

'Progress Means Trouble,' CC Banquet Speaker Says; Ruidoso Is Complimented

"Progress means trouble. It means toes will be stepped upon . . . You will sit to the bottom . . . You people are so full of free enterprise, it's refreshing," Jack Lacy, executive assistant to Sen. Edwin L. Mechem, told members of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce at its annual meeting Thursday night.
Lacy was the main speaker at the dinner meeting held at the Chaparral in Ruidoso Downs.
"You people have put on long pants . . . you are working things out," Lacy declared. He said that the Ruidoso area is the only tourist center that has the "correct philosophy" for growth and development. "You're up on the move," he said. "You have a fine sense of genuine citizenship upon which to build the area . . . A sense of values makes you what you are . . . Courtesy and consideration are the keys to your success," the speaker declared.
Lacy said that many communities across the nation have their hands out, "they cry 'Help us,'" he said. "I think this is a moral failure!"
In closing the speaker warned the group of several hundred Chamber members, wives, guests and supporters: "It is never wise to let the small, nearer profits make you lose sight of the larger gains."
He advised the Chamber to constantly be setting high, hypothetical goals "and meeting them."
Five new directors of the Chamber who will take office July 1 were introduced. They are Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., Emil Klemm, Jack Crandall, Jim Wimberly and Jack Jennings.

Approximately 250 will attend the three-day conference which begins today, it was reported.

To Spend \$10,000 Fighting Erosion At Fire Site

Pete Totemoff, recreation technician with the Ruidoso District Forest Service, announced Monday that the Forest Service is spending about \$10,000 in contouring and trenching to prevent erosion, and re-seeding the recent burned area above Bonito Lake. The forest service will also fence the burned area to keep out stock.

About 16 men are working in the area now felling burned trees in contours to prevent erosion. Three caterpillar tractors were moved into the area this week to assist in the contouring operation, Totemoff said. He added that Jim McEuen, fire control officer of the Ruidoso district, will be in charge of the project.

Route For US 70 Is Discussed With Sudderth

With construction apparently set for this fall on a 5.1 mile segment of U. S. Highway 70 east of here, starting at Biscuit Hill, several persons met with State Highway Commissioner John Sudderth in a conference at Holiday House Saturday morning to discuss its proposed alignment. The meeting was called at Sudderth's request by the road committee of the local Chamber of Commerce. The C. of C.'s only interest was to allow the commissioner and the people interested to voice their respective ideas, a spokesman said.
A proposal by Jim Tully, pioneer Ruidoso valley rancher that the highway be designed to go on the hillside above the valley, rather than follow about the same course it now does in the valley, brought support in many quarters, but also had some opposition. Chairman Sudderth and C. of C. Manager A. E. Hunt called on all who were present to make statements in regard to their views. Also present for the meeting were all of Lincoln County's commissioners, Chairman Charles A. Jones, R. C. Nunes and Kenneth Nosker. Each expressed the desire to recommend to the highway department what the people wanted.

Sudderth told the group that he had ordered an aerial survey made of the proposed hillside route to give the project further study along the lines of possible re-routing. He said at present the only interest was to go down the valley, following the old road as closely as possible. He said only 37.6 acres of arriaga land now in use would be retired by being used as a road. He said the highway department was anxious to preserve as many of the small businesses that are in operation along the route as possible, and that some of them definitely would be affected adversely if the road was put on the hillside. He said a preliminary survey of one mile of the proposed five mile segment from Biscuit Hill east showed that Fox Cave, a widely known tourist attraction, would be entirely destroyed. He said, also, figures showed that cost of the road would run \$100,000 more per mile, at least for the first one mile surveyed on the hillside. He said four possible routes had been studied for the improvement.

Speaking for the hillside route was Tully, who pointed out the present U. S. 70 road could be left as a service road for the people of the valley and for mail and school bus service. In opposition to this, Commissioner Nosker pointed out that maintenance of the old road would be a problem—as the highway department wouldn't and the county couldn't afford it. He also said the route for school buses would continue to be a hazardous plan, and that it was just possible the state school bus safety officials, and the local school board, might not allow the buses to run on the old route.

Nosker said the new road planned down the valley would be of the quality and width the one which runs now from the east edge of Ruidoso Downs to Biscuit Hill. And he said, from experience of operating school buses for several years, he felt that stretch of road was safe, adequate and would not take too much land away from ranchers and orchardists.

Village Commissioner Max Oliver of Ruidoso Downs said comment he had received on the hillside routes was favorable, as did Bruce Griffin and Louis Smith. Paul Jones and Joe Coe also spoke in favor of the hillside route.

