

**LOCAL MAN FATALLY STRICKEN**

**JOCKEY FATALLY INJURED**

Ruidoso Downs jockey, Richard Lujan, 31, died Friday when he was thrown from a horse during a workout at the track.

The Tucson resident, was riding a two-year-old filly, Strawwite, when the accident occurred. The News was told that the horse belonged to Jack Shoemaker.

It was reported Lujan had whipped the filly a few times, the horse dived toward the rail and Lujan fell off. His protective helmet came loose and he crashed head first into the rail. Lujan was described as one of the country's top quarter horse jockeys.

His survivors include his widow and three children.

Lujan, 30, was born in Taos Nov. 8, 1932. He and his wife, Deanna, were parents of three children, William Denton, 8; Rikki Lynn, 6, and Nona Bam, 4. Also surviving Lujan were his mother, Tillie Garcia Lujan, Albuquerque; two sisters, Mrs. Loyola Lechore, Albuquerque and Mrs. Eleanor Valdez, Columbia, Utah; and two brothers, Cipriano Lujan, in the Air Force and Demacio Lujan, in the Army.

Funeral was held Wednesday morning this week in St. Eleanor's Catholic church here, with burial in Forest Lawn cemetery.

He had raced at tracks in several Southwestern cities, and had been racing in Ruidoso the last eight years.

**NEW DIRECTORS NAMED BY BANK, HOOD ELEVATED TO PRESIDENCY**

Ruidoso State Bank has three new directors on its board, and some new officers, following a transfer of stock completed recently. The new directors were chosen in a meeting here Tuesday evening.

On the board now are Dr. James A. Beall, local dentist; Jack Hitchens, telephone company executive here; and J. C. Powell, Jr., a Roswell banker. They succeeded A. Eiland, Lawrence and L. Butler and Ernest Blood, Ruidoso. All three have been board members since the bank was organized ten years ago. Powell of Roswell bought the stock owned by the veteran board members.

Named president of the bank was T. B. Hood, who has served as executive vice-president since its opening and elected vice-president and cashier was Ed Wimberly. Wimberly has been cashier for about three years. Hood succeeded Ernest Blood as president and Wimberly succeeded Butler in the vice-presidency. Ralph Petty, named a board member only a few years ago, was named chairman of the board, succeeding Eiland.

Although Powell purchased a considerable block of stock in the bank here, the majority of stock owned is held by local residents.

The directors voted to declare a \$2.50 per share dividend June 30 for all shareholders, which will total \$4,062.50. Wimberly said.

**Pioneer Lincoln County Teacher Dies in Arkansas**





This year, for the first time in many years, no effort was made anyone to sponsor or conduct a clean-up campaign. Our Community, known far and wide for its natural beauty, needs a thorough clean-up. The Rio Ruidoso is loaded with trash, old tire vacuums, tin cans and bottles and other junk. Many of our vacant lots are eyesores, and health and fire dangers, because of accumulation of combustible materials. This is a job for some ambitious, civic minded organization to tackle.

### Three Very Fine Fellows

The Ruidoso News salutes three very fine fellows. All three are rising from civic positions of high trust and all three have done excellent jobs in their posts. One is J. Howard Morris, retiring after 30 years in public school life. He started as a teacher and ended as a school administrator of high calibre, and he takes with the respect, admiration and good feelings of the many hundreds of students who were under his supervision, as well as many dozens of teachers who were under his administration. Another is R. H. Hedgecock, who drove a school bus for the last 15 years, and last month after 30 years work carrying youngsters to and from school in all kinds of weather—and without a single mishap on his safety record. He, too, has many staunch admirers among students, faculty and parents. Then, A. E. Hunt, who also has a long record of service in public schools, and who turned to the office of manager of the Ruidoso Honda Valley Chamber of Commerce, says he wants to stop working so hard and enjoy some of the recreation that abounds hereabouts. On several occasions he has attempted to go into private business, but each time some public service opening beckoned him to shoulder a burden in the public interest. He served Ruidoso well in his one year as manager, and we regret seeing him leave that office. Some of the things he did and planned while in the managerial post will bear fruit for the playground of the Southwest for many years. He made a great contribution to Ruidoso in his short term, and best wishes for success to all of you in your private undertakings in the future.

