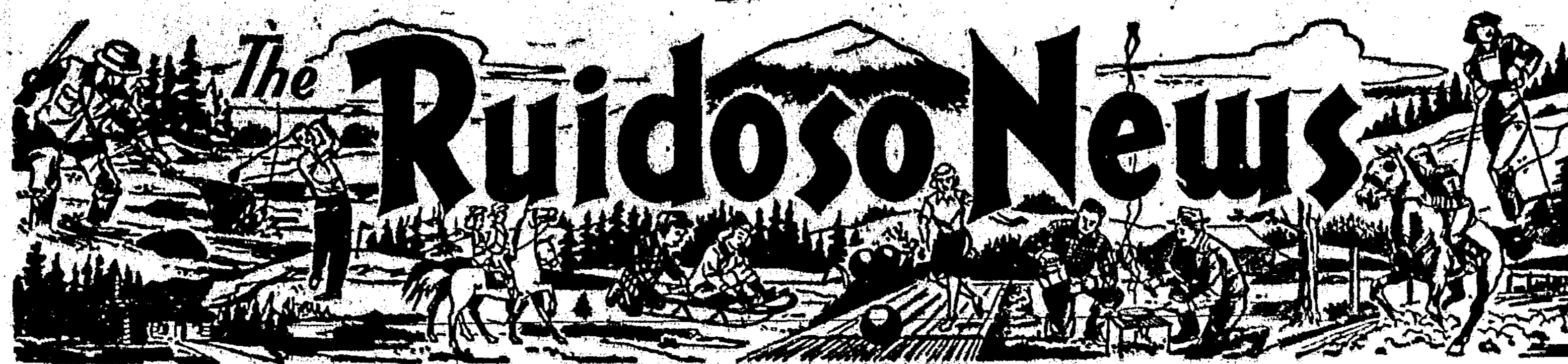

In our issue of Sept. 24 we quoted a state statute regarding appointment of board members for county municipal hospitals. Karel Bostell, president of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital board, brings us a copy of the statutes regarding county hospitals, which ours is—and which lists procedures for board member terms and appointments as follows:

"15-1-16. Boards of trustees for county hospitals—Members, Appointment, Terms, Powers, Bond.—Boards of County hospitals in counties which have or shall hereafter erect county hospitals are hereby established to consist of five (5) members, with terms of five (5) years each, one (1) member of the original board to be appointed for a term of one (1) year; one (1) member for a term of two (2) years, one member for a term of three (3) years, one member for a term of four (4) years, and one (1) member for a term of five (5) years. The board to be known as the Board of Trustees of the County Hospital."

The report we printed in this column that maybe the county commissioners should review their procedure on this was ill-advised and not in order, at all. Ruidoso had no part in constructing the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital through bond issues, but did through a large amount of cash and labor donations, but without participating bond issue. With the county alone providing bond money to match the Ruidoso funds originally ours is, legally and technically, a county hospital and the statute quoted above affects our institution here, and not the county-municipal statute as quoted earlier. FREE BARBECUE SET WHEN APACHES TOUR NEW SKI PROPERTY

Members of the Mescalero Apache Tribe will get to see their new acquisition, the Sierra Blanca Recreation area, which boasts a \$24 million dollar ski resort, this Saturday. A barbecue for the tribal members is planned as a part of the day's inspection tour.

An official announcement of the tour by members of the tribe was printed in last week's Apache Scout, a newspaper mimeographed and circulated among tribal members each month. The announcement is printed below:

"In order to acquaint the members of the Tribe and employees of Tribal Business Committee is sponsoring a free bar-b-que for members of the Tribe and employees of the Mescalero Indian Agency of Eagle Creek Recreation Area on Saturday, Oct. 5, starting at 9:00 in the morning. All members of the Tribe are requested to meet at Eagle Creek or the Ski Area at that time. Those who do not have transportation are asked to meet at the Agency Office where transportation will be available to the area. The day will be devoted to showing the Tribal members and the employees what the Tribe has acquired and to explain what the future and potential of the area are and what it means to us."

Two festive days are on the calendar for Ruidosians and visitors from other communities of New Mexico and from other states in the colorful annual Aspendade. Sponsored by the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce. The event each year draws sheriff's posse, riding clubs, tourists, vacation home owners and others to the Playground of the Southwest at a time when the autumn foliage is the gayest.

This year's Aspendade, first set for the last week-end in September, was changed later to Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 12-13, when officials of the sponsoring group figured the fall covering of aspens, oaks, maples, cottonwoods, fruit trees and bushes and vines would be at its height.

Briefly, these are the major affairs scheduled: Saturday, Oct. 12, a parade at 11:30 a.m. along Ruidoso's Sudderth drive will begin the Aspendade observance. In the past there have been as many as fifty entrants vying for trophies. At 9 p.m., there will be a street dance.

On Sunday, a trainride is slated for the morning hours, departure place and tour to be announced. While some visitors will want to ride woodland trails to view the aspendade panorama, others may choose from several automobile drives in the area, including the road to Monjeau Lookout tower, at 10,000 foot elevation, various highway in the region, and finally, the best view is from the 16-mile drive into White Mountain Park where the chuckwagon dinner will be held near Sierra Blanca Lodge at 1 p.m. Trophy awards will be made at the dinner.

This midweek there had been ten entries reported to the Chamber of Commerce office for the parade. Beauty Shop, U-Nami Gift Shop, Ruidoso State Bank and Hollywood Lumber Co. Deadline for entries is 5 p.m. next Thursday, Oct. 10. Heading up the parade will be the flag bearers, Bill McCarty and Harlan McCraw and the Aspendade Queen, Miss Linda Cantrell. Carl Morrison will again be parade marshal this fall.

