic. Names of hundreds of early settlers are included in the stories.

In the years to come, the publication will likely become a collectors' item, and will provide future historians with some authentic references. The gathering of the manuscripts for this book has taken several years—and is still not as complete as the sponsors had hoped—but in spite of that, what has been put together for this edition is of real and lasting value. The book will likely find a de-

inite place among historical writings in libraries of universities, colleges and museums throughout the Southwest. It is sponsored by the Postmasters of Lincoln County. Part of the records used in compiling the work comes from the dusty archives of the U. S. Postal Department in Washington, D. C. They, of a necessity, were handwritten, some possibly with a quill pen.

Credit to the various writers of the several pieces is given only with a "by-line" over the stories. Many persons who worked on the project are anonymous.

An interesting thing to note about the book is that it gives the stories of the post offices in chronological order, with Ft. Stanton being the oldest, founded in 1857, it is still in existence. The youngest is Ruidoso Downs, renamed from Green Tree three years ago.

The book will sell for \$1.25. Included is a map by Artist Bill Lettwich which shows existing post offices in the county at the time of the book's publication this year.

### Perfecto Sanchez, Star Route Mail Carrier In This Area 30 Years,

(Editor's Note: Very fitting with the story at left of publication of a history of Lincoln County post-offices is this article written for the News by Perfecto Sanchez, pioneer Star Route mail carrier for several Lincoln and Otero County communities.)

I, Perfecto Sanchez, was born on May 21, 1910, in Arabela, New Mexico, at my father's ranch, where I was raised by my parents, Mr. and Mrs. Simon Sanchez.

My father's ranch was on the Arabela-Tinilo route. My father, Simon Sanchez, was born in 1838, and died in 1934. My mother, Eulalia S. Sanchez, was born in 1848, and died in 1938. I was raised in the Ruidoso valley and along U. S. Highway 70, a star route carrier for many years.

ches, 1930-1934; Mr. Frank Trujillo, 1938-1948; Mr. Perfecto Sanchez, 1938-1948; Mr. Epuoseno Sanchez, 1948 to present (1962).

On the first Monday of July, 1930, I started hauling mail under my father's (Simon Sanchez) contract, whose route extended from Arabela, New Mexico to Tularosa, New Mexico; (40 miles round trip, 3 days a week). My means of transportation was usually by Model T and Model A automobiles. However, in times of bad weather and road conditions, I would go on horseback or I would use a buggy and a pair of Spanish mules to haul heavy mail; and using a kerosene lantern which served as a heater on cold days. Anyway, as the saying goes: "The mail went through, no matter what conditions were in store."

I was married in 1929 to Eulalia S. Sanchez. In July, 1938, I took over the contract. I continued hauling mail on this same route until the last day of June, 1946, at which time I got a contract, which included hauling mail on the new route extending from Tularosa, New Mexico to Hondo, New Mexico; thus, leaving my former contract to my brother, Epuoseno Sanchez, who has continued hauling mail up to the present time, (1962), on this same route.

On June 24, 1946, my family, consisting of my wife, Eulalia S. Sanchez, my two daughters, Elsie and Elma, my eight sons, Henry, Esmael, Alberto, Esfriere, Perfecto, Jr., Roy, Lu's, Belson, and I moved to Tularosa, New Mexico. After getting settled in Tularosa, my wife and I started hauling mail on the first Monday of July, 1946, on our new route extending from Tularosa, New Mexico to Hondo, New Mexico.

Up to the present time (1962), I have continued hauling mail on

this same route renewing my contract every four years. At the present time, my route extends from Alamogordo, New Mexico to Hondo, New Mexico (160 miles round trip), and has again renewed from 1962 to 1966.

At this time, I wish to thank God for having given me the ability and initiative to stay in good health for all the twenty-eight years of my experience as a mail carrier, always enabling me to get the mail through without delay and in perfect condition. In all these twenty-eight years I have never missed a day or been late, due to health or weather conditions, etc.

Also, my heart felt thanks go to all postmasters, postal employees and postal inspectors, who over the many years have helped to make my job such a pleasant one.





### A Preacher's Monday Morning

This is being written on Monday and some glances are being taken "through the rear view mirror," and other glimpses of the road ahead. Most group meetings of ministers are planned for Monday morning and I think that is wise. Perhaps the minister feels he can take a little "breather" and enter into some of the fellowship meetings with the brethren. The preacher-man feels that fraternization with others who labor in the field with him will do his soul good. Monday sometimes finds the minister in mixed moods. Some times he has board meetings, youth meetings and evening meetings in addition to the Church School and Morning Service. Sunday does not always proceed as smoothly as the minister had hoped and some things were left up in the air for him to get hot on the trail as soon as convenient (or sooner). I think if a minister does not have a planned group meeting for Monday, he should seek the fellowship and conversation of fellow-laborers for that day. A gloomy and glum preacher on Monday morning better get into both the physical and spiritual sunshine of God in a hurry. Juanita and I got up fairly early today, and when she saw me bringing out the paraphernalia for painting, she did the same thing. She recently started doing other objects than flowers and berries, and went to work on birds. Now she has the most beautiful Cardinal on a plate you ever saw. Me, I'm just finishing up blooming tulips. And, you can tell what they are, too... clear across the room even without printing "tulips" on the picture. Let me hasten to say that

I do not classify any daubing I do with Juanita's work. She is the artist. I just got started recently to see what I could do. I looked through several journals and books of instructions and felt that I wanted to try my hand. No works are on display to the public and I am not ready for a one-man show. That's one way I have of "letting my hair down." Well, back to the preachers. Since a great number of families serve roast preacher for Sunday dinner, and even warm him up on Monday, I think he can stand a little more mentioning in this brief column. 





miles on State Road 24 out of Cloudercroft. Just before the highway leaves the summit and starts down the mountain, take the all-weather extension road which will be marked. Follow the marked route for 18 miles to Sunspot.