### It's Not Fair

That old curmudgeon, I. M. Crusty, came by and set a spell on the edge of our desk the other day and declared he's going to stage a one man revolt. "If I should ever be given a ticket by the State Police for driving my vehicle with an out-dated brake and light sticker, I'm going all the way to the Supreme Court, if convicted, to fight the unjustness of it. I see no reason why I should be fined for an out of date car sticker, because of the way they are issued. The last four times I got a sticker, each one from a different garage, only one of them made even a reasonable attempt to comply with the law in seeing if all the safety factors my car were working. Two of them just slapped a sticker on a windshield and collected a dollar for them—and that's all the work they did. One other checked the lights only, and collected the dollar. The fourth checked the brakes and lights, (but not the emergency brake) and collected his dollar. Now, how can any "ake and light sticker be a valid substantiation that the law is being followed for them has been observed?"

The garageman is due, and should, make some money from his brake and light sticker law by having some mechanical work done upon a complete inspection. He stands the chance to earn more than the \$1 and for good reason. The driver and his passengers would certainly like to know if there is work needed on lights, brakes, windshield wipers and other such devices that will protect life and property. We pointed out to Mr. Crusty the blame shouldn't be shouldered entirely by the garageman, either, for the driver can, and should, insist that a thorough and competent check be made. We wonder if Mr. Crusty would ever get as far as the Supreme Court to test his crusade?

### 15 Years Ago

News items from Ruidoso News issue of June 11, 1948.

The City Council of the Village of Ruidoso with Mayor John Christman presiding, held a mass meeting of all citizens interested in learning the complete story of the water situation in Ruidoso. The City Council had two wells drilled below Ruidoso near Hollywood. The first one was paid for, but not the second, and the people of Ruidoso were asked to help pay for the second well which was about \$3,000. Immediately four Ruidoso men, Denny Davis, Bud Sheff, Buford Fisher, and Ted Johnson each gave \$100 to start the ball rolling.

A group of 100 visitors and local people attended the barbecue preceding the square dance on the front lawn of the Navajo Lodge. The evening festivities were held to mark the end of a week's square dance school held by Herb Gregerson.

The Village of Ruidoso reported that total disbursements for the month of May 1948 was \$1,790.52. This included the clerk-treasurer's salary of \$175, Marshall's salary of \$107.50, police judge salary of \$98.40 and fire department caretaker's salary of \$150.

Edward Tillman of Tularosa was the first person to register for private lessons in piano at the Arts Colony of the Southwest here. The 16-year-old boy was Tularosa's representative to Boy's State at El Rito. He was mostly self-taught and played Bach, Beethoven, Chopin and other masters.

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# FACILITIES FOR PRESS FOR PRESIDENT'S VISIT DESCRIBED BY NEWSMAN

(Editor's Note: Ruidoso News reporter Dick Bennett, below gives a report of his coverage of President John F. Kennedy's inspection of Holloman AFB and White Sands Missile Base last Wednesday which he attended. Some photos he made were in last week's paper, and additional ones are reproduced in the News this week.)

Wednesday, June 5, the members of the working press, radio and television began arriving at the Officers Club at the White Sands Missile Range for the President's visit. The briefing session was scheduled for the press at 11:30 a.m. and a lunch-

eon at the club was served with the El Paso Chamber of Commerce as hosts. Each member of the press was registered in and given a special press badge and was assigned a number designating the bus which would be his transportation throughout the missile exercise.