Prizes for parade winners will be awarded in these categories: First and second, posse; first and second, school float; first and second, commercial; first and second, civic float; first and second, individual; first and second, Jeep club; belt buckle for best dressed man rider and belt buckle for best dressed lady rider; best certificates for first, second and third best decorated bicycles; and plaques for outstanding beard and best groomed beard.

A deer rifle is to be given away before hunting season this year by the Ice-O-Rama, with every person who buys an ice skating ticket getting a chance at it, it was also announced.

A new policy begun only recently by the Ice-O-Rama is a Couples Night for each Friday night when two will be admitted for the price of one.

Hours for the gala opening Saturday will be from 10 a.m. until 10:30 p.m., with an intermission during the Ruidoso High School Homecoming game Saturday evening.

HOSPITAL GETS \$36,000 GRANT

D., director of the New Mexico Department of Public Health, had notified the hospital that tentative approval had been granted for \$36,000 in Hill-Burton funds to be used for hospital improvements here.

Owens, together with Kiel Bonnell, hospital board chairman, and Kern Smith, architect, met Thursday, Oct. 3, in a pre-planning conference in Santa Fe, with Mrs. Louise Waggon Masters, director of Hospital Facilities Division of the New Mexico Department of Public Health. The board here was authorized to proceed with construction plans.

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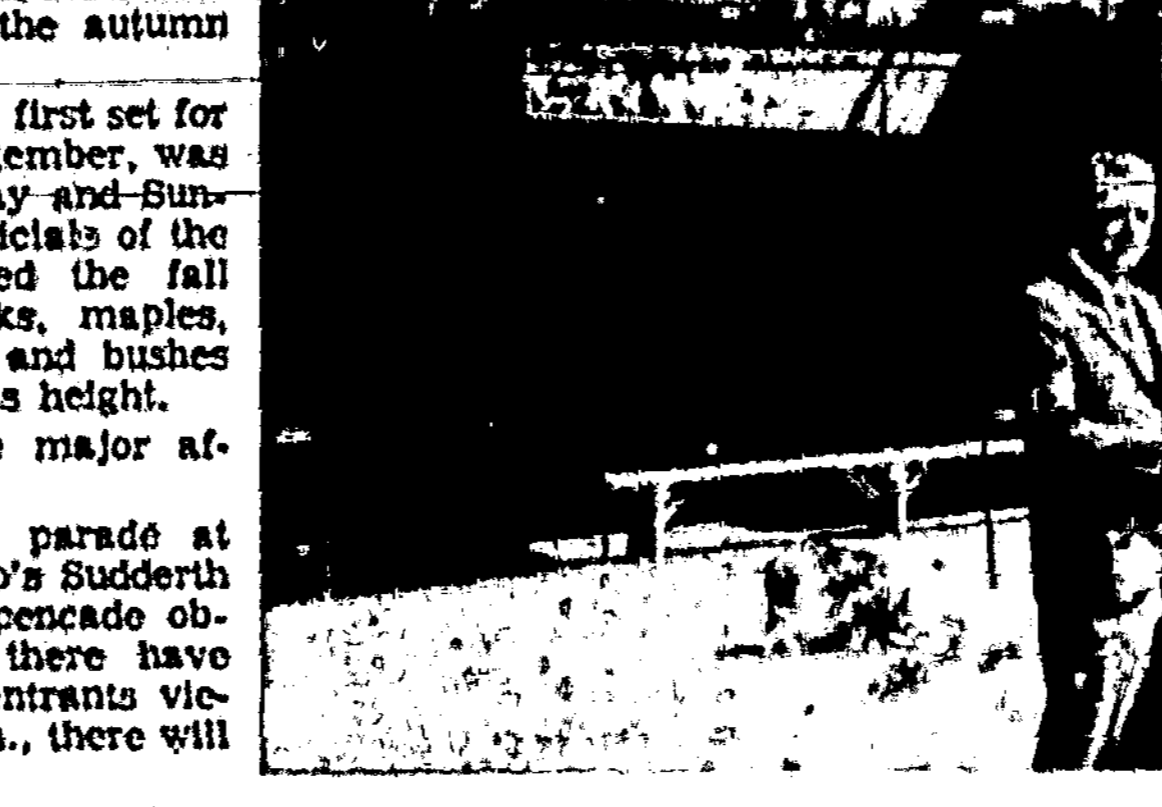
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The Glovers and the staff of the Ice-O-Rama extend a warm welcome to the home folks to join the visitors in Ruidoso this week-end in observing the opening.

FURTHER HEARING IS ORDERED IN LOCAL SCHOOL EXPENDITURES; OFFICIALS RULED AT FAULT

The Ruidoso School Board and Tom W. Barrow, the school superintendent, were ordered Thursday afternoon to appear before John Gott, director of the State Department of Finance and Administration in Santa Fe, for a further hearing on financial expenditures.

They were asked to appear following a hearing Thursday afternoon in the Junior high building Harry Wugalter, state school finance director, presided at the investigation. The investigation was prompted by school patrons represented by Richard Parsons, Ruidoso attorney, who have been dissatisfied with the administration of financial affairs.

At the meeting Thursday it was established that certain statutory procedures regarding purchases had not been followed at the school. At the meeting, Parsons did not contend there has been any fraudulent conduct concerning purchasing. On the other hand, he and his group said the alleged violations came from a lack of understanding or a conscious disregard of the state purchasing requirements.

Examples were obtained purchases in excess of \$500 and \$1000 without requiring bids or without publishing a notice or a call for bid, or purchasing out of state when state law requires purchases within the state.

