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

Refinancing Bonds May Save Interest for City

In the village board of trustees meeting last Thursday, representatives of Ransom & Co., a bonding firm, discussed possibility of refunding and refinancing village water and sewer bonds to gain a lower rate of interest and save money for the village. This mid-week a special called meeting had been planned to act to the proposal.

Trustee Lloyd Davis introduced a motion that all resolutions pertaining to the "Horse" Resolution be repealed and that the village attorney submit a new ordinance to include a new license charge for liquor dispensers—to be raised to \$1,500 per year. Retail package stores' licenses would be raised to \$215 per year.

New Grocery Is Planned In Hollywood

Construction began last week on a new grocery store building in Hollywood, next door to Hollywood post office and bus station, to be occupied by Jake McDonald about Jan. 1, Leo Wimberly, owner of the structure, reported. It will be 50x80 feet in size. McDonald said this week he had not decided on a name for the new business. He will continue to operate his Ruidoso Food Mart in the Ruidoso post office shopping area on Suddarth Drive, he said.

The building is to be two stories in height, 12 inch concrete blocks with steel framework. John Emde is contractor. All new modern fixtures are to be installed, and the grocery store will have an all-glass front.

The top floor will have an opening at street level, but a basement, the same size as the store, will have three entrances in the rear at ground level, since the lot slopes downward towards the back. Wimberly, the owner, reported. He said the basement can easily be converted into a bomb shelter, and that he is investigating what steps could be taken for such an emergency project. Wimberly said the entire project will cost about \$40,000.

Chaparral Books Huge Convention

Manager Clarence Fox, Jr., of Chaparral Hotel in Ruidoso Downs reported last week that arrangements have been completed for bringing one of the largest conventions to Ruidoso next April in many years. He said at least 650 people, perhaps more, would be here for Humble Oil Company's gathering of service station operators, their families and executives of the company and their families from three states—Arizona, New Mexico and West Texas.

Lonnie's Plans New Store In Hollywood

One of four or more new store locations in a new shopping center to be constructed in the Hollywood area of Ruidoso on U. S. Highway 70 will be a second Lonnie's Drive-In 7 to 11 grocery, Park and Ruth Long, developer of the new business area announced this week.

Plans call for construction of a building that can be divided into sizes needed by tenants, and will include one site 80x60 feet in size for the grocery. Others planning to occupy stores in the new building include E. V. Morris, who has a tractor agency, and the Hollywood Sheet Metal business.

Million Gallon Water Bill Due From Vandalism

Vandals who have been turning on city fire hydrants and letting them run at night during the last two or three weeks owe the city for about a million gallons of water wasted. Village Clerk-Manager Jim Hine said that is the estimate of the amount of loss from this vandalism.

Three Suspects In Robbery Are Arrested

Edward Frazer, 35, the third man sought in a massive manhunt that covered eastern Lincoln County for three days this week, was arrested at 5:30 Thursday morning as he walked eastward towards Roswell, about five miles north of U. S. Highway 70-990 in a pasture. He did not resist officers who searched him for a gun. Jim Clayton, Roswell state policeman, and Capt. Hoover Wimberly of Alamogordo arrested the fugitive. Late Wednesday the second man arrested had drawn a gun but was arrested without serious incident.

Jack Bisk, a suspect in a Carrizozo, N. M. bar robbery, was captured about 8:15 p.m. Wednesday near Border Hill, 40 miles east of Ruidoso. He was apprehended by Hoover Wimberly of the New Mexico State Police, stationed in Alamogordo.

The massive manhunt involving up to 150 law officers and volunteers carried on in an area eight miles south of Tumble Tuesday night and ended on Wednesday.

Two men, believed to be ex-convicts, took \$400 at gunpoint from a Carrizozo bar owner Monday. Before leaving, the gunman tied up the bar owner, his wife and three young children.

The Lincoln County sheriff's office is holding a third man reportedly involved in the robbery. The fugitive escaped when their car was stopped by officers. They fled on foot into the hills near Tumble Tuesday.

48 CANDIDATES, ONE STATE AMENDMENT ON LINCOLN COUNTY BALLOT FOR TUESDAY

Lincoln County voters will find a choice of 48 candidates from the two political parties, ranging from congressional seats down to constable in precincts, and one lone state constitutional amendment on voting machines for the 1962 general election next Tuesday, with polls opening at 8 a.m., and closing at 7 p.m.

Voting locations in this area include Ruidoso municipal building for those registered in precinct 19-A; at the American Legion hall in Ruidoso for those registered in precinct 19B; at the fire station in Ruidoso Downs (not yet legally known as Green Tree); at the school house in San Patricio; in Angus school for the Bonito precinct; at the new Hondo high school for Hondo; at Picacho school house for Picacho; at Nogal fire station for Nogal; at the village hall at Captain and at the school house in Lincoln.