Senator Edwin L. Mechem and Governor Jack M. Campbell were among the honored guests from New Mexico attending the luncheon, where film clips of former missile firings were shown. The program for the missile exercise was also explained as well as the services for newsmen which were available at each site.

Three firing sites were on the program, and after the luncheon the newsmen were transported by buses to the first site which skipped the site where the President's helicopter was to land and where he was to address the personnel of the White Sands Missile Range. It was explained to the 160 newsmen that his speech would be piped to them by loudspeakers at the launching site No. One where the President would proceed immediately after his speech.

For transportation purposes and for seating arrangements in the specially erected bleachers at each firing site for the Presidential party and invited guests, the newsmen were divided into three general classifications, the White House Press of about 60, the NATO press of 20 and the White Sands Press, of about 100, which was the designation for local editors and reporters from Texas, New Mexico and Arizona and all other local and national news medias.

At firing sites or launch areas One and Three, 60 desks, 60 typewriters, 20 long distance telephones and six teletype machines were furnished for the convenience of the newsmen. At launch area Two the facilities were 10 desks, 10 typewriters and 20 long distance telephones. Press kit materials and paper supplies were available at all sites. After arriving at launch area One, the press was informed by radio and loudspeakers of the delays in the scheduled arrival time of the Presidential party. Almost one hour after his scheduled time of arrival, the

band, playing "Hail to the Chief", came over the loudspeakers, and the President's speech of praise to the 15,650 personnel of White Sands Missile Range followed.

Approximately 15 minutes after the speech he arrived at firing site No. One followed by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and a number of Congressmen and Senators and high ranking civilian and military officials.

The President stopped to shake hands with Hiram Dow, of Roswell who was among the invited spectators in the stands. Congressman Joe Montoya and Senator Ed Mechem were others from New Mexico who were present.



## HORSES CANNOT BE MOVED

An epidemic of influenza has appeared among race horses in New Mexico. The State Cattle Sanitary Board last Thursday forbid for the time being, any horse being moved from either the Ruidoso Downs or La Mea tracks.

Lee Garner, secretary of the board, said the order was to prevent the spread of the disease to other horses. The respiratory disease, which Garner said is similar to influenza in humans, is highly contagious, he said. It is not serious, however, and properly treated animals recover in a short time, he said.

Deaths of two horses at Ruidoso Downs in the last week had nothing to do with the non-moving order, Garner said. The deaths were said to have been caused by a mysterious "Colitis-X" virus.

"Colitis-X is a very serious disease, but is not contagious," Garner said. "The virus is probably in the stomach. I've checked and double-checked, and there is no connection between it and the influenza."

The influenza has spread widely among the race horses, Garner said. About 600 of the 1200 horses now at Ruidoso Downs track have symptoms of the disease. He had no figures of the number ill at La Mea track near Raton.

No case of influenza has been reported in any New Mexico horse not at a race track, Garner said, adding: "We've had our inspectors

keeping a close watch." Prime purpose of the no-moving order is to prevent spread of the disease to other horses.

"We understand the disease is prevalent in other tracks over the country," Garner said.

The board order will have no effect on operation of the tracks. Races can continue as usual—assuming there are enough well horses to race.

"I really isn't anything to be alarmed about," said Garner. "What we're trying to do now is prevent spread of the disease over the state. Our order against moving a horse away from the tracks is only temporary. I'm sure in a few days we will be able to change it, so a horse can be moved after being found well by a veterinarian."

A group of veterinarians from the University of Kentucky, who have been studying the disease, were at Ruidoso Downs making tests to identify the particular virus involved. The same veterinarians also are checking the "Colitis-X" virus.

"Insofar as we know, no death has been caused by influenza," said Garner. "The horses are responding to treatment. It is no worse than influenza in a human being."



## Dick Siebeck To Be Overseer New Gill Bros. Breeding Farm

"Daring Dick" Siebeck, a personality-plus kid who would probably turn down a Playboy Club membership as drab and uninteresting, came into town like a Sunland Park wind this season.