The hearing here last week was held in an unused classroom in the elementary school building Parsons was representing O. L. (Bones) Wright, Dr. W. D. Horton, who is a school board member, and Eddie Siddens. Siddens told the News there were others in Ruidoso who were assisting in retaining Parsons as their legal counsel. These four sat at one table on Wugalter's left, were the other four school board members, Mrs. Gerald Tully, board president; Mrs. Jack Hitchens, board secretary; Mrs. Morrison Quiltrough and Ralph Bonnell. They were represented by Jack Underwood, local attorney.

Parsons called three people to whom he directed a list of prepared questions. First was Tom W. Barrow, newly employed school superintendent here, who was interrogated concerning purchases of roofing materials and paints, which, in previous school board meetings, had had their quality and prices questioned. Amount of purchases for the materials was determined to be in excess of the state's statutory limit of \$500, above which bids are required. It was determined that no bids had been asked. Barrow had defended the purchases on the grounds that they were an emergency need. Some of the questioning brought out the fact that no local dealers had been contacted nor asked what the products could be bought for here.

Others called included E. H. Fuchs, head custodian for the schools, who told of orders for roofing materials and paint being given an Albuquerque salesman, and who also stated he had first called Barrow's attention to the poor quality of some of the materials used—then went to board member Horton with the same report.

Mrs. Quiltrough was questioned briefly by Parsons regarding a motion she had made calling for the superintendent to negotiate with a building firm to construct steel

Man Fatally Hurt In Logging Accident

A 42-year-old Mescalero man was pronounced dead on arrival at Ruidoso Hospital last Thursday after he was pinned between his log loading machinery and a trailer loaded with logs in Carrizo Canyon. Delbert Moore, 42, was rushed to the hospital in a pickup truck by his stepson, Donald Allen, 25, but they arrived too late, officers said.

According to Allen's explanation to investigating county and state officers, the two men were loading timber onto a trailer pulled by a White tractor about a mile inside the Mescalero Reservation from the Carrizo school. Moore was using a fork lift and had loaded all but the last log, Allen said, when he turned the loader below the trailer.

The loader ran over a big truck tire lying southwest of the truck about 10 feet, Allen said, and turned over—pinning Moore between the loader and the logs.

Allen, who was standing atop the truck cab, witnessed the accident and saw his step-father wedged between the truck load and the loader. He pulled the truck up, allowing Moore to fall to the ground.

He then had to move the big rig about a quarter of a mile down the canyon to clear the road for the pickup. He loaded Moore into the pickup and rushed him to the hospital, officers said.

A Ruidoso physician signed the death certificate, Sheriff James George reported.

Moore, whose wife was reported hospitalized following her learning of his death, is also survived by three sons, Delbert, Jr., Billy and Bobby; by three step-sons, Donald, Billy and Phillip Allen. Also surviving is his father, Lacy Moore, of Oklahoma.

The body was transferred from the Mason Funeral Home in Ruidoso to the Paulin Funeral Home of Artesia, where funeral services were held last week-end.

Leftwich Plan Is Accepted For World's Fair The New York World's Fair committee has accepted the New Mexico exhibit plans prepared by Bill Leftwich, Ruidoso artist, the New Mexico Department of Development was informed Wednesday.

Leftwich, when interviewed by the News Wednesday night, stated that Bob Hoffman of the Department of Development had informed him that his plans had been accepted and approved by the World's Fair committee. His plans included four 20 by 44 foot adobe type buildings built around the New Mexico sun symbol and landscaped with native New Mexico plants and shrubs. The buildings would house the New Mexico exhibits and concession at the Fair, Leftwich said.

Lincoln County taxpayers will vote Tuesday, Oct. 8, next week on the question of whether they will approve a \$25,000 bond issue for construction of a new courthouse and the remodeling of an annex, a proposal called for by the county commissioners who acted last month on a petition asking for such an election.

In the last four weeks members of the county board, along with representatives of the architectural firm of Voll & Buffington of Roswell, designers of the proposal, have been holding meetings in various parts of the county explaining the new structure and its financing.

The final meeting of a series of seven was held here Thursday night of last week in connection with the Parent-Teacher Association monthly gathering.

All of the committeemen, including Charles A. Jones, board chairman; Kenneth Nosker and R. C. Nunn, were present with the architects. They outlined floor plans, type of construction, and the estimated cost to taxpayers. Nosker said a study of the bond issue showed the cost would be about \$2.30 per \$1,000 valuation to pay off the bonds on a 15-year issue. Cost to the individual taxpayer was based on the fact that the county's valuations have steadily increased in recent years to an estimated \$24,000,000 for the current year. The county's bonded indebtedness at present is reported to be only \$55,000, the remainder owed on hospital bonds voted about 15 years ago.

Polling places and election officials for each of the county's precincts are listed in a legal notice elsewhere in today's News.

Who May Vote On Bond Issues 1. Must be a registered voter 2. If a veteran has an exemption of more than his assessed valuation, and he pays no taxes, he is not qualified to vote. (If the veteran pays personal property tax, he is entitled to vote.)

3. Persons who have paid a property tax within one year of the election day may vote on the bond issues. Specific questions which may be asked are answered below.

A. The tax must have actually been paid, not merely assessed. B. The tax paid may have been for the current year or it may have been a payment of back taxes within one year of election.

C. If the person paying is a purchaser under a real estate contract of record requiring the purchaser to pay taxes, all the purchasers are qualified to vote. D. If an agent pays the taxes for the owner, the owner is entitled to vote.

E. Automobile license fees do not count as qualifying. F. The property on which taxes are paid may be either real or personal so long as it is on the County Assessment Rolls. G. Where property is owned by joint tenants, by tenants in common, or by husband and wife as community property, the payment of the tax by one of the joint tenants, the tenants in common, or the member of the community, has the effect of giving the other joint tenants, in common, or member of the marital community, the right to vote on the bond issues.

