School Superintendent, Board Member Resign

Around Town

We got a great big bang out of listening to a record of folk songs written and sung by Calvin Botes, who had Yucca Recordings in Alamogordo, and which features a special little ditty he wrote about our 18 1/2-foot rattlesnake story that swept around the world with a Ruidoso dateline some three years ago. He calls the two Ruidoso Down men who thought up the unusual nature story, "Hesus" and "Antonio". The record includes a number of other Southwestern folk songs he originated, including "Guitar Pickin' Man", etc. The records are on sale in Ruidoso at Lennie's two stores, Tucker's Variety, Motor Supply and Gateway Drug. There are 12 songs, all original, on the LPM record that sells for \$3.98. Hotel Cortez in El Paso is sending out new brochures with color photos of Southwestern attractions, and includes a view of Sierra Blanca Ski Area. The piece was designed by De Bruyn Advertising of El Paso. Residents of Indian Hills have had a couple of visits from a bear, or bears, in the last few weeks.

The resignation of Tom W. Barrow as school superintendent of Ruidoso Municipal Schools was tendered the Ruidoso school board last Thursday morning, and within a few hours, a member of the board also sent in his resignation—both of which were accepted by the board.

The board member resigning was Dr. W. D. Horton who had served in that capacity for about ten years. The meeting held Thursday night last week was attended by a committee of five citizens named by a gathering of patrons at the Deck House Tuesday last week, who were interested in assisting in solving problems that had arisen in misunderstandings between the administration and the faculty. The resignation of a science teacher here the previous Friday had precipitated a heated controversy in the community. The science teacher, Virgil Whittington, was asked by Supt. Barrow to remain on the job until sometime later in the school year, a board member told the News. Whittington returned to his post last mid-week. Problems over what Whittington said was "lack of certain supplies" for his physics and chemistry classes had brought the rift between the teacher and the superintendent, it was brought out in an investigation by state school officials.

Mrs. Wynema Tully, president of the Ruidoso board, told the News Thursday morning this week that there have been four applications for the vacant superintendent's job already received by one member, and that one application from a science teacher had been received. She said the board would take no action this week on filling these vacancies, nor would there be any action on filling the vacancy on the school board. She said a called meeting to discuss several problems will be held Thursday night this week with the committee of five invited, and some others who may be called in to meet with the board.

"We will not act on employing a superintendent until after we have conferred with State School Superintendent L. DeLayo and State School Board Member James Martin of Las Cruces, who are expected here this coming Sunday to meet with the Ruidoso board," Mrs. Tully said. "Neither will we appoint a new board member until we have studied this further, and have some recommendations for action from the state school officials."

Last Thursday night the citizens' committee of five, along with special invited school patrons, discussed the school controversy for several hours, then the board issued the following statement:

"The occurrences of the last many hours are such that they will affect the lives of every person in the Ruidoso School District. Dr. Horton's and Mr. Barrow's resignation submitted to the Board have certainly placed all former issues in a different light. The Ruidoso School Board sincerely requests the patience of each member of the community in allowing the Board to evaluate the situation."

Ruidoso to Vote Jan. 6 On Municipal Gas System



Ruidoso's village council in a special called meeting Monday afternoon moved to submit the question to voters of the village whether or not the municipality will go into the business of building, operating and maintaining a natural gas system in conjunction with the Village of Capitán. Citizens will vote on the question Monday, Jan. 6.

Mayor Warren Tucker presided in the called meeting in which three of the four trustees were present, Jodie Fillemann, Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., and Bill McCarty. Absent was Trustee Ben Donahue. Attorney John W. Thompson was also on hand for the session.

Legal notices concerning the gigantic project of going into the natural gas business are printed in this week's News, including an ordinance putting the project in motion, and a notice of the election.

Proposed is a \$775,000.00 revenue bond issue to be paid off in 30 years from income from the gas system. The bonds would not be a lien on private property—but would be retired from revenues from sale of natural gas to customers.

The council met last Thursday to discuss taking action last week, but did not do so at that time. News reporter Dick Bennett's story of the meeting last week is given below:

Charles Powell Thursday night advised the Village of Ruidoso Trustees to delay in getting a date for the election or voting pertaining to bringing natural gas to Ruidoso. Powell, the engineer who prepared the feasibility report on natural gas for the village stated that the wording on the ballots had to be further examined by attorneys for the village and also the attorneys for the bonding company. Powell requested that, as soon as the wording on the ballots was worked out in an acceptable manner to all parties, a special meeting of the Village Trustees be called to set the date for the election.

