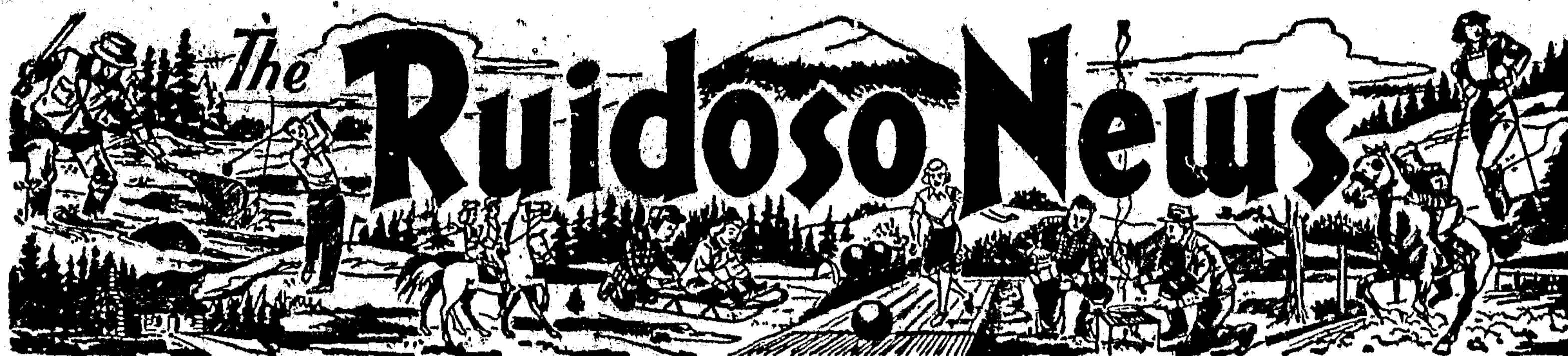

## Race Commission Meet Draws Ire of Horsemen

Monday when B. M. Keohane, Truman A. Spencer and Tex Barron, newly elected officers and representatives of the Ruidoso Racing Association, appeared before the New Mexico Racing Commission in Ruidoso, Chairman Floyd B. Rigdon questioned Keohane about Eugene Hensley and what official position he held with the Ruidoso Racing Association. Keohane stated that Hensley was a board member only, and that other than that he held no official position. Keohane, Spencer and Barron then produced the minutes of the Ruidoso Racing Association meeting of April 20 together with the Board of Directors minutes of April 20 when the Ruidoso Racing Association met and elected its present board. These minutes listed Hensley only as one of the directors elected. Barron then presented the Commission a list of all Ruidoso Racing Association members which included all concessionaires. This list did not contain the name Eugene Hensley. This apparently substantiated Keohane's statement that Hensley was only a board member and held no executive managerial position with the Association.

The Ruidoso Racing Association minutes written April 20 also mentioned that any individual or firm having information backed up with proof of any mismanagement or wrongdoing within the association should submit such proof to the Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Racing Association for its action. Barron also presented a request for the Commissioner's approval for a contract with Sam Knox for "Tip Sheets" negotiated on a 70-30 basis with the 30 per cent going to the Ruidoso Racing Association. He also stated that all concession agreements are being finalized in written contracts now, rather than by letter which had been the practice in the past.

President Keohane called to the attention of the State Racing Commission that the attorneys for the minority stockholders, Grantham, Spann and Chavez of Albuquerque, who have filed suit against the Ruidoso Racing Association are also attorneys for the Jockey Club. The members of the State Racing Commission present for the day-long meeting in Ruidoso were: Harvey Foster, executive secretary; Floyd B. Rigdon, chairman; Guido Zecca, Charles Laughridge and H. J. Lee, members; Margaret Foster, administrative assistant; Dr. Glen S. Bolton, state steward, and Oliver Payne, assistant attorney general were also present at the meeting.

The Racing Commission was advised by Payne that it was not the place of the Racing Commission to intervene in a dispute between stockholders of a Racing Association which is pending in the courts, however, he stated, should a court appoint a receiver for a racing association the Commission should file a notice to intervene in the case stipulating that such a receiver must first have the approval of the State Racing Commission. Payne also stated that the status of the Jockey Club was that of a lessee of the Racing Association and that it was subject to all rules pertaining to the association. ## Stockholders Sue Gene Hensley

A suit filed by seven minority stockholders of Ruidoso Downs Horse Race Track is seeking a receiver to manage the corporate affairs of the track. The suit was filed in district court against the director and manager of the track, Eugene H. Hensley. The legal action asks judgement of \$415,800 in favor of the association, and that a receiver be appointed to manage the corporate affairs of the track during the 1963 season. The plaintiffs charged that Hensley "has willfully, recklessly and in violation of his fiduciary duties to the stockholders, wasted, misappropriated and diverted corporate funds and generally mismanaged the corporation's affairs."

Hensley said he was unaware the suit had been filed. "No comment," he said. "It's just a bunch of disgruntled stockholders." The suit was filed by John Allen and Ernest A. Hanson, both of Ruidoso, and W. L. McDonald, P. A. Eaty, Ralph M. V. S. Wiles and William Hudson, all of Artesia, representing minority stockholders. The suit also alleged that Hensley "has been guilty of various illegal and fraudulent acts in conducting the corporation's business." The petition also asked that a lien be placed against stock owned by Hensley and his former wife, Martha E. Hensley, Phoenix, Ariz., who is a co-defendant in the suit.

In the request for appointment of a receiver, the plaintiffs contended that "further losses and dissipation of corporate assets will occur" to the plaintiffs and to other stockholders if Hensley is permitted to continue to manage the corporation during the 1963 racing season. Seeking judgement for \$415,800 plus interest and attorney fees against Hensley in favor of the racing association, the suit alleged Hensley used corporate funds in the amount of \$340,800 and in addition (Continued to Page 5)

## Arrival of Chiricahuas from Oklahoma 50 Years Ago Observed by Mescaleros

Memories of the past will merge with activities of the present and plans for the future when Apaches from across a broad segment of the West gather in Mescalero May 31-June 1 for a two-day celebration in observance of the arrival of the Chiricahuas at the reservation in April, 1913.

The Chiricahuas came to Mescalero from Fort Sill, Okla., after nearly 20 years spent at the Oklahoma site following the abortive attempt to locate the tribe in Florida and Alabama after the surrender of Geronimo. This year, members of the local tribe are arranging a gala celebration, to which Chiricahuas now scattered in many parts of the U.S. are invited. Many are expected to attend to renew acquaintances and to participate in the two-day series of programs, rituals, and dances which are being arranged.