Mrs. Bill Brem, wife of the owner and developer of Fox Cave, and her brother-in-law, Floyd Brem, said the cave would be lost if the hillside route was developed and the area's tourist receipts would diminish.
Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Coe, pioneer valley residents, urged the road remain along the valley. He said, however, the fact many tourists enjoy the beautiful scenery, the orchards in bloom and the ranches they could see as they traveled in the valley, which would not be available to them if the road was made a speedway above that area.

Sudderth mentioned that traffic projection by the highway department showed the road would have to be built to carry 5,000 cars a day in U. S. Highway 70 through Lincoln County.
Tully declared the road was needed on the hillside for safety and for the future — for he felt in 20 years it would finally have to be built there. He pointed out the need for swift transportation lines between the various military bases in southern New Mexico, and the growing volume of traffic that amounts to long lines of fast moving cars during racing days each summer here—now creating a road hazard for the drivers as well as the residents in the valley.

Sudderth said the highway department figured about \$1,000 an acre would be cost for right of way on the route now favored, but would be much higher on a hillside route especially if Fox Cave was destroyed. He said the road in the valley would likely cost about \$200,000 per mile to construct. It would be done in the fall, with work halted until next spring, to dodge the busy traffic of Ruidoso's recreation magnets.

Beloved Negro White Oaks Pioneer Dies At Carrizo

D. L. (Dave) Jackson, 93, pioneer Negro White Oaks resident, died Wednesday in the hospital in Carrizo. He had been hospitalized since April 19. Funeral services were held Thursday in the First Baptist Church in Carrizo with Rev. Harold Ely officiating. Burial was in the White Oaks Cemetery of which Jackson had been custodian for many years. Jackson was once a partner in the two Homestake Mines in the days when White Oaks was a booming mining town, and was one of about 25 people now living in the old ghost town.

Racing Secretary Jimmy West has hung up the "No Vacancy" sign on his 1300 stable area "Motel Units" as horses continue to pour into this mountain-top playground plant for the inaugural Ruidoso Downs 54-day meeting a week from Friday, May 17.

The traffic has been so heavy, in fact, that no sooner are they registered than thoroughbreds and Quarter Horses alike head for the racing strip and the serious business of testing their tooties for the \$1,300,000 in purse money being offered here this summer.

Manager Tex Barron told the News this week the Ruidoso racing officials were highly pleased with the quality of horses seeking berths in stalls here, and also with the unexpected big season that seems assured to top the 1962 per-mutuel handle of \$12 1/2 million. Higher purses are one of the drawing cards for the expected large entry list for the season, plus additional facilities provided in the horsemen's area, he said.

(Editor's Note: The following prepared statement was given to the press of New Mexico this week by Art Paul, who resigned as public relations manager for the race track. The article was given widespread publicity. The Ruidoso News contacted Gene Hensley, the track's director, Wednesday this week for comment on the statement, and Hensley said he had no answer except to say Paul's statement was "untrue" and that he wished that it would be "played down" in the press.)

After a two-month cojourn as Publicity Director for the Ruidoso Downs Racing Association, Art Paul submitted his resignation Tuesday, stating his reason as a "hopeless effort in a disgusting situation". Paul, a former newspaper and public relations man, was hired March 1 by Downs' General Manager, Tex Barron, because of the wide experience garnered in the publicity field. Prior to his appointment at Ruidoso Downs Paul was on the staff of the Hobbs News-Sun, one of the outstanding papers in the state.

"In all my years dealing with and in the business world, I have never seen such confusion, distrust, petty jealousy, and complete lack of cooperative attitude as is present in the Downs' management," said Paul. He continues, "there is certainly not one of Tex Barron who was employed a few days before I was, as he is the most capable management executive I have observed in a long

New Accounting System to be Used By JP's After July 1

July 1, 1963, a new accounting and administrative procedure goes into effect for all New Mexico Justices of the Peace officials. The new law transfers, supervisory and financial support of the JP system from county administrators to a court administrator.

The administrator prescribes and furnishes forms and supplies to the JP's. Civil and criminal costs are set at \$7.50 and are remitted by the JP's to the administrator along with fine and forfeitures in criminal cases on monthly schedule prescribed by regulation. The administrator audits monthly reports and pays JP's \$5 for each case.

In criminal cases where defendant is found innocent the cost must be paid by complaining witness, unless case is filed by a full-time salaried county or state law enforcement officer.

The administrator makes annual JP audits and presents unannounced spot-checks. The county commissioner continues to pay \$7.50 a day for requests JP's violating regulation of the administrator are subject to \$1,000 fine and removal from office.