Herbert Smith is chairman of election judges for 19-A; George Gardening for 19-B and at Ruidoso Downs, Frank Burris will be chairman.

Amendment to Combine Offices in Election

The constitutional amendment to be voted on, numbered 13, if passed would combine the positions of lieutenant governor in the general election with that of the voter would cast a single vote for the governor and the lieutenant governor of New Mexico—the same method as used in federal elections, the voter casting a single vote for the President and the Vice-President of the United States.

The amendment applies only to the voting at a general election. (Continued to Page 5)

MEET THE CANDIDATES — County candidates for office from both Democrat and Republican parties answered about 25 questions presented them at the "Meet the Candidate" program at the Chaparral Thursday night last week. A crowd of 156 people attended. Questions were of a wide range, and directed to candidates for the various office. Only one heated discussion was noted—an exchange of views between Kenneth Nosker, Republican of District 3 and chairman of the county board of commissioners, and Charles Jones, Democrat, seeking re-election as a commissioner from District 2. Nosker accused political enemies of a smear campaign. Jones declared honesty was a requirement of any public office holder.

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Hearing Is Held On Application For Charter Service

Corporation Commissioner G. Y. Falls presided in a hearing here Tuesday in Ruidoso municipal building on application of Ralph Brown for a state charter flying service license. More than 40 persons were subpoenaed, or volunteered to speak in behalf of two factions involved in the hearing. The grant of a license to Brown was proposed by operators of Ruidoso Flying Service. Both pro and con had vigorous support.

At times the hearing heard some personal remarks that Falls ruled had no bearing on the issue at hand, the need for a second charter service license here. He asked that those appearing stick to the pertinent facts having to do with whether the license should or should not be issued. Attorney for Ruidoso Flying Service, Charles E. Barnhart, made the point that the service now existing was adequate for Ruidoso while Richard Parsons, attorney for Ralph Brown, sought to establish the need in view of Ruidoso's recent growth, and potential as a recreation center that is developing rapidly.

Dr. W. D. Horton said the number of persons taking Type II Saturday in October when Type I was given. On two Sundays in October 1,222 persons received Type I.

"To reach that total, at least 700 more will have to take the vaccine this next Sunday, Nov. 4 of the Type II," he declared.

The Indians were not interested in the food, because they poured out the flour, beans, salt and sugar which were in cotton sacks, took the sacks and left the piles of food on the ground.

Mr. and Mrs. Trujillo were married on Oct. 9, 1912 just after New Mexico became a state. Their marriage certificate still reads: Territory of New Mexico.

Mr. Trujillo, a well known cowboy who broke wild horses, rounded up cattle, etc., is still in good health and is able to continue some of these activities such as shoeing horses.

Burglary Charges Filed In El Paso Against Ruidosoan

Burglary charges were filed with the district attorney's office Tuesday in El Paso against Ronald Edmond Stewart, 27, resident of an Upper Valley motel and former Ruidosoan. He remained in County Jail in lieu of \$2,500 bond.

Stewart's arrest Sunday night started a chain reaction which led New Mexico and El Paso officers to the residence of his brother, Jimmie Leroy Stewart, 26, who was wanted in connection with two 1961 armed robberies, and is free on bail on a similar charge in Albuquerque.

Ronald Stewart was arrested near the scene of a burglary at Ramo's Drugs, El Paso by Detectives Richard McLaughlin and Ivan Enriquez. He admitted to McLaughlin in a signed statement he committed the burglary after drinking in an Upper Valley bar with Jimmie earlier in the evening.

McLaughlin and Enriquez later received information Jimmie Stewart was staying in a trailer near Sunland Park race track and Jimmie was arrested without incident early Monday by Dona Ana County Deputy Alvaro (Chilean) Garcia on the two El Paso armed robbery warrants. Jimmie Stewart remained lodged in Dona County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond late Tuesday.

Dona Ana County Sheriff Alfredo Garcia and El Paso officers have agreed that Jimmie Stewart as a "good suspect" in the early Sunday robbery of Johnson's No. 2 Bar in Las Cruces in which \$1,350 and a \$500 ring were taken. Jimmie has not admitted complicity in the robbery.

Officers also believe Ronald Stewart may have taken part in the holdup. Both Ronald and Jimmie have been working around the race track since its fall opening.

Things alleged in the accusation have been judicially determined. Three paragraphs are made in the accusation.

The first alleges that Williams' sworn affidavit concerning Nosker sets forth "facts showing gross immorality and corruption in office and for failing to account for goods coming into his hands as county commissioner of Lincoln County."

His accusation alleged it would be in the best interests of the county that Nosker be removed from office and that he be suspended "pending determination of the issues set forth."