These arrangements were announced a month ago for the observance of this week-end. One of the largest groups expected for the occasion will be members of the Chiricahua community of Apache, Okla., including the descendants of those tribesmen who did not make the shift from Oklahoma to New Mexico when many of their fellows came to accept the hospitality of the Mescaleros. The celebration is open to the public free, and all interested persons are invited to attend the program of the two days. Official opening of the event will come at 9 a.m. May 31-Friday, when the celebration exhibit hall will open on displays of the Chiricahua heritage. At 1 p.m. that same day the official program of commemoration will be held with dances following the evening meal. Meals will be served to the public on both Friday and Saturday nights. Displays to be included in the exhibit will include arts and crafts from the Santa Fe Indian School, to be brought to Mescalero by Allen Houser, considered the leading Apache artist of today, who is an instructor at the school. Also, Gilbert Oriswold, director of the Fort Sill Museum, will bring the Chiricahua exhibit from the museum, and Regal Leitch, Alamo-gordo artist who is widely known for his paintings of Indians, will exhibit his paintings of famous Apaches.

Area Nazarene Meeting Held Here This Week  
The pastor and members of the Church of the Nazarene in this area took part in the annual New Mexico Nazarene assembly held at the Nazarene district center, Mountain Park camp grounds, near Capitan, on Wednesday and Thursday this week. Annual reports were made by pastors of the 44 churches in the district. These churches have a total of 2,700 members and a Sunday school enrollment total of 5,900. Dr. R. C. Gunstrem, Albuquerque, gave his annual message as district superintendent and outlined plans for the 1963-64 year. District officers were elected. The district also elected delegates to the 16th General Assembly of the denomination to be held at Portland, Oregon in June, 1964. The presiding general superintendent was Dr. D. I. Vanderpool, San Jose, Cal., who has served continuously since 1949 in the highest elective office of the denomination. The Church of the Nazarene stands for scriptural holiness in the Wesleyan tradition. It has a domestic membership of 335,005 in 4,803 churches, with another 59,000 members abroad where 525 full-time missionaries are at work in 43 world areas. The denomination maintains six liberal arts colleges and a seminary world offices and a publishing house are in Kansas City, Mo.