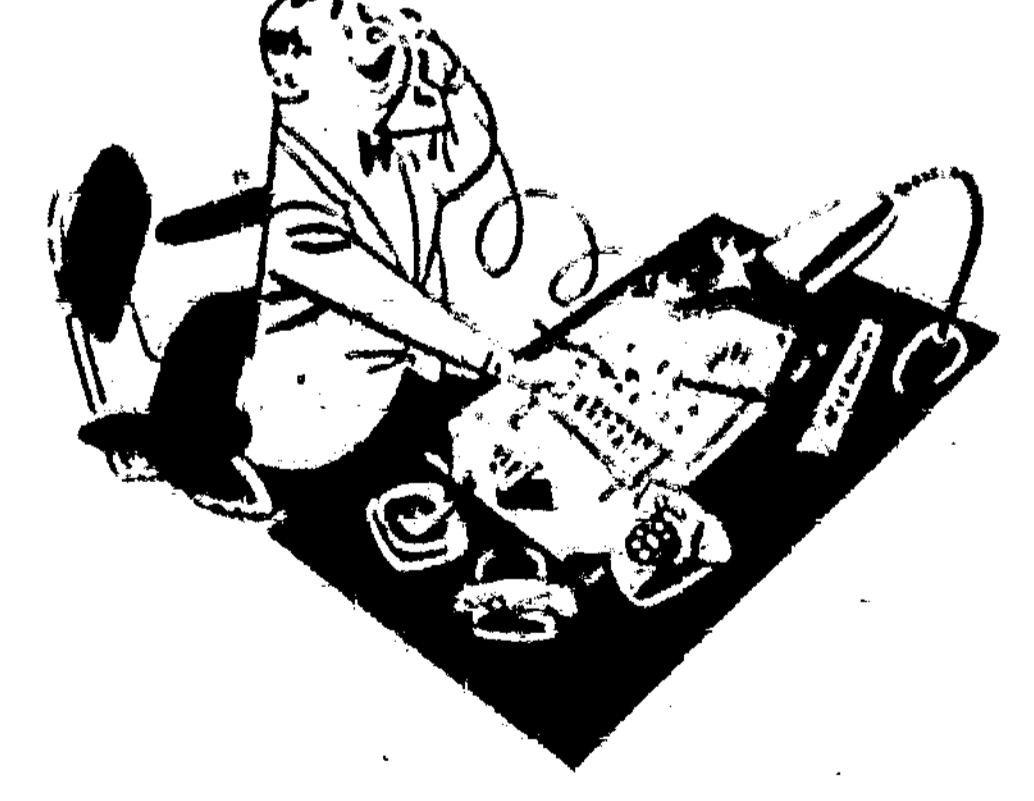

classrooms to relieve a crowded classroom problem. She was asked if at any time the board had unanimously passed a resolution declaring an emergency existed for purchases, to which she replied, "No, I believe there was no special motion to this effect." and then she was asked if the board had advertised for the classrooms and she again answered "No."
Attorney Underwood spoke briefly at the conclusion of the questioning, upholding the superintendent's and the board's actions as a matter of pressure of time, and that there had been no intention on the part of the officials involved to violate any laws, but to better serve the school and its needs in the actions taken.
Wugalter received applause at one point in the hearing when he said, "The children are the ones who will suffer if there is a rift in the community over school problems, and I urge you to settle your differences and work together." He said we must respect laws, and that there were clearly violations of state statutes in the purchasing actions of the school officials. "Even though there may have been extenuating circumstances we must obey the law, and there are ways in which emergency actions can be taken and still operate within the law," he concluded.
About 20 persons were present for the open hearing. Some of the visitors asked questions during the hour and a half investigation.
At one point in the hearing a direct question was asked of Barrow if he knew he was violating state purchasing acts in his actions, and he replied, "Yes."
Wugalter asked Board President Mrs. Tully to provide him with minutes, copies of vouchers and disbursement records for previous school terms when it was intimated at one time that purchasing statutes may have been violated before this year.
Following the hearing Board Member Horton called forward School Superintendent J. Howard Morris, now a resident of Colorado, and asked him about official actions during his administration. He said he could assure that every letter of the law had been observed in such purchases during his regime, and that all such matters had been approved by state officials.

