

### County Agent's Report

Lincoln County Woolgrowers Meeting  
The Lincoln County Woolgrowers will meet Jan. 26, at the Carrizozo Fire Hall. The morning session will be devoted to business meeting of the woolgrowers, with production control the main item on the agenda.

On the weekly range livestock market I notice that some spring lamb prices are being reported. In the Chavis area some choice 550-600 pound steers were contracted for March delivery at \$27.00 to \$28.00. In the Amarillo area, close to 1000 low choice heifers were sold at \$24.50-\$25.00 for March and April delivery. In Colorado and Wyoming 245,000 pounds of fine and half blood wool sold for 49.50 cents per pound. Marcher lambs were selling at \$10.00 - \$10.50 in Colorado.

Some time is here for the winter pruning. Here are a few tips about your start pruning. 1. Make cuts close to the base of the limb so it will heal quickly without leaving a dead stub. 2. Cut all rubbing branches and prune the limbs so you can see through the tree from all directions. 3. Generally you will need to prune more on the east side and less on the west side due to the wind. 4. On peaches, leave a few buds in the center to produce a new crop of fruit. Pruning may later be developed into a business. For more information, see the bulletin "Pruning Hardy Fruit Trees" available in the Extension office in Carrizozo.

# Problems, Challenges, Progress In 1962 Outlined by Local C. of C.

The year 1963 has arrived with its problems and opportunities. Some of the problems are old. All the opportunities are new. To solve the problems and to meet the opportunities successfully, it is well to review the programs of the past six months. A full time manager was employed for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1962. A budget of \$13,270 for the year was proposed by the manager, \$10,870 to come from pledges, and \$2,400 from Western Union commissions. A campaign for membership to meet this budget was carried on for the first two months of the year. The total amount pledged for the year is \$11,160. The amount needed to carry on the work is \$2,110. Therefore, the working budget is short \$1,369. Thus we are faced with the old problem of finances to carry on services needed.


The opportunity to collect unpaid pledges and to secure new ones to carry on as planned confronts us. It can be done. The office staff was kept very busy during the year's span, until after Labor Day with correspondence, phone calls, and personal interviews. With thousands of visitors and inquiries, a majority of requests concerned housing reservations. An estimated twenty thousand were assisted to find accommodations and places of recreation during the season. Our experience during this hectic time emphasizes the problem and opportunity to provide more working hours of assistance for this growing flood of visitors. Our econ-

New scenes upon their pleasure. A very successful Aspenade was held in the White Mountain Park the last week-end in September. It has been set for the same place and time in 1963. Plans have already been adopted to make this annual event bigger and better. The first Past Draw was held in Old Lincoln in September and was supported by the Chamber of Commerce. There is an opportunity for this to become an important Lincoln County event. Representatives of the Mesquero Tribal Agency met with the directors in October. Plans for further development of Reservation fishing and hunting resources were reviewed. Additional conferences with representatives and with members of the Tribal Council have emphasized an opportunity to co-operate with important agency plans for water conservation, and the development of tourist facilities on the Reservation.

Criticism and consultation with regional and local Forest Office has brought to our attention an opportunity to assist in the planning and development of additional camping facilities and accommodations to them on forest lands. A co-operative office arrangement with the Sierra Blanca Co., enables us to improve our service for ski enthusiasts, who want information, housing and equipment. We have been gladly swamped with their need for service, during the Christmas season. We could not have handled it without the efficient secretarial help provided by Sierra Blanca.

In November a questionnaire was circulated requesting our membership and other interested citizens assist in setting up a work program for the Chamber of Commerce. 118 suggestions were received. We were able to combine these into ten channels of work, and a committee has been projected for each. These committees are: (1) Conventions; (2) Resort and Recreation; (3) Research and Water Development; (4) Education; (5) Highways; (6) Aviation;

(7) Agriculture; (8) Retail Trade; (9) Civic and Community Planning; and (10) Membership. The first committee organized was the Convention Committee, and results are in evidence. The American Association of Sheriffs' Poses and Riding Clubs will bring its convention here in 1963. The American Legion will bring its department convention in 1964. Others are to be contacted in January and February. The committee is sponsoring the organization of the Ruidoso Mountain Men to advertise the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley area to bring more conventions to us.