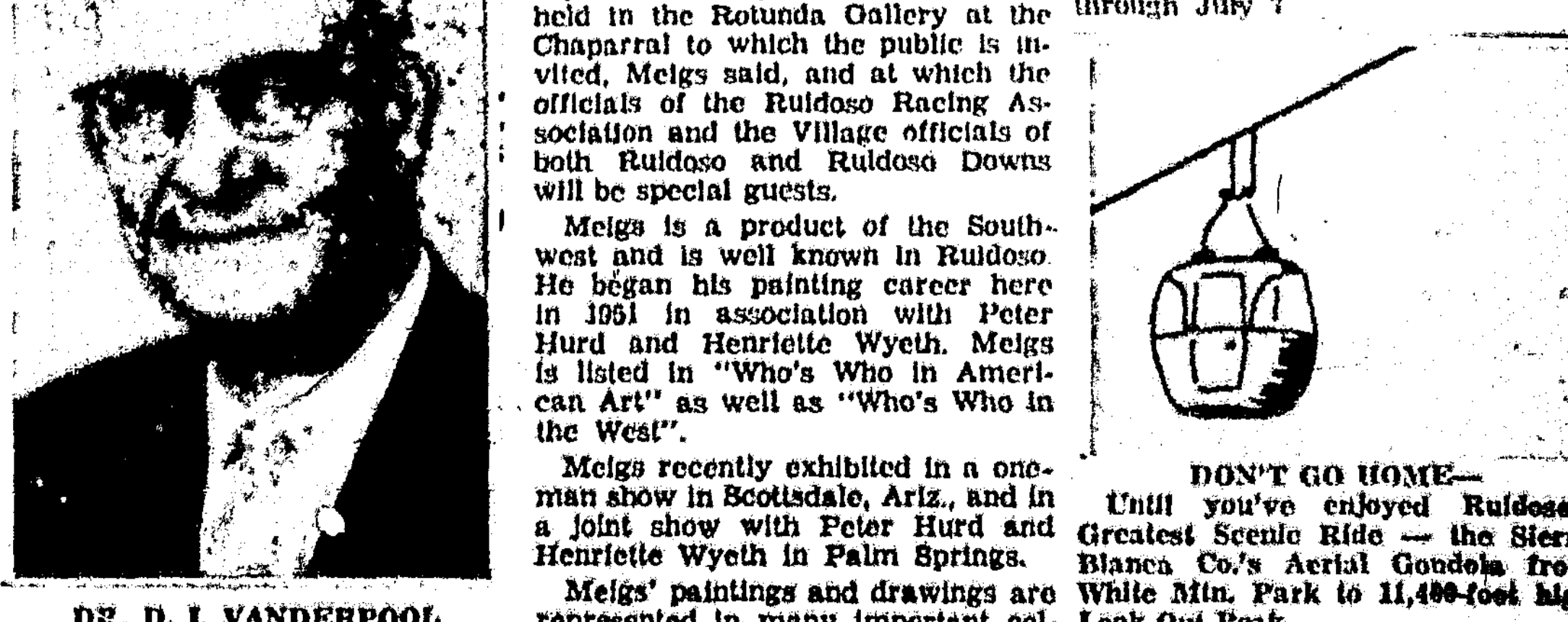
CHEVROLET PARTS MGRS. HAVE CONFERENCE HERE

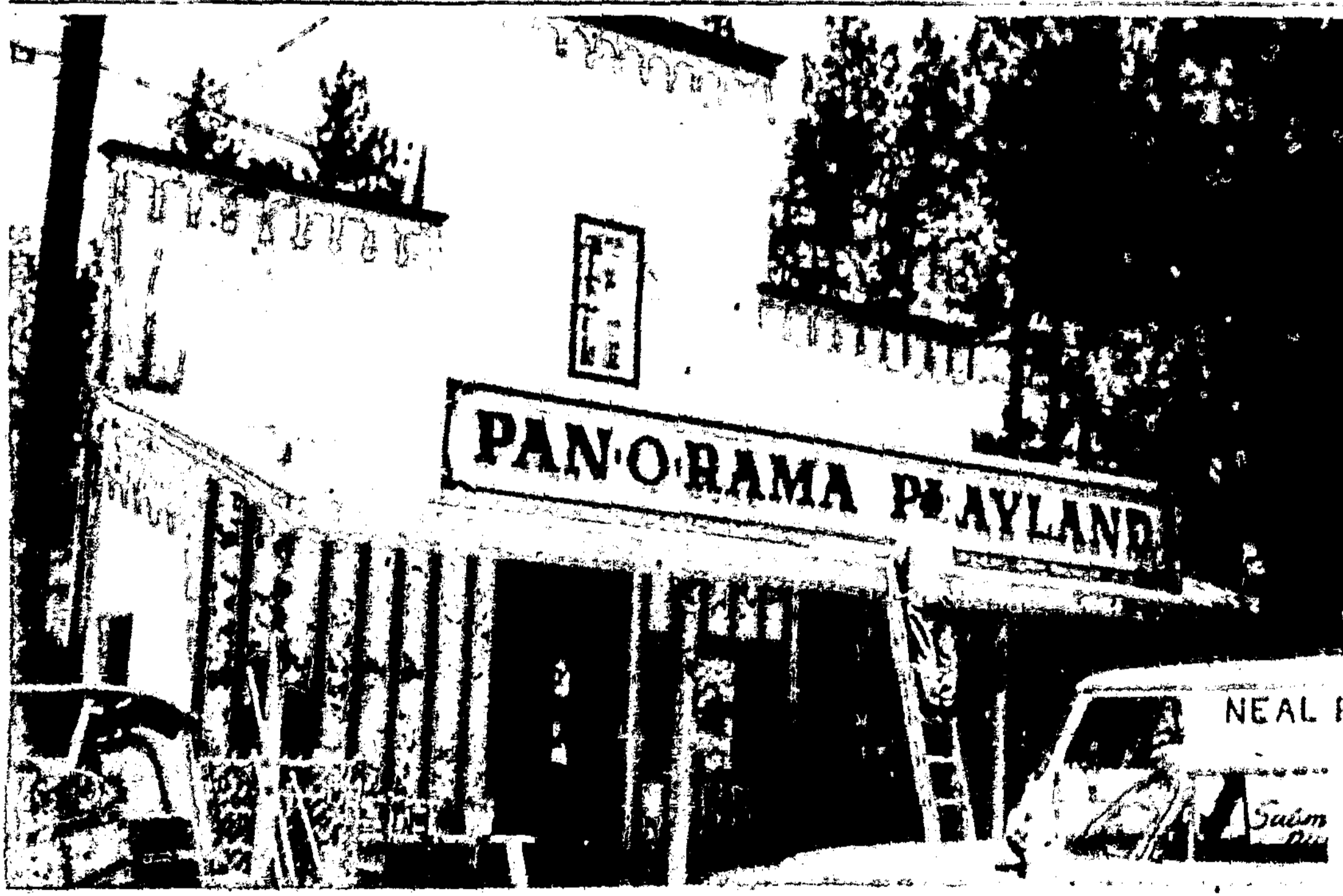

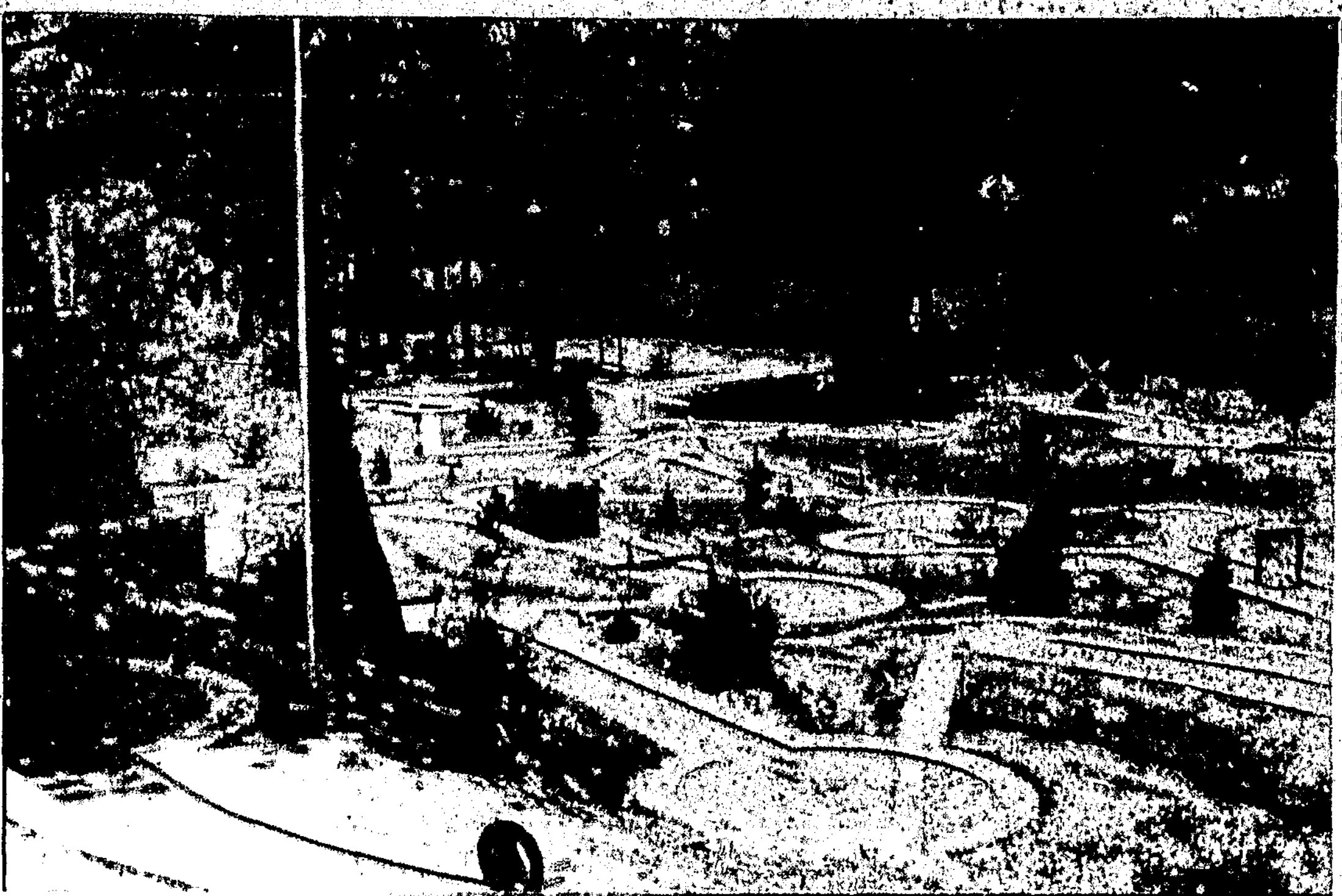

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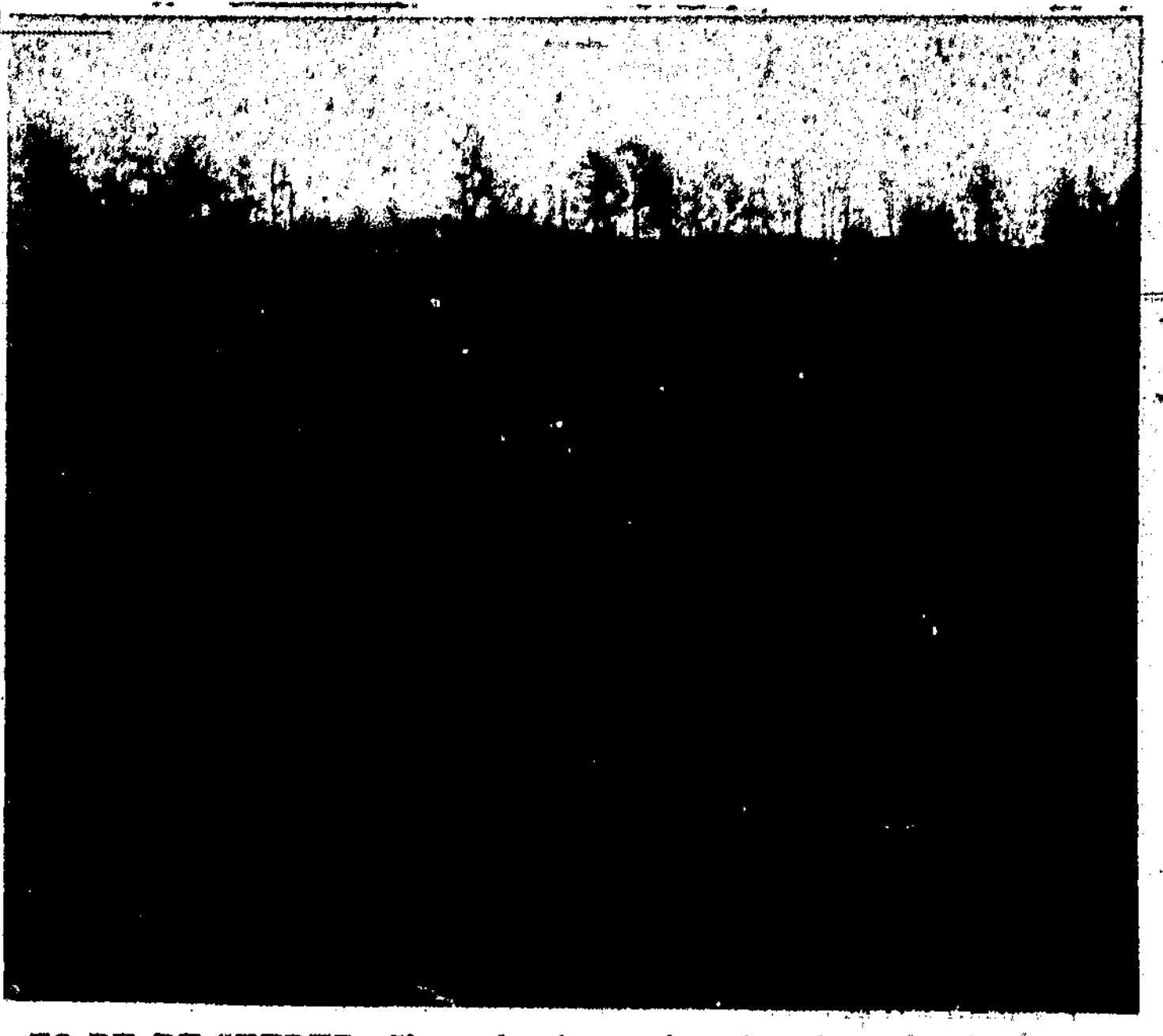

## Restoration of Burned Area Near Bonito Gets Priority

The Bonito fire restoration work is well underway, Tom Loring, Lincoln National Forest staff officer, announced Thursday.

The restoration and erosion control work on the area above Bonito Lake, burned over in the fire of April 24, has been given high priority by the Forest Service. The high recreation and watershed values in the Bonito Lake area required immediate action to control erosion from the fire scorched slopes and to prevent silting of Bonito Lake, Loring said. He added, that any reduction in the storage capacity of the lake could seriously affect the water supply for Holloman Air Force Base, the city of Alamogordo and other nearby towns.

Loring said that erosion control work, consisting of contour trenches, check dams and seeding to grass, is nearly completed. Bulldozer work, contributed by the city of Alamogordo, he said, is expected to run the total cost of the project to \$13,000.

Final restoration work, to stabilize slopes and to restore the burned area to tree growth may not be completed for some years. Loring pointed out. Some tree seed will be put out at the time of the summer rains, but any planting of trees must wait until next spring when the young trees will have the optimum soil moisture conditions.