Both Judge H. M. Graham of Ruidoso and Judge Alton Gray of Ruidoso Downs, stated that they felt the new system would be an improvement and would relieve the county commissioner of considerable paper work.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS OF ASSESSMENTS FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO DISTRICT NO. 2

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to property owners and other interested persons that, by Ordinance No. 137, duly passed, adopted, signed and approved on the 25th day of April, 1963, there were levied and assessed against the lots and parcels of land specially benefited by the street improvements in what is commonly designated as "Street Improvement District No. 2" certain lots and parcels being more specifically described in the assessment roll designated in said ordinance, a portion of the cost and expenses of said improvements.

Said assessments shall be due and payable at the office of the Village Treasurer on or before the 7th day of June, 1963, i. e., within thirty days after the effective date of said ordinance (or thirty-five days after its publication), without interest and without demand; provided, that all such assessments may, at the election of the owner, be paid in installments, with interest as hereinafter provided. Failure to pay the whole assessment within said period of thirty days shall be conclusively considered and held an election on the part of all persons interested, whether under disability or otherwise, to pay the unpaid assessment in such installments. In case of such election to pay in installments, the unpaid assessments shall be payable in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal until paid in full, with interest in all cases on the unpaid and deferred installments of principal from the 3rd day of May, 1963, i. e., the date of publication of said ordinance, at the rate of one percent (1%) per annum, both principal and interest being payable semiannually at the office of the Village Treasurer on the first days of May and November in each year, commencing the first day of November, 1963. Failure to pay any installment when due, shall cause the whole of the unpaid principal to become due and payable immediately at the Village's option, and the whole amount of the unpaid principal and accrued interest shall, after such delinquency, whether said option is or is not exercised, bear penalty at the rate of one per centum (1%) per month, until the day of sale or until paid, but at any time prior to the date of the sale, the owner may pay the amount of all delinquent payments originally being coming due on or before the date of said payment, with interest thereon and all penalties accrued, and shall thereupon be restored to the right thereafter to pay in installments in the same manner as if default had not been suffered.

The owner of any property not in default as to any installment or payment may, at any time, pay the whole or any security, installment of the unpaid principal with interest accruing thereon to the next interest payment date.

The amounts assessed as aforesaid constitute a lien upon said lots and parcels of land from the 3rd day of May, 1963, the date of publication of said ordinance, which lien shall be co-equal with the lien of other taxes and prior and superior liens of any kind, claims and titles. The sale of any such lot or parcel of land for general or other taxes shall not relieve such lot or parcel of land from such assessment or the lien therefor.

ORDINANCE NO. 138
AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING
RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, SEWER
DISTRICT NO. 1, BY PRESCRIBING
THE MANNER OF GIVING
NOTICES IN CONNECTION WITH
SAID DISTRICT; AND DECLARING
AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso by resolution adopted and entered of record on the 25th day of January, 1963, has heretofore determined and declared that it is necessary and proper to have constructed and maintained sanitary sewers in the area designated as "Ruidoso, New Mexico, Sewer District No. 1"; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees by said resolution has instructed Quentin Daniel of Alamogordo, New Mexico, to prepare and file with the Clerk of said Village a map of said proposed District, together with the lots and pieces of land situate therein; to trace in said map the commencement and course of said sanitary sewers; to attach to said map a specification of the materials of which said sanitary sewers shall be constructed, and the size of the same, and at what depth below the grade of the streets the same shall be constructed; to make under oath and file with the Village Clerk a carefully prepared estimate of the approximate cost of said sanitary sewers; and to report the total amount

prescribed by Section 14-40-10, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, the form of which notice shall be hereafter prescribed by resolution, shall be published once each week for four successive weeks in the Ruidoso News, being a newspaper published within the limits of the Village and of general circulation therein and being the official newspaper thereof. In addition, said notice shall be mailed by the Village Clerk, postage prepaid, as first-class mail, not later than the first publication of said notice, to the last-known address of each last-known owner of land within the District whose property will be assessed for the cost of the improvements, such addresses and owners being those appearing on the local property assessment rolls for general (ad valorem) taxes of the County of Lincoln wherein said property is located. The Village Clerk shall file in his office proof of publication and of mailing of said notice. The notice as so published and mailed shall contain a brief description of the lots and pieces of land to be so assessed and the amount to be assessed against each and shall state that according to the provisions of Laws of New Mexico, 1901, Chapter 72, as amended, also cited as Sections 14-40-9 to 14-40-15, both inclusive, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, as amended, any owner or owners, in whole or in part, or their legal representatives, has the right within ten days after the date of the last publication of said notice, stating the date, to bring suit in the district court having jurisdiction according to law then existing over the controversy, to review the action of said Board of Trustees.