Sunspot is not a town, but the name of the postoffice established for the convenience of the observatory's staff of 20 astronomers and technicians. It took its name from sunspots, 93,000,000 miles away that are being photographed constantly at this observatory by the world's largest coronagraph.

Visitors can observe through a gigantic telescope masses of sunspots which actually appear, dark only in contrast to the dazzling brightness of the sun. A mass of sunspots has been estimated at 300 times the area of the earth. You may see one of the sun's flares or prominences. Both are dazzling displays caused by violent explosions, which hurl matter into the sun's atmosphere.

The village of Cloudercroft offers plenty to visitors in the way of sports, scenic panorama and utter relaxation. It also offers professional and amateur astronomers a unique, awe-inspiring look at the sunspot on the sun at the Sacramento Peak Observatory located at Sunspot, 20 miles south of Cloudercroft on the all-weather extension of State Road 24, or about 60 miles from Ruidoso.

The village of Cloudercroft retains all the quaint charm which has kept visitors coming in great numbers for the past four decades. Hundreds of New Mexicans and Texans own homes here. Almost any kind of accommodation is available, from Forest Service camping areas to furnished cabins from boarding houses to splendid lodges.

There is no high-powered entertainment, but complete serenity in a magnificent setting, which provides the country's highest golf course (9,000 feet).

Approximately 20 miles south of Cloudercroft, at Sunspot, is the Sacramento Peak Observatory where a team of scientists collaborate with scientists throughout the world to find out more about the sun's mighty driving force on the earth. From May through October, the public is welcome at the solar observatory on Sundays at 2 p.m. when a guided tour starts. It is well to be on hand early for visitors are not admitted after the tour has left the gate.



## Contracts Let On CPS Home

Contracts have been let and work will soon get underway on a new business office for Community Public Service Company here, Manager Joe Coe has announced.

The masonry building will be erected on a site in the Gateway Subdivision on Sudderth Drive, west of the intersection of El Paso Road and Roswell Road. The new building has been planned for over a year but delays were encountered both in regard to proposed site for the office and the drawing of the plans.

Architects for the building are Wolgamood, Millington and Associates of Santa Fe, General Contractor is the Compton Construction Company of Roswell. General sub-contracts will be let locally.

The power company office building will contain approximately 2700 square feet and will provide a customer service area where the public may order service connected or disconnected, pay bills, etc.; an office for the manager; a clerical room; a stockroom and service department; and an employee lounge.

Heating and cooling will be furnished by a heat pump. The modern lighting installation calls for luminous ceilings in the customer service and clerical rooms, with late model fluorescent installations in other areas, designed to give a lighting level of 100 to 150 foot candles throughout.

Interior walls will be of plaster, finished in attractive pastel shades. Ceilings will be of acoustical tile and floors will be covered with vinyl tile.

The lot, which is 75 feet by 150 feet in size, will provide ample off-street parking, with customer parking in front of the building and employee cars in the rear. Parking lots will be paved and the entire area will be floodlighted.

According to Manager Joe Coe, he and his staff hope to move into their new quarters by late October, if no delays are encountered.

Further plans of the power company call for a new Service Center to be constructed in the Mountain Home Subdivision in Ruidoso Downs, facing Second Street. A lot slightly larger than one acre has been acquired for the Center, which will include a warehouse and office building of approximately 2400 square feet in area; an automotive and tool storage building about 2000 square feet in area and concrete slabs for outside storage of transformers and service material, and pole racks. A chain link fence will enclose the property, which will be floodlighted.

The warehouse and office building will provide offices for the line foreman, area engineer and storekeeper, as well as a large stockroom. It will be constructed of cinder block walls, with flat built-up roof.

## Innkeepers Law Must Be Posted

Les Crowe, president of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce, said the New Mexico Innkeepers' law must be posted in every rental unit. He said printed copies of the law can be picked up at the C. of C. office. The law reads as follows:

**DEFRAUDING HOTEL PENALTY**

40-21-17 Any person who shall put up at any Hotel, and who shall procure any food, entertainment, or accommodation, without paying therefor, and with intent to cheat or defraud the owner or keeper thereof, or who shall with such intent remove or cause to be removed any baggage or effects from any hotel, inn or boarding house, while there is a lien existing thereon, for the proper charges due from him or her for fare and board furnished therein, shall be punished by imprisonment not exceeding three (3) months in the County Jail or by fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) or both at the discretion of the court.