# Annual Tour to Burial Site Of Gene Rhodes Planned Sunday

They are being completed for the annual tour to the grave of Eugene Manlove Rhodes, scheduled for Sunday, June 2. The tour, sponsored by the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce, will leave at 9 a. m. on Sunday, June 2, led by Chamber officials including Wayne Stewart, president, Jack Lacy, Jr., chamber member and Jim Bounds and Dwight Oboler of the Special Events Committee.

Rhodes, acclaimed by critics as the world's best writer of fictional history of the west, grew up in Otero County and became nationally known for his Saturday Evening Post stories and his Southwestern books. At his death in 1934, his body was returned to his request, to his beloved Manlove, where he has been buried in the early days and which formed the setting for many of his stories.

The tour will be a lovely spot about 10 miles from the point of the White Sands where a semi-dugout mine was abandoned, that Rhodes chose as the climax of his last Western novel, "Plato Por Aquí." The mine is currently owned by the Alamogordo Sheriff, Jim Hunter, father of Alfred and Lon Hunter, Alamogordo who was a close friend of Gene Rhodes writing a large part of the "Bird" Rhodes, which is the area known as the White Sands Missile Range. The "Bird" of the "Library" group of Alamogordo has recently published a book, "Plato Por Aquí," which is a reprint for many of the stories which are available in the Alamogordo area at a cost of \$1.00 per copy.

Special Investigator for the Ruidoso track which they said should be termed a Special Representative of the Racing Commission decided upon the application of Walter F. Bitterhoff of Los Angeles and Pamela, Calif., who Rigdon stated, comes highly recommended by the California Racing Association.