Powell also advised the Trustees that the voting on the natural gas installation here would be open to all registered voters and not just property owners, as some people had been informed.

The meeting Thursday night was the regularly scheduled meeting for the Village of Ruidoso Trustees and all members were present.

The Trustees also passed Resolution Number 251 which accepted the petition for annexation to the Village of the Town and Country subdivision, on State Road 37 North of the city.

M. W. Knox submitted to the Trustees a franchise proposal for the Ruidoso TV Cable Service. Mayor Warren Tucker, after reading aloud a portion of the long document, referred the matter to Village attorney John Thompson.

Jim Hine, village manager-clerk, was authorized by the Trustees to proceed with the making of a new and official map of the Village, and not to exceed in cost \$2,000. Trustee L. L. Davis, Jr., added an amendment to the motion that, in the future, all subdivisions would have to furnish maps of new subdivisions in the same scale as the master map.

The Orebucket

Area mining news and views

"Down by the old mill stream" Remember that old favorite. Well the mill I'd like to tell you about is somewhat different than the one mentioned in the song. It's the mill a few miles south of Carrizozo. This mill was built primarily to handle ore produced in this area, back in 1952. It has been standing idle these past years, due to litigation.

I'd like to explain, to those of you unfamiliar with the one milling process, the importance of an operating mill to anyone with a producing mine. For example, if you had a mine with low grade ore, it may not be profitable to ship to the smelter, considering freight rates, whereas by shipping a short distance to a mill, could render a profitable operation. The mill would eliminate the waste rock and produce a concentrate of your ore. A pick up load of concentrate can equal many large dump truck loads of unmined ore.

There are many small mill owners in this area, whose mines are inactive at the moment, because of their low mineral percentage of their ore bodies. Once a mill is put into operation in the vicinity, many mines will become activated.

Last Thursday we pulled up at the Carrizozo mill and were greeted by Mr. "Spot" Heath. We made ourselves comfortable in his home trailer and he proceeded to tell us about the mill. Mr. Heath is caretaker and former operator of this mill. Born at Galena, Kansas in 1900, he has had approximately 34 years experience in this line of work. During World War II he worked 2 1/2 years as a journeyman stevedore at the ship yards.

The mill is located on a 65 acre site, containing two 3-inch water wells. Six tons of ore can be handled per hour. The electric system is a GMC diesel 250 hp., producing 250 kw. Enough electricity to power the entire town of Carrizozo. Mr. Heath stated that most of the machinery was in very good condition, due to non-excessive operation. This is a selective flotation plant. The total cost of this mill was close to \$175,000. I hope the litigation regarding this mill is settled soon, so we can have an operating mill in the area.

I have seen the core drilling rig, Mr. Ira Young is building, and I was impressed. I think he is going to have a very efficient piece of equipment when he finishes.

I met Arvel Runnels at Tommy's Steak House Monday afternoon. He gave me the following information, while I dug into some of that good chili Tommy makes. Phillips Petroleum has leased 32 of Arvel's claims at Bonito. Arvel is stated that he shipped 850 pounds of crystals to the shop in Texas. He expects

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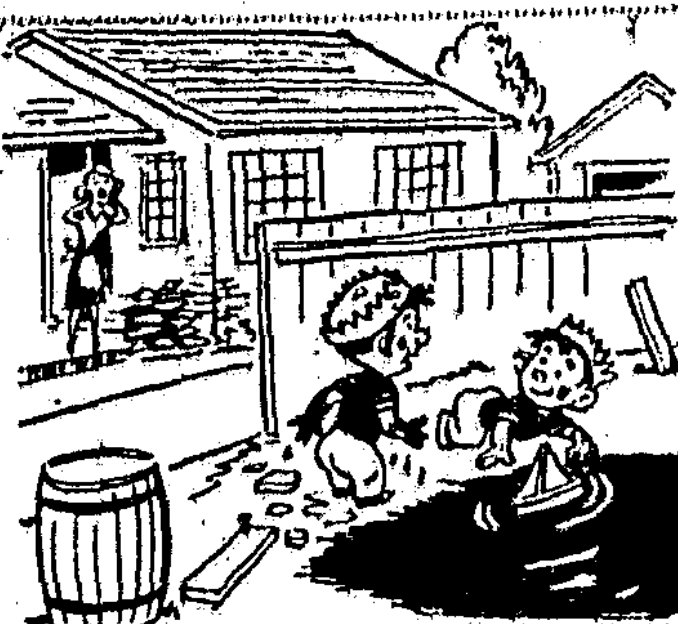