Section 2 That whenever any notice is mailed as herein provided, the fact that the person to whom it was addressed does not receive it shall not in any manner invalidate or affect the legality of the notice thereby given.

Section 3 That all action heretofore taken (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance) by the Board of Trustees and the officers of the Village of Ruidoso toward the construction and maintenance of sanitary sewers in the area designated as "Ruidoso, New Mexico, Sewer District No. 1," the levy of assessments to defray a portion of the cost thereof, and the giving of notice in connection therewith, be, and the same hereby is, ratified, approved and confirmed.

Section 4 That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall for any reason be held invalid or unenforceable, the validity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5 That all orders, by-laws, resolutions and ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6 That the officers and employees of the Village be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 7 That this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and is hereby declared to be an



State Planner Says Ruidoso Needs Are Unique

Albert Solnit, principal planner with the State Planning Department of Santa Fe, met with the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, Monday night at their regular meeting.

Wayne Estes, acting as chairman, deferred other business and introduced Solnit to the commissioners present.

Solnit spoke informally to the small group. He said he considered Ruidoso unique and that its planning should be in keeping with this uniqueness. Ruidoso has many natural features and advantages, he said, and it should be kept clearly in view that Ruidoso is a recreation area, and he added, if you try to duplicate the shopping centers and the general business environment of other places that exist for different economic reasons, you may destroy the environment which draws people from other areas to Ruidoso.

He also mentioned that zoning is but one tool to implement planning, other tools are building codes, fire regulations and subdivision regulations and these should also support and over-lap each other, he said. Keep zoning simple, he advised, zoning should help to keep a town's growth orderly.

Estes asked, "Is zoning good for a community of this type?" Solnit cited two examples where zoning had been beneficial, the two similar communities were Aspen, Colorado and the Lake Tahoe region of California, both have found zoning a distinct aid. However, you have to know what you want to do and you have to identify your problems.

Solnit used Albuquerque as an example where zoning in effect without an overall plan where many problems have been created. Zoning is definitely an aid to a community that knows what it wants and is willing to work for it, he said.

Solnit warned against transient operators who are only interested in a "fast buck" and care little about the stable and orderly growth of the community. He also mentioned that provisions should be made in Ruidoso for transient and summer residents and that traffic could be made into beautiful and harmonious areas. They should be provided with space, views, and landscaping where they become an asset to the occupants and the community. He promised to send Jim Hine information from his office on planning for trailer areas.

Solnit also stated that he thought Ruidoso had some of the greatest natural advantages with the state of New Mexico and is unique in that it has practically all types of recreation available and easily accessible.

In closing, Solnit stated that he had received a Yale faculty appointment and would be leaving the State Planning Department within two weeks. He wished the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission the best of success and advised them again to keep in mind that Ruidoso's greatest assets is its natural setting for recreation.

16 Break-Ins Net Robbers \$318 In Two Weeks

The cash loss in the five break-ins last Friday night totaled only about \$75, an interview Monday with the five owners and managers showed. The five establishments broken into Friday night were: Estes Cleaners, Sportswear Shop, Bob's Mobil Service Station, Lonnie's Drive-In Grocery and Home and Auto Store.

E. C. Estes reported Monday that entrance to Estes Cleaners was through the breaking of a rear door and window. Approximately \$15 in cash and change was taken together with a brown suit, a white dinner jacket and a pair of black slacks. Estes also stated that seven or eight other garments may be missing. The bags covering many suits ready for delivery were torn and papers and cancelled checks were strewn about.

Mrs. O. B. Waltrip reported that police while investigating the break-in at Estes Cleaners noted that her rear window was broken and the rear door open. She reported approximately \$10 in change missing and 35 silver dollars. Her stock of merchandise was not too badly disturbed, she said, and she was not able to determine the full loss. However, papers in her desk and filing cabinets were strewn over her back room and some of the papers had been burned.

Bob Moore reported that the same rear window was broken which was priced open two weeks ago when \$35 in change and a transistor radio were taken. In the Friday's break-in, Moore said, he had not yet found any loss.

Leon Herring, manager of Lonnie's, when interviewed Monday, stated that his front glass door was broken and that about \$15 in change was taken. They scattered bananas about the store and apparently left through the rear door, he said. Apparently no other merchandise was taken.

H. C. Boyd, owner of the Home and Auto Store stated that the glass in his front door was broken sometime early Saturday between 2:30 and 4:00 a.m. and that apparently the store was not entered since his cash register was not disturbed and there seemed to be no merchandise missing.