The Commission issued a directive to the Board of Stewards that all employees of concessionaires must have a license before noon, May 30 to qualify for employment. They also issued a similar directive that all race horse owners and trainers must make application for license before June 3.

The Commission also approved a request signed by 62 quarter horse racers that Graded Quarter Horse Racing be approved at the Ruidoso track.

The Commission heard the complaint of the New Mexico Horsemen's Association in regard to spot check stable inspection "without cause or reason" which had been instituted at Ruidoso by the State Steward, Jess Kemp, president of the horsemen's association, and Dub Phillips spoke in behalf of the association which claims that such "shut-downs" "without cause or reason" are humiliating to the horsemen, and will serve no purpose in catching the crooked operator.

Loughridge, speaking for the Commission said that they were only trying to keep racing clean in New Mexico and to protect the public which is entitled to an honest race as well as the horseman who certainly doesn't want to compete against illegal stimulants. The new 48-hour medication law prompted the spot check inspection rule, Loughridge said, and pointed out the Bureau of Internal Revenue also uses the spot check inspection system in checking income tax returns.

Loughridge's statement did not convince the representatives of the Horsemen's Association, however, it did convince the members of the Commission who instructed the State Steward to continue the spot check inspection and to institute the same procedure at Raton.

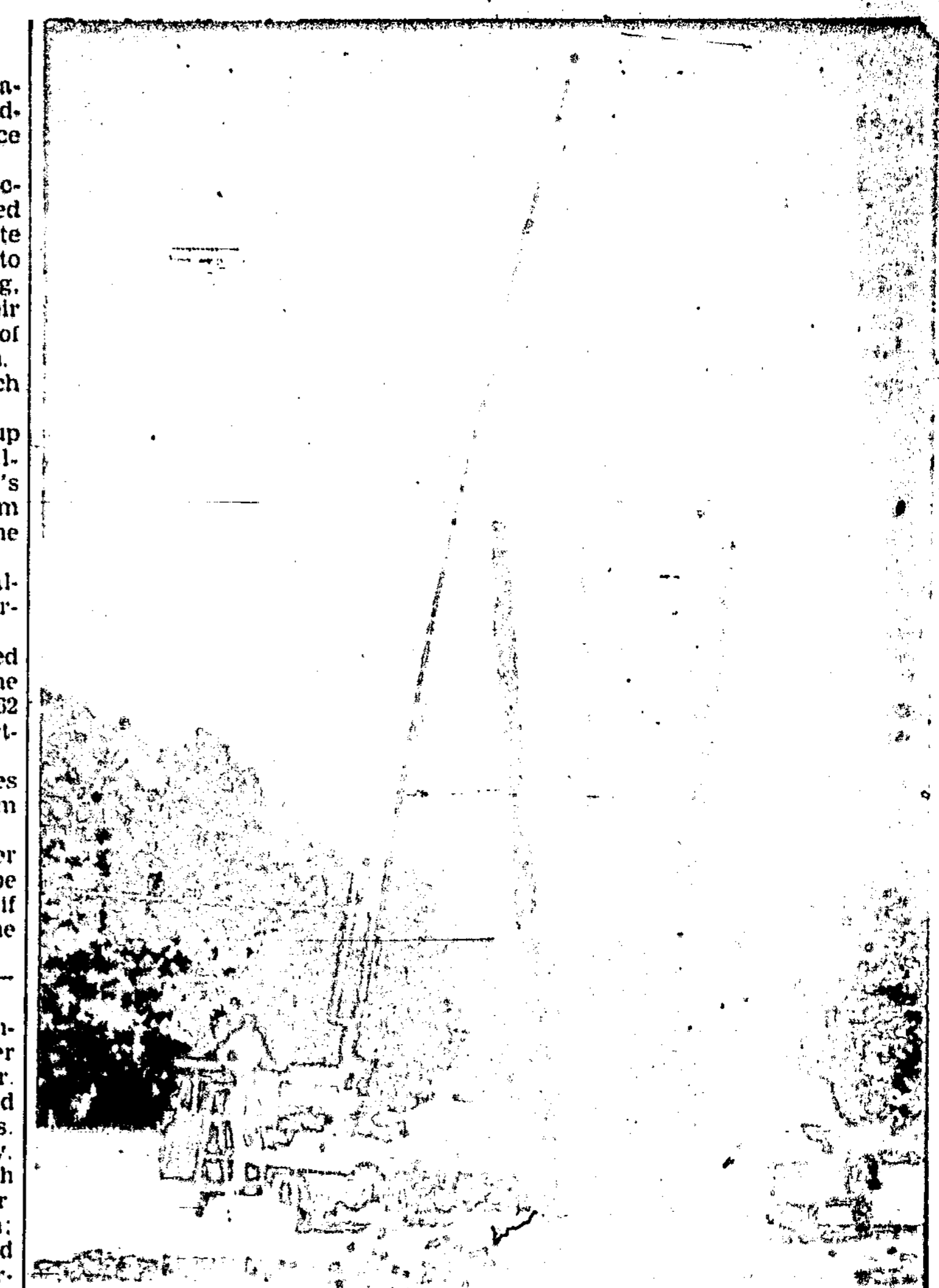
The petition said Hensley owned or controlled majority stock in the racing association from 1953 to 1962 and has always nominated and elected all officers and directors.

The suit added that any other stockholders who might wish to be represented in the suit can do so if they contribute to the expense of the legal action.