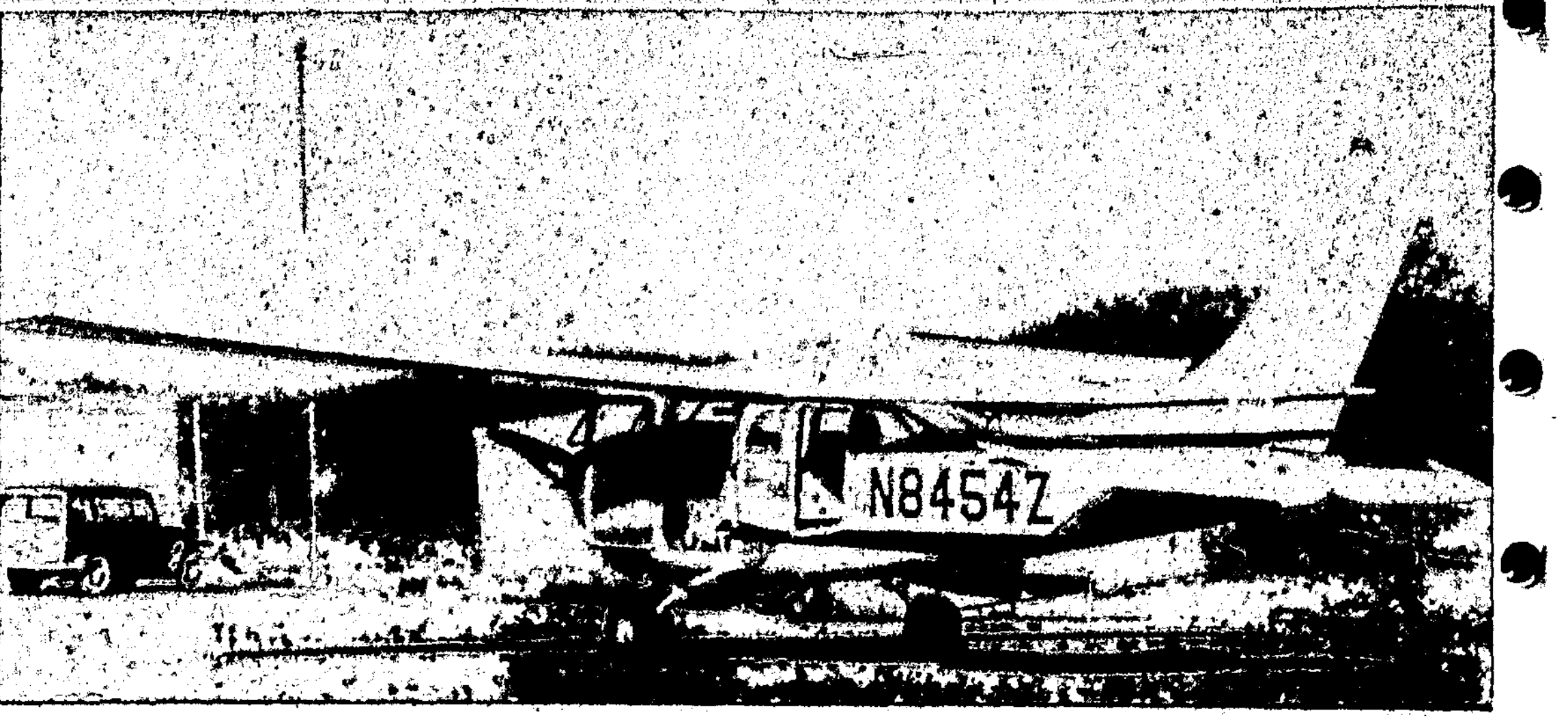

The association also went on record as requesting that all complaints of speed traps, unfair JP practices or similar allegations be forwarded to the association.
Secretary of the association was directed to write letters to the American Automobile Assn., the New Mexico State Police and the State Judicial Committee requesting forwarding of all complaints.

HISTORIC LINCOLN HOTEL TO STAY OPEN ALL YEAR
The Wortley Hotel, a landmark of the Southwest, where Bill the Kid drank and killed at least one man, will be kept open on a year around basis at Lincoln.
Heretofore, the nine-room hostelry had been kept open on a seasonal basis only, but the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission decided to try the new plan.
The hotel, restored and rehabilitated three years ago, will continue to serve three meals daily to guests.
Col. N. A. M. Dudley headquartered his troops at the Wortley during the Lincoln County War, a rangeland battle, in July, 1878.
Three years later, Deputy Sheriff Robert Olinger was eating lunch in the hotel. He heard shots across the street and ran the 100 feet to the jail. He was shot dead by Billy the Kid.
The commission, where the hotel, since its restoration, has turned a moderate profit and it will be kept open year round to provide accommodations to tourists and skiers in the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

Til Thompson's Photo Service Is Nerve Center of Downs

Til Thompson has been in charge of the photographic section of the Ruidoso Downs track since the beginning of racing in Ruidoso. This little known nerve center which is an indispensable part of racing today, is housed in the small building directly in front of the grandstand which is hidden by the electrically controlled racing results and tote board.

This center is managed smoothly and efficiently by Thompson working with a relatively small staff. Each race is covered by three 16-mm cameras, one 35-mm timing film strip camera and one 70-mm timing film strip camera. To flash the results from these cameras to the judges and later to the public, two closed circuit TV cameras are used.

The three 16-mm movie cameras film each race from enclosed towers, one on top of the grandstand and one at the east end and one at the east end of the track. From the grandstand and the west tower the film of the race is placed in canvas bags equipped with rollers which slide down cables to the center with terrific speed. From the east tower the film is sent by runner. As soon as the film arrives it is immediately taken into the dark room where it is fed into the developing and processing machine which can process 100 feet of film per minute.

As the finished film comes out of the processing machine it is run through a viewer and threaded into a projector from which the closed circuit TV camera flash the filmed race to judges.

While this activity is going on, the two film strip cameras which are focused on the spinner at the finish line, photographs each horse as it passes the spinner. These two cameras photograph the finish of each race from a dark room next to the judges' booth above the grandstand where they are immediately processed and ready for the judges to

view for their final and official decision.

Both the 35mm and the 75mm timing film strip cameras are inventions of Thompson and were developed here to improve his work at the Ruidoso Downs track. They are now called the Bullova Timing Camera and are commercially produced by the Bullova Watch Company for other tracks and are also used for other sporting events.

Also a part of this section is the still photographer who photographs the winners circle after each race. These pictures are also processed and printed and ready for distribution before the beginning of the next race.

Thompson, in addition to his work here, also handles the photographic section at Millito Park in Tucson. He also has a contract with the University of Arizona to photograph all athletic events for the university. He has also made color sound films for the New Mexico State Fair, two films for Ruidoso Downs and one for the Shriners Crippled Children's Hospital. Thompson is now in the process of editing another film for the Ruidoso Downs publicity department. These films are shown to audiences of many hundreds in the Southwest prior to each racing season. They are seen on TV stations, at luncheon clubs, at sports shows and in other areas.

Thompson got into the field of electronics in the early life of this new and important industrial revolution. For many years he has been manufacturing polygraphs—popularly called lie detectors, and has several models in use in police departments of several large cities in the west.