The third point states that "there is no grand jury in session within the county of Lincoln and none is expected within 30 days from the filing of this accusation."

Sosa also asked that the issues for removal from office be set for jury trial.

Williams' affidavit stated that he examined the records of the clerk of the Lincoln County Commission and found irregularities "all attributable" to Nosker.

The affidavit states further that on or about May 18, the county was billed for a short block engine by the Valley Chevrolet Co., Roswell, at Nosker's request that the County pay for the engine which was delivered to Nosker and not to the county, that Nosker used the engine, that he approved payment as commission chairman July 9 and that payment of \$216.01 was made by a county warrant on July 10. The affidavit also states that subsequent to the County payment Nosker paid the Roswell firm on Oct. 6 and the county has been reimbursed by the company.

The affidavit states further the Perez Valley Tire Co., Roswell, billed the county on Sept. 15 and 10, 1961, for \$11 and \$60.73 respectively and for \$137.24 on April 20, 1962, and that the bills were ordered paid by Nosker on Nov. 6, 1961, and July 1962. The articles in these billings were used by Nosker and not received by the county, which paid for them, Williams stated.

After the investigation was begun, Nosker reimbursed the county on Oct. 19 with a check on the Roswell State Bank for \$208.96, according to the affidavit.

The affidavit also states that the county was billed for several other items on Aug. 1, 1961, and April 23, 1962, and paid for these items, and that Nosker delivered

these items to the county warehouse on Oct. 18.

The affidavit states further that Nosker has authorized payment of purchase in excess of \$500 which were made without bid.

Nosker, a Republican, is seeking re-election to the commission. Williams is a Republican.

Claude Peterson injured Saturday In Truck Accident

Claude Peterson, who is employed by Sudderth Gas Co., here, received cuts and bruises and was admitted to the Ruidoso Hospital last Saturday when the pickup he was driving was hit from the rear by a truck on Highway 70. Peterson was preparing to make a left turn to go down to the Smith trailer courts between the race track and the Chispa Hotel when his pickup was hit by a large truck, causing the pickup to roll over several times down the embankment. State police took Peterson to the Ruidoso Hospital where he was admitted, suffering from cuts and bruises. He was released Tuesday this week. No charges have been filed as yet, it was reported.

 county can know the entire truth and will not be misled by the rumors and uninformative statements that have been made against me. I will repeat that I do not owe the County any money, have never knowingly owed the County any money, I do not have in my possession any property belonging to the County, nor have I ever used any property or equipment belonging to the County for personal benefit or gain. These things I feel I can establish to the satisfaction of an impartial jury of citizens of this County who can judge the issues without personal or political motivation.

If I have committed errors in judgement or in business transactions for which I am held responsible, such errors were certainly not calculated nor intentional and I can only add that to err is human, and only he who has not erred should cast the first stone.

The atmosphere has become quite smutty, and I feel that the only effective cleanser lies in the judicial process provided by our laws. I urge the impaneling of a Grand Jury to give the people of this County the benefit of an informed and considered opinion.

Lincoln National Forest Report

There will be several new additions at Sierra Blanca Ski Run this year. The main and most beautiful addition will be a new base area lodge designed by Victor Lundy of Sarasota, Fla. This lodge is a far departure from the conventional buildings usually erected on National Forest land. The spires are designed to compliment the form of Spruce and Corkbark fir trees in the area. These are preformed laminated beams made by Timber Structures of Portland, Ore., a subsidiary of Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., the largest timber producer in the United States.

This lodge will have rest rooms and ski rental in the basement with a direct access from the parking lot to the ski slopes. The area has added to its ski rental stock so designated for the road tests which are Tuesdays—from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 9:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

"A word of advice to those persons who are now residing in New Mexico and hold valid out of state drivers' license. You do have to take the written exam and eye exam only. Also the State requires that you surrender your out-of-state license," Hine said. Written tests must be taken prior to driving tests, he stressed.

The Forest Service will have a vista point ready for use right on the peak of Lookout Mountain by next summer. The circular vista point will have benches for resting and plaques describing points of interest in all directions.

We've seen a lot of spooks and various horrid creatures prowling around the last few days. There's been enough of them in evidence to make anybody even to the verge of reacting into the supernatural produce a few good words about them and ward off their evil.

I am sure that they can be, and are, wrong about their explanations and specific beliefs and theories. But all these strange beliefs must be trying to say something.

Our modern age says it in very different ways. We too realize that

our lives are not entirely in our own hands. We too know that we are pushed around, limited, and sometimes defeated by a variety of forces that to some extent shape our lives and fortunes, and which lie outside our control. Our "spooks and goblins" are complexed of planetary or the weather or the barometric pressure; the spirit of the age, our civilization; attractions of selfishness, greed; personal ambition or mob spirit; original sin; the new styles, and what "they" do nowadays; advertising, propaganda, allergies, political parties, progressive education, mass communications—and so on and so on. The list could be a mile long.