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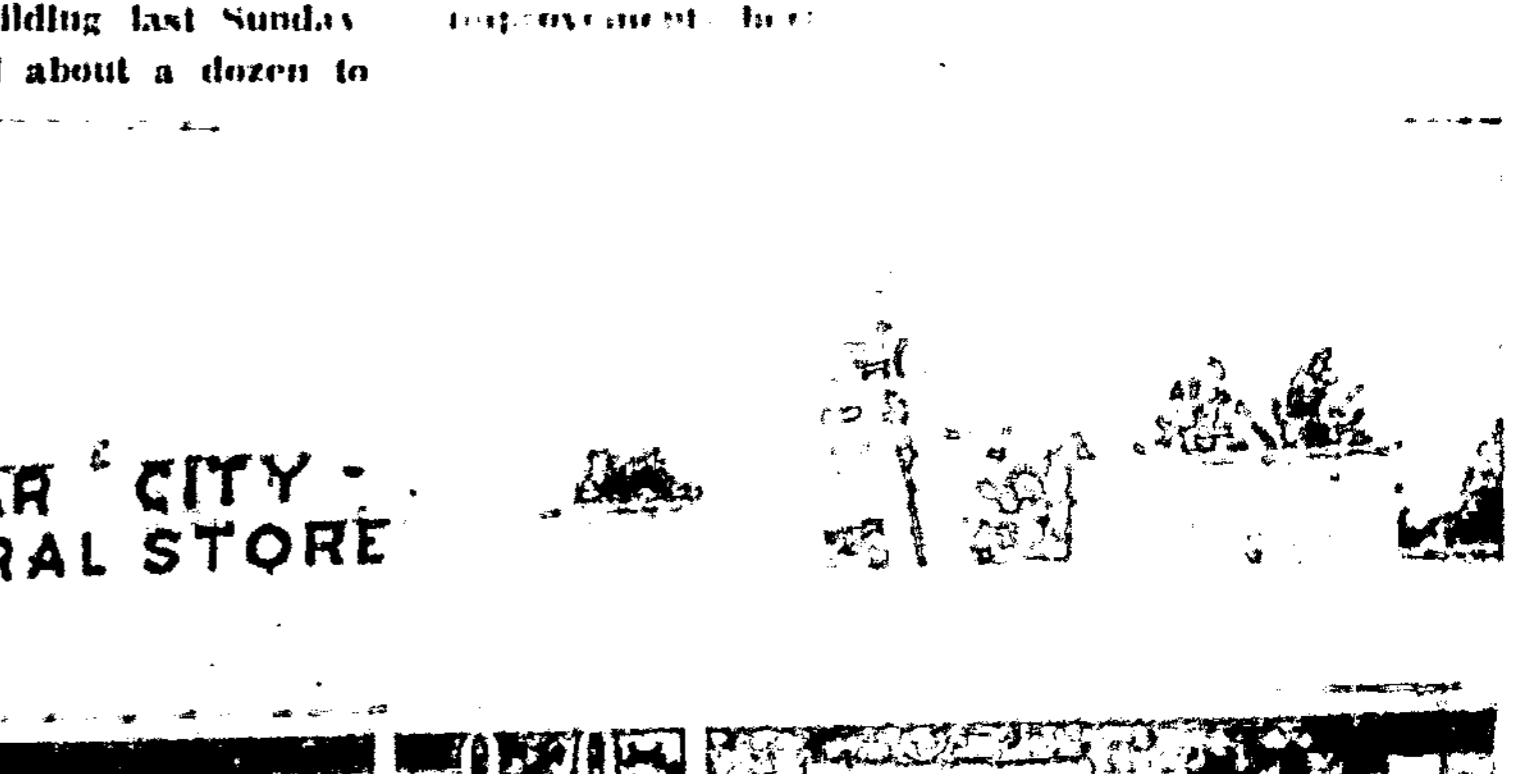