He was among the first in the New Mexico and Arizona racing circuits to introduce movie patrol of races and also was responsible for many other innovations in rapid photography for use by judges on race tracks.

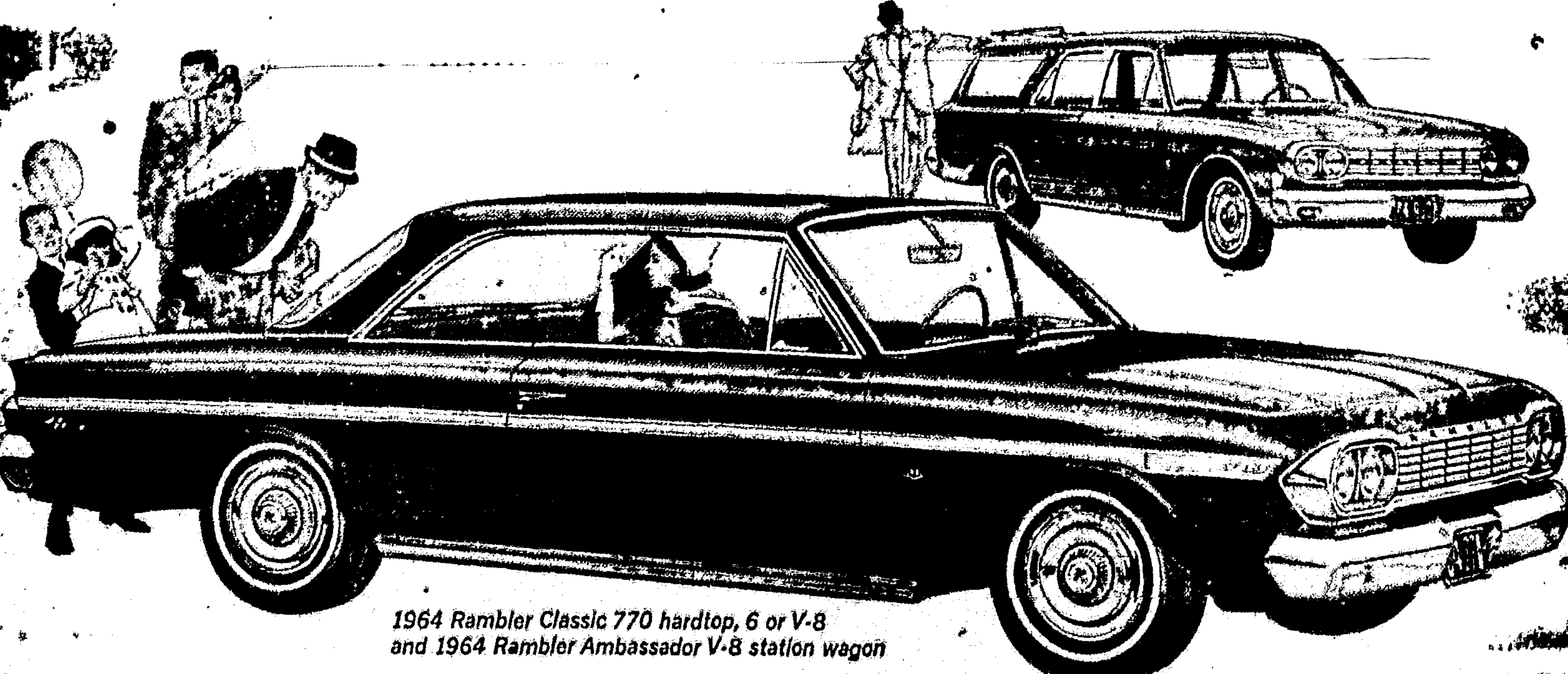

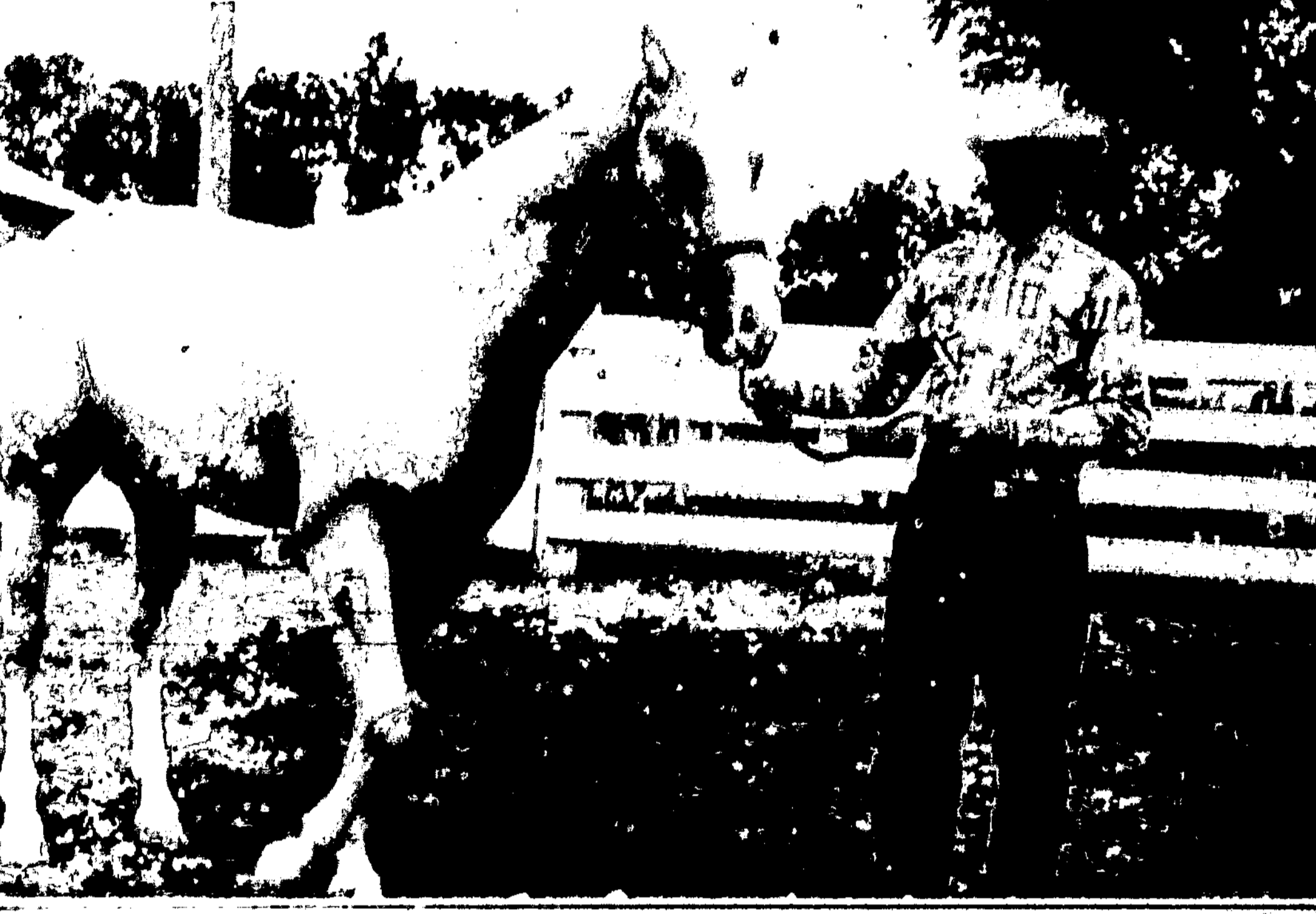

Tularosa's Wildcats came back in the second half with two touchdowns and a safety to overtake a 15-7 half-time lead by the Warriors to take the locals' first 3B District encounter, 21-19, at Tularosa last Saturday night.

The undermanned and outweighted Warriors held the Wildcats to only one touchdown in the first quarter while scoring two markers in the second period. A safety after the opening second half provided the spark for the Wildcats as the Tularosans pushed across two more markers in the third period to gain victory.

Tularosa scored in the first period of the second time they had control of the pigskin. Using only nine plays from their own 26, the Wildcats marched the length of the field to score from the one with quarterback Gilbert Lopez diving over for the tally. Fullback Dennis Marr ran through the Warrior defense for 24 yards in two carries to set up the touchdown. The conversion split the uprights for the extra point.

The Ruidoso offense sputtered momentarily in the second period before a fumble recovery on the Warrior 42 yard line by linebacker Lloyd Absher gave the Warriors the break needed. Fourteen plays later halfback Jim Steele scooted around right end on a reverse for the locals' first touchdown. A Bill Stirman pass for the extra point was knocked down in the end zone. Quarterback Stirman had completed four of six aerials in the drive to the goal line.