Village Marshall T. J. Sanders reported that the new patrolman Gene Baker, age 50, who was employed May 8, had an accident while patrolling on Sudderth Drive. Baker, after hearing the right front door locked and threw the patrol car into a parked pickup belonging to J. H. Cooper, the chief damage was to the right front fender and windshield of the patrol car, he said.

Sanders also stated that both patrol cars have more than 100,000 miles and are in constant use on a twenty-four hour basis and that the police department has been making an effort to keep in use the old cars until the end of the fiscal year. However, he stated, both cars patrol more than 100 miles per day.

Ruidoso, due to its terrain, and large transient population, is a little more difficult to patrol than most cities of its size, Sanders said. "Until this month we have been operating the police department with three patrolmen operating the department 24 hours, seven days a week, now we have four," he said. "which is needed due to the large number of drifters and hitch-hikers who follow the races."

Sanders also pointed out that the five break-ins reported last Saturday were all reported first by patrolmen: Bob Moore's, reported by patrol at 3:30 a.m., nothing taken; Boyd's Home and Auto, reported by patrolman at 4:28 a.m., nothing taken; Lonnie's, reported by patrolman at 8:01 a.m., \$127 in change taken; Estes Cleaners, reported by patrolman at 7:20 a.m., \$12 to \$15 in change taken plus some clothing; Sportswear Shop, reported by patrolman at 7:57 a.m., \$35 silver dollars plus \$10 to \$12 in change taken. He also added, that with the 16 break-ins and attempted ones within the past two weeks, \$318 was the total cash taken.

Sanders also said that some break-ins like the Mt. View drive-in, which is not within the village, are also investigated by the department. Sanders said that he was certain-

Reservation Fire Is Between Forks Of Rio Ruidoso

A fire within the Mescalero Indian Reservation was spotted by the Ruidoso Lookout at 3:25 Wednesday afternoon. Lincoln National Forest surveillance planes from the Alamogordo headquarters reporting about 4:00 p.m. from above the fire located it as burning from one to one and one-half acres in an area between the middle fork and the north fork of the Rio Ruidoso, at about 9,000 feet elevation.

A group of trained Indian fire fighters under the direction of Glen Elrich, forester in charge of fire for the Bureau of Indian Affairs on the Mescalero reservation were reported on their way to the fire. It was estimated by Bob Elarton, assistant ranger at the Ruidoso ranger station that the Indians would reach the scene of the fire within about two hours or about 6:00 p.m.

Jim McEuen, fire control officer of the Ruidoso district, explained that the Bureau of Indian Affairs, under the Department of Interior, maintained an excellent fire fighting program on Indian reservations and that the Forest Service, under the Department of Agriculture, assisted them only at their request, when the fire is on Indian land. However, he mentioned that Forest Service tanker planes have been alerted in Alamogordo to drop "slurry" on the fire, should it be requested.

The fire could be seen from Ruidoso late Wednesday afternoon.

Elrich, Forester in charge of fire on the Mescalero Indian reservation reported Thursday morning that the fire was under control and that approximately 10 acres, mostly brush, had been burned.

He stated that a crew of approximately 15 were now "mopping up" the area.

Grazing Association, Forest Personnel See 5 Year Range Management Results

The Ruidoso Grazing Association in conjunction with the Lincoln National Forest staged their first joint Field Day last Thursday.

The field day began at 9:00 a.m. with members of the association, their guests and Forest Service field men assembling at the Mayme Perry ranch at Glencoe. From the Perry ranch a caravan of jeeps and pick-ups formed to inspect transects established by the Forest Service on the South Coe Allotment in 1955. A transect is a 100 foot linear measurement in which grass samplings are taken at one foot intervals on the same terrain each five years. This is to evaluate the grass condition on the range and to gauge whether the grass is increasing or decreasing.

The South Coe Allotment is an area of approximately nine sections of which 4,400 acres are graded "good" grazing for approximately a 90-cow unit and where a "rest rotation" of pasturing has been practiced for more than eight years. The current annual rental for permittees on the South Coe Allotment is \$4.38 per cow unit. This rental may vary according to range conditions and to the market value of beef. Bob Elarton, assistant ranger, Ruidoso District, explained.

Elarton also stated that there are 26 Forest Service allotments in the Ruidoso district which total in area better than 100,000 acres. The allotments are assigned only to ranchers who also own grazing land within the National Forest and are assigned on a multiple use basis. The five principal considerations for allotments are: Range management, wild life management, timber management, watershed, and recreation. Permittees are required to maintain all fences and where cabling underbrush and dozer work is recommended the permittee pays one half of the expense. Where wells are drilled for water on the allotments, the permittee pays for the windmill or the required hardware for the well.

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