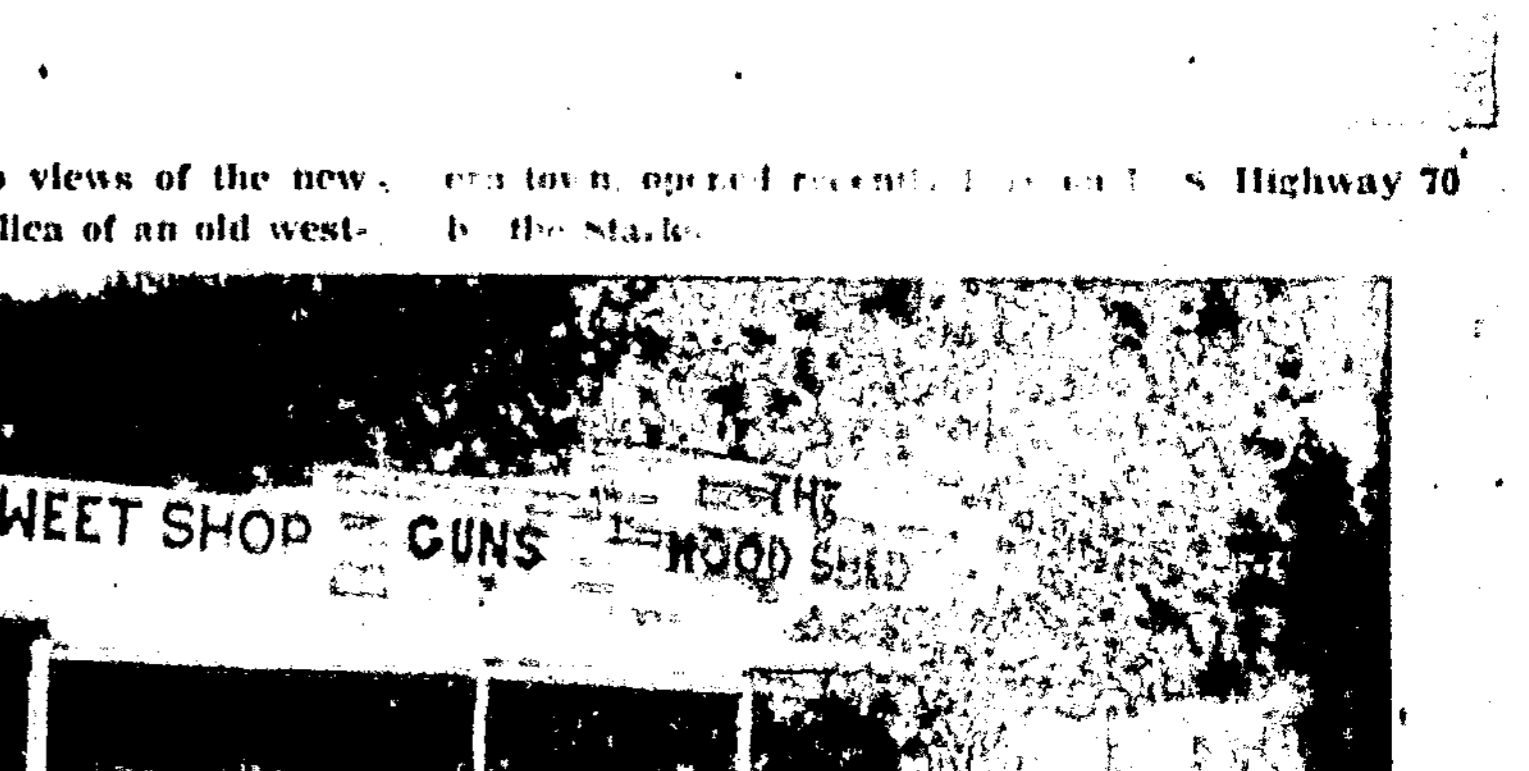

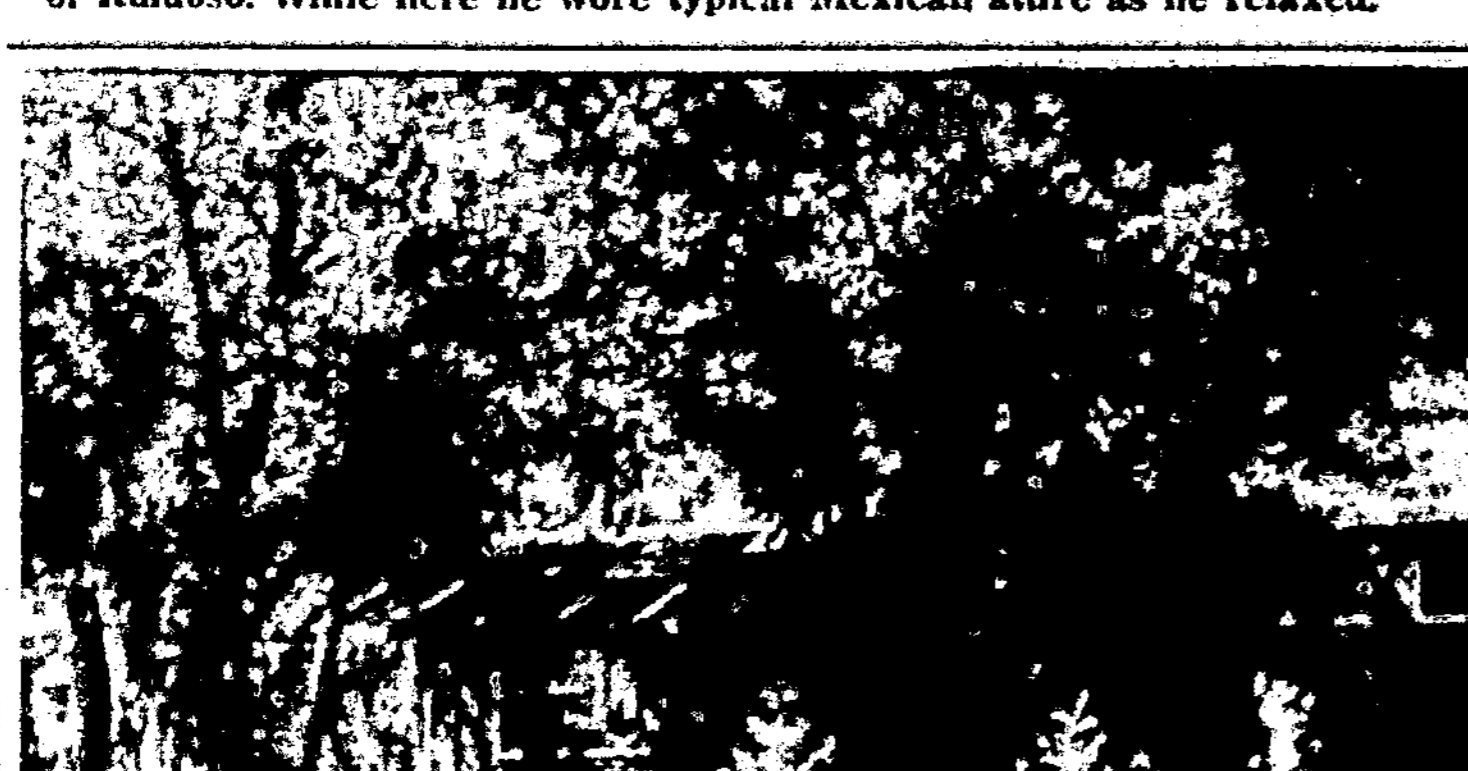

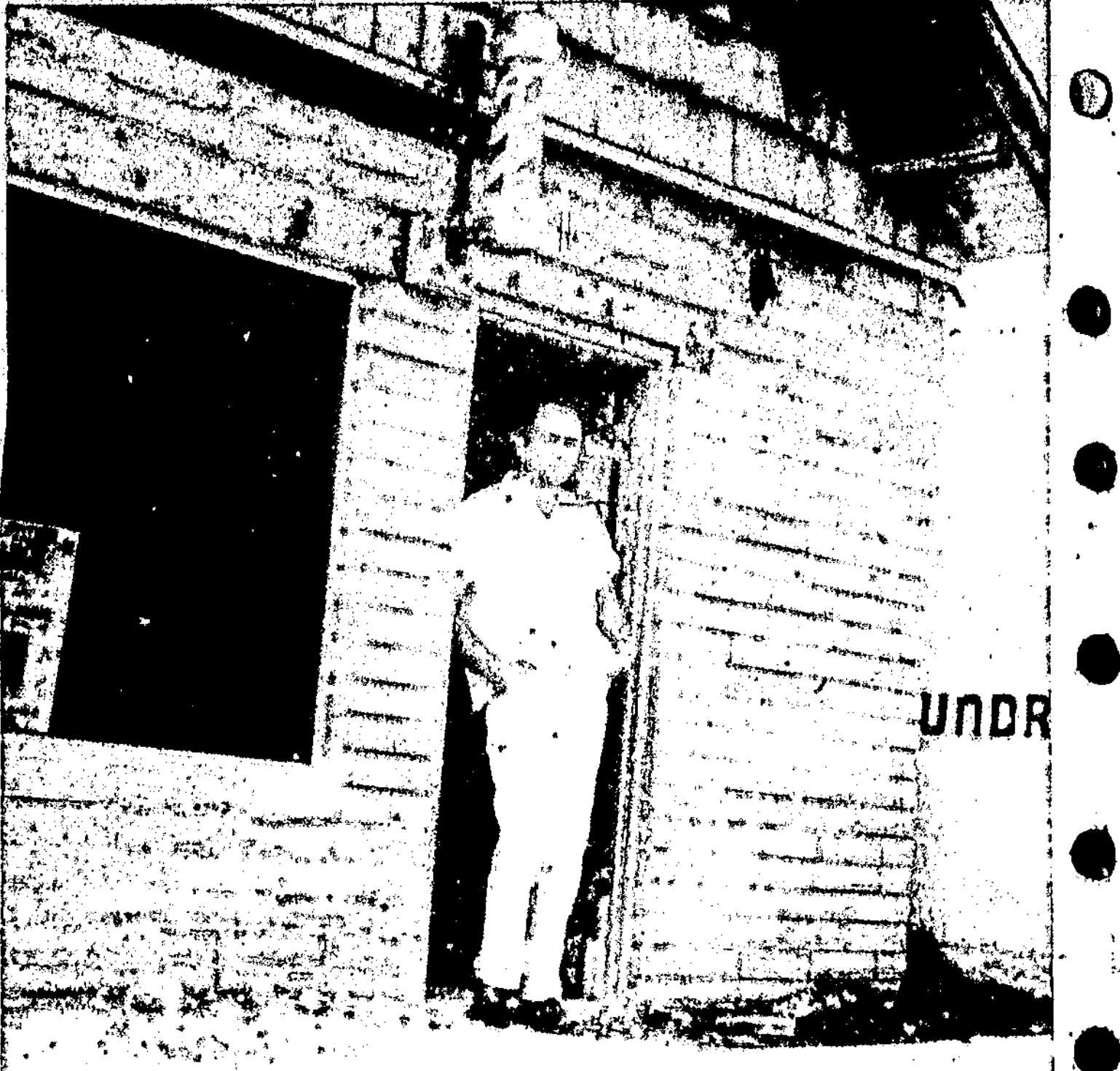

Ruidoso, the Playground of the Southwest, was the mecca for thousands of racing fans and vacationers who are making use of a four-day holiday week-end that started Thursday—Memorial Day.

This year Ruidoso is offering much more in recreation, in tourist accommodation facilities, a fine race program than ever before, plus the new Ice-O-Rama, the gondola car rides in white Mountain Park, enlarged playland attractions for youngsters—along with the other usual fun spots—such as the golf course, night clubs, etc.

The Memorial Day race program, sporting a card of 12 fast events, features the annual Memorial Day Handicap for thoroughbreds, 3-year-olds and up, at 6 furlongs. Other racing days this week-end will see these items on the track's agenda: Hondo Valley Purse Friday

F. H. Jones Jr.'s Bound Along, a grey 3-year-old galloper that flashed good speed and held on well to finish a creditable sixth, could prove as good as any in the 370-yard Hondo Valley Purse featuring Friday's 12-race card here—second leg of a banner four-day Memorial Day holiday weekend of racing.

Since that marked Bound Along's first outing since he won his final start here last summer, the sophomore son of Through Bound should be up to his top effort, Friday's dash being 10 yards shorter than his four-furlong lighter last week.