The big play however, was an amazing pass reception by end Jim Graham on the Wildcats' six. The hustling end actually took a pass out of the hands of a Tularosa defender to keep the drive alive.

Two plays following the kick-off to Tularosa, Stirman intercepted a Wildcat pass at midfield and returned the ball to the 21 to start another Warrior scoring drive. Only able to pick up three yards in three downs the locals were faced with a fourth down and eight situation. On yet another pass and a tremendous reception, this time by halfback Steele, gave the Warriors a new lease on life. Steele made a diving catch at the nine for a first down. Stirman moved the ball to the six on a quarterback sneak and on the next play fullback George Pearson crashed over right tackle for the TD. Pearson added the PAT with a plunging over right tackle again.

The opening kick-off of the second half started the downfall of the Warriors as the ball rolled to the one yard line before the Tribe could pick up the slippery sphere. On the first play Stirman was caught in the end zone for a safety and two points in the third quarter.

Taking the kick-off after the safety the fired-up Wildcats used only five plays to push across another marker from their own 46 yard line. Quarterback Lopez scored around left end from 17 yards out. The extra point kick was wide. A 15-yard penalty at the Ruidoso 32 against the Warriors opened the door for the touchdown and the Wildcats took the lead 15-13.

Late in the third period the Tularosans capitalized on another break recovering a Warrior fumble on the Ruidoso 21. Lopez carried to the seven on a roll-out around left end and fullback Marr rumbled up the middle for the touchdown on the next play. Extra point pass was knocked down.

