

Vic Lamb, editor of the Ruidoso weekly, has the Bureau of Revenue sweating over what happened to the cigarette tax for the village. Lamb noted that the one-cent-a-cigar tax that Ruidoso is supposed to receive on sales went into a sharp decline last year while the village was recording considerable growth and business increase.

Revenue Commissioner Tony Vigil said Ruidoso got \$8,084 in the business year that ended June 30, 1951, and only \$4,493 in the year that closed.

Vigil suspected that the big fall off was due to faulty reporting by cigarette distributors but it was feared that the Carter Tobacco Co. of El Paso is the chief supplier in the Ruidoso area. There's an investigation underway.

The state system of apportioning the cigarette tax money back to the municipalities and counties where the cigarettes were sold is a Rube Goldberg thing that is based on reports from wholesalers who don't know where their cigarettes are eventually sold.

DIRT BEGINS TO FLY AS WORK ROLLS ON NEW RUIDOSO AIRPORT

Construction is now underway on Ruidoso's new airport. To recognize the start of the immense project, which calls for a wider, longer runway, an auxiliary landing strip (or taxi strip), paved tie-down area, new T hangers and a large service hangar, plus a new terminal building with room for offices to lease, about 30 local civic leaders were on hand for an official ground breaking ceremony Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

Former Mayors Bob Pearson and Jack Hull and Mayor Warren Tucker were on hand, along with former village trustees, incumbent trustees and others, for the significant forward step.

Ruidoso's new airport is the first of its kind in the United States to secure a portion of its financing cost through assistance from the Community Facilities Administration, a branch of the Housing and Home Finance Administration. The C. F. A. is buying two types of bonds, one of them revenue bonds from the airport's operation in the amount of \$100,000.00, the other on gasoline tax receipts in the amount of \$245,000. Interest on these bonds to be retired over a period of 30 years, is not to exceed 3 5/8 per cent. A direct grant from the Federal Aviation Agency in the amount of \$245,000, coupled with Ruidoso's own issue of general obligation bonds of \$67,000, brings the total amount of money available for the job to \$412,000. Floyd Haake, successful bidder on the project, bid the job in at \$11,600.42, but some portions of the project have been dropped at present, and the Haake bid now totals only \$487,201.23. The difference in money available and the bid price will be made up with some contributions of labor and use of machines belonging to the village of Ruidoso, Bill Toole, representing the engineering firm of Flatow, Moore, Bryan & Fairburn, directing the project, said this week.


Toole said office space in the new six-story terminal building is now being sought by several business firms.

Haake, Ruidoso and Santa Fe contractor, who has constructed roads in the Ruidoso vicinity for the state highway department in years past, said Dick Lance is the superintendent on the job now underway, and that A. J. Gilbert is the office manager, and that W. J. (Bill) Loomis will be joining the Haake crew here later in another executive position. Toole said the new runway should be done in 90 to 95 days, weather permitting. The auxiliary runway, or taxi strip, may be done in much less time, to permit air traffic to continue using the field, he said.

The terminal building is to have a small second story in the center of the structure for an observation and control tower. It will sit directly atop the airport manager's office. The terminal building will be located on the southern end of the field and will be reached by a new road to be built there from the south.

Ruidoso Downs Calls Meeting On Water

Mayor E. E. (Brother) Miller and Water Commissioner Max Oliver of Ruidoso Downs have called a meeting for Wednesday evening, Sept. 8 at 7 p.m. in the juke club of the race track to outline a proposed water system project. Details of the plan to install a new system, with assistance of a loan from the Community Facilities Administration, will be given residents of that community. Oliver said. Mayor Miller said the C. F. A. would loan funds necessary for the system over a period of 40 years at an interest rate not to exceed 3 5/8 per cent. The proposed improvements will cost an estimated \$35,000.00, the two men said. "We urge all our citizens to be on hand for this important meeting," Max Oliver stressed.

Bob Jurney Is Named Village Marshal

Ruidoso Board of Village Trustees in a special called meeting Thursday night last week moved to employ Bob Jurney, former State Policeman, as village marshal. Jurney was employed to fill a vacancy created when the board voted to give J. P. Bobo a "leave of absence." Bobo has served as marshal here six years and currently is a Democratic candidate for sheriff. Reasons given in the board's minutes for the "leave of absence" was that Bobo would be campaigning for office, and also that there had been reports to members of the board that relations between the village marshal and the State Police had reached a low ebb. Also, it was noted in the minutes, some of the board members had received complaints on the marshal.

Bobo told the News Wednesday he planned to meet with the board in its regular meeting Thursday night this week, and that he would be joined by several of his friends to find out why the action was taken when he was out of town. He had been given permission by Mayor Warren Tucker, he said, to leave the city last mid-week to go have a medical examination, and during his absence, the board gave him the "leave of absence."

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

It seems Virgil, then a set against the theory that children should be "seen and not heard", dismantled the gun's favorite Atwater Kent radio set to build his first public address system.





Don't be in a hurry to contract your lambs; the price seems to be getting better. The latest contracts were for \$17.50 per hundred weight in the Corona-Vaughn area. These lambs are expected to have a good percentage of fat. The latter contracts are 3.00 better than some made in July.

How is the screwworm problem in your area? Most livestock owners report fewer than normal. The screwworm eradication program being carried out in Texas and New Mexico may account for some of this reduction in screw worms. If you have a suspected case of screwworms take a sample in a small bottle of alcohol and send to Jack W. Balzo, Alamogordo, New Mexico.

New Mexico '62 Apple Crop Is Now Moving To Market

New Mexico has apples this year, says W. G. Schreengost, Lincoln County Extension Agent. The Apple Council. He released this word because of the many rumors throughout the industry that there was no crop in New Mexico.
