

Ruidoso School Superintendent J. Howard Morris this week received a telegram from Congressmen Montoya and Morris that the Health, Education & Welfare Agency had approved the local school's application for \$10,768 in federal funds under Public Law 874, a law that provides for assistance to schools having larger enrollments because of nearby federal installations, such as military bases, or Indian reservations. The money is an annual grant to assist in education of the Indian children in all the local schools, and is paid on a per capita basis from a biennial count, Morris said.

A tie vote by the village board of trustees on a motion to ask Bob Jurney to resign as marshal and to re-employ three city policemen was broken by Mayor Warren Tucker last Thursday night here following a lengthy, sometimes heated discussion among visitors. The mayor voted to ask Jurney to resign to make the count 3-2. Jurney, who was in attendance at the meeting, immediately turned in his badge and commission card. Mayor Tucker then appointed T. J. Sanders as temporary marshal until the next regular meeting of the board on Nov. 29, stating "I may need to study several applicants before making a recommendation to the council for a permanent marshal."

Within a few minutes another city policeman, Ted Buck, turned in his badge and commission saying, "I feel I cannot serve since Jurney is not the marshal any more." Sanders was the center of the controversy that brought the upheaval in the police department. Jurney, as marshal, had asked Sanders to resign about ten days ago. When he resigned, village policemen L. McDonald and O. E. Monfies resigned their positions, turning in their commission cards and badges to Mayor Tucker at the end of a special called meeting of the board of trustees on Nov. 2. The trustees had attended two special called meetings prior to the regular meeting Thursday night in which the police row was discussed. One of the special called meetings lasted for four hours and was tape recorded. Each member of the police force was asked to appear in the special meeting to make a statement or be questioned. Two-One Vote Okays Transfer Of Villa License

Lincoln County Board of Commissioners last Thursday voted two to one to approve the transfer of ownership as well as location of the Atlantic Bar & Liquor license No. 1483 from Joe M. Dominguez to Bill Chancy and others of the Villa Corporation, from a site 15 miles south of Carrizozo near Oscura, N. M., to a plot 2.68 acres in size, located in the SE 1/4 of section 19, township 10 south, range 14 east, which is 5 miles and 319 feet from the village of Ruidoso limits. (The site is near the Sunny Wright ranch home.) Board Chairman Kenneth Noser and Commissioner Ignacio Torrez voted for the transfer and Commissioner Charlie Jones voted against it.

A group of Ruidoso liquor dealers attended the session to protest the transfer. Some of the same men visited in Santa Fe on Friday after the board meeting Thursday at Carrizozo to protest the transfer in the office of the state liquor control board. 

SIERRA BLANCA RESORT OPENS NEW SEASON THURSDAY

Sierra Blanca Co. will open its fabulous recreation area for the winter sports season on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 22. Thursday next week, the firm's office in the Chamber of Commerce building reported Wednesday afternoon. Even though there is no natural snow by that time, the company's office reported the snow making machines would be at work covering the lower slopes for skiing. 
Air Force C-47 Forced Down In County

Dear A. E.:

I have just received the form letter and blank from Les Crews regarding a ten point program for development of Ruidoso. I believe this letter to you is probably better suited to my reply than is the form.

I sincerely believe, and those who are familiar with the situation will support me, that I have done more to "realize our potential in these and related fields" than the average citizen of Ruidoso. I have done this at a great personal sacrifice, great financial loss and, most importantly, in the face of continued insults and lack of support for what the leaders in the town were trying to accomplish for Ruidoso. There have been a few people in the Chamber of Commerce who have appreciated and recognized what has occurred. However, although I recognize that these people could not always give active support, I am still not terribly happy by lack of such in the past.

I will not belabor the points above. I believe that you have one heck of a task to try to get "united effort of our people through an active Chamber of Commerce". You'll get a lot of verbal mouth-flapping "support" but when it comes to the guts of anything that has to be done, the people who are willing to stick their necks out you can count on the fingers of one hand.

My belief, and I believe the future will support this, is that there are a great many people in Ruidoso now that will not be here in the future because of lack of courage and foresight which exists.