The Resort and Recreation Committee has organized and plans a busy year. Incidentally, a meeting of Recreational directors and personnel of the six air bases in the El Paso District is scheduled here for Jan. 16. This meeting with 125 representatives of the military personnel adjacent to our area presents an excellent opportunity to sell our recreational potential. The Research and Water Development committee is organized, and has had representatives at a County Commissioners meeting called for the purpose of considering Lincoln County water problems and opportunities of basic importance to our economy.

Very important assurances have been received from our State Highway Commissioner concerning maintenance of the Ski Bash road, and of construction on Highway 70 between Biscuit Hill and Hondo. The Aviation Committee has secured favorable publicity for our area. A determined effort is being made to secure U. S. Weather Bureau reporting service, and eventually commercial flying service from our airport. The Retail Trade committee sponsored Santa Claus for the area, and promoted a program for stores to remain open on week-ends during the holidays. This committee



## Tax Proposal On Motels, Hotels Has Opposition Here

Ruidoso Tourist Association, in a meeting attended by representatives of about 20 of Ruidoso's accommodations, voted to write state legislators letters opposing a proposed 5% tax on motel and hotel rooms. The bill is planned for introducing in the current state legislature, and would be a special-use tax, the funds to go towards building and maintaining public auditoriums in municipalities.

Mrs. Virgil Wallace, Captain, member of the New Mexico Motel Owners and Managers Association, brought attention to the proposed tax. Local Tourist Bureau President Russell Hays, asked for expressions of opposition to the bill, and urged members of the group to write state representatives and senators urging they do not vote for the tax measure. "A motel grossing \$20,000 a year will pay \$1,000 in taxes to the state under this law, and that will buy a new car every few years," he pointed out.

Mrs. Wallace who operates the Smokey Bear Motel in Capitlan, mentioned that another law that needed opposing by the state legislators was one proposed by Lt. Gov. Mack Easley that would build state operated motels and hotels. "We don't want the state operating tourist accommodations in competition to us and we need to get to work to defeat this proposal," she declared.

The group also moved to send letters to federal representatives in Tucson asking they assist the Apache Indian reservation in its plan to establish a fish hatchery which could supply fish for a number of lakes and ponds planned on the reservation for conservation and recreation use.

A brief discussion on sponsorship of a new advertising brochure was held, but action was tabled until another meeting.

Principal speaker was Editor Vic Lamb, whose subject was "Lincoln County, the Most Interesting County in the U. S. A." He named numerous vacation and recreation attractions of the area and urged the motel operators to learn more about their county so they can encourage vacationers to stay long in Ruidoso while touring and enjoying the climate, scenery and history of the region.

## Federal Escapee Is Captured

A 24-year-old man serving a sentence in Carrizozo on misdemeanor charges has been identified as an escapee from the State Correctional Institute at Huntington, Pa., nearly a year ago.

H. O. Hawkins, special agent in charge of the Albuquerque FBI office, said John Chester Mitchell and his girl friend, 18, were arrested Dec. 22 in their trailer home near Lincoln on misdemeanor check charges.

Wednesday, Sheriff W. G. Bradley learned through fingerprints sent to the FBI that Mitchell, who had been using the name William Ebersole, escaped from the Pennsylvania institution Jan. 5, 1962.

After a crime spree in North Carolina and Ohio, Mitchell headed west with Lila June Miller, 18, Johnston, Ohio, and settled in Ruidoso Downs Sept. 12.

Mitchell worked at the Ruidoso Downs race track and had been doing odd jobs while living near Lincoln, Bradley said.

The Ruidoso village marshal's office reported Mitchell was brought to the local jail by Deputy Sheriff J. D. Bryan, and that they had a record that he had been employed once by Holiday House here. Since here on misdemeanors has Jim Withers, manager of Holiday House, said the man did not work there, that it was another person who had a criminal record and had been nicked up by police at an earlier date.

Miss Miller admitted cashing \$600 in checks under \$10 each, the sheriff added.

Patron Downs Peace Justice Alton Gray sentenced Miss Miller to 30 days in jail on one count and charged Mitchell a \$25 fine and five days in jail.

Mitchell also was sentenced to 30 days in jail by Carrizozo Peace Justice R. L. Howell for obtaining a hunting license by fraud, declaring himself a New Mexico resident, and Hawkins said after Mitchell and his fellow inmate escaped last January they fled in a stolen car to Asheville, N. C., where Mitchell's accomplice was apprehended. Mitchell was sent to the institution after being convicted of burglary and larceny.

Mitchell made his way to Ohio and assumed the name Ebersole when he met Miss Miller in Johnston in February, Hawkins reported.