The 35-year-old Siebeck, it seems, has little time for pleasure now, having been appointed commander-in-chief, along with veteran trainer Lyle T. Lee, of the vast quarter horse breeding program being undertaken by the Gill Brothers' Cattle Company of Tucson.

Formerly manager of the Gills' ranch at Sasabe, Ariz., and now headquartered at the company's Lightning A Horse Ranch at Tucson, Siebeck disclosed that all of the Gills' broodmares and stallions would be moved to Exeter, Calif., where they would be bred to the outstanding quarter horse studs and mares standing in the Golden State.

The yearlings will be based at the Lightning A Ranch from now on, with Siebeck, no slouch as a hand himself, helping to break 'em for the racing wars. The Gills, in comparison to the mere 64 acres of the Tucson yearling station, have such other vast holdings in cattle and feed as 40,000 acres in Sheridan, Wyo., and 35,000 acres in Tulare, Calif., and 45,000 acres in Exeter.

A close friend of Gene Hensley, father of Ruidoso Downs horse racing, Siebeck also has personal interests in "The Niblick" lounge at Tucson's Rolling Hills C. C., and in Ft. Huachuca and Florence real estate with Fred Busby.

"In moving our breeding operations to California," says Siebeck, "I believe our continued upgrading program in breeding will result in even finer racing stock than we've had the pleasure of breeding, breaking and/or racing by our two fine stallions, Bar Tonto and Glass Truckle. We plan now on breeding our best mares in California to such top-ranked stallions as Moon Deck, Three Bars, Go Man Go, Triple Chick, etc."

Continuing, Siebeck said "our objective is to raise quarter horses with speed, conformation and disposition, and in the arena we have at Lightning A Ranch, we hope to develop the quarter horse of all trades—roping, cutting, barrel, and show ring, etc."

## 920 HORSES TESTED AT DOWNS

Dr. E. R. Doll, head of the serology department and Dr. Craig Frauks, animal pathologist, were at the Ruidoso Downs track last Wednesday through Friday making studies of the respiratory virus which has been prevalent with race horses throughout the East and Midwest this season.

The Kentucky doctors made blood tests from 920 horses and took 15 nasal swabs from 15 horses at the Ruidoso track. Dr. Joe Miller stated Monday, their project, he said, is to type the virus and the two doctors have visited many of the tracks throughout this area making tests.

Both Dr. Miller and Dr. Sid Zarges stated Monday that the cases of the respiratory virus at the track here are decreasing and that they know of no fatalities that could be attributed to the virus alone unless there were other complications, such as colitis. The doctors stated that every type of test to date has shown that colitis is not contagious.

Members of the board of stewards stated Monday that the track here is not in quarantine in the strict sense of the word, but rather that they are trying to control the movement of horses so that the respiratory virus may be better studied and controlled.

Results of the tests will be studied for several months, the visiting doctors said.

being sore had had luck here at Ruidoso. He shined bucked after the Ruidoso Open Futurity; and then they fired him and turned him out for 42 days. They picked him up and with three weeks of training in him, he ran 400 yards in :20.4 at Phoenix, Ariz., in November, equalling the colt record held by Pokey Bar here at Ruidoso Downs.

Back at Los Alamitos he started five times and won five times. He won the big race, the purse, \$207,000 which was the richest race ever run in California, including the Thoroughbreds.  
This year he started 11 times at Los Alamitos and won all of them, disqualifying in one. He holds the world's two-year-old record at 400 yards in :20 flat, and won the Championship race at Los Alamitos, 440 yards in :21.49. His total earnings 'til now are \$166,254. And he didn't run in the All American! He is currently the leading money-winning quarter horse of the world!

Our All-American race this year looks good. Out of 318 entries, we have around 115 nominees left, and there's always a few late penalty payers. So it looks like the purse may run around \$250,000! 