We know that we are all affected





Dear Vic:

What has happened to our law enforcement in Lincoln County? What recourse remains to an average citizen after he has exhausted all efforts with the courts and law of-

ficers to obtain relief, and when the County Sheriff refuses to obey the orders of our District Court?

I could mention several instances of disregard-on neglect-of duty during the past few years, but I refer specifically to one that affects me personally, along with friends and neighbors.

A citizen of Ruidoso Downs has, for the past three years, openly and defiantly defied the laws and the courts of our county and state without penalty of any kind. He has admitted to the court of barricading, blockading and fencing off

roads and streets in the Village of Ruidoso Downs. This transgression of law has been exposed to Village and County Officials. State Police, Municipal and County Courts for a period of three years on many and varied occasions. Yet these unlawful acts still continue.

On June 20, 1961, Judge, Allen D. Walker handed down the last decision in this case No. 6879—in Alamogordo. He held the above mentioned citizen in contempt of court, and sentenced him to serve 60 days in jail. He went further to say that this citizen could purge himself of this contempt charge by having said streets and roads re-

stored to their original place and condition within a period of thirty days. A permanent contempt charge was also made, enjoining him from any further tampering with said streets and roads.

Shortly after the 30 day grace period had expired, I informed Sheriff Bradley that nothing had been done by the defendant to remove barricades, blockades and fences or to restore the road to its original location, and asked him what action he was taking. He advised me very curtly that he would handle it in his own way. Well—I guess he has. Fifteen months later, nothing has been done by him. The

defendant, however, has continued building new barricades and fences—one just last week. (This last was torn down by angry citizens).

Less than two months ago, armed officers of the law were called to stand by alongside while the county grader operator graded this section of road. Vic, this is a serious matter. It's appalling to think that one lone citizen who has been in contempt of court for over fifteen months can still, with impunity, flaunt the orders of our District Court.

The only arm of the law we have to enforce the orders from our District Court is the sheriff. As he has repeatedly refused to obey these orders, even at the urgency of lawyers, village officials and other interested citizens, perhaps its time to ask ourselves how much progress have we made since the days of Billy the Kid.

What recourse do we have? Should we pack our belongings, and

abandon our homesteads? Or should we start wearing side arms to protect our lives and property, and treat all law enforcement officers who approach as "revolvers" and enemies and drive them out of our woods? I wish I knew the answer.

World-Wide Import Business Is Operated By Ruidosoan

A man sits calmly in his toy office in Ruidoso and surveys the rustic setting about him and also the world — and makes it pay off. E. H. Starr, 72, is an importer. Mr. Starr was born in Brooklyn, N. Y. As a young man he got the wanderlust bug and made a trip west. Most of the United States from New York to California, came under his scrutiny and "I liked the business potential of the west."

In New York, Starr was associated with his father, Daniel H. Starr, in bent wood products. "That is all obsolete now," said Starr. "I went south for an eastern manufacturer of earth moving equipment. As their territorial representative I covered the area south of the Mason-Dixon line, east and west."

During this period Austin and San Antonio were Starr's two residences.

Then E. H. Starr drifted into the jail and prison manufacturing business. Starr was designer and sales engineer of cells. "In those days," he said, "I drew the prison layouts to fit the building. I was responsible for laying out escape-proof cells of non-cuttable steel. To the best of my knowledge there has never been an escape

from a cell. Starr was successful in getting Starr's interest in the import business started when a friend saw him in San Antonio, and asked him to secure import cement for a development project in Corpus Christi. Starr was successful in getting

it from Belgium. Later he procured cement from England and Germany for general commercial purposes in the United States. Thus, a new import was launched on his career.

Starr branched out and began to handle many commercial lines and material requirements. These included such items as steel and wire goods, steel sheets and steel plates, newspaper and similar items.

On the "soft" side, Starr later branched into the importation of cork insulation and floor covering materials.

"I travelled abroad," Starr said, "to get a first hand look at the quality of the materials so that I could report to the firms I represented there was no doubt of the quality of the goods being offered the American buyer." The buyers were getting the highest standard of quality for each dollar they invested. I knew this from personal observation. At the same time, I made valuable personal contacts."

Starr's one-man operation represents imports direct to wholesale and retail establishments all over the country. He has made personal contacts all over Europe. "I have done business in Africa," said Starr, "but I have never been there. I got cork from Morocco, North Africa."

All heavy commodities are Starr's stock in trade and they come to this country by boat. He literally roams a great part of the world to fill his orders, making use