I would like to refer to the Comprehensive Plan prepared for the Village of Ruidoso. I would like to point out the very many things which are suggested in that Plan that would occur and would like to point out also the kinds of actions recommended in that report. I would also like you to investigate back around the time when the report was presented) as to how many people really thought what was predicted in time would in fact occur, as some have now even in this brief time. You can see how the community is not supporting the kind of things which are recommended in that report. I really can say no more than this since the situation has not changed.

I have a great many things to say about each of the ten points that the questionnaire lists. Some of them I have said so often that I am hoarse. I am sick and I am tired by the lack of vision, responsibility and basic human warmth which has been so often exhibited. I am also sick and sorry that the general attitude of really what amounts to a very few people in Ruidoso should have a great deal to do with the destinies of so many fine people.

As I have mentioned, I do not believe that I am the only one who has felt either the barbs of wrongful opposition or the "spears" of non-support. There are many citizens in the community who have given much and long for the Ruidoso and Hondo Valley and have gone long and will continue to go long unappreciated.

In summary, may I refer you to the Comprehensive Plan for Community Development for the Villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs regarding my recommendations for a program of work in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley area. May I also refer you to a statement made by the 1st National Bank of Tucumcari in a recent newspaper publication (The Tucumcari Daily News) which is included here and which is something the people of Ruidoso should seriously consider. I appreciate the problems which you have and wish you the best of luck in the future.



## SAN PATRICIO LOUISE BABERS

A local legend tells how the village of San Patricio was named by a young Irish priest. The priest was traveling through the country with a group of hunters in the mid-1800's. The group left the plains and started through the mountains to the west. It was in the early spring when they lived at a little settlement in a valley and were struck with the beauty of the green hills and countryside. While they stayed to rest while the priest said one day "let's call this little settlement San Patricio in honor of St. Patrick for this place reminds me so much of my beloved Ireland." The name was to last and it is today the only post office in the United States by the name of San Patricio.

Soon after this there was a feeling of the need for a place to worship and the settlers built a church which was dedicated to St. Patrick. More families came, land was homesteaded, orchards were planted and fields were plowed and sown. The years passed, a little store was opened and a school started. In 1904 the residents were awarded their own post office and Ignacio Olguin, son of one of the first settlers, became postmaster and kept the office in his home.

John C. West became the second postmaster in 1911. He was married to a charming French girl who had come to New Mexico from France with her family. Their daughter, Mrs. C. D. Chavez still lives in San Patricio and has in her home the beautiful old furniture brought by her mother from France. Another colorful postmaster was William E. Brady, grandson of a soldier from Ireland who had been a Lincoln County Sheriff and was killed during the Lincoln County war. During the years the office was moved from one store to another and then kept in the home of two for a time as postmasters were changed. The mail came daily by car from Tularosa, New Mexico. If many families moved away to better jobs and the young men left to serve their country, only a few families have returned and the population has diminished from the largest voting precinct in Lincoln County to perhaps the smallest now.

San Patricio has been a favorite spot of many well known people through the years. Many famous names have received mail there at one time or another. Some of them have been Helen Hayes, Charles MacArthur, Paul Horgan, Judge John Biggs, Jr. and Mrs. Biggs, a Thieland Prince, Linda Darnell, Teresa Wright, Novia Busch and many more. Perhaps the most renowned in San Patricio is the world famous painter, who bought a ranch at San Patricio in 1935 and makes his home there with his wife, another famous painter, Henriette Wyeth. A favorite story about the San Patricio Post Office is told by R. M. McNatt who was postmaster when Peter Hurd called for an insured package. Jokingly McNatt said to him as he handed the book to be signed to Hurd, "Here, Pete, draw your picture and I'll give you your package." To his delight Peter Hurd promptly sketched a quick likeness of himself in the space provided for signature. Unfortunately the book was destroyed by fire years later.

Louise Babers who is now postmaster was serving when the office burned in 1933. The Babers' living room served as the new office. Forms were kept in a box from Glencoe and Hondo and business was carried on as usual until a building could be found and readied. The office was then moved to its present site on the highway where it fills the needs of the small community. It is the meeting place of neighbors and gives them a chance to visit when they call for their mail. After improved mail service necessitated the mail being left before the office is opened each morning one patron was heard to grouse "I don't like this new way of bringing in the mail. You never know when anyone is coming in to get their mail and I don't get all the news about the cows or pigs or fruit!"