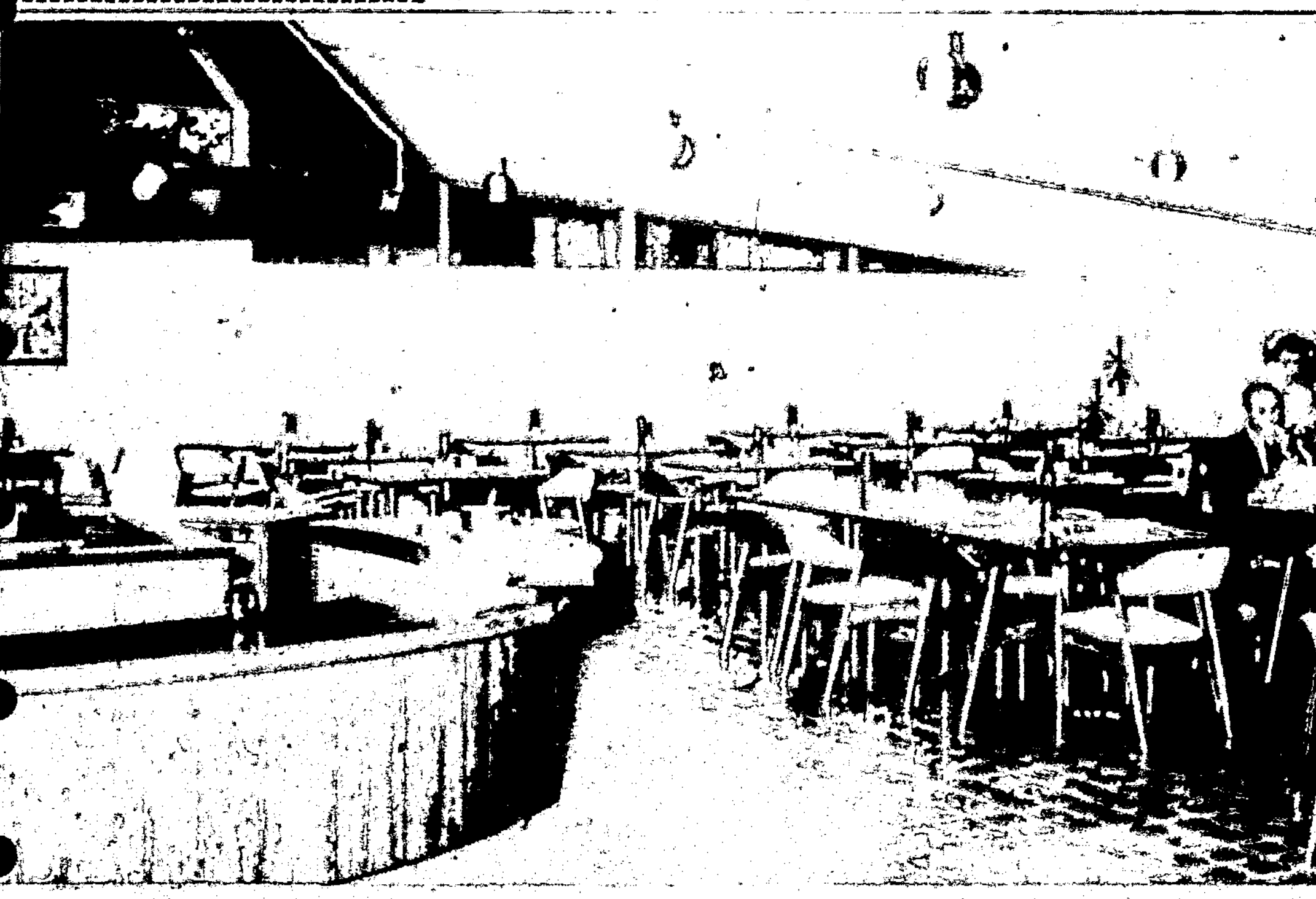
BOND SALES INCREASE THROUGHOUT U. S. BUT DECLINE IN LINCOLN.

RUIDOSO KINDERGARTEN FILLS 7-FOLD PURPOSE

The non-denominational Kindergarten supervised by Mrs. Bill Pippin and Mrs. Robert Lee meets each Monday through Friday in the educational building of the Community Methodist Church.

The kindergarten has a seven fold purpose Mrs. Pippin stated: 1. To meet the individual child's needs; 2. To help the children see that learning can be fun; 3. Let us have a look at the Stark's Double Red Delicious also called Starking. For sheer beauty and flavor this apple is in a class by itself. In full ripeness, this apple is a dark maroon color a cheerful sight in the orchard; and in the afternoon sun its strong flavor sends forth upon the breeze a delightful aroma which can be recognized from quite a ways off down the orchard rows and is really something like a little taste of the apple itself.

Did you ever notice how flavors, aromas and colors go together? How a Concord grape and its color and flavor can be recognized in other fruits, and flowers—may be like the blue plum or the purple iris?

Well, the Double Red Delicious, with its rich dark red color blending almost to purple, has a flavor that is something like a purple plum or a Concord grape. Many other delightful little flavor elements come into this apple also in a year like this along with something of the apple's very own. There is absolutely nothing like the flavor of the Double Red Delicious. They are at their best and they are going fast.

The Golden Delicious—do those words alone not bring to your mind's eye beautiful sights? And the sight of the Golden Delicious apple fully ripe upon the trees during this golden autumn weather, is something even beyond the imagination of you or I. Beautifully and delicately made, smooth and silken and thin skinned, brightly golden with a cherry-red blush upon its cheek of gold, the

Golden Delicious glows against the blue autumn sky like something out of a story book.

The gold of this apple is more than skin deep and goes on down into the delicate and sparkling juicy-laden apple itself. The flavor too is truly golden, reminding you of the pear, the pineapple, the apricot and better flavor even than this. Anyone who has grown apples can tell you that there is no place where the apple is needed that the Golden Delicious does not shine.

The very best of pies, cobblers, dumplings, preserves, baked apples, apple sauce and all the rest are made from the Golden Delicious. With its magic touch the Golden Delicious adds something of its own in appetizing and delightful quality. The tartness and the juice of the "Golden" put it on top of the list as a health apple. Where can you stop when you start telling about the Golden Delicious? They are getting ready fast.

Just a little later we can have a sketch of the Stayman Wineap and the Double Red Stayman Wineap or "Stayman Red". This is a long time favorite and is popular as a Halloween Apple. The Rome Beauty—the Old Faithful. It always brings a crop—and sometimes it is lonesome when the other apples have been laid low by the spring frosts. More about these later.

One thing I would like you to do is to spread the word around to your friends that our apples are in their glory this year.

SWAMI PARAMPANTHI

Hindu Monk Speaks In Ruidoso Oct. 10

The Philanthropic Library of Ruidoso will present Swami Parampanthi in a lecture at the Old Mill Thursday evening, Oct. 10 at 8 p.m. Title of the lecture is "The Nature of Mystical Experiences".