Bound Along will pack 116 pounds and apprentice Randy Phillips, the same weight as the only other three-year-old in the race, Doe Bowman's Lucky To Live, scheduled to be ridden by D. W. Whited, off to a flying start as least reinsman of the meeting.

Big question mark in the race could be Hurst Philip's Moolah Bee, a regally bred thoroughbred giant that came here last week as a 5-year-old maiden with nary a single race to his credit.

Apparently "just a growing boy," Moolah Bee, by Moolah Bux-Anita S., by Fair Truckle, probably is worth \$5,000 or more as a stud prospect on his breeding alone. But in his "coming out" party last Saturday at 550 yards, the "Big Clown" neglected to break alertly and wound up outrunning only two horses in a dash won by Sea Raider.

Prior to getting a race on his record, Moolah Bee excelled at running impromptu match races a good quarter horse Relampago Bar, when the morning workouts were concluded during the Arizona Downs-Turf Paradise winter meetings in Phoenix. The pair usually finished nostrils apart at 400 to 440 yards, with Philip riding Moolah Bee and Steve Bain on Relampago Bar.

This time, Moolah Bee, to be ridden by George "Pee Wee" Koyk at 122 pounds, will be running around a turn for the first time in his career against the likes of such other hard knockers as J. A. Stutte's Go Morse Go, Maurice Martin's Flashie Sam, W. H. Peckham's Hy Bull and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Meeker's Connie's Lad.

This group all packs 122 pounds, with Robert Faulkner on Connie's Lad, Harley Crosby aboard Flashie Sam, Billy Powell on Go Morse Go and "No Boy" listed for Hy

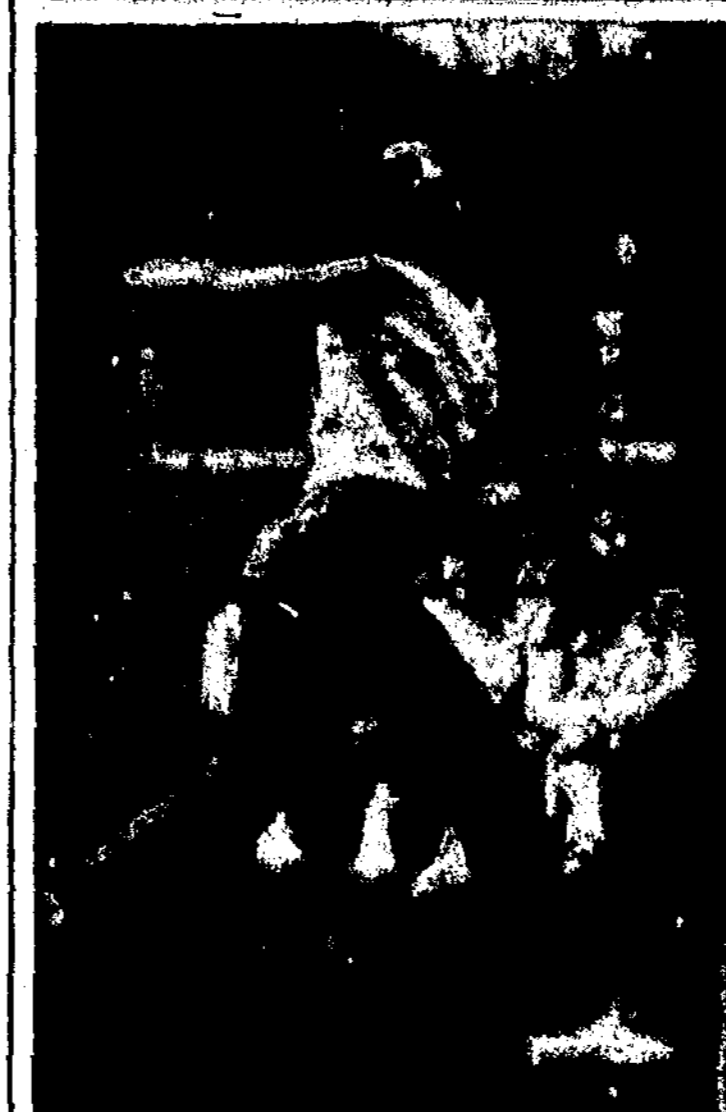
